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### **OUTDOORS**

Now that spring is creeping out unmistakably from under the wet gloom that seems to have shrouded us since October, I find I'm hungering for it more than ever. 'Spring seems more moving each year,' a dear old friend said to me, as we flew to Seville for a conference in April 1975. As I get well past the age he was then, I know what he means. Partly it's a visceral thing. Our bodies need light because it helps us to secrete melatonin, the chemical of wellbeing or euphoria. It's also visual. We need to see

colour, variety, texture, and the damp greyish-blues of winter slate and tarmac, the washedout browns of winter woodlands, are too drab to satisfy the need. And then it's a psychological thing. Once I didn't care about time passing because there was plenty of it. If you're past seventy and know you're in the fourth quarter of your life, you can't help greeting each spring with intensity, because you may not have all

that many left, and with relief because at least you've made it through another winter.

The first wild primroses I saw this year were on February 24. A clump was growing up a mossed long-dead treestump in Low Park Wood on the west side of Whitbarrow

a little north of Witherslack Hall. On a day of drizzling overcast they seemed to radiate their own clear yellow light. Weeks before that, hundreds of hazel catkins had begun to signal from the copses, looking luminous on clouded days. The twigs they dangle from are so slender that the catkins always look to be hovering in mid-air, unsupported. Then on March 3 Anne and I saw our first blackthorn blossom, like small snowflakes on a sharp black twig, near where the canal abruptly ends as a waterway at Stainton.

Once this is all happening, it comes in a steady flood, and at times you almost want to slow it down to savour it (and to prolong your own life.) Now (March 13)

celandines are opening their shiny yellow cups and through their succulent beds of foliage the dangerous teeth of nettles are starting to push through and will soon overwhelm them. Green sprouts of young leaf are starting to show on branch after branch of hawthorn, elder, hazel and willow in particular, although the sap has not yet reached the branch ends of the bigger trees.

The birds have been showing their colours for a good many weeks now. Bluetits had become almost unrecognisable after the summer's desperate brooding and feeding young. Around Christmas they turned smart

yellow-and-blue. At the same time the breasts of male chaffinches began to glow ember-red again after the summer's fading. The sexual politics of the birds have hotted up too. Last year blackbirds showed the second-highest productivity (after the greenfinch) of all garden birds compared with the previous twenty years, according to the British Ornithological Trust, and both figures hold true of our garden. Greenfinches feed avidly on the sunflower hearts, ousting all other species from the feeders when they want to. On most days at least two male blackbirds will be flustering at each other, darting and rushing at rivals even when there is no obvious prize to be gained. No doubt there is a brown female nearby who will mate with the male most adept at protecting a feeding patch.

By the time you read this piece the wild daffodils at Brigsteer and Witherslack will have bloomed and withered. The green hay will be visibly deeper in the fields. Garden walls will be foaming with clematis Montana and flowering cherries will have sent up their fountains of pink blossom. The hedges will be dense screens of leafage once again, hiding the birds' nests, and only the ash trees will still be looking as stark as they have done all winter.

#### Roger Reports On....

#### **Cumbria's Sad Day**

The saddest event of the last month for Cumbria was also the most encouraging. This was the great train derailment at Grayrigg on 23 February in which one lady died and several people were injured including the heroic driver whose actions, along with the train's design, seem to have averted a much higher casualty rate. The encouraging parts included the instantaneous response of local people - neighbours, voluntary organisations of all kinds from mountain rescue teams to RWVS ladies and to the Cumbria Police and Fire and Rescue Services. Within half an hour 400 people had negotiated a maze of lanes and slithered down boggy hillsides in driving rain and pitch dark to reach the scene. Kendal's fire fighters were the first professionals to get there but, our Chief Fire Officer told me, Milnthorpe's retained fire fighters were second. Lessons learned during the 2005 Carlisle floods included the immediate ordering of a 'Gold Alert' which meant that the Chief Constable had legal powers, for example, to requisition property and vehicles. Along with Rail Track and Virgin Train staff both the County and District officers supported the 300 people who laid the half mile long emergency road, repaired the track and removed the wreckage so that the main line was reopened in 16 days. The inquest has opened in Kendal and it is possible that part of the official enquiry will also be held in County Hall. Hopefully farmers and other people will be speedily compensated for any costs and already Grayrigg Village Hall has been granted £10,000.

