BURTON MEMORIAL HALL NEEDS YOUR VOTE

At last we can spread the news! We have been under an embargo until Thursday 2 June about a grant that we applied for with the National Lottery Jubilee People's Millions.

We are delighted to let you know that we have reached the final stages of this application. We are one of the six groups in the Border TV area that are competing against each other for a match funded grant of up to £60K. Only the top four groups will receive the money so it is vital that we get your support over the next three weeks.

If successful we will be using the money to add junior toilets to the main hall which will allow Pre-school complete security for their children. We will also be replacing the boiler with up to three new ones to dramatically improve our ageing heating system throughout the hall, and we will be fitting sports lighting, stage lighting and wall lights in the main hall which will benefit everyone from badminton and table tennis users to people who would like more subtle lighting at concerts, drama productions and parties. This work will take place over the summer break.

Fiona Armstrong will be coming to the hall in early June to film a two minute broadcast that will be shown on Border television on the evening of Tuesday 28 June, and we will need you to phone in and vote for us on that day. Don't worry if you do not receive Border TV because you can watch the broadcast on the internet at ITV.com, and details of the phone number will also be in the Daily Mirror and on our JPM website page. We will be competing head to head against a group from Whitehaven on that night. The six groups are being showcased in broadcasts over three consecutive nights, ours being the second night, and voting will take place but will only count from 9am until midnight on the day of the broadcast. We will not get the telephone number until the day of our broadcast so we need everyone to be ready to help spread the number around to maximise our chances of coming in the top four. You can also follow our progress on our web page at www.peoplesmillions.org.uk and the telephone number for voting will be displayed there from 9am on 28 June and will also be displayed at the Memorial Hall and around the village. You do not have to wait to watch the broadcast to start voting. Everyone can vote up to ten times from the same landline at a cost of 11p per call.



Mobile rates will vary. Please tell everyone you know and ask them to vote for us.



Outdoors

Towards the end of April I sat in the garden at Pear Tree Cottage in Dalton, talking with

Alec and Linda Greening about cattle grazing in the woods, and about the birds that frequent their terrain between wild trees and cultivated flowers; redpolls and flycatchers, and a young kestrel that had spent weeks and weeks calling for a mate, and about adders, which are threatened nationally by loss of heathland habitat (40% of heather lost to bracken from 1945-1985.) I was recalling how our yellow labrador Shep, on a path through windshorn heather near Pordenack in West Cornwall, had suddenly gone out on a loop beside the path. When we got there, a dark lithe adder was coiled up on the trod.

Half an hour after leaving the Greenings', as I came down towards the car park from the rim of Plain Quarry, Klipper the lurcher jibbed, stepped to one side, and would go no further. On the sunlit ground a slowworm glistened like a runnel of liquid gold as it eeled across, slid into the mesh of bramble and raspberry, grass and young bracken, and was instantly invisible.

Will I have a more enthralling glimpse of wildlife this year? Every few years a slowworm lights up my day. The last I'd seen hereabouts was in Lancelot Clark's Storth, gliding away into cover in the whin jungle. Earlier again we brought one home from Warton Knott and kept it for a few days until it got out of its box and slithered cunningly into the groove beside the front-door mat. So we took it back to the Knott, where we should have left it in the first place. More than forty

years ago, when my family was at the stage of being excited by all things animal (even cats), we found a slowworm amongst bracken on Jura in the Inner Hebrides. Foolishly we brought it home to Lancaster. It turned out to be a pregnant female. Soon the children were feeding nine inch-long olive-gold young ones with the smallest earthworms they could dig up in the garden.

On the way back from Plain Quarry I told Alec about the wonderful meeting with the slowworm. He said, 'that will have made your day', and told me about the many lizards that live on their land. They almost never see them and only know about them because of the little entrance-holes to their lairs in the rock-garden.

