

Dear Editor,

Re: Village People, Oct 2013

Charis Twist's article in the October issue was most interesting; for those of us who do not have children at Morewood School, it is always good to read about how the school works and to have the views of the Headteacher on the School's policies. It is after all our village school. I did however want to raise a couple of points about the article.

The Head tells us that "the power to change teachers' pay and conditions ... is not going to be used here." That may well be the position of the current School Board and Head. However, headteachers move on or retire and board membership changes over time. There is therefore no guarantee that a very different view may not hold in the future.

More worryingly, the Head tells us that the "fun, exercise and activities" found in the school are "not normally found in a state school agenda." This is wholly untrue and is a slur on state schools. I have been involved in primary schools for over fifty years as a parent, governor and lecturer at a college of

than the fact that every penny raised is donated to charity and other local causes.

Rumours of monster onions and vegetables did not disappoint! Local expert onion grower, Carl Jackson won the heaviest onion class with a giant of 11lb! He also went on to clean up in the dressed onions and onion set classes.

Other notable specimens were in the heaviest vegetable class which saw several vegetables weighing in at over 40lb, with the class being won by Callum Graham with a 74lb marrow.

The event encourages entrants from all age groups, and the children's classes saw some beautifully creative entries from the younger competitors. The best children's exhibit was won by Laura





Wilson with her miniature garden. Local youngster Lauren Nelson continues to impress, collecting many prize envelopes and a trophy as a result of her efforts!

The baking classes saw some simply stunning cakes, biscuits and breads on display. The novelty cakes are real works of art, the end product of days of preparation. Local husband and wife


team Steve and Rachel Mealor collected four firsts in the baking classes for their apple pie, cupcakes, novelty and chocolate cakes.

This year's judges were Mike and Barbara Earl who deliberated for over an hour before making their decisions.

PC Observations...

Reporting from the Parish Council meeting

Call me old-fashioned, but when I go to a meeting I like to see progress on the action points from the previous meeting clearly on the agenda. I scanned November's agenda, but there was no sian of the October actions to investigate school parking, to check on Electricity NorthWest's confusion about lighting in Tanpits Lane and to push on with Slape Lane improvement. However these items did emerge eventually in the "Outstanding Actions Report." Read on - all will be revealed.

First of all, County Councillor Roger Bingham appeared for 10 minutes – he was apparently trying to cover two or three parish council meetings on the same night. He rattled off a number of budgetary pressures. Essential services caring for "looked-after such as children" and "winter road gritting" will continue but the library van will not call from 2014 onwards. He came, he spread rather depressing news and then he was gone.

The Chairman sped through the agenda, approving accounts, agreeing to pay for a Remembrance Day wreath, accepting or not planning applications and signing cheques. Then the new Parish Clerk was introduced. She is

Jane Johnson from Boon Town. Her background as a Development Officer for the Council of Voluntary Service (CVS) should be useful. Departing Clerk Peter Smith offered to work with Jane to ensure a smooth changeover.

Other items of note were an offer of money from SLDC to carry out a feasibility study for a footway to Clawthorpe not necessarily along the A6070, and to accept the offer of SLDC-led planning workshops (although no one was entirely sure why.) At this point the Chairman was looking very pleased because in 30 minutes, with little discussion, the agenda was 75% done. However, a 5minute debate about whether to fork out nearly £500 for a "historic County of Westmorland" sign ensued. Crazy idea I thought and so did some councillors as they stalled on it asking for another quote. Then the school parking issue again. raised its head Whose responsibility was it? The Chairman went red faced as he said it was the school's responsibility. They were a business now and a pub or a butcher causing such traffic disruption would be reprimanded. The ideas to alleviate the problem - cones, white lines, parking at the pub etc. - have not been accepted. The police have asked the school to send out letters to parents and stickers might be put on windscreens. But the problem remains. It looks like one of those things that will linger on the list of

Burton Morewood School

There has been much interest and speculation as to what has been going on under the huge false roof that has covered the school for many months now and all will be revealed very shortly. Much to everyone's relief the building work is due to be completed by the end of half term, then the scaffolding, temporary site buildings and many trade vehicles will all go away. The little ones will have their play area back, the teachers their car park, and parents, residents and other road users will find it easier to safely negotiate the area surrounding the school.

This enormous amount of work has been possible as a result of the efforts of Sue Woodburn in gaining two grants totalling over half a million pounds for works to bring the academy up to date, and she is pleased that most of the contractors for both phases have come from in and around the village.

The first bid was for the extension to the junior school and replaced the flat roof, extended the Year 3 classroom and provided an upstairs area for the staff. This has been split into a staff room, a room where teachers can prepare their lessons and do paperwork - a recent innovation for junior school



staff previously only available at secondary level - and a lecture room for use in the training of the new teachers mentioned in the October issue.

The second bid was for the infants school new roof, Reception classroom, music room, quiet room and Year 1 classroom. The number of classes having reached the maximum, Sue feels that is also true of the building and no further major extension work will be undertaken.

The present work led to the loss of a small part of the rear patio but none of the playing field or pond that Sue is so proud of, keen as she is that the children are out in the fresh air as much as possible. Her husband and two sons all hold degrees in sport and declares that she would not dare to lose this precious outside space even if she was inclined to, which she is not. The lovely new Reception classroom has a double door leading to a secure garden which will stand open as much as possible to encourage the children to move in and out as they wish.

