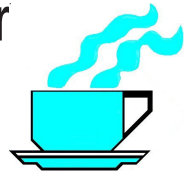

The latter view would point to somebody who provides spiritual leadership to the whole community, including those of all faiths and none, in a broad church.

Butcher's to Reopen

After a six-month closure, we're delighted to be able to report that the village butcher's shop will be reopening on Monday 1 October.

The shop will be operated by the Brown family of Deep Clough at Littledale, where Nathan and Carole farm using traditional methods raising British cattle breeds and native pigs, Dalesbred and Swaledale sheep.

The butcher will be John Unsworth who, they tell us, is a local lad, and the meat offered will include heather-fed lamb and mutton, Galloway beef, Rose veal, local game and free-range chickens. The shop will carry a range of home-made sausages, dry-cured bacon and gammon, and be supplemented with a range of local cheeses.

Nathan and Carole have been farming at Deep Clough since 2004, but prior to that Nathan has worked with sheep throughout the UK and even as far away as New Zealand, learning his trade as a shearer and a shepherd before farming on his own account.

Nathan and Carole supply both the retail and catering trade, and already operate one shop at Bentham, and are looking forward to their new venture here in Burton. They are determined to provide a quality butchery service from the shop, and will be open Monday to Friday from 8am until 5pm, and from 8am until 1pm on Saturdays.

Outdoors

Long, long ago - on August 27 to be precise - we went to the Grasmere show. It turned out to be the perfect way to celebrate the long slither into autumn which began, as we all know, sometime in early June. 'Everybody' was going there, or at least as far as Ambleside. We drove in first gear for about seven miles, enjoying close-ups of gardens and shops that you normally whizz past. By Rydal traffic had become normal for a summer Sunday (perhaps because the posses of Oriental tourists had stopped in Ambleside.) At the edge of Grasmere we parked in a grass field, close to a monumental sycamore which would help us find the car again amongst a thousand others.

High above, from beyond the 1000-foot summit of Grey Crag, a parachutist was spiralling silently downwards. Smiling police-persons and Rotary Club members with giant yellow plastic hands were directing cars and people. Two P.A. systems were competing in mid-air: one of them quite hysterical as he commentated on a race we couldn't even see, the other one homely and unruffled as he pleaded with people from the sponsors to come forward and hand out various prizes.

Something had just happened and something else was about to happen - it was quite hard keeping track. In the nearer of two arenas, a gaunt, swarthy, youngish man in a blue kilt was warming up for the wrestling - flexing his arms, throwing out his chest, doing push-ups in front of the competitors' tent. The other wrestlers were standing about on the grass in their long-johns

and black socks. Dozens of dogs were mingling with us humans - a young Great Dane the size of a small pony, spaniels and collies and yellow labradors and our lurcher Klipper, perfectly unbothered down there amongst hundreds of trampling trainers and green Wellies, and quietly pleased with the caresses of an 8-year-old who couldn't keep his hands off her.

Runners toiled up the steep slope above Dove Cottage and came headlong back down a hairpin track. Children skedaddled down the purple slide of a bouncy castle. More parachutists spiralled and landed beyond a line of trees - tantalising, because I like to see their controlled stagger as they alight. The Cumberland wrestling hotted up, moving through the teenage heats to the young men's. 'Wrestle!' shouted the judge, after adjusting the opposing heads and interlocking hands of each couple, and the couple shook and swayed and whirled and strained, and heel-hooked the opponent's legs, until one or the other was thrown onto his or her back and the opponent's arm was raised in victory.

A boy walked past holding a white balloon with a neck three feet high and a smiley face. The couple in front of us opened a huge umbrella as the rain came on - and kept it up even after the sun had burned clear of the teeming clouds again. We munched at buns six inches across filled with roast pork, apple sauce, and sage-and-onion stuffing - it would have kept me going for at least two days and I put half of it into my pocket to give to Klipper afterwards. The kilted wrestler, from Dundee, lost his bout by two falls to one and spent the next hour sitting on the grass with an air of darkest tragedy. Children ran round and round the marked track in the other arena while the commentator told us it

was "a great race - it's going to be a real thriller!" A military-sounding drum was beaten - then no music for half an hour, apparently - then, as the sun was dimmed again, we saw that an entire band, its brass instruments and red uniforms like the army before camouflage was invented, had been playing away unheard, their sound lost in the great green hollow of the fells.

