Outdoors

Six or seven years ago I was walking up through Lancelot Clark's Storth, making for

the memorial seat which overlooks the entire sweep from Heysham Head through the high fells to Shap. I had just stepped off the limestone pavement when I saw the shadow of a thistle leaf on a serrated rock. The likeness between the two toothed shapes was close. Earlier I had been looking at the underside of a bracken frond and noticing that the spores on each leaflet were herring-boned, like the larger structure of the frond itself. The arrowy alignment of these patterns was like the hairs on a moth's antenna and the vanes springing from the rib of a bird's feather.

I wanted to memorise these likenesses - they had the makings of a poem. How to jot down some notes up there on the hill, far away from pad and desk? I had my pen - and nothing to write on except some £10 notes. I didn't want to deface

them, not out of respect for the Bank of England, more because it might make them valueless. In the end I scribbled a few words on a bramble leaf. The ink took a long time to dry. I got the leaf home intact and a little later wrote the poem.

That sort of matching between natural things crops up constantly like a revelation. We recognise this when we liken a high rippled cloud to the stripes on a mackerel. We see it in the likeness of our arteries and veins to the branching of a tree. A once-famous author called an autobiography The Scarlet Tree and the dustjacket showed a red image of a trunk flourishing out into a web of limbs, like a sycamore, for example, seen in leafless silhouette.


Noticing such likenesses so satisfies our minds that we name things in nature according to them. A mountain in New Mexico sacred to Native Americans is called Sleeping Ute - it looks like a person lying down with hip raised and long legs stretched out. When we were driving past it, a wisp of white cloud draped round its blue body like a garment. Burringurrah in northwestern Australia is Sleeping-Man and the great redrock gully running up his southern flank is a spear wound. The Old Man of Hoy in Orkney and Devil's Point

in the Cairngorms are very old embodiments of phallic myths.

The beauty of such likenesses of shape and pattern isn't only physical. It also confirms that our world hangs together.

The three legs on each side of every insect helps them to stay in balance, as do the two forelimbs and two hindlimbs of dogs and cows, humans and apes. Walking at Jack Scout Cove just now I saw a violet whose uppermost pair of leaves were so vivid and so splayed that they looked like the forewings of a very small purple butterfly. And the dark tracks left by water dripping down the grey trunk of a young ash in Dalton woods the other day made snaky patterns very like those left by ivy once it has fallen away from its host.

Going Green - June '09

Through the square window...

I have a 'to do' list. These days it stretches to several pages of A4. Jobs move up and down it, usually according to how much money they'll make or lose me. Some fall off to return a year or two later, with the potential of clogging up the list for decades to come. I'm re-jigging it after lunch to include sorting out the kids wardrobes when Carbonlite strides in.

"Ah you're amending the famous 'to do' list again. Are the windows still on it?" he asks. I admit they've dropped off again, and dutifully add 'phone SLDC about windows' to the end of the list. He takes the pen and crosses it off again. "There. I've reduced your list for you. There's a planning road show at Kirkby this afternoon. If you go now you'll be their first customer." "A planning road show? Do you get tea and biscuits?" "You might have to apply for them," he replies.

I race a well-heeled woman up the path of the Institute. There's a bit of confusion as the road show official thinks we're together. I almost get planning permission for an extension before being asked to wait in a side room where a man is putting out tables. I offer to help, noticing a poster for a Slimming World meeting that's about to start. "You don't look like a Slimming World leader," I say. "I own a cheese shop," he says. The planning officer calls me in before we have a chance to really get to know each other.

On the table I lay out my quotations from builders and window specialists, explaining that we live in a listed building and all of the original sash frames at the front of the house are rotten. I show her a catalogue for a company that specialises in heritage frames for conservation areas. "No PVC," she shakes her head. I explain that they specialise in making modern windows identical to the original frames, and work with councils to ensure standards are met. "No PVC," she says. So we talk about double glazing set into like-for-like wood frames. This too is a minefield. It's all about thickness of frames and reflection of glass, and what the other houses in the terrace look like. I have photo evidence to show her that our terrace is more Coronation Street than Savile Row. But the bottom line is that pursuing double glazing is going to bring on a whole new 'to do' list of faffing about, consent forms and measuring. And then she tells me we may able to get financial help because we're a listed building, but only if we put in single glazing. I pause. I wait, and gather my breath. "If my husband was here, this is the point he'd really start shouting" I say. I'm not shouting but I do press my point about why they aren't moving with the times, given all that we know about the environment, "How can you square all this with the government's targets for energy efficiency? Every government official across the world is trying to meet targets to combat climate change. Every piece of literature suggests that the first place to start is in the home. We have windows that are leakier than a terry towelling nappy when it comes to insulation and you are advising us to spend six thousand pounds on replacing them with new ones that are exactly the same. Not only that but you'll give us a grant to do it?"