Slowworms are found in 20% of the countryside, adders in 7%. Slowworms are so smooth, so evenly and subtly coloured, and have such jet-black shining eyes that it is hard not to think of them more kindly than we do about adders - so venomous, so fiercelooking with that black lightning-stripe down their backs. I wholly admire them; I recall how fitting it was that on Jura - Britain's Garden of Eden - we found a knot of adders, five or six of them, entwined under a rock. Eight years ago on the island of Mull, we went up a path above the deserted harbour of Calgary to explore and photograph villages from which the crofters were evicted in the Clearances a hundred and sixty years ago, Crumbs of earth began to patter down from a bluff just above the track. A young adder, three or four inches long and glowing orange like hot metal, was ramming its head against the crumbling ground worming desperately upwards and falling back - biting the soil in a frenzy to escape. We climbed on towards

Innivea and left the wee animal to find a more sheltered place to grow up in and turn dark and lengthy like its parents.

Roger Reports...

The results of South Lakeland District Council elections on 5 May for the Burton and Home Ward were: Vic Brown - Liberal Democrat 857, Brian Cooper -Conservative 939. The turn-out was 59.81% compared to an SLDC average of 56.16%. The Burton village turnout was certainly higher, as at 6.00pm (with still four busy hours to go) I was told by our election officers that over 50% of the Burton electorate had already voted, in addition to postal votes which were around 20%. Although 19 out of 51 South Lakeland seats were contested, there was ultimately little change in the parties' relative strength. All the Conservative seats were held and the Liberal Democrats lost only one seat. This was at Troutbeck where the successful Candidate. 23 year old Ben Berry, in beating SLDC's Vicechairman Jo Stephenson, became one of the country's youngest Conservative Councillors. SLDC's party figures are Liberal Democrats 32 (compared to 36 in 2009), Conservatives 18, Labour 1. At a county council by-election the Conservatives won the Keswick seat from the Liberal Democrats. The county council figures are Conservatives 39, Labour 24, Liberal Democrats 15, Independents 6. At the Alternative Vote Referendum the district turnout was 50.28 which was about the national average, as was the approximate 66% vote for No Change.

Locally the election was one of the hardest fought ever, with considerably more leaflets being distributed by both parties than, I am informed, anywhere else in the district. There were, however, fewer party signs than in recent years. Moreover, unlike last year when 47 Conservative posters were removed or damaged (though none were harmed in Burton), there was no vandalism. I accompanied Brian Cooper round the district, and as usual we had a friendly reception from supporters and opponents alike. Whenever we met Vic Brown we exchanged handshakes and good wishes - which at least shows 'we was brought up proper.'

There was, however, much confusion. Constantly, I had to explain that Brian was not fighting against me, while the two member situation led to about 17 voters putting a cross by both Brian's and Vic's name which meant that they were spoilt votes. Also most electors could not see why both the ward's seats could not be contested at the same time instead of in consecutive years. The current electoral system means that we had elections for the district in 2008, for the county in 2009, general election 2010, district 2011 and we will have district elections in 2012, county in 2013, European in 2014 and, if the coalition government's agreement lasts, a general election and a district election in 2015. If we had an all out the lot out system for the district, instead of election by thirds, in years when there is not an all out county election it would reduce election fatigue slightly - but please what do you think?

Election issues included concerns about overdevelopment under the LDF, though the need for some more 'affordable homes' was appreciated. There were

fewer than usual grumbles about the roads, and the fear of crime has been reduced. The 'say no to wind farms at Kirkby Lonsdale' emerged as a issue towards the end of the campaign - and there was criticism of SLDC's plans to replace Kendal's New Road free car park with a grassed area, as the car park is well used by local workers. Several people mentioned their opposition to giving prisoners the vote. Throughout the campaign the weather was gorgeous so climate change was not mentioned - but have we had our summer?

So officers have been elected, in all cases unanimously. And the Parish Council accounts have been audited. Thanks were unanimously given for the sterling services of PCllr Mason-Hornby, who has been a pretty impressive Chairman for the last three years. And a vote of thanks was also recorded for the services of the Auditor.

