

# Outdoors

Now that I'm growing old, the things I see in nature are changing. I don't mean philosophically - I've always taken Darwin's view of nature and I still do. I mean the things I attend to most closely, really look at (and touch, and hear and smell). For many years going outdoors mainly to climb hills and rocks meant that the focus was some distance away - a cairn on a fell-top, or the vertical grain of a crag (which always looks so much steeper seen headon), or the next valley that comes into sight when you reach the crest of a pass and the lowland ahead glows as thought spotlit with the lemon-and-lime of newmown hayfields.

When reaching the distant goal takes ten times as long as it used to, the shine is knocked off it, the pleasure drains away, and you settle for the delights and beauties of things close at hand - the emerald starbursts of the clumps of maidenhair spleenwort on the wall at the start of Boon Walks path, or the many different patterns of spores on the undersides of fern fronds. The other day, on what Anne and I still call the 'secret path' - although it's now heavily trodden by people and cattle - I was stopped in my tracks by an exquisite pattern on the smooth grey bole of a youngish ash tree. It was the shadow of a nearby hawthorn. Smoke-grey on oyster grey, it had the scalloped edges of some amazingly elaborate jigsaw puzzle. Half an hour earlier or later and it would not have been there for us to see. One species beautifying another for perhaps ten minutes in the day - this may have some significance I have yet to fathom. For now I'm content with its lovely shape.

They start up on all sides, these unexpected gems. I suppose most people have their own anthology of the choicest flowers they ever saw (or, trees, or views, or birds). If I had to pick one, it might be the birdsfoot trefoil we saw in tufts on the sandstone crags next the ropeway down St Bees Head. Their blossoms were twicoloured, yolk-yellow and blood-red, and their stems were quivering like guitar strings in the updraught off the sea. Or it might be the first edelweiss I ever saw in the flesh, not in a brooch or a picture. It grew in a solitary cluster amongst limestone scree on a ledge of the Piz di Ciavazes in the Italian Dolomites. Its leaves were as though scissored from frost-grey felt with the starry snow-white flower in their centre - a single tender organism in a towering mineral wasteland. Today (August 9), as we walked along the gritty track to the stock-car circuit at Keer mouth, I noticed a single purple cushion of thyme growing from a crevice in the furnace slag from Carnforth ironworks which makes a berm along the right bank. Some of it is in drum- or barrelshaped chunks with smooth sides moulded out of glassified shards. No flower could have found a harsher place to live and give out its fragrance (when bruised between the fingers) which Rudyard Kipling likened to 'dawn in paradise'.

Turned on and attuned by such things, you can begin to fancy creating something yourself - imperfect and simple, admittedly, but fine enough to be memorable. When I've come across an ash branch or bole in the woods which frost has furred with a white bloom, I've

sometimes gripped my fingers along it at several points for long enough to melt the rime. The recurring grey pattern left on the white looks as though the ash has mutated into a silver birch with the dark blotches on a pale ground. Or you can make fingertip prints all along the rime, as though some creature had hopped down it on delicate paws. Of course these little works will be gone in an hour, and that's all right, because the idea is simply to work with the grain of nature, not to rival or replace its abiding beauties.

# Roger Reports...

In every age older people grumble about young people. Indeed a 4,000 year old Egyptian papyrus states that children are out of control and that teachers cannot discipline them anymore. But in this generation I have observed a different picture while going round as Chairman of the County Council. Just like our own Burton Boys' Brigade, Brownies, Scouts, Guides and the children on Sports Day, I have witnessed the commitment of young people to energetic and enthusiastic sportsmanship. At the Cumbria Swimming Gala at Troutbeck Bridge no one applauded until the last competitor came in and also if someone was a long way behind they got an even bigger cheer - for trying. Similar commitment was also demonstrated by members of the Westmorland Youth Orchestra, by cadets at Warcop summer training camp and by Young Farmers and gymkhana participants at the country shows. So - I say well done to our young people.

My other County cares are not so pleasant as we grapple with the budget for 2010-11. Whichever government takes over after the General Election there could to be a reduction in Whitehall's Revenue Support Grant for local government in succeeding years. Last year the RSG was 47% of the Council's budget of

£843m (including a separate School's Budget) compared to 66% in 1997. There could be a reduction in 2010 so if services are not to be cut drastically Council Taxes will have to rise. Even so I hope that we will be able to spend more than the £21m we spent on Cumbria's roads last years and that we can increase the transportation subsidy, e.g. for rural buses from £12.3m. We have already allocated about £170,000 to repairs on the A6070 near Clawthorpe.

