# Reporting from the Parish Council meeting

Well what an exciting parish council meeting! Just as it was about to begin, County and District Cllr Bingham turned up despite the Clerk already having received his apologies. Something to do with a hustings meeting or the Conservative party conference or a failure to find his Conservative party membership card (which I don't think you need to attend the parish council meeting), I got confused. Anyway given his contributions to the meeting later our gain was someone else's loss.

Then came the boring bits. The Police Report – there was no presence only the written report and actually no incidents either – and everything else down to Item 5.

In the Open Forum Cllr Bingham was asked to clarify some of the reports which had been circulating about financial probity in another parish. He detailed the information that was in the public domain (if you wanted the details you should have been there.) The important point is that financial procedures within Burton in Kendal Parish Council are open and transparent, have been subjected to risk assessment and contain



safeguards to protect all transactions of the council. And anyway I have personal knowledge that the Burton Parish Clerk is overworked and underpaid!

Then, back to the Agenda and routine matters. Two planning applications had been approved by SLDC, although one with conditions, thought to be a boundary dispute. The outline application to build in the garden of 1 Mowbray Drive had been refused, and of the 2 new applications received the council had no comment.

But again, it was the topics not on the Agenda which roused the meeting from its slumbers. By various methods, a piece of paper, the ever-present iPad on the table on the left, and from the SLDC rebel cllr who voted against his colleagues, we learnt that outline planning for Church Bank Gardens had been approved. The last ditch hope that a spoke might have been put in the plans of Mr Big by Cumbria Highways department objecting on the grounds of access seems to have melted in to thin air. As do other matters – what has happened to the feasibility study into a footpath to Clawthorpe? But I digress and at least it's back on the 'Things to Do' list now.

Your parish councillors do have their noses to the grindstone and ears to the ground. It seems that a sneaky



amendment to the planning permission already granted for the Royal Hotel has been submitted. Not that the cllrs are a suspicious lot, but they believe this might be to reduce the number of affordable houses to be built. Now we have another part of the anatomy put to work - feet on the ground. A cllr has counted the number of houses for sale in the village and it's a lot. Everyone agreed that the last thing we need is more full price houses but there are lots of locals needing affordable homes. The Clerk was asked to investigate.

I really do feel like putting the next bit in capitals and bold, well I think I will. THE VILLAGE IS STILL PLAGUED WITH SOME ANTI-SOCIAL DOG WALKERS WHO DO NOT CLEAR UP THEIR DOG'S MESS. A community minded resident cleared up at least 30 piles on Boon Lane. Cllr Rowley has worked hard at trying to eradicate this problem. She has obtained a poo bag dispenser from Bay Vets which will soon be in place and she also reiterated the offer from Gleneils Kennels that if you walk your dog in that area you can use their bin to dispose of the bag. Please don't throw it to one side. Various initiatives were discussed to tackle the problem and all parishioners are encouraged to report offenders. Dog fouling is both socially unacceptable and a health hazard. It is against the law not to clean up after your dog straight away and can result



in a fixed penalty of £75 or a Magistrates Court appearance. You can report offending behaviour on 0845 giving 050 4434 the following information if possible: name and address of person in charge of the dog if possible, description of the dog, when and where the offence took place. (How about taking a photograph.)

After that it was all down hill. Cllr Rowley (again) is still on the track of a replacement see-saw, and a couple of councillors had information about 9 standby generators to be installed alongside the solar panels on Tarn Lane. White-lining and slow signs have been painted and, despite resurfacing of the A6070 in the Clawthorpe area, another vehicle came off the road. Is it perhaps something to so with the driving as well as the road surface?

Despite all this excitement the meeting still ended at 8.30pm. Well done cllrs.

# Vícar's Letter...

### **Out-of-the-box thinking**

The majority are not always right. Sometimes it needs one person with a different view, a new idea or a bold opinion to get us all to see what has been staring us in the face.

The people crowding around the grisly execution scene outside Jerusalem were all agreed; the man hanging there is a fake – no-one can now take seriously his claim to be a divine king or saviour. So what if his name, Jesus, means 'The Lord Saves'; he can't even save himself! So what if some gave him the royal title 'Christ'; does he look like someone who is in charge? National leaders, soldiers, another condemned man – they all speak with the same sneer, "Save yourself if you are the King!"

But another dying man sees things differently. In great pain, his mind is still strong enough to resist the majority view; he calls out, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." One man who realises that Jesus is indeed a king with a kingdom, one man who believes that knowing Jesus (or rather being known by him) will matter forever: "Remember me!"

