Outdoors

Now and again - well, most days, actually -I'm struck by wonder at the presence of birds in our lives. A robin perches a few feet away when we dig the garden. Jackdaws bark and chuckle as they make their homes in our chimney stacks. Blackbirds stab and forage amongst leaf-mould in the flowerbeds. Swallows perch on overhead cables, swoop in and out of barns, and dip beakfuls of mud from ponds. Hundreds of starlings twist through the air like scarves of smoke above Lancaster and Blackpool. Buzzards cruise on air-currents four hundred feet above the garden and give out that mew which seems the voice of sky and space.

All of them evolved from dinosaurs about seventy million years ago. First in central Europe, now abundantly in China, fossils have turned up which preserve the exact shapes of skeletons, skulls, and even feathers of animals from the generations when lizard-like creatures with teeth and scales were evolving into air-borne ones with beaks and feathers.

Scales with fringes developed to give buoyancy as the proto-birds glided from tree- or bush-top to the ground (as peacocks still do.) Now scientists are wondering if the scale/feather transition was not so much in aid of flight and more in aid of mating display, as the fringed scales became ever more elaborate and colourful. Some of these questions may never be answered. What is certain is that some reptiles, like the dinosaurs which scampered about in Steven Spielberg's Jurassic Park, evolved into birds over thousands of generations.

And then, about two million years ago, we came along. We hunted birds, for meat, feathers, bones. At Ewaninga in the central Australian desert, I saw slabs of red rock chiselled with likenesses of emu footprints to tell fellow-hunters that a waterhole nearby was a good place to catch game. We tamed birds and bred them, to provide eggs and meat and plumes and to carry messages; also for our enjoyment - peacocks displaying in the gardens of the rich, doves with flutes fitted to their wings to delight Chinese mandarins with their reedy music. We worshipped them - sea-eagles were totems in Shetland - and we made up stories about them, their golden eggs, their offering a disguise for Zeus when he raped Leda, their carrying away of babies from the cradle.

Gradually fantasy has been replaced by knowledge. Early in the 18th century people, puzzled by the disappearance of swallows in September, supposed that they flew to the moon. Now we know exactly where swallows (and swifts, and ospreys, and corncrakes) go because birds ringed in this country have been traced to Algeria and sub-Saharan Africa and Egypt. Migration is as wonderful as those ancient myths and much more interesting because it brings home to us the intimate lives of these nimble, bright-eyed creatures who sip from our birdbaths, peck seeds from our feeders, and hunt snails and grubs amongst our flowerbeds.

Burton Memorial Hall ALMOST THERE!

Work on the new pre-school sized children's toilets should commence in mid-October, with the replacement heating and lighting systems being scheduled in to cause as little disruption to Hall users as possible.

The Contractor tender process is frustratingly longwinded and it appears nothing is happening, but there has been a huge amount of activity taking place behind the scenes, with endless discussions, phone calls, meetings and so on leading us to the point where the tenders are in, and by the time the October BN hits your doormat the Contractor will have been appointed.

The first indicator that things are starting to happen will be the appearance of safety fencing round the north end of the Hall - this will provide a secure exclusion area accessible only to the Contractor's staff and will also be where all the materials needed will be delivered to. During building work a small part of the north end of the car park (where the recycle bins were) will be coned off for the use of the Contractor's vehicles. As there will be larger than usual vehicles in the car park, please do take extra care whilst using it or passing through.

Meanwhile, thank you for your patience whilst all the preliminary work is being undertaken, and we're sure the results will be well-worth waiting for.



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Roger Reports...

from the district & county councils

Firstly, congratulations to our young people on the excellent A Level and GCSE results. 80% of Queen Elizabeth and Dallam School pupils obtained 5 Grade C passes and the success rate in most Cumbrian schools was above the national average.

Officially Cumbria has the lowest crime rate in England. As we were spared the discouraging and corrosive August riots, our crime statistics continue to show a downward tend with 222 or 18% fewer victims of crime in South Lakeland; anti-social behaviour fell by 24% and assaults related to alcohol by 31%. But theft, mainly from motor vehicles, increased by 14 offences. Sex and domestic violence offences have increased, but perhaps because of more sensitive reporting procedures which has led to fewer victims withdrawing charges.