On South Lakeland the increasing budget cost of concessionary fares, mainly for Senior Citizens, has induced SLDC to ask that the scheme should be administered by Central Government or by 'an upper tier authority' which could put even more pressure on the County. SLDC is also considering handing over more public conveniences to Parish Councils.

Better news on South Lakeland District Council is that a further £60,000 will be spent on a much-delayed survey of the quality of South Lakes Housing which could be partly financed from a housing revenue account underspend of £29,700. Also a detailed report on the 'Public Realm' outlined plans to improve open spaces like streets, village greens and playgrounds.

I was also pleased to present to SLDC's Cabinet the report of the Rural Proofing Task and Finish Group which I chaired. Our main findings were that most of our district could be classed as rural for service provision. According to DEFRA much of the district is classed as 'super sparse' where there are almost no amenities. But as we know even in a large village with a thriving community life we often lack facilities like

Over and above all we have the almost insuperable problems of affordable housing and public transport. In one of our surveys, at Coniston, most young people said they had no hope of ever buying a house in the village while, already, many had to pay £8 in fares simply to go to a Saturday job. 'Rurally' will now be taken into account while framing policies just as 'equality' and 'health and safety' are considered already.

Finally what do you think of my idea circulated a little while ago to add a parish name to signs as e.g., "Clawthorpe or Dalton - Parish of Burton"?

Comments on the goings-on at the Parish Council...

# POOR STATE OF MAIN STREET A CAUSE FOR RESIDENTS' COMPLAINT

#### **OPEN FORUM**

A Burton resident spoke up in strong terms about the parlous state of the road surface along Main Street. She guestioned the serious intent of SLDC to resurface various potholes and listed the worst ones. You would have thought everyone would have noticed the gaping collapse of the drain outside the Butcher's, but it seemed this was news to some PCIIrs and in particular to our Dist.Cllr., who expressed amazement he'd never noticed it despite being a regular customer at the shop (he's the Highways 'guru'). White markings to indicate potholes in need of attention were beginning to wear away, it was pointed out. "If I buy a tin of spray paint and redo them will I be arrested for graffitti?" asked this resident. At this point our Dist.Cllr. announced he personally had ensured that the A6070 from Church Stile to the first turning to Holme was to be completely re-surfaced. He was virtually shouted down in exasperation. That's not the point here, he was informed. While this is creditable and necessary, the people of Burton are concerned about the execrable condition of the road in the very centre of the village. (Since the meeting, traffic cones have appeared over the collapsed drain, notes A.O. Maybe the road could be swept too? Weeds are sprouting in the gutter opposite, and the brander is partially blocked.) [Editor's note: the hole outside the Butcher's appears to have been sorted as we went to press.]

#### "FUNDAMENTALLY OPPOSED"

Residents from the Church Stile area came to the meeting to express serious doubts about the proposed change to the 30mph sign at the north end of the village (from 30mph to 40 mph, with a 30mph sign nearer the village.) A point the spokesman raised was that insurance claims wouldn't be so favourable if injury happened to a pedestrian (or motorist) if the speed of the offending vehicle was within the higher limit. If you're knocked down by a vehicle doing 40mph in a 30mph zone you can claim higher compensation than if that vehicle is travelling legally at 40 mph in a 40mph zone.

There was no doubting the serious intent of both speakers on this subject, and the examples given of dangerous driving and the hazard to pedestrians on the A6070 between Clawthorpe and Church Stile were vivid and convincing. It was pointed out to him that the scheme was as yet only in the melting pot, and came as part of a package which included road markings and so on.

bins - the Trust has agreed to provided 3 dog-poo bins at entrances to Burton stretches of the canal and arrangements have been made to empty them.





## Historical Footnote by Roger Bingham

# The Hiltons - an ancient Burton family

I have recently been looking at a manuscript account about Beetham made in 1937 by Robert Hilton of Hale who was at the time aged 85. In it he includes some notes on his ancestors who lived at Burton. The family seems to have originated near Warcop in north Westmorland where Alexander de Hilton or Helton was granted land in 1180. Subsequently they built Helton Castle in the area which, following a marriage alliance with the Bacon family was also called Hilton Bacon.

A century later some Hiltons had moved to Burton as in the '17th year of the reign of Edward I' (1289) Thomas de Hilton was granted land at Ormshead (Ormside) from his brother William de Hilton, Lord of Burton Manor. Even so they seemed to have moved up and down the county, as about the same time John de Hilton, son of John de Hilton of Burton, settled land on his daughter, Anne, at Ormeshead. Similarly in c.1470 Christopher Hilton of Burton married Margaret, daughter of Thomas Marshall of Kirkoswald.