Police Report

The ever-spandier report – this time in a delicate pink, with a grey bit of matter as an afterthought at the very end – appearing elsewhere in this issue.

The Library Service

There was discussion about the economies and changes that are almost certainly to be made,

particularly with regard to the visits of the Mobile Library (first Monday of the month in Burton.) Only one letter had been received asking for the continuation of this service. All present were, to tell the truth, at a bit of a loss, as most felt this didn't reflect the true strength of feeling about the importance of the visits.

It was hoped that other opinions about the direction the library should go would come from other Burtonians, and the PC expressed the wish that others would contact them about what is after all, a key service in the community. PCllrs were reminded that Burton had a higher number of users of the service (20) than any other village in the area.

<u>Footnote:</u> A.O. has the privilege of being able to correct herself at this point. At the PC meeting, when asked, she claimed she didn't use the library. It isn't true. The Kendal library has, from time to time, been of huge service to her, providing reference books she simply wouldn't have been able to afford otherwise. (One history book given a value of £50 on Amazon for example.)

That's all A.O. is going to write about the PC meeting. And there isn't much else you haven't heard (or read) before anyway. You know by now how slowly these things progress. The accounts are important, of course. They can be accessed on the PC website, and so on.

pondering his exciting new project. It is of course Roper, and he is hoping to reap such a profit from his new idea that he will make it possible for the estate to rid itself of the tentacles of the National Trust and once again achieve independence from the tedious stream (as he sees them) of visitors who peer into his bedroom, and leave their fingerprints on the family photographs. It is his aspiration to gain forever the approval of his parents, in particular that of his father, now far away in Hong Kong.

Sadly, Roper has picked up criminal tendencies from his adventures. From his perch he looks down on the rusting roof of the library van, which has come to its final resting-place in the stable yard. It was his mother's suggestion, for she enjoys conducting her middling-distinguished cocktail guests for a viewing of the vehicle that was, for weeks, the prison of her only son. 

Historical Footnote by Roger Bingham

BURTON GRASS

Agriculture was Westmorland's greatest industry until the twentieth century. Even so, all commentators stressed that most of its land, anywhere else, would have been regarded as unfit for cultivation. Up in the fells poor folk grumbled 'we've fratched and scaulded lang and sair upon the whole the fell has meade mischief for iver mair.' Similarly, the more erudite Daniel Defoe, in c.1700, said that the 'country was eminent only for being the wildest and most barren and frightful of any that I have passed through.'

A hundred years later Andrew Pringle dismissed the county as being so 'mountainous that a great proportion of it must ever remain untouched.' Slightly less stingy land could be rented for as little as £1 an acre. But our southern part of the county was a fertile exception. Here land could be let for £4 an acre in 'pleasant vallies (sic) that want only trees and hedge rows to be truly beautiful. From Millthrop to Burton, and from Burton to Kirkby Lonsdale both the farms and the inclosures appear to be somewhat larger, and it is not quite so rare to see a few acres of wheat.'

Pringle found that along with arable cultivation the district's main crop of grass required for the 'abundant stock' of sheep and cattle could be improved by careful management. 'In the year 1792 Mr Smith of Henridding in the Parish of Burton in Kendal sowed a close containing exactly two acres and a half with 48llbs of

red clover seed amongst a crop of barley for which the land had been slightly manured after fallow wheat. The field is in Lancashire, but being situated within an hundred yards of Westmoreland it may be mentioned here without impropriety. When the field was mowed in July 1793 it yielded a crop of twenty two single cartloads of hay. It was mown a second time in September and produced eighteen of the same cart-loads. It was depastured with nine sheep from the time the land was carried off till the beginning of November, and the foggage was then tolerably good. Let the most strenuous advocates of natural grass say whether they ever had a crop so valuable'. Well done Mr Smith of Henridding!