Now it began to pour. Time for the refreshment tent, and tea and delicious chocolate cakes, among about three hundred women and men and dogs and children, all crammed like sheep in a cattle-float, with never a word or a gesture of annoyance, while the rain teemed, and drips ran down in silvery rods from the eaves of the marquee, and the grass beneath our feet turned brown and liquid. There could have been no better way to spend a summer afternoon in Cumbria.

Commenting on the goings-on at the
Parish Council meetings

WHAT GOES AROUND COMES AROUND

Rather an enigmatic saying that A.O. never really understood. Possibly you get your just deserts if you lend someone something. But in this case it seemed a fitting heading to report about the roundabout in the village playground, because it just keeps coming round and round. A.O. has been reporting on the fate of this great survivor for years and years, or so it seems.

The Parish Council has the opportunity of a grant of £2,000 from CCC towards playground equipment. Two PCllrs reported that they have concluded the best way to spend this grant is to refurbish the 34 year-old roundabout at a cost of around £3,000 rather than fritter the grant on less attractive and more expensive new equipment. All have a soft spot for the old but still popular roundabout. The cost of bringing it up to standard would be around £3,000 according to an estimate received. PCllrs agreed that the PC should make up the shortfall if necessary up to £3,000. What you lose on the swings you gain on... sorry, couldn't resist it.

This meeting was notable for the exemplary behaviour of the PCllrs. Even the most gentle voices were clear and audible, with few hands held before faces. So A.O. has no excuse for misquoting anyone.

Police Report

Our C.P.S.O. was there in person. She reported there had been no significant crime here this month, though she had been called on her way to the meeting to an R.T.A. just north of the village, involving a 70 year-old woman.

Earlier in the week traffic had been diverted along Main Street due to an accident on the M6, C.P.S.O. Jessica also reported. She then departed, to concern herself, no doubt, with less comfortable business than the calm of a Parish Council meeting. She was followed from the room by the hasty exit of a PCllr who returned just as hastily, reassured it wasn't her mum involved in the most recent accident.

Daffodils

A PCllr reported progress on this project. The bulbs are bred in Wales, though they are of the Lake District type. The suggestion is that they should be planted in groups at the bottom (does that mean the top??) of Tarn Lane and along the verges leading south from the village towards Lancaster. Care will be taken to leave sufficient leeway for pedestrians to walk on the grass verge when necessary.

But here A.O. foresees a problem. The verges have been maintained in excellent care recently, both N. and S. of the village. This means they have to be cut regularly. When the daffodil flowers die at the end of spring, it is essential for their survival the following year that the foliage isn't cut for (according to A.O.'s trusty gardening book) at least six weeks, when the leaves have died down. By which time the grass has grown considerably, in A.O.'s exasperated experience in her

own garden. Not only that, but it has to be remembered that these beautiful little codgers have a mind of their own, and will be likely to spread if, by luck they become established. Walkers may remember the single brave wild daffodil that established itself along the grove leading to Holme Park Quarry from Clawthorpe Lane. For many years we sought it out, till its blooms increased to as many as seven, and the shoots of two more bulbs appeared. Was a colony about to be established? We wondered. Then one year all the flowers were either eaten or broken off, and from then onward the little group began to decline, and sadly has gone. But it would be a ruthless lengthsman who dragooned the delicate blooms back into place if they dared to begin a surge forward onto the safe haven of the tended verge. It is their nature to spread, which is part of their charm. Hosts of golden daffodils and all that, (though to A.O.'s way of thinking "gold" is a misnomer. Their colours are far more subtle than that.)