Other Burton Hiltons included Robert, Lord of Burton who in the reign of Henry VIII (1509-47) granted land to his brother Robert. In a rare reference to Mary Tudor's marriage to Philip of Spain there is deed dated in the second year of 'King Philip and Queen Mary', i.e. 1557, in which Thomas Hilton of Burton is mentioned. Half a century later Andrew Helton (Hilton)

of Burton married Alice, daughter of John Aglionby of Carlisle. Their son, John Hilton esq., died about 1630.

Robert Hilton mentioned that in 1685 John's coat of arms 'put up in 1622 was remaining on the outside of Burton Hall' and that he married Mary, co-heiress of Byham Hall in Essex. Whether Burton Hall was the house of the same name in Tanpits Lane is not known, though parts of its fabric pre-date the early nineteenth century appearance of the building and could have been inhabited by the Hiltons.

Another seventeenth century family member was Cyprian Hilton of Burton, esq. He married 'Frances illegitimate but only daughter of Sir Christopher Pickering of Ormeshead by his milkmaid at Threlkeld whose name was Todhunter'. Cyprian died in 1652 and was buried in Ormeside church, where a brass tablet states, 'Cyprian Hilton for renowned fame hee may justly stiled the glory of his name'. Nearby his son's memorial states, 'here lies interrd the body of Cyprian Hilton Esq. of an ancient family, whose loyalty to his Prince, zeal for the Established Church ... and kindness to his tenants are a lasting monument. By his dear consort Mrs Abigail Hilton he left a numerous offspring, four sons and five daughters all now living and he in them'.

His south Westmorland cousin Thomas was neither loyal to the monarchy nor to the Church of England, being a Roman Catholic and a Jacobite supporter of the Stuart pretenders to the throne. He had moved from Burton to Cappelside Hail at Beetham, the ruins of which can still be glimpsed in the meadow to the

In 1720 he bemoaned 'on Sunday in Lent I vowed to abstain from three things during the ensuing week viz eating flesh, drinking wine and the use of women. But alas the frailty of good resolutions, I broke them all, was tempted to eat the wing of a fowl, got drunk at Milnthorpe and laid with a girl at Sandside'. I wonder what proportion of Burton folk were pleased or saddened that Thomas Hilton no longer lived in Burton.

# Oarsmen abandon bid for record to rescue pilot from stormy sea

Robert Pickering, aged 18 and formerly of the Old Vicarage, who will be known to many villagers, is one of four school leavers who attempted to challenge the 2005 record of 26 days, 21 hours, and 14 minutes to row non-stop round Britain. They set off from Tower Bridge at 11am on Friday 3 July in a 20 foot boat, sponsored by British Gas. Their aim was to raise £100,000 in aid of Orchid, a charity that supports the study of cancers which affect men.

After four days of rowing from Tower Bridge the crew of the British Orchid met very heavy seas off Hastings, when the Dover Coastguard requested the lifeboat to be launched and escort the four men to safety amid increasing winds. This was devastating for the school leavers who had set their hearts on breaking the record to row around Britain.

However, when the forecast improved they set off again, this time from Dover. Good progress was made along the English Channel in spite of contrary winds, but in the Irish Sea they were almost killed when a container ship came too close after losing power to their warning transmitter. Then their 15 foot boat almost capsized when it was struck by an overfall, a powerful surge of water.

On day ten, off the coast of Wexford, one of the crew claimed that he had seen an aircraft plunge into the sea. This, at first, was disclaimed as hallucinations, due to exhaustion and dehydration, and the crewmates thought it was just a diving seagull. They did decide to investigate, in spite of it costing them any chance of record breaking. This saved the life of a pilot who had ditched his aircraft in the same storm.

The crew had put out a mayday call and approached the aircraft, which was already under water with the pilot standing on one of the wings. The coastguard said they were 20 minutes away. They continued radioing until a rescue helicopter arrived and took the



pilot and one member of the crew to shore.

Robert Pickering and the other two left in the little boat were towed to Dublin where the four were hailed as heroes. One said, "There is a fine line between ego and heroism. There are more important things than trying to get into the record books."