Time is running out for Jesus; now would be the opportunity for him to end the pretence and confess that he has been misleading people with all his talk of coming from the Father to seek and to save the lost. Instead Jesus' reply shows that nothing has changed, "I tell you the truth, today you will be with me in paradise."

The crowd thinks that Jesus has ended up on the cross because he couldn't save himself. Jesus knows that he is there because that is how he will save others. He must die in our place bearing our guilt if he is to bring us back home to God his Father from the far-off country where have taken we ourselves. That is why he can immediately offer forgiveness to a convicted criminal (and to anyone else). My debt is paid.

So are you stuck in the crowd or have you seen what this man saw? While everyone else shelters behind the popular mood of the day this man alone accepts Jesus' authority over him and receives the rescue that Jesus alone provides.

# Historical Footnote...

... by Roger Bingham

#### **Burton's first post-war Autumn 1945**

By the autumn of 1945 the Second World War's hostilities had been over for six months. The Victory celebrations had climaxed at a sun-drenched Burton Show, which was the district's first peace-time event. The major drv weather persisted until Christmas, with only three wet days in November when a third of an inch of rain fell in Burton. Happily, a glorious Indian Summer stimulated a bumper harvest when combined harvesters were seen locally for the first time. Black and white Friesian cattle had also appeared but the traditional shorthorns, one of which sold locally for 450 guineas, still dominated milk production. Surprisingly the older method of recruiting farm workers persisted and the streets of Kendal were crowded for the Martinmas Hirings, though around Burton most labourers preferred to stay with their current masters.

For some the recent election of a Labour Government heralded a new dawn, but in Westmorland the Conservatives held their own in both the General and Council Elections. The county's new MP, Colonel Vane, did not share the national political optimism and informed Burton's Conservative

Women's Unionists that 'the pendulum will not spring back immediately' to what he recalled as the halcvon days of the 1930s. The Colonel, who had visited Germany, also reported that 'the Germans seemed subdued so all we need to do is to give them orders and see how they behave.' Meanwhile the war was gradually oozing away from the news. Burton's collections for the 'POW Tobacco Fund' ceased, the final event of the forces comforts fund was a well-attended dance at which the vicar, the Rev A. C. Sutcliffe, thanked the workers for their efforts and Mrs M Hutchinson was praised for having knitted '1000 pairs of socks for the merchant navy during the war.'

The shortage of food persisted and bread, unrestricted during the war, was soon going to be rationed. But, to many, housing was the biggest problem with demands for homes being 122% higher than in 1939. Prices had escalated and Fern Bank, a cottage near the canal at Holme. was auctioned for the unprecedented sum of £1,720. Plans were announced for rented council houses for a site on Station Road which became Drovers Way. Because of a reported shortage of materials it was rumoured that wooden houses imported from Sweden were destined for Burton. but in the event they were erected by the Lancashire authority at Borwick where they can still be seen.

As the village looked forward to Christmas the church bellringers learnt a full peal, the carol singers rehearsed The Burton Drama Group and 'presented, to an appreciative audience in the National School, four one act plays: World Without Men, The Sister who walked in Silence, Far, far away and a French comedy The Pie and the Tart, in which Madame Gautier (Mrs Thompson) persuaded Monsieur Gautier (Mr Graves) to part with a magnificent eel pie to satisfy his hunger. All of which provided much laughter.' So, Happy Days were here again.

## Roger Reports... from the District & County Councils

Firstly I must apologise about the breakdown in the implementation of the district council's plan to reorganise the Collection Waste Service. The haphazard start resulted in manv householders including mvself in receiving inaccurate collection time tables so, as in my own case, we ended up with three grey bins collection in a row while nearly a month's collection of paper, cans, glass and garden waste, culled from the busiest period Autumn tidying, built up. My situation was made worse by the repeated break down of my e-mail inbox so I was unable to contact quickly all the complaints which came from in and out of my ward and from people from other councillors' areas. Even so SLDC's collection failure was not an IT fault but our ubiquitous enemy 'human error.' Ironically on the first day 'the lads on the lorries' had instantly recognised that something was wrong. I have asked if they were consulted beforehand, especially as their Waste Collection service has hitherto received the most praise from the public.

Good news concerning South Lakeland is a drop in unemployment rate and a rise in employment. The number of people out of work is now lower than the 1,400 figure for job vacancies.