Our successful law and order record underlay a motion, supported by the leaders of the Conservative, Labour, Independent and Liberal Democrat Groups, at the September county council against the government's proposal to replace the Police Authority made up of 18 community representatives, including 9 councillors, with an elected Police Commissioner. He/she would have a salary of £120,000 pa and candidates would be nominated by political parties. The 'police' election is planned for November 2012 - which would not be the best time to get activists out to deliver leaflets in support their party's candidate. All but three Councillors opposed the scheme.

More controversial is a proposal to save £2.5m by transferring Cumbria's Fire and Rescue control centre from Cockermouth to a new £400m North West HQ at Warrington. The savings would enable the county to keep all our local fire stations and retained brigades. Although I pointed out that Burton is as near to Warrington as to Cockermouth, I accepted that a Warrington HQ might be perceived as lacking local knowledge. Moreover, we were told that the Warrington computer links were not yet complete.

Dissatisfaction about car parking continues, with complaints about extended evening hours charges, and a petition signed by over 400 people at the County Show opposing SLDC's administration's policy of transforming Kendal's unsightly, but free, New Road Car Park into a grassed area. I would like the river side area tidied up, but only if alternative - and preferably free - parking can be provided, as the current parking is much used by workers from the villages, but please what do you think?

The county's Scrutiny Committee has also investigated parking disparities. The penalty figures range from 2.9 per booked offences a day in South Lakeland to nearly 10 in Barrow; so is SLDC too lax and Barrow too harsh?

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Moreover the current system of most districts retaining the lucrative off-street parking with county officials supervising on-street parking has anomalies - so that district wardens walking from one car park to another cannot deal with breaches of on-street parking dealt with by county wardens. But if the district's car parks were transferred to the county the lost revenue would have to be met by an increase in district council tax.

Meanwhile the county is grappling with budget cuts, to ensure that any Council Tax rise will be below 2.5% if the government does not subsidise us, to prevent any increase as in 2011-12. Staffing levels have been reduced by 600, with only 18 new recruits being approved against 84 proposals for new staff. Some improvements achieved include a new 60-bed older people's home costing £4.5m for south Cumbria at Barrow and an electronic recording system for home care assistants; and we have ordered more salt than ever before for the winter when - or even if - it comes.

Commenting on the goings-on at the Parish Council meetings

If you ever watch Film-4 on Channel 15, you'll have enjoyed the running potato wedges ad for the sponsors, McCains - a row of potato wedges at the cinema who say things at each break like "He does his own stunts" and (my favourite) "I am lost here," uttered with a resigned groan. This was pretty much the mind-set of 02, your novice correspondent at the Parish Council in September, standing in for A.O., who was unwell. 02 did try hard to follow the Councillors through their maize maze of draft planning frameworks, interest eligibility criteria, and one guite new (well, to 02) creature called 'out-turn'. So, dear reader, please make allowances if the following sketch calls something an income when it was really an expenditure or says a planning application refers to Dalton Lane when it was really Clawthorpe Road.

The policewoman in attendance, who looked rather ill and worried, reported that there had been 'social behaviour issues' in Boon Town involving 'kids', requiring 'several police visits'. (Nothing like Tottenham or Salford, we gathered.) After an attempted break-in at the derelict Royal a screwdriver and a hacksaw had been found but this apparently doesn't make it to the status of a crime because nobody has been charged.

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sheet showing Expenditures for 2011-12, under twenty headings, each divided into Budget, Budget to Date, Actual to Date, Variance to Date, and % Variance. Also another spread-sheet showing the proposed budget for 2012-13. While not quite groaning "I am lost here," 02 clutched at one or two intelligible items. Grass cutting will cost four times as much as last year because Grasscare (now defunct) had been charging absurdly low prices. One Councillor couldn't understand the high figure of £1025 under 'Contingencies' - the Clerk jokingly congratulated her on 'spotting the deliberate mistake' - half an hour later it turned out to be the actual cost of repairing the Market Cross.

The Clerk circulated a wondrous two-tone spread-

Councillors were worried that the County Council grant to pay the lengthsman his £1000 might be cut this year and appealed to the District & County Councillor, who gave a splendidly involved reply to the effect that he didn't really know what would happen but he hoped it would be all right - a state of mind we must all recognise, whether we're councillors or not. Bank balances were reviewed (on September 15 we had £15,481.25) and everyone laughed at the size of our deposit in the Bank of Ireland (£20.09) and hoped that keeping our money there would help the struggling Irish economy.