To Australia and back, with Burton links

Last year we sailed from England to Australia and then flew home (see BN May 2010). This year we did the opposite - so now we can say we have sailed round the world! John has also therefore achieved a lifetime ambition, albeit on luxury cruise ships! We flew to Australia at the end of January. Our first stop before we joined the ship was a couple of weeks with our son Jeff and family - they live in a beautiful area 50 miles north of Sydney, NSW. While we were there we enjoyed the many sandy beaches nearby, and saw lots of pelicans.

When we were there I was in touch with Joan Sargent who used to live in Burton House, North Wing, and then on Burton Park. She now lives in New South Wales. Joan told me that last year she met Clive and Meg Probyn who also live in NSW. They exchanged reminiscences of Burton, and I (Kath) promised to send them the latest book on Burton, Clawthorpe & Dalton and some leaflets of our area because Dr Clive Probyn wrote the first history of Burton about 40 years ago when he was working at Lancaster University.

The book, *A Guide to Burton-in-Kendal - the parish and its history*, was published by the Burton-in-Kendal Civic Society. Clive sent a letter of thanks and recalled that they lived in the 3rd house on the left, going up Morewood Drive (1968-71). Their neighbours, he said, were John Tobin, OBE, and his wife, he was a director of the London Choral Society and a noted Handelian.

John Tobin was also a stalwart of Burton Amateur Dramatic Society, being secretary in 1970.

Mid-February we left sunny Australia and sailed north, with stops at Brisbane, Whitsunday Islands, and Cairns. Hong Kong was followed by Halong Bay, a world heritage site, with its many strange islands, on the east coast of Vietnam. (See photo opposite)

We then visited Bangkok and the island of Koh Samui in Thailand, followed by Singapore and Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia. In Mumbai the contrast between the English architecture and the Indian temples was very interesting.

When we sailed across the Indian Ocena we had talks and practice drill in the event of the ship being attacked by pirates, we managed to avoid them, but saw several warships patrolling the zone where it has happened.



The future of Cumbria Libraries

Cumbria County Council is launching a major review of its library service and is encouraging library users, local communities and anyone else interested in shaping the future of the service to get involved.

Unlike many local authorities elsewhere, Cumbria has chosen not to reduce its library budget this year as a result of the public sector cutbacks. While the total spend on the county's network will be maintained with a budget of around £6m this financial year, the county council is taking the opportunity to have a thorough review of the service to see where it can be improved and how new methods of delivering the service can work.

A crucial factor in the Time For Change? public discussion booklet is that, by modernising the service now, it will be stronger and more resilient in the future.

The need for change is becoming ever clearer. Cumbria is mirroring the national trend which shows a sharp decline in usage of libraries. In the last five years in Cumbria there has been a 20% drop in visitor numbers and half a million fewer items have been borrowed from libraries since 2005/6 - an 18% decrease.

The county council believes that access to services is a big factor in this reduction. Some of the county's libraries are only open for 10 hours a week, meaning the books are locked up in buildings for 95% of the time. Three ageing and unreliable mobile library vans

also have to cover the second largest county in England - meaning most mobile library service users only get a visit every six weeks.

Therefore the council's 'big idea' is to increase its efforts in providing the right services in the right places and make sure that the focus is on access, books and people rather than simply buildings and opening hours. The county's main network of libraries in the main towns could therefore be strengthened, with improved and more consistent services on offer - these would be called Library Extras and it's envisaged there would be around 30 in the county. They would also support Cumbria Community Libraries which would serve other parts of the county - and it's here that the scale of change will be determined by what people in Cumbria want to see being done differently.

There's no fixed model for Cumbria Community Libraries and other areas of the country have seen innovative ideas such as book drops in the village phone box springing up. Nothing is being ruled out in Cumbria at this early stage and the council is keen to hear about people's ideas through the consultation document or website www.cumbria.gov.uk.

There is a petition form in the Village Store/Post Office asking for the continuation of Burton's weekly mobile library service, so please sign it if you want to see the service retained.

Whatever else you think the council should be doing with the library services, you have until 30 June to tell them, so don't forget!


