WHAT WILL THE PROPOSED WIND FARM MEAN FOR BURTON IN KENDAL?

Over 40 villagers met in the Village Hall on 23 August to discuss the impact of EON's proposed wind farm which is to be built between Burton in Kendal and Kirkby Lonsdale. It was a very positive meeting during which many people learned about the threat to the village and its landscape for the first time.

Phil Dale (from the local opposition group, Landscape First) confirmed that EON plans to build 9×110 metre turbines (similar to the ones on Caton Moor) and that a full planning application is likely to be submitted at the end of 2010.

EON have held exhibitions in Kirkby Lonsdale, Hutton Roof and Whittington but have missed out Burton in Kendal even though the village is very close to the proposed site. The development will have a big impact on Burton if planning permission is granted not least because Burton will be the main access route for the site before, during and after construction. Traffic will increase and roads will need straightening and widening. On top of this, the views from the crags which many of us enjoy will be devastated.

'We're not against wind farms' said Phil, 'but they are

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heavily subsidised and incredibly inefficient. It's more about profit than renewable energy. Landowners and developers will make huge sums of money through this scheme'.

Developers are targeting the Lune Valley because it falls between the Lake Distict and Yorkshire Dales National Parks which have more protection from a planning perspective. At the moment there are over 20 wind farm schemes affecting the valley between Lancaster and Tebay.

The site proposed is surely an inappropriate site. The development will damage for ever an important landscape and will have a serious and adverse effect the communities surrounding the site including our community.

Over the last 6 months groups have been formed in surrounding villages to oppose this development and there is strong support from local MP's.

As a result of the meeting a local campaign group has been formed in Burton to keep villagers up to date with progress and to help those who want to object when the time comes. The path up to it from the Clawthorpe/Lupton road was mostly grassy thirty years ago. With growing use it became an earthen trod. A few weeks ago it looked less used or else it was just that a recent deluge had effaced people's footprints.

Outdoors

Late-summer flowers embroidered the lush grass on either side. Eyebrights twinkled their wee white stars. Tormentils shone butter yellow. Knapweeds glowed, some royal purple, some mauve. The harebells which do well on spare soil up there were a quiet blue like distant islands. Sloes like black grapes nestled in a dell amongst whin and bramble.

'My' boulder is like a pair of buttocks, gnarled ones with fretted sides.- The top is perfectly smooth and you can rest your feet on moss so deep that no hard ground can be felt under it. I used to sit here when I was planning a book about 'great rocks': Uluru (Ayers Rock) in the red centre of Australia; Macchu Pichu, the Inca citadel on a granite ridge high above the Urubamba in Peru; canyons in Arizona which have whole villages carved out of their sides, the adobe shells still there after a thousand years; and Land's End, and Cape Wrath, and... I got to all those places; wrote the book; it flopped... Never mind, the sweep of it all is still with me: thinking about the Cape of Good Hope while looking north-east to the leonine flanks of the Howgills; thinking about Herod's rock palace on Masada above the Dead Sea while looking north-west at the Kent, just visible as a slip of grey fabric between fields near Levens, with one pewter gleam beyond Haverbrack...

This time, as I sat quietly with no great plan in mind, I heard a shout from the fields below the ridge of Farleton Fell. Fifty Friesians were grazing calmly. In twos and threes they began to file downhill towards the milking parlour. Had the farmer called them and they were walking home obediently? No, there he was - a small brown figure walking uphill, then round the back of the herd to round up two reluctant animals.

It all looked just right for the end of a day in Westmorland. It had happened hundreds of thousands of times before. There was nothing wrong with it. I don't think I'm being sentimental. Of course a hill farm isn't Utopia. The price of milk to the producer is forced down by the supermarkets. The next generation may want nothing to do with the family farm. There was still a solid goodness about what I was looking at.

Not long ago on the 'Grumpy Old Men' programme an actor well-known for his coffee commercials remarked drily, 'What is the countryside <u>for</u>?' Well, it is certainly <u>for</u> milk and butter and cheese, and wheat and barley and oats, to go no further. And it is also <u>for</u> the sheer oxygen of fresh air and live things growing in their own sweet way.

Roger Reports...

