

Dear BN

If this is important to you, take action!

Over the last few years as I have become more infirm and elderly I have been actively concerned about the SLDC's bizarre policies on waste and recycling. There were two separate policies. On the wheelie rubbish bin you were offered assistance to the perimeter, no assistance was given for the cumbersome blue recycling boxes. When I first had problems I was offered two long-handled boxes. These boxes are fine if lifting and walking together is not a problem and they are very heavy after two weeks of newspapers. However, when I could no longer manage these boxes I was advised, like everyone else who phoned in, "to put it in the rubbish wheelie".

That was their answer to settling a system of cumbersome boxes which are awkward for most people and impossible as you get older. Horrified, I protested, and was offered a prototype 2 shelf wheeled box to "test". This is ideal but I think I am the only person in South Lakes to have one.

The present situation is as follows:

- 1. If you are in difficulty, SLDC will continue to offer you 2 long-handled boxes.
- 2. As from 1 April 2010 you can now get assistance to the perimeter of your property if you request it and it is needed.
- 3. However, SLDC have no policy to look at the provision of wheeled recycling boxes.

I have discovered that other local authorities do not set up their elderly and infirm to fail in the task of full participation in the country's salvage efforts - they provide wheeled boxes similar to mine. So do we leave it there? If other authorities recognise our needs, why not SLDC? Can I suggest you write / phone SLDC to make your views known.

By the way, did you know that with the green garden wheelies, you can ask for and get as many as you feel you need. I have two!

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Outdoors

From the viewpoint at the south end of Holme Park Quarry you look across the excavated gulf into three or four hundred feet of the Earth's crust. The green, habitable surface, with its leafage and pasture grasses. Grey limestone crags, like skulls and skeletons laid bare. The yellow-stained white of quarried rock, the layers of it rising and dipping like swell on the sea whose bed it used to be. Deepest of all, and oldest, the black shale - a mudstone split into brittle layers by the weight of all that sea-bed which overlaid it for 300 million years or SO.

I love that whole sight because it shows us a sample of

how our Earth came into being. Here are the mineral ingredients of the universe which knit together under their own momentum, during this slice of time where we at last evolved and can now witness them and explain them.

Rock crushing the rock beneath it: I first encountered that when I tried to climb the Rock of Gibraltar with my son Neil in 1993. We gave up after three hundred and fifty nightmare feet where you could lift pieces out like Lego. The great crag was cracking its own foundations under its own dead-weight. I saw the same thing at the marble quarry on Monte Altissimo in the Apuian Alps. Michelangelo and Henry Moore both went there to select stone for their sculptures. Only the top five hundred feet of the mountain is faultless enough to sell because it is cracking its own lower reaches. For a like reason the shale beneath our local limestone is too brittle to use for sea-walls or building, the quarries are not allowed to expand further sideways, and working them must finish in another ten years or so.

Limestone, as everyone knows, is made up of trillions of boney fragments. Farleton Fell was a section of sea-bed. The shallow seas teemed with molluscs, corals, fishes. Their hard remnants compacted into the reefs and scars



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and pavements that we see today. After the Earth's crust had been lifted clear of the waters by the buckling of the crust, the crags were further shaped by weathering, especially the sluicing of rainwater which chiselled out the exquisitely fretted plaques and snakey runnels at Greyrocks, Hutton Roof, and elsewhere. (The Maori embodied this in one story when they dreamed up Tangaroa, their god of carving and the sea.)

Of course this natural 'art' was coveted. Geoffrey Halliday the botanist has told me how in the

Seventies and Eighties the pavement at Greyrocks was saved in the nick of time. The stone was being prised off and sold for garden decoration. There was no law to stop someone removing 'loose stone' from his land; only 'mining' required permission; and while a specific application was being decided, eighteen months could go by in which more and more pavement was removed. A Countryside Bill was going through Parliament. The Friends of the Lakes, the Lancashire and Yorkshire Naturalists, the Nature Conservancy Council, the Countryside Commission - body after body became involved, and some of them had too many other worries or pet issues to have much time for the pavements. At last an amendment to preserve them was put into the Bill, it became law, and acres of natural Westmorland were saved.

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Roger Reports...

Firstly may I thank the very many people who have enquired after my health and sent cards during my completely unexpected stay in hospital and subsequent convalescence. Also thanks to my fellow Burton and Home District Councillor Brian Cooper for holding the fort for me while I was away. I am making good progress and although I have already been out and about in the village I am behind on the local details e.g. pot holes but hope to catch up soon.

