PC Observations...

Reporting from the Parish Council meeting

These two meetings (18 December 18 and 15 January 15) both had lack-lustre Agendas but both turned out to have interesting discussions regarding planned developments in the village.

At the December meeting, Councillor Jane Hopwood made the important point that without a Neighbourhood Plan for the village, Burton is at risk of developers getting permission to put up unsuitable housing developments. Jane has mentioned this several times during the past year and this column has also tried to raise interest in a village-led plan to influence the kind of houses (but not the number, and up to 140 new houses are planned for Burton) which could be built and the infrastructure to support housing development. It came up again at December's meeting when a member of the public, resident in Church Bank Gardens. expressed concern about the number of houses planned for Church Bank and the safe access to these houses from the A6070. Councillors preferred a 'wait and see' strategy, saying that there was little that they could do until detailed plans were available, but the possibility of a mini-roundabout on the A6070 could be interesting if it helped to slow down traffic on this stretch of road

whilst at the same time providing a safe access to a planned new housing development there.

At the January meeting, this issue came up again and Councillor John Brown reported that he had met with a number of local residents who were feeling let down by the Parish Council's lack of response to the proposed development. The developer is also looking for a response to the scheme and had sent in an email to this effect. Jane Hopwood asked for a more proactive response from the Council. observed She that even though detailed plans were not available, it was not in the spirit of the Localism Act (2011) to withhold a response. This Act encourages local communities to take responsibility for local development. She recommended earlier engagement which might help to get a better outcome in terms of traffic flow, village amenities and adoption of the road leading to the housing development, which is 'going to happen anyway.' After a discussion, Councillors agreed to respond to the developer's e-mail, suggesting a face-to-face meeting with residents and Councillors to people a chance to find out more about the development plans.

Other planning issues included:

At the December meeting Councillors noted that a planning application for housing development of 5 dwellings at



the Royal Hotel with a further 10 to the rear of the hotel was approved by the District Planning Authority, but it is not clear how imminent this development is.

At the January meeting, prompted by an impassioned plea for action by two concerned residents, Councillors debated an application for adaptations and an extension to The Tannery in Tanpits Lane. This was seen to have several problems. Neighbours were complaining that it was overbearing and would lead to even more parking problems that currently exist. It was also inappropriate and plans submitted did not adequately explain the need for a new entrance onto Tanpits Lane. The Council agreed to respond accordingly.

It was also noted that permission has been granted for two electric vehicle quick-charging points in the main parking area of Burton Motorway Services.

At both meetings the usual administrative business – noting bank balances, approving budgets and approving dates for future meetings – was carried out.

Outstanding items were discussed. The regular discussion about where, when and how to relocate a Royal Oak sapling oak tree is amazingly moving towards a conclusion. Councillor Paul Rogers has sourced a galvanised tree

guard for the sapling. The planting is now planned for February with a plaque and a suitable ceremony in a corner of the School Field.

Paul also congratulated the Canal and River Trust on sorting out a collapsed wall over the canal at the bottom of Tarn Lane. Road markings at Clawthorpe and Burtlands junctions are still to be discussed with the county Highways Agency and a new Westmorland sign was welcomed for traffic approaching Burton from the south.

The monthly police report reaffirmed the need for residents to lock away keys to farm machinery and vehicles. There has been an increase in the theft of Landrover doors and bonnets in surrounding areas. Other observations covered loose ponies on the road, an agitated male youth lying in the road, thefts at Hanson Aggregates of a vehicle battery and diesel fuel, and criminal damage to two gravestones at St. James' Church.

Finally, thanks to Mike and Anne Taylor for the wine, delicious mince pies and biscuits at the December meeting. And a member of the public voiced her appreciation for all the hard work done by Councillors; this message is heartily endorsed by your correspondent.

Vicar's Letter...

Baptism Pictured

The candle flickered as William blew dust off the yellowed paper. It must have lain hidden behind the rafters of their little one-room cottage for many years.

Uncurling it William saw the crest of Lord Grace who lived in the manor house at the head of the valley. The neat writing was badly faded but it appeared to be about the entry into service of a child. He was "from this forward, without end, to available as required for work in the house, on the estate and elsewhere" and, if necessary, "to defend the property and family of Lord Grace." He was expected to report regularly to the House for instruction. But these were no ordinary terms of service; William, in amazement, saw that Lord Grace was promising that this child would "enjoy the rights and privileges of a son" and, in time, a full share in all his estate and wealth.

At the bottom of the paper, under the signatures, was a date – why, the paper was nearly as old as he was! And then suddenly a terrible thought pierced William's mind. He held the top of the paper close to the candle flame and peered hard at the faded name. And

What should he do? Put the paper back and pretend he'd never seen it? But surely Lord Grace had not forgotten? If he was in deep trouble now how could it help to add further years of indifference? But how could he turn up at the manor house after all this time? He sat for an hour or more unable to do anything.