# SOUTH LAKELAND LOCAL DEVELOPMENT FRAMEWORK CORE STRATEGY

South Lakeland District Council would like to invite you to make representations on the South Lakeland District Council Core Strategy proposed submission documents. The Core Strategy document sets out the development strategy for South Lakeland outside the National Park areas up to 2025. It is a long-term plan. It draws together strategies of the Council and other organisations whose activities have implications for the development and use of land. It puts the aspirations of the Community Strategy into effect, seeking to create a sustainable district that is the best possible place to live, work and visit and addressing our key issues such as providing housing to meet local need, growing the local economy in a sustainable way and protecting and enhancing the quality environment.

The most recent consultation in developing the Core Strategy was the preferred options stage in 2008. That stage involved putting forward for public comment the Council's preferred approach to the spatial planning for future growth and development in the area. We are now writing to inform you about the publication of the proposed submission Core Strategy, which is the next stage in the process. It has been developed based on the extensive feedback received on the preferred options and further evidence gathered since last year. After the end of the publication period, the strategy will be submitted to the Secretary of State ahead of an examination in public - which is currently estimated to take place in February next year.

From Thursday 27 August the proposed submission documents (and a standalone executive summary document) will be available to view and download from the Council's website at www.southlakeland.gov.uk/ldf and may be inspected during normal opening hours at South Lakeland House, Kendal; Ulverston Town Hall; and the libraries at Kendal, Ulverston, Grange over Sands, Milnthorpe, Kirkby Lonsdale and Arnside. You may purchase a paper copy of any of the proposed submission documents at a cost of 7p per sheet plus postage and packaging by contacting the Development Plans Team.

You are invited to submit representations on the proposed submission Core Strategy by Friday 23 October 2009. When making your representations, please consider the "soundness" of the strategy, since the independent examination of the submitted Core Strategy will focus on this. The representation form, which is available to complete online at http://www.southlakeland.gov.uk/ldf/consultation/login.aspx asks you to indicate whether you consider the proposed submission Core Strategy to be "sound" - that is, justified, effective and consistent with national policy. Further guidance is given on the notes that form part of the representation form.

Representations e-mailed may be developmentplans@southlakeland.gov.uk or sent by post to: Development Plans Manager, South Lakeland District Council, South Lakeland House, Lowther Street, Kendal, LA9 4DL. To reduce administrative costs, representations are particularly encouraged to be made on the Council's online representation form. Representations may be accompanied by a request to be notified at a specific address/email when the Core Strategy has been submitted to the Secretary of State. and of the appointed planning inspector's recommendations and/or of the adoption of the Core Strategy.

The matter of identification of potential sites for development is not a subject of the Core Strategy; this is a matter for the Allocations of Land DPD. There will be a further opportunity to comment on site-specific proposals during preferred options consultation, scheduled for December 2009. This will be followed by another period of consultation later in 2010.

# The Vicar Writes...

### The Miracle of Rain

The barbecue summer we were promised hasn't materialized. The summer holidays have been a bit of a washout and I, along with many other holiday makers in the UK, have moaned about the weather. Today, however, I read these words from the Bible that caused me to think again about rain:

He performs wonders that cannot be fathomed, miracles that cannot be counted.
He bestows rain on the earth;
he sends water upon the countryside. (Job 5:9-10)

The Bible regards rain as one of God's great wonders and miracles. That's not how I tend to view rain! At best, I regard it as necessary. But most of the time I see it as a pain. I am wrong to do this.

Commenting on the above words from Job, American pastor, John Piper explains why rain really is one of God's wondrous miracles. "Picture yourself," he says "as a farmer in the Near East, far from any lake or stream. A few wells keep the family and animals supplied with water. But if the crops are to grow and the family is to be fed from month to month, water has to come from another source on the fields. From where?"

The answer is from the sky! But first it has to be carried in the sky from the Mediterranean Sea several hundred miles away. Then it has to be poured on the fields. But rain is heavy. It only gets up in the sky by evaporation. This means that the water stops being water for a while so it can go up not down. Then it starts becoming water again. Before that, however, the sky has to take out the salt from the sea.

Then the sky dribbles down thousands of gallons of water in little drops. These have to be big enough to fall for one mile or so without evaporating, and yet small enough not to damage the crops in the fields. To do this, tiny specks of water have to start bumping into each other and join up and get bigger. This requires an electric field, because otherwise these tiny specks

would just bounce off each other and there wouldn't be any rain. And without rain there would be no food and without food there would be no life.

Wow! Rain is amazing. It really is a miraculous wonder and priceless gift from our generous Creator God. I should be much more thankful for it than I am.