By a tragic coincidence the leader of the County Council Jim Buchanan was taken ill on the same day as me and died only three weeks later. Jim was largely responsible for steering the 2010-11 budget through with, at 1.9%, the lowest ever increase in Council Tax. He was also leader of the county council Conservative group which has now chosen a new group leader. He is Eddie Martin, from north Cumbria, who was elected unopposed. He will be proposed as council Leader at the AGM. Prior to Jim's death the party strengths were Conservatives 38, Labour 24, Lib. Dems. 15, Independents 4, Socialist People's Party 1. Currently the Conservatives lead a 'rainbow cabinet' with Labour and Independent support. So far it seems that the current arrangements will continue but anything could happen. The deputy group leader is now James Airey who represents the Ulverston area but

who did live at Kirkby Lonsdale. He is an old boy of QES and a former county YFC chairman so between north and south we have achieved a geographical balance in our leaders.

My time as Chairman of the county council also ends at the AGM. My year as Chairman was dominated by the weather. Firstly a poor summer combined with the recession hit the tourist trade, then came the unprecedented flooding in November followed by the longest spell of snow since 1963 and the accompanying grit crisis. Although I was in the thick of it I enjoyed enormously my year as Cumbria's civic head. Highlights included many royal visits including three from the Prince of Wales who, like his grandmother, talks to everyone and stays twice as long as expected. In April I was pleased to welcome him to Ambleside where he inspected post flood renovations. A great honour for me was being asked to open the new bridge at Workington where P.C. Bill Barker lost his life when it was swept away by the 19 November floods. But my main joy has been meeting so many worthy people throughout the county and beyond. These include members of all occupations and services and swarms of volunteers chief amongst whom are our young people. At the Whitehaven RAF parade I met a young cadet whom I'd previously seen taking part in a swimming gala and the county youth orchestra. I feel that people like him are more typical of our youth than the unpleasant minority we hear more about.

At South Lakeland's council on 30 March SLDC's council tax increase was fixed at 2.84% - the disproportionate increase compared to the county's tax rise is largely due to the cut for all districts in the governments Revenue Support Grant. The most contentious clash was over a





proposal to contribute £10,000 to a fund shared with other councils to meet the costs of appealing to central government for a rebate of hundreds of thousands of pounds raised from car parking fees. On the face it to spend £10,000 to get say £500,000 back seemed a good bargain; on the other hand some members thought it was too much of a gamble when faced with the power of Whitehall's law officers - but by a majority members decided to risk the £10,000. Time will tell who was right.

SLDC also approved some constitutional changes which enable e-mail petitions and also for emergency powers to be implemented without having to obtain the Chairman's signature. I recall that in 2001 when I was SLDC Chairman I was knocked up at night to sign a document to enable the removal of a whale's carcass washed up at Greenodd!

Further information has also been released about the Local Development Framework which was so controversial when draft suggestions were published in 2008 which, in Burton's case, implied that the village might be increased by 50 percent and that a mixed industrial area might be created. The final proposals were submitted to the Secretary of State last November and the publication of the Development Plan Documents is due this month so, as with wider governmental matters, we will have to wait and see - at least until after 6 May. In the meantime let us enjoy the Spring and hope for a better Summer.

Possibly this is also the concern of SLDC, not to mention Cumbria CC. If South Lakes residents are obliged to take recyclable goods to Kendal the whole exercise would surely be counterproductive.

All in all a great improvement, all agreed. Hopefully now this has been undertaken roads will be swept regularly to prevent re-clogging.

He suggested "Burton Emergency Action Volunteer Reaction. He was uncertain of the second "e". Possibly residents would like to make a suggestion? 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EYES WITH NO SPARKLE

"What do I have in common with Katie Price, Fern Britton, Elle McPherson and Gwyneth Paltrow?" ANSWER: We are all mothers who have experienced post natal illness.

The doctor's appointment was meant for my son, but out of nowhere the tears began to flow, I realized I needed to ask for help.

That was 8 months after my son Harry was born and the first time I'd admitted to anyone how desperate I felt.

The hard part began: phone your health visitor I was advised, tell your husband, easier said than done. All these thoughts came into my head: they will think I'm a bad mother, they'll take Harry away from me, we'll always have a black mark against us as a family.

After many attempts I finally plucked up the courage to phone Shirley, our health visitor. She was very understanding and arranged to come and see Brett and me, as it was important we dealt with this illness as a family. It was much easier talking to someone who understood what I couldn't even explain to myself and she made it clear that she was there to help.

I scored 24 on the Edinburgh Score (this measures the rate of post natal depression) the highest she had had in 3 years. But still I convinced myself I would be better in a few weeks, and desperately wanted my family not to worry anymore and to feel well again. The first mistake I made was pretending I was okay after a few weeks, wanting it to all go away when underneath I was crying inside.