I relay all this to Carbonlite as we stand on the doorstep, gazing at our windows. The street in front of us resembles a car park. There is litter on the ground. The house two doors along is unlived in and falling apart. The pub nearby has been left to the rats. "So what you're saying is that what matters to the council is we protect this piece of 'heritage' at all costs. And one of those costs is that we continue to waste heat resources, and contribute to the global warming and rising sea levels that will eventually wipe out the heritage of a large percentage of the world," he sighs.

"That's about the gist of it, but just think how little reflection you're going to get in that pane" I reply. "And get this... the man who runs the local Slimming World class also owns a cheese shop!" I return inside to add 'write to my MP' to the bottom of a 'to do' list that now entirely covers the desk of my draughty, un-insulated but perfectly preserved office.

Another Opinion...

Comments on the goings-on at the Parish Council...

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

As a "guest reporter" at the Parish Council I've avoided using the word "opinion" in the title, although in all honesty I won't be able to avoid expressing some opinions in the article. But then you wouldn't want it any other way, would you?

First to the election! No, not that one. The all-important role of Chair and Vice-Chair of the Burton Parish Council. Francis Mason-Hornby was elected to serve a second year as Chair. I've only seen him in action a couple of times but I'm always incredibly impressed by the business-like manner in which he runs the meetings and actually gets things done. We're very lucky to have him, but he's only allowed to serve as Chair for two consecutive years, so there will be a new Chair next year. Richard Boddy will continue as Vice-Chair for a further year. All the other PClIrs agreed to undertake various other roles for the year. Michael Taylor was co-opted to fill the vacant seat on the Council.

The Council agreed to an experiment whereby a councillor will be available from 7.00 pm before each Council meeting so that any villager who wants to can have an individual meeting with a councillor about anything they want. If appropriate the councillor could then raise the issue at the following meeting. This is a new service from the Council, so "use it or lose it". First opportunity is 18 June.

have expressed an interest in having an allotment, of whom 7 turned up for a meeting at the Kings, led by Darren Nicholls. The basic problem is that there is no publicly-owned land in the village that could be used for allotments. The new tenant of the Kings suggested that the field at the back could possibly be used for 3 or 4 "gardens", maybe providing produce to the pub? The Kings will even provide access to a secure outbuilding, toilet facilities and access to water. It was thought that there may be other people in the village who have some "spare" land which could be used by others to grow produce. The PC could act as a sort of informal dating agency to bring together those who have such land with those who would like to use it. Please contact a Parish Councillor if you can offer anything.

Possible good news on allotments. About 20 people

Not such good news on recycling. Since SLDC now collects paper and glass directly from houses the recycling bins in the Memorial Hall car park seem largely redundant. It was suggested that maybe they could be replaced by bins for plastic and cardboard, which is not currently collected. For some reason the Memorial Hall committee is opposed to this change, citing "lack of space" as a reason. Seems strange to me, if it's just a question of replacing one set of bins with a different set. What do you think?

The police reported a general increase in burglaries from sheds, barns and garages in the area, and asked people to lock them up. There have also been a couple of reports of dodgy-looking men in the area: do report such sightings because they are followed up. Parking

It was good to see that the Council is making progress on various aspects of the Parish Plan - yet another example of the business-like way in which the present Council conducts itself. Issues being addressed from the Plan include allotments; a bus shelter at the south of the village for which funding has now been secured; an audit of dropped curbs to help wheelchair users; footways on the A6070, although these are not likely to happen; improvements to Slape Lane; repairs to finger posts of footpaths; a path from the school to the tennis courts; a red telephone box, which won't happen because it costs a fortune; an extra post box at the bottom of Tanpits Lane, although again it is unlikely to happen; further repairs and upgrading of the equipment at Boon Town play ground which will happen; the provision of a dog waste bin, about which the Council had mixed feelings; and road safety improvements, especially to the north of the village. Apparently "fillthathole.org" is the place to be!

The Council heard that the Royal Hotel is now up for sale and have asked for details from the selling agents. They will continue to monitor progress with this important building right at the heart of the village.

Historical Footnote by Roger Bingham

BURTON NEWS - IN SPRING TIME - 25 YEARS AGO

Though George Orwell had penned dire warnings about 1984, the year was relatively un-sensational. In Burton the main controversy concerned attempts to restrict car parking at Crofton Lea down Neddy Hill while the Westmorland Gazette announced that 'lack of parking was killing tourism in Kendal'. Older forms of transport also hit the headlines. Mr T.S.H. Wordsworth, a descendant of the poet, organised a meeting of the Lancaster Canal Trust to discuss the restoration of the Northern Reaches through Burton and Holme. Although 'costings were not presented' the audience was assured that much ground work had been covered especially regarding facilities for disabled people. There would be 'linear marinas' and not a Butlin's Holiday Camp type of development.