'It's the economy stupid' which, as in every financial sphere from household to the government's budget, continues to dominate public life - though whether all the agencies responsible for the nation's living beyond its means will be able to rein in accustomed expenditure remains to be seen.

On South Lakeland the long debate is continuing about the proposal to increase the pay of the Chief Executive from the previous holders' £86,000 to over £100,000. Some believe that the higher sum is the rate for the job compared to other similar authorities; but others, including me, argue that CEO's pay scales were set before the spending crisis hit us and that, as the employees in the 'paid service' are being reduced, the top person has less responsibility and therefore should have lower, rather than higher, pay.

I also remain opposed to SLDC's spending money to replace the century-old free New Road car park in Kendal with an exhaust fuel-wafted public 'park'.

On the county council the figures are much higher, though the debates about cuts have, so far, been less fierce. Altogether Cumbria spends $\pounds 860m$ pa, of which $\pounds 400m$ is 'pass-ported' to schools. It has been



suggested that that schools budget might be reduced by £50m. The cuts, however, might affect planned building schemes as at QES, Kirkby Lonsdale, rather than class sizes or subject teaching.

Generally, it is anticipated that the coalition government's spending review to be announced on 25 October will require cuts, over four years, of between 25% and 40%. As 80% of spending is on staff costs, compulsory redundancies (which initially involve extra costs) are likely. Already 45 staff from the discontinued North West Development Agency have been made redundant.

Greater cuts are expected in CAPITA which, among other tasks, care for highways. By and large it is hoped that basic maintenance on the principle of 'pot holes yes, new bye-passes no' will continue, as will the upgrading of gritting etc which resulted from last winter's severe weather.

Fewer cuts in care for elderly and needy people are expected (except perhaps regarding bureaucracy) but some anomalies might be tackled. For instance children from less prosperous homes are entitled to an Educational Maintenance Grant to cover, among other expenses, transport to school, but they are also entitled to free bus passes - one or other subsidy could, perhaps, be cut.

A recent survey of deprivation amongst pupils based on Free School Meals (FSM) take up indicates the relative prosperity of south eastern Cumbria. One Carlisle school has 59% FSM take up compared to Burton Morewood's 6%, Holme's 5% and Milnthorpe's



9%. On school balances our local schools are satisfactory and Morewood, which had a small deficit in 2005-2008, had a surplus of £2,567 for 2009-10.

The happiest school news is that our main secondary school QES at Kirkby Lonsdale obtained the best results ever with 77% of pupils gaining five grade C or above GCSE passes, including 86% in English and 84% in Maths. The A Level results were also excellent and the VI Form now has 394 students (including 52 who previously attended other schools), roughly the same number as all QES pupils when I became a governor 30 years ago. The school roll is now 1,480 which, with 203 staff, gives QES a higher population than Kirkby Lonsdale town or of Burton!

A small row resulted from a Sunday Telegraph report that Cumbria County Council is spending £390,000 on union officials. As only 30% of county employees are in a union, compared to 80% 30 years ago, it can be argued that the cover for staff absent on union business should be paid for by the membership. But would this be fair?

Finally the county council and the districts are fighting off a government plan to incorporate our economic development in a North West Local Enterprise Partnership which will replace other 'guangos'. We want a single Cumbria LEP to deal with our distinct rural, tourist and nuclear interests.

An Opinion...

Observing the goings-on at the Parish Council meetings

ELECTRIC BLANKETS - NO GREAT SHOCK

Readers of last month's BN including A.O. herself, must surely have been impressed by the conscientious attention to detail recorded in the Parish Clerk's Minutes, which stood in for her "An Opinion". Thanks, Peter. But where was A.O. herself? Together with "Outdoors", she was disporting in Keswick at a production of Jo Orton's "What the Butler Saw". What a clever and funny farce it is, immaculately performed by the Rep Company.

It is tempting to compare it to a Parish Council meeting except it would be difficult to have PCSO Bullock descending through the ceiling on a precarious wire ladder, (though no doubt she would be up for it.) But could Police Sgt Sizer be persuaded to rush naked across the Council Chamber clutching his helmet to his most private parts? And would our single female PCIIr linger modestly behind the curtains popping up now and then to have her say? And who would play the part of the dubious psychologist? The possibilities are many. Disgruntled Burtonians who have read so far may be reflecting that poor Jo Orton, the playwright, came to a sticky end. Alas, dear readers, A.O.'s talents are too meagre to merit such desserts.