And then William remembered the promises. He didn't deserve them, but he had heard that Lord Grace was both severe and generous. Even after all this time was there a chance that he would still honour his promise and welcome William as his own son? Might he forgive? The thought burned within him as he rolled up the paper, tucked it into his waistcoat pocket and grasped the door latch.

BIRDS ALONE

A black-backed gull has been around for several days - perching on Frieda Coward's roof-ridge down Neddy Hill, disliking it when jackdaws fly in to join it, flapping slowly away, looks out of it, at a loss, and at this time of year it should be still at the coast. Perhaps it's a 'refugee' from Walney Island.

Such lone appearances of a species are both exciting and upsetting. They trigger many memories from over the vears. In 2001 I watched a crane struggling in a stormy easterly above the coast of Fetlar, in Shetland. It looked like a bundle of legs and wings and neck tied loosely together, blown helplessly among flocks about fulmars and herring gulls who were manoeuvring expertly above a sea churned white by the gale. It must have been blown three hundred miles offcourse west as it made its annual journey from Egypt to Sweden.

Climbing a granite cliff near Lands End, my son Neil and I came across a herring gull cowering in a deep niche, looking out at us, unmoving. Its bill was diseased, swollen into boney blobs. I suppose it was an outcast, bullied or disregarded by its mates because of its deformity. We climbed on past it, leaving it alone in its misery.

One morning in the Eighties, Anne called out to me at breakfast-time to come and see something in the garden, under the cherry tree near the back door. It was a swift, crouching on the grass. As I came near it, it gasped, and died. Anne had just seen its killer, a sparrowhawk, speeding off across the neighbouring gardens.

Of course not all such sightings are tragic. A goldcrest appeared one year and nested in the downward-slanting branches of the cypress. It had never happened before and hasn't happened since. Once we found a swift crouching on the earth under a blackcurrant bush. They can't take off from the ground and must launch from a height, so my son Peter carried it onto the top of a wall and cast it upwards, and it flew off at once, seemingly unharmed.

So birds visit us, and (almost) mingle with us, in these poignant ways. They are like vivid spray, breaking over our streets and gardens in wafts flickering beauty, embodying amongst our civilised arrangements. House-martins are called cliff swallows in America - now they nest under the rain-gutters on our roofs. Jackdaws are really at home in cliffs, like the choughs we saw on the Isle of Man. Now they nest in quarries - Brian Pearson on Main Street once told me that there were 46 at Haverbrack Quarry where

he worked - or in the even more unnatural chimney-stacks. We do birds some terrible harms, by haymaking in June that destroys the nests of skylarks, for example. We also tolerate them, more or less, as they flit about our villages and towns and delight us by their individual ways.

Roger Reports...

from the District & County Councils

A HAPPY NEW YEAR to you and yours

As I am writing this at the beginning of January the councils' budget process has not been completed.

SLDC has decided not to raise its share (about 10%) of the Council Tax but the Police and Crime Commission's share (about 13% of what householders pay) will increase. It looks also as if the county's majority share of the tax will also be stable. But this will entail heavy savings.

So far Cumbria has made £130m of savings, but a further £83m still has to be found. Over the years the Council Tax share of Local Government expenditure will rise from 51% for 2015-16, to 55% in 2016/17 and 59% 2017/18. In 20115/16 the projected savings will be about £30m. Staffing reductions could save £7m.

Increased efficiency has been achieved by the so-called digital revolution, which has reduced paper bureaucracy in revenue and tax collection, planning and highways.

Customers also reserve and renew library books on-line while the county

council is busy installing Wi-Fi in care homes to reduce feelings of isolation amongst 'silver surfers.'

The proportion of on-line users has tripled in three years, but one in ten Cumbrians still do not go on-line. A volunteer service is being started to help older people especially. For further information contact www.go-on.uk/get-involved/nw/.

The county is also recruiting Fire and Rescue Service volunteers. On-call firefighters earn around £6,000 a year. Applicants have to be agile and to be able to pass a selection process. The upper age, currently at 55, may also rise.

One difficulty is that firefighters should be available within five minutes of Cumbria's 25 fire stations of which the nearest for Burton is Milnthorpe. I am enquiring whether personnel who could be used in the back-up and relief teams in a call out could come from further away; otherwise recruiting from areas like Burton, let alone the really isolated areas, will be difficult. With economies in mind the county administration has started an anti-food waste campaign. To the surprise of my generation who recall post-war rationing (which only ended in 1954) it

is claimed that £50 worth of food is thrown away per household each month and if there are children this rises to £70! If (and I stress IF) you want to know more please contact www.lovefoodhatewaste.com.

Good news includes that employment is growing and that the empty shops have decreased in Kendal to 9.97% vacancies, the first time the rate has dropped to below 10% in seven years. On housing, 91 affordable homes, of which 78 are for rent, were completed in 2014 up to October.