Shirley saw right through this. She visited once a week, no time limit. She sat us both down and explained that I had serious Post Natal Illness that required treatment and it wasn't going to be a quick fix, and only when I admitted to myself, family and friends would it begin to get better. She said when someone asks you if you are OK try saying no, they will be shocked but it will help you talk about it.

This was the best advice she gave us. Once we had support from our close family and friends, and I knew I needed them to help, my recovery began.

Nearly a year on I am so much better. I am still on medication from the GP and receiving counselling but I am able to enjoy life again. The birth of a child is very special, once the life has been created for 9 months you have the preconceptions, ideas and dreams of what it will be like, when in reality it creates different challenges and hurdles.

On Saturday 12 June I am holding a Summer Extravaganza for all the family at Burton Memorial Hall, in aid of Post Natal Illness Awareness and Support. The money raised will go to Milnthorpe Family Centre so that they can provide classes and support for mums, and also for the Kendal Post Natal Illness Support Group.

This will be fun for all the family so please support this event. I strongly believe it is an illness that needs to be brought to the forefront and taken seriously so that mothers and their families receive the help and support they need before the illness worsens.

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Historical Footnote by Roger Bingham

AN HISTORICAL 6 MAY - 1935

Whatever the result - or lack of result - the General Election Day on 6 May 2010 is bound to go down in history. But the 6 May already has historical significance because exactly 100 years ago on the 6 of May 1910 King Edward VII died and was succeeded by his son King George V. As a result 25 years later the British Empire celebrated the Silver Jubilee of King George and Queen Mary. Burton entered into the celebrations with gusto - although few local people would have seen the King and Queen. The monarchs did, however travel regularly along the main railway line through the parish on their trips to and from Balmoral. According to legend the well-appointed Royal Train slowed down near Burton so that Queen Mary could enjoy a splash-less bath as the track between Oxenholme and Carnforth is one of the most level stretches on the whole journey.

Earlier in the year the village Jubilee Committee had been informed officially that because the actual Jubilee Day fell on a Sunday - 'the Lord's Day' - social celebrations should he held mainly on the preceding Friday and Saturday. Hence it was on Friday the 4th that 'Mrs Hoyle kindly presented in Morewood School a Jubilee beaker for all children including babies one day old'. I wonder if any Burton babies were born on the 5th or 6th and if they received a beaker. Rather unfairly the County Education Committee provided children's beakers only to 'Local Authority Schools' like Holme Primary so that the C. of

E. Morewood School was left out by Westmorland County Council. 'On Saturday 5th decorations and bunting were displayed and a large crown made by Miss B. Corless was fixed on the Market Cross. On Monday morning which was a public holiday the programme began at 10 o'clock when parishioners assembled for the procession to church. The procession was headed by the banner "Prosperity to Burton" and the Burton ex-servicemen. The service was conducted by the Rev. Carey Ward (vicar) and Mrs Kay was the organist. The service was followed by the broadcast service from St. Paul's Cathedral in London. In the afternoon there was a large assembly in the old cricket field in Dalton park (lent by Mr Shuttleworth) when a programme of children's and adult sports was enjoyed. Tea was provided and in the evening a social terminated a successful day. A second social was held on Tuesday'. Unusually neither Burton nor Holme organised a Royal Beacon on Farleton Knott, although many local fires could be seen from the parish particularly on Warton Cragg, Ingleborough, Heversham Head, Haverbrack and Arnside Knott. But at Holme there was a fire works display at 9.15 on the Sports Field lent by Mr Pinder.

Burton does have one permanent reminder of the 6 May 1935 as, to mark the Jubilee, the Market Square was conveyed to the Parish Council by the descendants of the Atkinson family, who as the former owners of Burton House were [and still are] the Lords of the Manor.

A few people still remember the Royal Jubilee of 75 years ago. Those who took part in the London pageantry include the Queen who was then Princess Elizabeth of York, the Duke of Edinburgh who as Prince Philip of Greece attended as a royal cousin, and the Earl of Harewood

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who as the son of the then Princess Royal is the eldest grandchild of King George and Queen Mary. In his memoirs he stated how as an English youth from Yorkshire he was furious and puzzled when his 'Grandpapa England' commanded him to wear a Highlander's kilted costume for the occasion. Are there any local memories of the historic 6 May - 1935 - and have any Jubilee beakers survived?

Allotments Update

Just a quick update on the allotments; Phil, Emma, Anne (plot 3), Andrew (plot 2) and myself (plot 1) have started work on the new plots behind the Kings. Now the weather's getting warmer we're all working hard to get the plots up to shape.