#### **Budgetary Matters**

Meanwhile we are taking stock after the furore of the Budget Debates. Official figures show that in our division of Lower Kentdale Cumbria's spending on roads in 2006-07 included: Main St. Burton £29,060, Station Rd. £46,170, Hutton Roof to Burton Rd. £80,544, Greenside and Kitridding Lupton £39,905 and £13,828 and Preston Patrick roads £31,126. A Neighbourhood Forum grant of £20.000 shows 'continued commitment to the Parish Lengthman Scheme' which the Parish Council is administering. Other useful grants include £4,250 to Community Transport South Lakeland, which I and several Burton residents, like Peter Ellis and currently Peter Smith, have long supported. As so often home to school travel is one of our most troublesome transport issues, I have long battled for free transport to QES for Holme pupils; now sixth formers from Burton may have to pay school bus fares. Already Cumbria spends £179 p.a. per pupil on school transport compared to a national average of £167, amounting to £14m p.a. The County's aim is that every young person will have a NOW card which will be free for eligible pupils and part-funded for others. Sixth formers who receive the £30 p.w. Educational Maintenance Allowance will be expected to pay up to a maximum of £10 p.w. for transport.

#### **Quarry Worries**

I am pleased that the problem of quarry blasting seems to have abated and that some attempt has been made to deal with the congealed 'dust' on the A6070. Also I had a most enjoyable meeting about the wildlife reserve - it is

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
amazing how many species are preserved and recorded by many devoted supporters.

#### **Post Office Worries**

Although not a council service, we are all worried about the decline of rural post offices. Parliament has been told that 2,500 (one in six) could close in the next 18 months despite active opposition and petitions from all political parties. Cumbria is considering ways of providing alternative P.O. services in, e.g., village halls or in mobile libraries. Neither Burton nor Holme's Post Offices are threatened, but as in all rural services we must remember to 'use them or lose them'.



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## Going Green - April '07

#### Have you got the bottle?

Carbonlite has seen the future, or rather read about it in the Sunday Times. He filled me in on the latest 'reality behind the science' of climate change over breakfast. "It's scary stuff this," he said, putting down his fakon butty. "By the time the Carboncopies are our age, a third of the earth will be without fresh water, polar bears will have been pushed off the top of the planet, and the Maldives will no longer exist. And that's if the earth warms up by one

degree, which given our addiction to carbon, is unavoidable. If it warms up by two degrees, Europe will have Saharan heat waves, Greenland will have melted irreversibly, central London will be in flood, half of humanity will have moved to higher ground and a third of all living species will be extinct. Our only chance of avoiding this is to cut greenhouse gases by at least 60% in the next ten years. And what

are the chances of that?" he said gloomily. Halfway through his portrait of Armageddon my sandwich seemed less appealing. "What if the earth warms up by three degrees?" I asked. "You really don't want to know," he replied, collecting up the crusts for composting. "Perhaps I'll cycle to Tesco today," I told him, ditching the latest gossip on Brittany Spears and reaching for the broadsheet.

Carbonlite took to the bottle that night to drown his sorrows. But it only made things worse. "Why is this cork made out of plastic?" he slurred, flinging it at the wall. "Three million acres of cork forests and wildlife are endangered by this pointless fashion. If farmers can't harvest and sell cork

they'll convert their forests into timber and that third degree of global warming will also be inevitable." The 'cork that wasn't cork' lay on the carpet, another small example of our collective failure to care for our planet. I left Carbonlite nursing his wine and logged on to check my email. An anonymous rant about the environmental cost of plastic milk cartons was at the top of the pile. "Hey, I think you have a soulmate," I told Carbonlite. He ambled over, and looking over my shoulder, he read out the message urging us to consider bottled milk and avoid buying

> supermarket dairy products. "If you buy milk from the supermarket it's likely to be in a Tetra Pak carton or plastic milk bottle made from high density polyethylene. These Tetra-Paks, because they are made of different materials fused together, are very hard to recycle and many kerb side collections don't allow carton recycling." Carbonlite nodded in agreement, "Who do you think sent the message?" he

asked. "Well, it wasn't the manager of Tesco that's for sure." I told him, powering down the computer.

A few days later there was a knock at the door. A man with a milk truck stood before me. "I'm Mikey the milkman. I sent you an email but then realised I forgot to sign it," he said. I seized the chance to make Carbonlite a happy man, immediately ordering two bottles of milk a day. No more plastic containers clogging up the downstairs loo, no daily semi-skimmed trips to the supermarket, no depressed husband. Just a trip to the doorstep to return bottles for washing and refilling rather than pulping, and two happy Carboncopies fighting for possession of the

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milk. I congratulated myself on my eco action, but Carbonlite didn't join in. "It's not nearly enough," he said matter of factly as he put the kettle on. I was stung by his criticism. "But we've cut our emissions by 20% over the last year," I reminded him. "And you were pleased when we worked out our new carbon footprint."