Emerging undaunted from the blizzard of figures, the Councillors then discussed, and more or less decided on, a number of physical things. How should next year's Silver Jubilee be marked? Medals are just put away in drawers. Mugs are better and could be given to all Burton children - possibly the national mug, possibly a commissioned one. A late, rather tentative, suggestion



was some memorial seats. And there should be a beacon - the mention of it made all present look jolly and bright-eyed. Where, exactly? The highest point in the parish? The trig point can be seen from almost everywhere. Farleton Knott is obviously a commanding height, alough the view of it from the south is blocked by Burton Knott. Anyway, we all want a beacon - a ring of flames should encircle the entire district - and the site will wait on consultation with neighbouring parish councils. There were beacons in 1911 (accession of George V) and 1953 (accession of Elizabeth II), and by this time 02's head was humming with the fine old lines


The red glare on Skiddaw Roused the burghers of Carlisle - although that was a warning, not a celebration.

The Council still doesn't know what to do about the proposal to make a car park out of the grassy, bushy bank where Boon Town runs onto Main Road. It turns out to be owned by S.L.D.C. Our Council will ask them to hand it over to us - free, or at least for a peppercorn - and a decision about it can then be made. A Councillor had worked out that there was room for stepped parking for eight cars. Others clearly disliked the idea - or rather, unclearly, since they seemed to swither between the look of the thing and the safety of it. The pro Councillors stated flatly that it was necessary because it was 'the only available space in the centre of the village'. So: watch this space.

Adult Social Care was discussed at length, in a spirit of worried concern, since this matters to us all, either for our own sakes or for the sake of our elders. A Councillor was worried by the imminent closure of Benson Green day-care centre. Another pointed out that such centres are now much under-used. The Council must respond to the County Council consultation by next Wednesday, so the sensible suggestion was made that Councillors should send in their views individually by internet.

The following two Agenda items had this in common, that the Council should or possibly should not 'express an interest in' or 'respond to' large plans, 'pilot plans' (02 wonders if all plans aren't in a way pilot plans), and National Planning Frameworks. 02's silent groan of "I am lost here" must have been almost audible. One Councillor thought it was silly to do lots of work on planning the use of this or that space when the enabling legislation might never be passed. Other Councillors thought it was only decent to show willing. The Chairman said that he himself was not inclined to undertake the task. A proposal to 'express an interest' was carried by 6 to 1 (roughly, because some hands seemed to go only halfway up).

There were several discussions throughout the evening about whether the subject under discussion could officially be discussed, during which one or another Councillor usually broke free and actually discussed the damn thing. And of course everybody interrupted everybody else - usually two or three councillors were talking at any one time. In spite of all this, expenditures were authorised; actions were reported; mugs and beacons were enthused about; road-markings were promised (sort-of); and a car park may or may not have moved nearer to reality. Not a bad evening's work.

Historical Footnote by Roger Bingham

AUTUMNAL TROUBLES in 1829

'Alarming and Destructive riots in Manchester', 'an increase of drunkenness among the lower orders', fierce religious disputes, youth crime, pay cuts, fatal accidents and miserable Autumn weather characterised by 'dull clouds with cold north winds' were just some of the troubles reported by the Westmorland Gazette in 1829. There was, however, a good Onion Show and over 40 cart loads turned up at Kendal Market where the onions were sold at 1s to 1s 6d a stone.

Nationally, the biggest issue was the passing of the Catholic Emancipation Act which gave the vote to Roman Catholics. 'No Popery' riots took place in London and other cities, and in South Westmorland a Protestant Defence League was formed. In Burton the Church of England still held sway, despite a regularly printed advert asking for 'the creditors of the late Rev Henry Sill to meet at the house of Mrs Agnes Burrow, The Royal Oak, Burton in Kendal'.