We'll keep you posted over the coming months but you'll be glad to hear there's some 'friendly' rivalry developing over veg, which should make the onion show a year to remember!

Some other news: we've had an offer from a kind lady who has a garden she can no longer use. She would be happy for someone to take over the garden for growing veg & fruit. If anyone's interested can they give me a call (07737 472 17) or email me and I can give you more details. Thanks.

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Around the world in 80 days

We left Burton-in-Kendal on January 7th, the taxi taking us to Southampton had some difficulty getting us out of the village owing to the ice and snow on the roads. Eventually, after trying Plan A: Neddy Hill - no; Plan B: Tan Pits Lane - no; Plan C: Station Lane and Moss Lane and onto the A6 - yes!, we arrived in good time, the roads being very quiet owing to the weather, and sailed for the Atlantic Ocean.

The passengers varied on our trip between 475 (the same number as the crew) and 600. Before we even got on the ship we met two ladies from Grange and Witherslack!

Our first stop should have been the Azores but the water was too rough for us to dock, so we had quite a lengthy

time at sea. However, there were so many activities / lectures and entertainments on board that the time just flew by.

Our next stops were the islands of Antigua - with Nelson's Dockyard, Curacao and San Andres, in the Caribbean. We explored the rain forest in Costa Rica and then spent a full day sailing through the Panama Canal - a wonderful feat of engineering. In the Pacific we sailed down the west coast of S. America and we visited Ecuador, where Panama hats are made, and we celebrated crossing the equator, then Peru with its ancient archaeology.

A few says at sea to Easter Island with its unique carved statues. Pitcairn was next - we heard all about "The Mutiny on the Bounty" and met several people with the surname Christian - we told them that their ancestor Fletcher





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
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Christian (who led the mutiny) came from near Cockermouth in Cumbria. The islanders came on board for several hours to sell their crafts, postcards and stamps, they also enjoyed a tour of the ship, plus lunch and sang to us before they left. The island has a population of 50, which includes 9 children.

Our next stops were the islands of Tahiti with the artist Gaugin's Museum, Bora Bora, Samoa with a visit to Robert Louis Stevenson's home (author of *Treasure Island*, etc), and Fiji - during which we crossed the dateline and lost a day!

In New Zealand we had 5 stops on the east side of North Island and 2 stops on South Island. In Wellington, the capital, we spent some time with Beith Atkinson (Lord of the Manor of Burton), he kindly took us on a tour of the lovely surroundings of the city, and inquired about village news.

We then sailed the N.Z. fjords and on to Hobart in





Tasmania, where we found the memorial to John Woodcock Graves (he died 1886) who wrote the song John Peel. Another local connection is Sir Gerald Strickland (Sizergh Castle family) who was Governor of

Tasmania at one time.

We disembarked in Dorling harbour, Sydney, Australia after 8 weeks and 21 stops at sea - a wonderful trip which fulfilled several lifetime ambitions. Next we drove 50 miles north of Sydney to stay with our son Jeff and his family, then we flew home via Singapore and arrived back in Burton before Easter.

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The Vicar Writes...

The God who suffers

The suffering we see in the world around us and which we experience in our own lives commonly raises two questions about God:

- a) Why does God allow suffering?
- b) Does God really care for us?

To the first question, I can't really give a clear answer. I don't always understand what God does in the world. Many of his ways are beyond me.

As for the second question, I can give a clear and definite answer because I have clear and definite evidence – the cross of Christ. Over Easter I found myself once again awestruck and moved by the account of Christ's passion as described in the Gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke and John).

Jesus experienced human betrayal, horrible injustice and a gruesome death. He bore incredible insult and was inflicted with horrific injury and yet continued to act in a compassionate way to those around him – even his tormentors and executioners.

This, according to the Bible, is the God who rules all things. He willingly experiences what we experience. This God, then, is able to sympathise with those who suffer and he is able to comfort the broken-hearted not just because he is all-knowing but because he has experienced suffering first-hand.

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This is something I hold to especially when I'm going through hard times. The God of Christianity is not cold, distant and aloof. He is humble and loving and familiar with suffering. He has come near to suffer with us and for us. This helps me to trust God when I don't understand what he is doing in the world and in my life.

So, while I might not always be able to fathom what God is doing, I can always trust his motives. His ways might not be clear to me but his heart is because on the cross he wore it on his sleeve for all to see. Does God really care for us? See for yourself: "God demonstrates his own love for us in this: while we were still sinners, Christ died for us." (Romans 5:8)