He poured some milk into his coffee, put the bottle top aside for recycling and told me his assessment had changed since reading the Sunday Times. "So what do you suggest we do, build an ark?" I asked. He shrugged. "It's up to you what you do," he replied. "I can't drive your actions. But tinkering around at the edges with milk bottles and corks isn't going stop global warming now. You need to tackle the big stuff. Dispose of throw away nappies for good? Aim for zero waste? Do without the car for a month? You call yourself an eco worrier. So tell me Eco Worrier, what do you have the bottle for?"

#### **SLDC Recycling News**

We answer some more of the questions raised in recent months...

## Why are plastic and cardboard not included in the recycling boxes?

These materials are both light and bulky and would require householders to use two more collection boxes. The Council would also need to introduce additional collection vehicles and staff or larger vehicles, which may not be able to access many parts of the district. As the materials are light and bulky the amount of recyclable

materials collected would make collections environmentally unsustainable and financially expensive.

## Why are there restrictions on the materials collected for recycling?

The materials are used to manufacture new products and compost. The manufacturers have specified the materials that can be collected for processing.

#### Why are bottle and jar tops not recyclable?

These are made from a variety of materials and many are plastic coated. The combination of materials makes it difficult to recycle bottle and jar tops. Unfortunately at the moment they can only be sent to landfill.

## Why are used envelopes not collected with the paper?

The paper collected in South Lakeland is mainly used to manufacture newsprint. The glue used is oil-based and this interferes with the recycling process, particularly for newsprint. The glue can cause the paper reels to split and this can be a major problem during the print run. Also the window part of envelopes cannot be recycled. However if you have a compost bin envelopes can be composted if you remove the window section.

## Comments on the goings-on at the Parish Council

#### "KNOWING NO BOUNDS"

This month the Parish Council held their Annual Meeting, at which Debbie Binch, the Neighbourhood Development Officer, gave a short speech, mostly about the Neighbourhood Forum. Our area comes under the name "Kent Estuary". Matters of local interest are raised, and the Forum can give grants for local projects. As An Opinion has connections with at least two of the organisations which have been the lucky (and deserving!) recipients of funds from this source, the talk was of especial interest. It didn't last long, and neither did the following questions.

Sandwiches were kindly provided by the Chairman's wife, and sparkling water was drunk, with no immediate illeffects, or over-indulgence.

Apart from A.O., one solitary 'member of the public' was present to hear the Chairman's report. This was a summary of the work and achievements of the Parish Council, and the Chairman thanked PCIIrs for their (voluntary) work. The full report will no doubt appear on the new PC notice-board.

#### **Community Police**

There was no police presence, and there probably never will be again. In a letter to the PC, PC Suart pointed out the drastic cutting of officers from 28 to 16, which he said had led to "a vast increase" in their patrol area, and heavier workload. He promised to send a report when possible. PC Suart is a man of few words. His report raised the

dangers of buying items on eBay when paying cash direct to the seller. His one reported misdemeanour in this area was damage to a vehicle parked on Drovers Way, possibly by an air rifle. Incidents appear to have decreased dramatically since his arrival.

#### **Public Forum**

Praise for Parish Council: A newcomer to the village introduced himself, and said how impressed he was with the work done by the PC. As is A.O.'s usual custom, his name remains anonymous, but here's a clue: it would make him eligible for the House of Lords.

#### The Lengthsman

He's up and running! And doing a very good job, reported the chairman. So far he's collected eight plastic bags of rubbish on each of the days he's worked. Other parishes also reported great satisfaction with the arrangement.

#### **Christmas Tree Lights**

These will be considered nearer the time, when they appear for sale in catalogues etc.

#### Map of the Area

The map displayed on the wall opposite the Royal Hotel carpark is to be replaced by a laminated one which it's hoped will remain free from condensation, and readable, for the benefit of the many walkers who come through Burton.

#### **NatWest Returns**

NPS, acting on behalf of SLDC and Impact Housing, have written to the PC requesting that the lease held on the playing field, which expires on Sept. 30<sup>th</sup>, should be relinquished on April 30<sup>th</sup> instead, so that Impact can commence to build. In return they offer rent-free use of the playing-field for the next five years.