For those of you who would like to see for yourselves just what has been achieved please see the notice announcing the Grand Opening at 7.00pm on Thursday 7 November.

Historical Footnote by Roger Bingham

The Great War in the colonies - A Burton man in Rhodesia

For the next four the years commemoration of the 1914-18 War is bound to focus on the Western Front. where most of the British Empire's gargantuan efforts were concentrated. Evidence that the Great War really was a World War is shown by a letter from a Burton lad, F Bainbridge, who prior to hostilities may have got no further away than Morecambe. By 1917 he found himself fighting the Germans on the frontier between British Rhodesia (Zimbabwe) and German East Africa (Tanganyika).

He wrote: We've been giving the Germans a hot time miles away from civilization. We spent a lovely Christmas night, wet through for ten days but we got a tin of bully beef and 1lb of flour for Christmas day. When I get back to garrison I'm going to settle down to some nice meat and sweet potatoes. I've two chums, Sam Lafford from Kendal, an elephant hunter formerly a Blacksmith, and Jack Burtholme who spent many a day in Burton. I met them out scouting when I heard, "Hello lad when's ta gae yam at Martinmass."



We trek 15 miles at night with 500 natives carrying our stuff. When the Germans attack they first send in their un-trained natives kicking up a devil of a row and blazing away. They always fire high so there's no need to fear. Then comes trained natives under European cover fire - but the Germans never come near. They always retire when a few hundred of their natives have been blotted out: so why bother? It's great fun this guerrilla warfare. The German n*****s can't stand European fire and just bunk off. Our native carriers have a nasty way of bunking away into the bush as soon as shots are fired and the bullets are pingpongin.

Sam Lafford bagged an eland - an animal bigger than an ox, very good eating. The border is a big place to patrol but they are getting a few thousand more troops from the Union of South Africa. The Germans come over the border, raise the natives' kraals and go off with the natives' food. These critical times make me think of home and I would dearly love to come to dear old Burton. If the comforts people send me anything tell them to send a pipe and some English tobacco (that will be a change from the Boer stuff we smoke now) and as many fags as they like but for heaven's sake pack them well: they get dropped in rivers and are carried on a n*****s head for 500 miles.

Roger Reports...

from the District & County Councils

Councils, like schools, are subjected to OFSTED inspections. Unlike some authorities, which have been put into special measures, Cumbria County Council has received a reasonable report. Inspectors were satisfied with the county's financial management as "the net budget for £346m was within 3% of that figure, with a £930,000 underspend." The council has also made "significant improvements in its financial reporting" and has "robust financial systems." The major criticism that "children services was were inadequate", which will be given top priority, quite apart from the vital emphasis in safeguarding vulnerable families.

One of our hidden services -Trading Standards has been particularly successful. They have visited gyms throughout the county highlighting the dangers of a Burns Fat Body Building Supplement called 2,4 dinitrophenol (DNP). Trading Standards have also praised for helping been the in successful prosecution of a dealer, who had illegally entered for sale sheep purchased in Lancashire for another auction in Cumbria the next day. In another inspection four traders in the Grange - Ulverston area were found to have sold alcohol to a fifteen year old volunteer. Anyone who sells alcohol to



underage persons is liable for a £90 fine.

At SLDC the main debate concerned a new by-law to deal with "defecating and urinating in public" which, disgustingly, is now a growing problem in some tourist areas and near night-time venues. In the debate I wondered whether the closure of so many public conveniences might have increased the problem which, I thought, was covered by the historic law of "committing a nuisance." I was not satisfied that in Kendal there are now 50 toilets available for the general public in shops, the Town Hall etc., and that I could get a list of them at the Tourist Information Bureau. I thought that this would not be much help if you were caught short after day-time opening hours. But what do you think?

Better news for youth is that apprenticeship grants to induce local employers to recruit 16-19 year olds have been increased by £15,000. The fund has so far helped create 23 apprenticeships for young people over the past two years, in roles ranging web programming from and engineering to joinery and horticulture.

communities - without streets - can be helped. Actions include a Warm Up scheme for home insulation.


Regarding highways, repairs at Junction 36 with the A 6070 are starting are being implemented to which I say, "and about time too!"

With winter in mind we have been told that "Cumbria is all geared up to keep road users on the move." Last year, gritters operated 108 on days compared to an average, over the last ten years, of 82 days. The Council pretreats 2,400km of highways, a third of which (884km) are in South Lakeland. This year £4,392 has been allocated to winter maintenance and, despite the warm autumn, a 35-strong fleet of gritters equipped with state-of-the-art technology is ready to take to the roads as the temperatures dip. We'll see!

Finally I am still pressing that the antiflood measures at Neddy Hill, Tanpits and elsewhere will be completed soon.

It is hoped that councils will acquire speed guns, either for themselves or in conjunction with other members of the LAPs or Neighbourhood Forums, which will be used by members of the local community to monitor speed at the appropriate locations. These volunteers will receive training in the use of this speed monitoring equipment. The Constabulary have already appointed five Police Support Volunteers throughout Cumbria. This will include receiving all the details of offending vehicles, completing PNC checks and sending the warning letters to the registered keepers.