Second Homes

All agreed to the S.L.D.C. suggestion that the Council Tax Reduction Scheme should be off set by discontinuing the 10% council discount on second homes. They also agreed with the Govt proposal that P.C. precepts should be protected from increase to cover these reductions.

Winter

Burton P.C. efforts over winter highway precautions can hardly be faulted. It is no surprise that PCllrs turned down an S.L.D.C. suggestion that they should come under a scheme to undertake voluntary winter arrangements. They have done that already, to their credit. And the problem of the disappearing salt from

salt bins would not, they agreed, be solved by padlocking the bins. They agreed to suggest that a notice should be attached to each bin in an attempt to deter residents from helping themselves to the salt/grit for their own use.

Poppies

It was agreed that a donation of £50 be made towards a wreath etc for Armistice Sunday.

Draft Parish Council Budget 2013/14

It seems the P.C. is underspent this year, due in part to grants for the Jubilee and so on. The Clerk suggested a decrease of 9% in next year's precept. But after discussion PCllrs agreed to reduce it to 5%, to cover unexpected demands, in particular to cover the cost of the lengthsman if the present funding is reduced. This will be finalised at next month's meeting.

Wind-loading

A phrase new to most of us. It appears the erection of the 20 m.p.h. signs at the school has been delayed because one of them blew down somewhere near Barrow, so they have to be re-thought. Possibly dig a deeper hole?

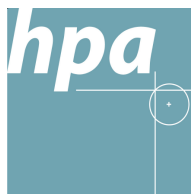
The Royal Oak

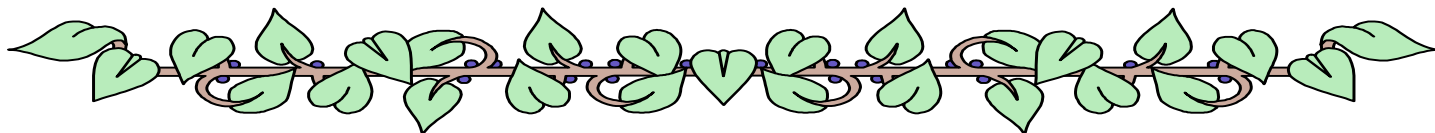
the royal one at a discreet distance. Anyway, growing though it is, it was agreed that it is still too small to fend for itself, so it will continue to be tenderly cared for.

Following the uncertainty surrounding selection it came as a relief to finally travel to the games. Our daily routine involved joining the Central Line at Epping (fortunately the starting point so we could grab a seat) and travelling into Stratford to join what seemed like millions of people going to the vast Westfield Shopping Centre or into the Olympic Park.



On Monday 30 July we watched Great Britain's opening game versus Russia who were ranked 3rd in the world. Before the game we were interviewed 'live' in the venue and asked about Alex and Team GB's chances etc. It was quite a surprise. The game itself could have gone either way, and only a late goal by the Russians, after a GB player failed to hear the referee's whistle due to crowd noise, secured their 7 goal to 6 victory. It was a promising performance if not the correct result.



The second match saw a bit of a grudge match against a physically daunting Australian team, and comments in the press about Alex's broken rib and the Aussies being a 'dirty' team raised tensions a notch or too. In the end GB produced by far their most-disappointing display – failing to make an impact against their bigger opponents and the letting the score slip in the second half. The final defeat by 16 goals to 3 allowed the Aussies to gloat a bit which Alex certainly responded to.

GB's games took place every other day and so we made the most of hospitality available in the free time. This included refreshments at British Swimming's base in the Holiday Inn and Team GB's magnificent headquarters overlooking the Olympic Park. The 9th floor views were stunning, which complimented the continuous supply of food, drink and sundry 'freebies' provided by Proctor and Gamble.

Alex's third game was against the current European champions, Italy, and she had the unenviable task of marking their inappropriately named centre-forward, called Casanova, who weighs in at 100kg - Alex is a lean

and mean 62 kg! Yet she fought hard and played very well, even managing to score a smashing Olympic goal to equalise the scores at 2 – 2. It made the whole trip worthwhile but in the end the canny Italians won by 10 goals to five.