Confusion reigned. First thoughts were to delay permission, thus at least allowing this summer for children to have full use of the field. Hold on a minute! warned others. Here's a chance to negotiate. Good may yet come of this tricky situation. Hmmm...

The confusion arises because there is no clear definition of what the boundaries of the playing-field will finally be. How can this be? asks A.O. (but not aloud, of course). Isn't that precisely what planning is about? It's hard to believe this wasn't part and parcel of the plan that was passed by the Planning Cttee. Perhaps it was. What do I know? It was sad to see well-meaning PClIrs apparently at a total loss while rings are run round them by

professionals whose aim has to be to squeeze every advantage for their clients.

Our PClerk will write to NPS asking to see the plans of the area that will be used by the builders during the building operation, and the boundaries of the play area when they've completed their task. At the same time he will ask for confirmation that Impact (the developers - good name) will provide and maintain the play equipment.

Who's NPS? you ask. Here's the answer, which may be of interest. I quote from info. at the foot of their letter:"NPS North-West is a subsidiary of NPS Property Consultants Ltd, and is a controlled company of Norfolk County Council." Good old Norfolk. At least that council seems to have its wits about it. The "subsidiary" bit seems to consist of ex-SLDC employees.

Can SLDC claim after this, with any conviction, that Carlisle is too remote from our area to be our unitary authority? Perhaps someone should give them a lesson in geography.



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## fit for life

Dr Kenneth Cooper recommends 20 to 30 minutes of aerobic exercise, three to four days a week (Cooper Wellness Centre.)

You may find exercise easier to maintain if you are accountable to another person, so recruit a friend or family member to exercise with. Join an exercise group or class, then continue to exercise regularly. Make exercise a priority.

When starting an exercise programme, you need to determine your heart rate range. Your target heart rate should be between 50 and 80 per cent of maximum heart rate. Find your maximum heart rate by subtracting your age from 220. Multiply that by 0.5 to give you 50% then multiply by 0.8 to give you 80%. For example, a 40 year old would subtract 40 from 220 (220-40=180). Then 180x0.5=90, then 180x0.8=144.

The exercise heart rate range is 90 to 144 beats per minute. Over say 6 months, you should increase your intensity from 90 beats per minute to 144bpm. Increasing your intensity beyond 80% can be harmful as more free radicals are produced. These excessive free radicals can damage tissue and organs.

Dr Cooper addresses this problem in his book - *Antioxidant Revolution*. In the book, he discusses the dangers of overtraining, especially training done by marathon runners, who constantly overtrain at high intensity and increase the risk of developing cancer, heart disease and other degenerative diseases.

Also, do not become a. weekend warrior, assuming that 30 mins of exercise, 3 to 4 times a week, are equal to 2 sessions of 2 to 3 hours of solid exercise at weekends! Weekend warriors have more pulled muscles, aches and pains, shin splints, foot problems and other musculoskeletal problems than regular exercisers.

Another example of someone who over-exerts, is the sedentary 50 year old male, who after strenuous physical exercise, like shovelling snow, is 10,000% more at risk of a heart attack than someone of the same age who exercises regularly and is conditioned!

Dr Cooper also recommends a thorough medical examination prior to starting an exercise programme, especially if you are over 30 and have any cardiovascular risk factors.

Stretching should be added to aerobic exercise. This helps prevent musculoskeletal injuries, and reduce symptoms of arthritis. Resistance exercise or weight training will preserve muscle mass and prevent osteoporosis.

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#### HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE by Roger Bingham

#### **FIFTY YEARS AGO - BURTON NEWS 1957**

#### **JANUARY**

After the New Year Watch Night Service the Vicar Rev. J.B. Philips and congregation were treated to mince pies at Green Cross by Miss Burgess. A severe Measles epidemic with 729 cases in a week swept the district. Mrs Wildman stood in for Father Christmas at the WI Children's party. Westmorland County Council budgeted to spend £1m p.a. on education.

#### **FEBRUARY**

Items in the Winter Sale Advertisement for Musgroves of Kendal included: 'Ladies Dresses 27/6, Nylon briefs 4/6, hook side corsets 16/6, front laced corsets 23/6; Men's caps 5/11, Winceyette Pyjamas 19/6, Sports Jackets from 95/-.' The Gas Board offered Gas Washing Machines at '£17:10 complete or £3:10s deposit and 1/9 per week.' PC Limon of Burton arrested a lorry driver for not keeping proper records. Mrs Margaret Rawsthorne, a solicitor's widow from Burton, left £7,714.