Fears of a crime wave led Sir Robert Peel to start the Metropolitan Police, while Edinburgh saw the execution of the murderers Burke and Hare. Locally, the magistrates imposed a year's imprisonment respectively on Mary Cook of Carnforth for 'being a lewd woman', on 12 year-old Mary Hall for stealing a pair of a shoes, and on Elizabeth Smith for 'passing off false money'. Elizabeth was allowed to take her baby to gaol but her other children 'would be cared for' - in



the Workhouse. Inconsistently, Richard Mackereth, also got twelve months, in what was described as 'his old home at the House of Correction' (Kendal) for swindling £27. This sum compares with paycuts for farm servants at the Michaelmas Hiring Fairs held where, for six month's work, 'Good Men' got £5 to £7, Women £2:10s to £3, 'strong lads at less than a shilling a week' and 'young girls for anything'.

Burton's most sensational news was reported in the Lancaster Gazette on the 19 August: 'the dwellinghouse of Mr Page, of Clathrop (sic), was broken into by three men, who knocked Mr Page down and forced him to be quiet; fastened the housekeeper and a girl in their bedroom and then ransacked the house. They stayed three hours and then took their departure. They had blackened faces and took his sovereigns and silver ware'. Apparently they were never caught. 'Yeoman' John Page lived at Pear Tree Cottage, Clawthorpe, which is now called Sunny Glen.

The ultimate fate was described in detail of a Burton labourer, John Linsey, who 'came to his death whilst attending to his usual avocation at Holme Park Quarry. He was undermining a huge piece of rock when a considerable portion of it fell upon his head and so much crushed it as nearly to sever it from his body. The poor man, no doubt seeing his danger, was heard to exclaim as the stone was falling, "Oh! Dear me". 16 persons were on hand but were insufficient to raise the stone by the smallest degree; so as to admit the poor man's head being moved from the ponderous load so that the only recourse was to break the stone, which was done as quickly as possible. The stone when in one piece was 8 feet long, by 8 feet broad, and upwards



of four feet thick and would weigh nearly 10 tons. The unfortunate man has left a widow and three children to lament his loss, and who are totally unprovided for; likewise four children by a former wife. An inquest was held before Robinson Cartmel, Esq., Coroner, and a verdict of Accidental Death returned'.

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The Vicar Writes...

"I'm here!"

When my sons were very young and wanted me to play, I often suggested a game of hide and seek. I'd explain the rules and send them off to hide while I counted. However, they didn't quite get the object of the game. No sooner had I stopped counting and embarked on my search than out they'd pop and say "We're here!" For them the joy of the game was to be found.

It's a bit like that with God and humans. The common assumption is that God is hiding from us and doesn't want to be found – an assumption commonly expressed in statement like this: "If only God would come and show himself to me, then I'd believe in him."

But the Bible says the opposite is true. God isn't hiding and he delights to be found. He is pleased to make Himself known to us. He has spoken loud and clear in Jesus Christ. Look at these words from the Bible:

"God has spoken to us by his Son....The Son is the radiance of God's glory and the exact representation of his being." (Hebrews 1:2-3)

The glory of God is the "godness" of God. It's what God is. Jesus, the Son, is the radiance of that glory. He shares the very essence of God the Father and makes Him fully known to us.

The problem between humanity and God isn't a lack of communication or bad communication on God's part. His communication is excellent. In fact, it couldn't be better. God could not have made Himself any clearer than he already has in Jesus – just read the Gospel accounts of Jesus' life and see for yourself. God has gone to extraordinary lengths to show himself and speak to us. So the problem isn't with God. The problem is with us and our refusal to listen to Him.

In the person of Jesus Christ God has effectively come into the world and said: "I'm here!"

So, according to the Bible, if our question is "Why doesn't God show Himself?" we're asking the wrong question. In the light of Jesus' coming, we ought rather to be asking ourselves, "Will I listen to him?"

Shenzhen 2011

Water polo player Alex Rutlidge who is from Burton has returned from Shenzhen, China after competing in the World Student Games. Great Britain had hoped to secure a top four finish but in the end had to settle for 7th place following a couple of disappointing results.

Following a long flight from London to Hong Kong and

a short trip to Shenzhen, Great Britain settled in to the competitor's village sharing a block with Canadians. New Zealanders and Americans. As they acclimatised to the heat and humidity a couple warm of up

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encounter which saw the three other team mates join Alex sitting out the end of the match.