But all that's a digression. Here's some of what happened on 16 September. It was a short meeting, lasting about an hour.



Fire and Rescue

PCIIrs received a Fire and Rescue report from Deputy Location Mgr Callum Graham (has he been up- or down-graded since the time he rightly corrected A.O.'s claim that he was Fire Station Sgt? – Last time he was Fire Station Mgr. "Location Mgr" sounds decidedly grander, though the Deputy part may be a bit of a downer.)

A.O. wasn't sent a copy of this report. Nevertheless she can advise Burtonians that they can have their electric blankets checked for free on 4 October in Kendal (details elsewhere in BN.)

Police Report

PCSO Jessica Bullock was present, and PCIIrs expressed appreciation of this. She reported there had been a daytime burglary on 3 September from a house in Burton – possibly connected to another house break-in at Lupton the following day. If anyone saw anything out of the ordinary, she asked them to be in touch.

Village Parking

This was discussed further on in the meeting, but it was also brought up by a member of the public in Public Forum. He had also written to the PC about his concern re lack of parking in Burton. It was agreed that a working party should look into the matter and present its findings at a later date.

Those Verges (Again!)

A member of the public expressed concern about the overgrown state of the verges on the west side of the A6070 towards Clawthorpe. Surely both hedges and verge could be cut back more severely, to at least



provide the possibility of a refuge for pedestrians from oncoming traffic? It seems this isn't the task of the Lengthsman, it's up to SLDC. The clerk will look into the matter.

End of public forum.

Remembrance Sunday

A wreath will be contributed, and a donation of £50 sent to the British Legion. This is an increase of £10 on previous years.

What else?

1. A couple of negatives: (a) the PC agreed they don't wish to contribute to the SLDC review of the Statement on Licensing Policy (b) or to comment on the SLDC review of Polling Places. They're happy to keep them as they are.

2. Road markings. PCIIrs will confirm these with CCC after a walk-through.

3. Contingency Plan (Major Emergency.) All will be revealed in the PC Newsletter.

4. The new road surface on Main Street. This has raised the level of the road above the dropped pavements in places, leading to flooding of pavements and, in some cases, water entering properties. Now it is fair to say the PC was warned of this possibility, before work started, by a member of the public. The attitude of at least one PCIIr was, roughly speaking, that that was just hard cheese. Not much comfort to those who now have to cope. The Clerk is to inform Capita of the situation.

5. The Hutton Windfarm. Some PCIIrs had attended the meeting at BMH to hear the case against the proposed erection of wind turbines at Longfield Tarn.



Access to the windfarm via Burton had raised concern. they reported, especially during the building period. They were also concerned about the size of the turbines. The PC Chairman pointed out that no action can be taken till the plans are formally presented by EON. Note: Eon have delayed presenting the plans while further research into noise levels is conducted. 6.The Fun Run. Some good news: the Fun Run, reported PCIIr Boddy (for the Rec. Trust), had been a great success and raised around £1000 much-needed funds for the Trust. Fun was had by all - except for the odd grouchy motorist - or even, as A.O. witnessed, an irritable cyclist. The inclusion in the finishers' goodie bags of a small tube of toothpaste was a master-stroke. You could clean your teeth after devouring the chocolate, as A.O. pointed out to her grandson.

Challenge 25

Following on from a series of cases where pubs have been caught supplying alcohol to under age persons, we've been asked to remind people about the changes to the law which come into effect on 1 October.



Under the new rules, a premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must make sure that their premises has in place an age verification policy for the sale or supply of alcohol to anyone who looks under the age set in their policy.

Schemes such as Challenge 21 and the more recent and widely used Challenge 25 mean that young adults will need to show their photo ID <u>each time</u> they purchase alcohol - even if they've already shown it earlier in the same day at the same place. ID's usable are passports, photographic driving licences, or a card bearing the PASS (Proof of Age Standards) hologram. (See www.pass-scheme.org.uk for how to obtain one.)

From 1 October it becomes an offence for any licenced premises not to request sight of a proof of age document for young adults, so don't be surprised when you're asked for this in local shops, pubs and restaurants. Make sure you carry yours with you!