The defeat to the Italians, though disappointing, was not the end of the world and meant that GB would meet Spain in the quarter final. The Spanish were world-ranked one in the world and like GB a relatively small team. The game seemed to be following a pattern, like those before where GB had lots of possession but struggled to score. However, down by 4 goals in the second half, a stirring fight-back brought the scores back to 8-7 late in the game – including a crucially missed penalty. It was not to be when the goal judge ruled that a Spanish shot had bobbled agonisingly over the line with 27 seconds left. The 9-7

defeat was devastating for the team and ended any chance of a medal.

The structure of the competition meant that GB had to compete against China, Italy and Russia for places 5-8. A similar game to the earlier tie against Russia saw a 9-7 defeat - the Russians capitalising on a couple of moments of good fortune which swung the result in their favour. Finally after 11 days of competition GB took on Italy for 7th place. Again Alex played a prominent role and scored a second goal but GB rued a bad run in the 2nd and 3rd periods and lost 10-7.

We had a fantastic time even taking into account the results, vast crowds of people in the Olympic Park and Tube.

Historical Footnote by Roger Bingham

UNCERTAIN AGRICULTURE

In 1611 John Speed asserted that Westmorland could "not be commended either for plenty of corn or cattle being neither stored with arable ground to bring forth the one, nor pasturage to bring forth the other." Similarly Daniel Defoe wrote in c. 1690 that the County was "eminent only for being the wildest and most barren and frightful of any I have passed through." Even so he conceded that Lower Kentdale was "a pleasant fruitful land." Somewhat later, Celia Fiennes, after grumbling that the road from Leighton Hall was "over steepe hills all like rocks stony and steepe far worse than the Peake in Derbyshire" noted that as she approached the Burton area there were "inclosed lands; here you have very rich good land, little green hills flourishing with corn and grass green and fresh; there is not much woods but only the hedge rows round the grounds which look very fine."

Similarly, In c. 1694 The Rev Thomas Machell observed that the parish's land was comparatively more fertile than neighbouring areas as "the soil is blackish clay and blackish sand, but most part Limestone, and affords woodland, arable pasture and meadow - neither very fertile nor very barren. Their fuel is peat which is fetched from a place called Burton Moss about a mile from the Church." In 1777 Nicolson and Burn, although they observed that Burton was "tolerably well built", commented that there was not enough oats grown locally to feed the population which had led to a large

market for imported grain being established in the township. Even so improvements were on hand as "the inhabitants are at present draining the mosses, having expended some hundreds of pounds therein. The main drain is two and three miles long. At the bottom of the peat moss is a bed of whitish earth where abounds innumerable small shells of the snail and periwinkle kind such as appear in limestone or marble. There are also trunks of large trees, both of fir and oak."

By 1819 agriculture was booming when Adam Walker reported that "round Milnthorpe, Burton, Farleton and Kirkby Lonsdale it is not rare to see a few acres of wheat and the valleys consist principally of grass farms which is a wise conformity to the climate as crops of corn must be very uncertain where so much rain falls and where winter sets in so early."

Roger Reports...

from the district & county councils

The major issue at the September county council was the prospect of a nuclear waste dump at Sellafield on Cumbria's west coast. The supporters contended that 15,000 jobs depended on the facility which already produces three quarters of the U.K.'s waste material. If not stored locally it would have to be transported outside the region - possibly along the M6.

Having once obtained an A-level in Geology, I argued that the complex strata is too uncertain in which to create an underground store the size of a mountain. Moreover, the "real experts" disagree over whether hard igneous rocks like the granite near Sellafield or softer sedimentary material like the Solway silts, or even London clay, might be suitable.

Other opponents were concerned about the impossibility of retrieving the material which might not decay for 100,000 years! The final decision to go ahead with further tests will be made by the county's Cabinet in October. Even then all the stages before this nuclear facility is operational will take 25 years.