This left GB with an important game against Italy who had beaten Canada and lost to China. Victory would have meant second position in their group and an easier quarter final game. Again GB started very strongly and won the first quarter by 5 goals to 2 but were unable to maintain this momentum and the Italians gradually got back in to the match. However GB wrestled the initiative back as half time approached and held a 7-6 lead at the midway break. Italy were



In their second group match GB played hosts, China, in front of thousands of partisan spectators. The Chinese team had recently finished second in the main world championships and were firm favourites to win this event. Again GB started well and at the end of the first period were winning 3- 2. However, playing this match at centre back instead of her usual position on the wing Alex was missed for most of it after receiving three exclusions in the opening quarter marking a massive Chinese centre forward. China put away three not to be deterred and soon converted an extra player chance. At the other end GB had a lot of chances, but the luck wasn't with them as a number of shots rebounded off the posts - including efforts from Alex. So, at the start of the final quarter GB led by 8 goals to 7 but Italy finished very strongly and eventually won by 10 goals to 9. This result meant that GB would play the USA in their quarter final.

The game against the American followed a similar pattern to earlier GB's other games - a very bright start which was not maintained. In the first guarter Alex was among the scorers with a long range shot as a 4-2 lead was established. However, the powerful Americans fought back in the second quarter, upping the pace and pulling level. Yet after defending three man downs towards the end of the guarter, the British defence held on to stay 4-4 at the half way point. The British started the third quarter positively converting a man-up but could not prevent the Americans building a two-goal lead at 8-6. There was no way back in the final guarter as the American added another three goals and held on to win 11-8. While a top-four place was now out of sight, GB could still achieve fifth place overall, needing a win against Australia in their next game.

The game against Australia proved to be the most disappointing of the tournament. The combination of the heat and humidity, added to a number of draining matches, saw a lack lustre performance and the British women were out fought in another physical encounter. This time, however, GB were never in front and eventually lost by 11 goals to six - with Alex again being

With 5th postion unobtainable GB had to play off against France and Mexico for 7th place. Still showing signs of fatigue GB struggled at first against France but in the end ran out comfortable winners by 8 goals to 4. This result meant that the final game versus Mexico would determine if GB finished in 7th or 8th place.

Now that GB had gained some confidence back with victory over France, the game against Mexico was a very one-sided affair - despite Alex yet again being on the receiving end of harsh referee's decisions. GB soon took control as the game became the most one-sided in the whole competition. The final score was 15-3 to Great Britain and 7th place was confirmed.

The competition was won as expected by China who beat the USA in the final and the bronze medal went to Russia.

Alex's next international matches in September include a European Championship qualifier against Ukraine and a tournament featuring Canada, Germany and China.

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Good News – Banking at the Post Office

We are a little bit closer to all customers being able to access their current accounts at the Post Office. By the time you read this, customers of the Nat West, RBS and Ulster banks should be able to withdraw their hardearned cash at the Post Office counter without charge.

An Early Note about Christmas Posting - Sending Parcels Abroad this Year ?

I can't believe that it's that time of year already. Once again I hesitate to mention the word Christmas, since many of you have only just recovered from the shock of a new term at school. However, if you are planning on sending presents abroad, you might find the following information helpful.

For parcels sent by Airmail there is no rush, you probably have until the last week in November for the furthest destinations. However, if you are planning on sending parcels via the slower option of Surface Mail the last posting dates are fast approaching.

As the Burton News goes to press, the dates have not yet been published for 2011, but, based on last year's, they are likely to be:

• End of September – All non-European destinations except those mentioned below.



• First week in October – Middle East and Far East (except Hong Kong & Singapore)

• Middle of October – South Africa, Hong Kong, Singapore, the USA & Canada

• First week in November – Eastern Europe, Greece, Cyprus, Turkey, Malta & Iceland

• Last week or so in November - Western Europe

Remember that parcels sent outside the E.U. need to have a customs form attached, these are available at the Post Office Counter. Also remember to put your name and address to the top left hand corner of your package; this will enable Royal Mail to return your package should overseas customs authorities refuse it entry into their country.

A reminder about size and weight for parcels sent abroad...

Before you go out and buy a full-sized scooter for your grandson in Canada, may I remind you of the maximum sizes for sending items abroad with Royal Mail.

The maximum total of length + width + height is 90cm (approx 3ft) with the maximum single dimension of 60cm (approx 2 ft). Also, the maximum weight is 2kg.

It is really easy to exceed these and then the parcel would cost a great deal more to send via Parcel Force. It is often cheaper to split a heavy parcel and send two packets.