In Burton a newly married couple Mr and Mrs Giles Stothert drove in a Victorian Governess's cart from St. James Church to the reception at Greystones, Holme. The single horse vehicle had belonged to the groom's great grandfather Mr Richardson of Laverrock Bridge and it had been restored by his uncle Sir Sanderson Temple of Yealand Hall. As regards modern vehicles, a 1984 Audi 80 would set you back £4,000 and a Ford Fiesta £5,500, while the dearest advertised car was a Mercedes 190 at £14,350.

Houses for sale in Burton included 2 Barker Close, a four year old detached true bungalow with solid fuel

heating at £47,500 and (the unpriced) Old Tannery which featured a 'gourmet kitchen' and a swimming pool. Prices at the village Mace and Spar stores included 55p for 500 grams packet of Kellogg's Corn Flakes, 28p for Krona Marge and 55p for 500 grams of 'Yellow Turkey parts'. On TV the most popular weekend show was 'Wogan' on Granada but as a feint hint of things to come there was a BBC 2 Open University item on 'Computers at the Bank of Scotland'.

In politics Mark Lennox-Boyd, MP for Morecambe and Lonsdale, warned that Arthur Scargill, the miners' leader, was a menace and local farmers threatened to boycott their annual meeting with Westmorland's MP Michael Jopling because, as Minister of Agriculture, he had cut dairy production by introducing Milk Quotas.

On the Parish Council 'the Dog Dirt menace' was denounced and there were complaints about gravel falling from quarry lorries, while in the most sensational event of the season 'the clerk, Mrs Bobbie Morris announced with regret that the bus shelter at Clawthorpe had been demolished to complete the work begun by vandals'. The village policeman, Tony Lees, was congratulated in 'preventing what could have been serious damage to the school'. The Parish Council also received a petition from residents of the neighbouring but separate parish of Dalton asking if their area could be included in Burton's civil parish.

Oh - and there was one other council change; 25 years ago, on 3 May 1984, Roger Bingham was elected as the South Lakeland District Councillor for Burton and Holme. He was SLDC's youngest member -then. Doesn't time fly?



In the Garden....

In 2004 a new ladybird arrived in Britain. But not just any ladybird: this was the Harlequin ladybird, *Harmonia axyridis*, the most invasive ladybird on Earth.

A native of eastern Asia, it was introduced into many countries as a biological control agent against aphid and scale infestations in greenhouses, crops and gardens. After being introduced to North America in 1988 it is currently the most widespread ladybird species on that continent. It is now established in northwest Europe and Britain - some possibly flew across the channel, others were found on flowers imported from Europe and in packing cases from Canada.

So why should we be concerned about the arrival of the Harlequin ladybird? There are 46 species of native ladybirds (Coccinellidae) in Britain and the arrival of the Harlequin ladybird has the potential to jeopardise many of these. Harlequin ladybirds are very efficient aphid predators and have a wider food range and habitat than most other predators and so easily outcompete them. Harlequins do not need a dormant period before they can reproduce, as some ladybirds do and so have a longer reproductive period than most other species. In 2004 in London, Harlequin larvae were found still feeding in late October, long after all the native species had sought overwintering sites.

When aphids are scarce, Harlequin ladybirds consume other prey including ladybird eggs, larvae and pupae, butterfly and moth eggs and caterpillars. They can disperse rapidly over long distances and so have the potential for rapid geographic spread.

They can also cause problems to humans. Harlequin ladybirds have a tendency to collect in buildings in large numbers during autumn and winter. Having ladybirds in the house can be a nuisance especially when they run to tens of thousands of insects!

Woken from dormancy by central heating, they may bite people as there is no food available. The bites usually produce a small bump and sting slightly. There are a few documented cases of people having a severe allergic reaction to Harlequin ladybirds.

Back outside, they also damage soft fruit crops. In late summer, when Harlequin ladybirds are feeding up for the winter, they will seek ripe fruit and suck the juice from it to gain sugar causing blemishes on late summer ripening fruits, such as pears. They are also particularly fond of grapes, and wineries are finding large numbers in the grape harvest. These are difficult to separate from the grapes before pressing, and the defensive chemicals (reflex blood) produced by the ladybirds taint the wine.

It is essential that the spread of this invasive species is monitored - it has been spreading north and west throughout the country over the past 5 years, with a few sightings here in the north west and up into Scotland.