On a local issue, I opened the debate on the threatened

closure of the Vascular Service at Lancaster Royal Infirmary, which would mean patients, including those from as far away as Barrow, having to go to Blackburn or Carlisle. I contended that the Sparsity and Rurality factors which enable us to have three major hospitals to serve a population which in a city would require only one should apply to subsidiary facilities. But, please, what do you think?

Meanwhile the county is grappling with the 2013-14 Budget which, to stay steady, requires savings of £13m, and if we are to avoid putting up the Council Tax for first time in three years would mean cuts of £16m.

Good news includes the creation of 146 County Apprenticeships, and that Queen Elizabeth School, whose exam results are again excellent, is now one the country's sixty training schools. Also our schools will have to expand to cater for the raising of the School Leaving Age to 17 by next year and to 18 by 2015.

On S.L.D.C. many people have complained about being required to type in your vehicle number on the new car parking machines. I am enquiring who decided to spend the reported £340,000 on this latest efficiency measure.

Meanwhile after a site visit I have agreed to a new sign for Station Lane, which will be on the road and not round the corner on Neddy Hill.

Christmas Posting Dates

So, once again, many of you have only just got the kids settled in to their new classes at school and here I am talking about Christmas, but the last posting dates for sending Surface Mail are unseasonably early. In fact by the time you read this you will almost certainly have missed at least one.

For parcels sent by Airmail there is no rush, you have until the beginning of December for the furthest destinations. However, if you are planning on sending parcels via the slower option of Surface Mail the recommended last posting dates are:

Tuesday 2 October

Middle East & Far East (except Hong Kong & Singapore)

Tuesday 16 October

South Africa, Hong Kong, Singapore, the USA & Canada

Tuesday 6 November

Eastern Europe, Greece, Cyprus, Turkey, Malta & Iceland

Tuesday 20 November

Western Europe

Remember that parcels sent outside the E.U. need to have a customs form attached, these are available at the Post Office Counter. Also remember to put your name and address on the top left hand corner of your package; this will enable Royal Mail to return your package should overseas customs authorities refuse it entry into their country.

Dimensions and Weight

A reminder about size and weight for parcels sent abroad

Before you go out and buy that fantastic doll's house for your granddaughter in Australia, may I remind you of the maximum sizes for sending items abroad with Royal Mail.

The maximum total of (length + width + height) is 90 cm (approx 3ft) with the maximum single dimension of 60cm (approx 2 ft). Also, the maximum weight is 2 kg.

It is really easy to exceed these and then the parcel would cost a great deal more to send via Parcel Force. It is sometimes cheaper to split a heavy parcel and send two packets.

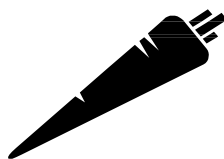
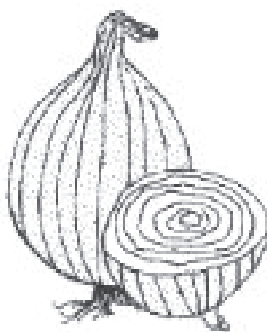

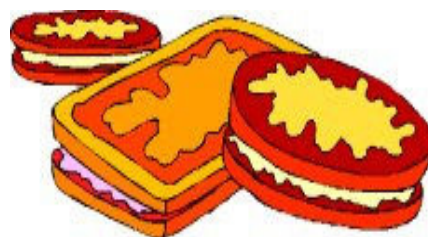

The first observation is how much drier the summer was in 2005 and 2006, in those years we were having higher rainfall during the winter months, and hotter, drier summers.

Since then we have seen much higher rainfall in the summer months following a drier spring.

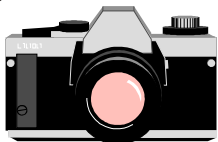

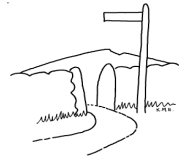

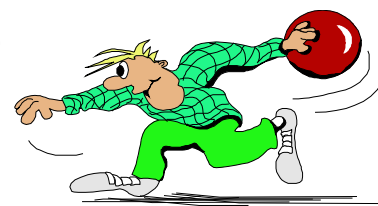