#### **MARCH**

Ian Raw was elected Chairman of Burton Youth Club. Burton WI celebrated its 25th Anniversary. Mrs Pemberton presided and Mrs Ellis played for dancing. During a 'Winter Heat Wave' temperatures rose to 69 in the shade. In the most sensational event of the year an 'AWOL' National Serviceman, Robert Peel, entered Mrs Foster's house on Drovers Way and cooked three wild duck eggs and then stole 2s 10d she'd left out on the sideboard. The bench gave him a conditional discharge but he had to return the money and pay 8s 10d costs.

The Arend-Roland Comet was seen clearly though it was 50 million miles away. Moss House Farm was sold to Mr W. Butterfield of Over Kellet for £4,300. The winners in Burton Youth Club's 32 Mile Cycle Rally were J. Mounsey, R. Robson and J Foster. The only girl entrant, Diane Crayston, was sixth.

#### MAY

On one of the most important days in Burton's history The Memorial Hall was opened by 'The Squire' Mr C.W.L. Penrhyn Hornby. Tributes were paid to the Committee chaired by Mr P. Cummings, who first proposed the venture in 1942, and to the committee, which had raised £7000. 300 Burton people out of a population of 800 crammed into the 250-seater hall for the ceremony. As part of a week-long 'Opening Celebrations' Burton Amateur Dramatic Society (BADS) staged 'The Secret Tent'. Representatives from eight other local dramatic societies attended the performances.

#### JUNE

Mrs Jane Read died aged 77 at the home of her daughter Mrs Pritchard at Boon Town. Mrs Read had been very active in the village since her family arrived in Burton in 1930 and was a 'stalwart' of the Mother's Union. Two sons, four daughters, 11 grandchildren and 4 great grand children survived her. 'The Caledonian' the fastest postwar steam train sped along the main line through Burton at 82mph. British Railways claimed that it would only take three and half hours from Oxenholme to Fuston.

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#### **JULY**

£6 was raised at a Children's Dance in The Memorial Hall. 28 members of the WI went on a trip to Holker Hall. There was an 8-car crash on the A6 at Beetham. 'Polio jabs' were given to schoolchildren during an alarming epidemic. In the most fashionable local wedding of the season Mr A. J. Caunt of Under Fell, Burton married Miss Helen Margaret Fox at Halton. The bride wore a parchment lace dress of classical design and the bride's maids were in apricot tulle.

#### **AUGUST**

A devastating 80mph hurricane hit the district. 'Great Cranes from the Hutton Roof waterworks' removed fallen trees, which were blocking roads. Mr Cummings declared that £84 made at a Summer Fair marked the 'end of the beginning' for the Memorial Hall Fund Raising Committee'. Mrs Hewitt won the ankle competition and Mr J Brown the knobbly knees competition. BADS organised the Rose Queen Festival in which the retiring Queen Barbara Wright crowned the new Queen Jennifer Wyatt. 'The now traditional procession of vehicles gaily decorated with leaves and flowers formed up in the Memorial Hall car park and was accompanied by a loud speaker van'.

#### **SEPTEMBER**

In a year of epidemics, Asian Flu affected a third of the population including most of the boarders at Heversham Grammar and Queen Elizabeth Schools. South Westmorland Rural District Council reluctantly agreed to allow TV aerials on council house roofs. Following a hue and cry through Burton two absconding inmates from Bela River Open Prison were caught at Longlands.

#### **OCTOBER**

'Radio-active milk' from local farms was poured away after 'the atomic mishap at Winscale.' Fruit, flowers and vegetables collected by Children for the Harvest Festival were distributed to the sick. A rare and poisonous Thorn Apple was discovered in a local hedgerow.

#### **NOVEMBER**

£26:10:2d was collected in the Poppy Appeal plus £8 collected by Mrs M.E. Hoggarth for St. Dunstan's. A paratyphoid epidemic broke out at Arnside. Inspector Allan Joseph Dixon, formerly of Drovers Way and a Burton Thistle footballer, married Evelyn Jackson in Mombassa Cathedral, Kenya.

#### **DECEMBER**

With the help of three actors borrowed from Milnthorpe Amateurs, BADS staged 'George and Margaret' in the Memorial Hall, their third production of the year! An application to build houses at Bank House Farm, Priest Hutton was turned down because of the 'Great Landscape Value' of the area. A New Year's Eve Carnival Dance featuring special lighting installed by Mr Pritchard and Rock n' Roll music closed the Memorial Hall's first year.

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#### The Vicar Writes...