The number accepted as being officially in South homeless Lakeland dropped from 111 in 2012 to 6 in 2014. As SLDC continues its 20-year old policy of 'no second night out', any street sleepers are offered hostel or bed and breakfast accommodation. But. like Kendal's famous bag lady some time ago, they may refuse - so despite sensitive efforts councils by and volunteers we unable help are everyone.

Historical Footnote...

... by Roger Bingham

BURTON IN 1915

JANUARY - In order to ring in the New Year the Church Bell Ringers were supplemented by lady ringers as the formerly exclusively male team had been depleted by war service. Mrs. Wilson died aged 86. She was a daughter of Mr. Cocks a former master of Melling School. Reportedly, since the war began, local crimes had dropped except for false pretences and deception.

FEBRUARY - The price of milk went up as dairy men's wages had risen to £30 for six months (more than a school master's pay) since the outbreak of war. As tailoring had also declined Redmayne's of Kendal were offering men's suits reduced from 39/6 to 27/6. The Rev. Gilbert Monks, who had been Vicar of Burton for only six months, died. He had come from a Birmingham parish of 16,000 souls in order to have a guieter time in Burton. Fortunately the not touched village was epidemics of diphtheria and typhus in Kendal

and Bindloss of Hilderstone, organised a boon day in which 40 acres were ploughed. John Cottam used a new sowing machine to sow 10 acres of wheat. 50 volunteers had a convivial supper at Mr Bainbridge's Pinders Farm.

APRIL - Local wheelwrights were urged to join up to service army vehicles. As the cost of Burton's street lights had risen it was decided to turn them off until the autumn . The Parish Council allocated £20 for lighting for the next winter. At Easter there were fewer cars on the roads but far more motor bikes. "Pace egging continued to hold its sway and the merry voices and hearty laughter of the children could be heard over the undulating pastures."

MAY - The Rev. F Sinker was instituted as Vicar. Because the previous vicar's widow had not yet vacated the Vicarage the Bishop and other guests at the induction were entertained by Mrs. Shorland-Ball at Underfell. There was a well-attended Otter Hunt along the River Bela. Mr. and Mrs. Wadeson of Main Street celebrated their Golden They had Wedding. 3 sons. daughters, 26 grandchildren, and 2 great-grandchildren. Two sons and two grandsons were serving in the forces. Mr. Wadeson had been gardener at Burton House.

Private Herbert Eccles, while on leave, told of how he had come within 40 yards of the German lines at Ypres and had helped to capture a trench. When an "aeroplane flew over Burton all doors burst open and all eyes gazed upwards before the aircraft flew towards Lancaster." Day was held at the Green Dragon where tenants were served a "capital dinner by the hostess." At a Children's Flower Service £1: 5s 9d, 121 eggs, along with flowers and fruit, were donated for the Royal Lancaster Infirmary also for soldiers' and comforts. On August Bank Holiday there was "a goodly number of motor vehicles but little or no disturbance was experienced from dust owing to heavy thunderstorms."

SEPTEMBER - Thomas Saul was convicted of poaching fish on the Bela but was not sent to prison and was allowed time to pay a £4 fine because he was needed for hay making. During a drought the canal ran dry. Mr. and Mrs. Rhodes retired from running the Bible Class and the Girls' Friendly Society. Local Scouts were reviewed by Chief Scout Baden Powell Windermere. The Girl Guides were inspected by Chief Guide Lady Baden Powell at Crook.

OCTOBER - Mr. T. Burton of Bell House, Dalton married Miss Mary Alice Wilson of Russell Cottage, Dalton. "The bride wore a cream serge costume trimmed with white satin, hand embroidered, and a black hat adorned with white flowers." At a Harvest Festival Service the preacher was Rev. S. Sinker (brother of the vicar) who was Archdeacon of the Fylde. £9 7s was collected for the organ fund. Typhoid

fever broke out in Kendal but Burton was spared.

NOVEMBER - At the Martinmass farm workers' hirings "there was a general reluctance to hire men of military age." Ploughman were hired for £28 - £30 (for six months) but girls' rates had risen to an unprecedented £16 - £20 owing to female labour drifting off to highly paid munitions work in Lancaster. At Appleby - away from the war industries - the going rate was £11 - £14. Messrs. Hartley of Carnforth, who ran a grocery store in Burton, were fined £10 for faulty weighing scales which registered 1lb 2 ozs for 1lb accurate weight.

DECEMBER - A testimonial letter was published from Mr. Kauffman of British Columbia praising his former Private Secretary. Lance Corporal Redwood, who came from Burton and who had been killed at Suvla Bay in the Gallipoli campaign. He was "a pleasant and agreeable young man who made many friends." At Dalton, Mr. W. Saunders, aged 84, and his wife, aged 79, died within two days of each other and had a double funeral. It was recalled that about 50 years ago similarly timed deaths occurred at Russells Farm. Dalton, of Mr. and Mrs. Mott who were also buried together on the same day. £9 was raised for the soldiers relief fund at a patriotic concert. Miss A. Stockwell's rendition of Land of Hope and Glory was loudly applauded.