Historical Footnote by Roger Bingham SCHOOL RECORDS

Historians use two basic records for their work: primary and secondary sources. Primary sources are documents like letters, wills and deeds. Secondary sources are generally published accounts like books, directories and newspapers. Primary sources as well as providing a factual foundation also give something of the 'flavour' of the period when they were a written.

A good example of historically useful deeds relate to Morewood School as they contain names of Burton's principal inhabitants of nearly 150 years ago, ancient tenancy terms like 'copyhold', topographical information like the site names and areas e.g. 'one rood', and 'period' details like social classification such as 'poor persons', gent', 'esq.' and 'farmer'.

Although half the pupils would be girls, women were not considered eligible to be school managers, though 'ladies' could be visitors. There are some possible errors. The site is referred to as being on Boon 'Wall' whereas other evidence indicates that the present name of Boon 'Walk' was in use at the time. Also one surname is spelt as 'Fearenside' and not as the more commonly occurring 'Fearnside'.

The main deeds (or 'indenture') relate to the conveyance of the site for the Victorian school which provided elementary and later primary education until it was demolished in 1967 (after exactly a century of use) to make way for the core of the present building.

4. said William Chastel de Boinville, and William Wilson of Burton, gent, Henry Cock of Dalton, farmer, present churchwardens of parish of Burton.

Premises: all that plot of land containing one rood being part of a close of land called Boon Wall situate in Burton and now in the occupation of Edward Rooks, being in the south west corner of the said close twenty nine yards in breadth and forty seven yards and one foot in length with all appurtenances and discharged from copyhold or customary tenure as parcel of the manor of Burton - for the purposes of being applied as a site for a school for poor persons of the parish of Burton and neighbourhood. The managers shall erect a neat and comely house with out offices, conveniences and appendages (i.e. earth closets for toilets) to perpetuate the memory of Reverend Robert Morewood M.A. late vicar and to cause the residue of the plot to be laid out for play and pleasure ground and other purposes as the managers shall think fit. The said school shall be open for inspection in conformity with the order in Council of 10 August 1840, that the principal officiating minister of the parish shall have superintendence of



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religious and moral instruction of all scholars during school hours and may use the premises for purposes of a Sunday School; that the master or mistress must be a member of the Church of England and that managers must meet on first Monday in January, April, July and October and they may appoint a committee of not more than five ladies to assist in the management of the school and that if any of the said mangers shall die, go abroad, refuse or become incapable of management then the majority shall appoint another in their place, provided the Vicar of Burton is always a manager'.

Finally the deed states that the land should be 'conveyed for a consideration of £50' which was rather cheap as it equates approximately to £5,000 in today's values.

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<u>A Note from the Post Office</u> Sending Parcels Abroad this Year?

Please don't lynch me for mentioning it so soon but CHRISTMAS will be here before we know it. As the Burton News goes to press, the final dates for posting have not yet been published for 2010, but they are likely to be similar to last year's which, for surface mail, were:

20 October - Canada, Hong Kong, Singapore, South Africa & the USA

- 6 October Far East (except Hong Kong & Singapore) & Middle East
- 1 October All other non-European destinations

For those of you sending parcels abroad this year, before you go out and buy a full-sized Barbie scooter for your niece in Australia, may I remind you of the maximum sizes for sending items abroad with Royal Mail.

Maximum length for an overseas parcel is 60cm (approx 2 ft in old money!) with a maximum total of length + width + height of 90 cm (approx 3ft) Also, the maximum weight is 2 kg

It is really easy to exceed these and then the parcel would cost a great deal more to send via Parcel Force. It is often cheaper to split a heavy parcel and send two packets. Come & ask us at the Post Office Counter for further advice.

Cumbria County Council's Trading Standards team, working alongside Cumbria Fire and Rescue Service, Age UK and other care agencies, is hosting free electric blanket testing - by appointment only - between 9am and 5pm at the following locations:

Among the common issues are problems such as defective overheating protection, exposed wires or failing insulation.

Although electric blankets have to comply with strict safety standards when they are sold, they do wear with age and can become damaged. Blankets in poor condition are a fire hazard and can put people at risk. Improper storage during the summer is one of the main reasons for blankets developing faults.