## Did Jesus really come back from the dead?

Millions of Christians all over the world will be celebrating the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. As they do, many other people (if they're not too preoccupied with time off work and chocolate eggs) may well be provoked into asking the above question. I hope so. It's a crucial question, because, if Jesus didn'trise, then all of Christianity is false and a complete waste of time. When it comes to the resurrection, three things need to be explained:

- a) The empty tomb: Jesus' body had disappeared. He had died on a cross; the authorities released his body to his friends who buried it in a tomb, which was then guarded by soldiers. On the third day after he had died, the tomb in which Jesus had been laid was discovered to be empty. A body that had been there was no longer there.
- b) Jesus was seen alive: after the tomb was declared empty, Jesus was seen alive by individuals and groups of people. Hundreds of people claimed to have seen him over a period of forty days. Moreover, these eyewitnesses were willing to be killed rather than deny their belief that Jesus had been raised. These facts need to be explained.
- c) The growth of Christianity: the Christian movement spread like wildfire across the first century world. This extraordinary growth has continued to the present day. Of all the founders of great religions or movements, none has impacted the world as much as Jesus, yet none lived in so remote a place as Jesus, none spent such a short time in the public eye (just 3 years) and none died so young as

Jesus (33 years old). We don't set aside one day in the year to remember him by as with most other great figures. We base our whole calendar on his life. How could this village carpenter turned preacher make such a huge impact given his short life? This is a fact which demands an explanation.

The explanation given by the New Testament, of course, is that Jesus rose from the dead. Alternative theories (Jesus wasn't really dead, the body was stolen, his disciples invented the resurrection etc.) lack real evidence and don't square up with the facts. The theory which best fits the facts is, that this man Jesus was killed and rose again from the dead. Sir Edward Clarke, distinguished lawyer, writes:

"As a lawyer I have made prolonged study of the evidence for the events of the first Easter Day. To me the evidence is conclusive, and over and over again in the High Court I have secured the verdict on evidence not nearly so compelling ... As a lawyer I accept it unreservedly as the testimony of truthful men to facts they were able to substantiate."

If the resurrection of Jesus Christ is historical fact, then everything Jesus said and did, as recorded in the Bible, is absolutely true and we'd be mad to ignore him, for what happens in our own life and at our own death depends on how we respond to him.

## **Burton Bowling Clubs**Part 1 – Burton Indoor Bowling Club

We are fortunate to have two bowling clubs in the village. Burton Indoor Bowling Club was formed in 1992 when Sadie Wilkinson arranged for someone from SLDC Leisure Services to bring a mat and give some tuition for playing short mat bowls. The borrowed mat was available for the first year, after which the eleven founder members put up enough cash to purchase a mat for the Club and each member eventually bought their own set of woods. The founder members were Sadie Wilkinson, John & Barbara Wood, Jean & John Tomkins, Kath Proctor, May Reid, Joyce Bye, Jennie Coates, Margaret Slack and Margaret Boon. John Wood took on the role of Chairman at inception and that of Treasurer 3 years ago; posts which he held until 2006.

As the popularity of the Club grew, two more mats were purchased, stretching the skills of players as each mat is different; one fast, one medium and one slow. A recent innovation has been to lay the mats along the room as one large playing service and play diagonally across the room as an `end of term` fun session. Judging the speed of the bowls can be tricky and it makes for some interesting results. The Club has enjoyed reciprocal friendly games with Heversham Club and a Club Singles and Doubles competition is held each winter, the winners receiving an engraved plaque to keep for a year.

An ingenious scheme was devised by Dave Holland, in collaboration with John Wood, for the awkward problem of safe storage of the mats and accessories. Dave built a frame and the equipment can now be wheeled away and stored in a locked room. A keen member for a number of years was the late Pat Wren, who never let her failing sight deter her, and fellow members marvelled at her skill and good humour. Membership, limited to 22, is now at full capacity with just five of the original members remaining; John and Barbara Wood, Kath Proctor, Joyce Bye and May Reid.

An annual lunch is enjoyed near to Christmas and the club has visited the Cowan Bridge village hall on a few occasions where they have longer and wider mats. Bowls is a game that can be played for life, knees and hips permitting, for it provides good exercise and congenial company and is an asset to village life.

Meetings are held weekly in the Memorial Hall on Wednesday afternoons from 2.00 pm – 4.00 pm in winter and on alternate Wednesdays from June to September. Some members play outdoors on the other Wednesday which brings us neatly to the Burton Bowling Club situated behind the Royal Hotel and whose story will be featured next month.