Give Neil a call on 01524 782177 / 07712 475863 There has been a welcome reduction in NEETS - young people 'Not in Education, Employment and Training' and there are only 20 people who have been registered as unemployed for over a year.

SLDC has now a Debt Free Status but its reserves are considered by some of us to be too high and would be better spent on improving or preserving services or by cutting the Council Tax. Please what do you think?

The county council, our biggest taxing authority, is deep into the budget process as CCC still has another £88m pounds to save over the next three The Government's vears. recent decision to cut a National Revenue Support grant in return for handing over the collection and retention of nondomestic rates seems more efficient as the county will not have to hand over funds with one hand only to be given grants back in return. But the income is largely dependant on local prosperity and in particular on major enterprises including the controversial nuclear industry and armaments, e.g. Trident.

Current restructuring aimed at savings include the grouping of local management teams into three teams and not six - so South Lakeland and Barrow now have one senior manager. It has been announced that the county's new £10-13m HQ in Carlisle is nearly



complete and should be occupied by September 2016. We don't as yet know what will happen to the vacated offices, let alone if their sale will bring in capital receipts or if their, hopefully, more efficient use will result in savings.

Sadly the biggest county council's worry remains Children's Services which, if they do not meet the final attempt to reach OFSTED standards, could be taken over by an outside team. Even so the recent exam results indicate that, locally, our children benefit from schools mainly judges to be 'outstanding.'

So I'm afraid this bulletin is mixture of sorry, good and bad.



The Thrush migration is on us! With birds coming through Burton which could well have begun their journey in Iceland, or the Baltics or for that matter anywhere in Northern Europe. As I write this (20 October) I have already counted almost ten thousand Redwing and over 2000 Fieldfare passing over our village or crossing over Hutton Roof. We have still got lots more to (I hope!) the bulk of the come Fieldfares should start to come through over the next week or two. The next decent weather over the North Sea should start to see the larger thrushes entering our country.

Each day small Starling parties again originating from Northern Europe have been crossing over Hutton Roof on their way to the West. I wonder just how many of them will roost over at Leighton Moss, where numbers can reach over 50.000 and provide murmurations spectacular which usually commence 30 minutes before Most early mornings whilst dusk. "visible migration counting" over on



Farleton I will see the Starlings coming over low down in a long straight horizontal line as far as the eye can see as they leave their Leighton Moss roost and head out East towards Kirkby Lonsdale areas to forage for the day.

I have just got back from a walk in Dalton Crags and Hutton Roof, after being tipped off in the last couple of days that several Great Grey Shrikes have been seen on the East Coast and a pal of mine from Bradford had one only yesterday (20 October) whilst "Vismigging", so I thought I best go and check to see if our Dalton bird (or birds!) had returned, but no I could not find our bird. Usually if the Shrike is going to return to us it will be around the 4 November and can even be a week or For the first time to my two later. knowledge the Shrike actually overwintered with us last year and was present from 20 November 2014 to Easter Monday 6 April 2015. Also we were further honoured last year by the appearance of yet another Shrike which stayed for two weeks.

No one seems to know the reason why our Chaffinch counts have been so low this year! I have spoken with other recorders and they too are experiencing low counts. It remains a mystery as yet to what's been going on with this species. Take last year between Sept 30 and Oct 20 I had 10,714 Chaffinch passing through Burton early morning



whilst the comparable period this year I have only managed to record 1,103. So we are well short of birds this year compared to past years.

Yesterday I was surprised to see two Wall Brown butterflies over on Farleton which is quite late and is probably another indicator of how mild the weather has been for the time of year. Lots of Red Admirals have been recorded passing through to the South whilst on their autumn migration.



#### It's that time of year again... A Note from the Post Office about Christmas Posting 2015

For parcels sent by Airmail there is no rush, you have until the beginning of December for even the furthest destinations. However, if you are planning on sending parcels via the slower, cheaper option of International Economy the recommended last posting dates are:

• Tuesday 3 November – Eastern Europe, Greece, Cyprus, Turkey, Malta & Iceland

 Tuesday 17 November – Western Europe

Remember that parcels sent outside the E.U. need to have a customs form attached, these are available at the Post Office Counter. Also remember to put your name and address on the top left hand corner of the front of your package; this will enable Royal Mail to return your item should overseas customs authorities refuse it entry into their country.

# The usual reminder about size and weight for parcels sent abroad

Before you go out and buy a scooter for your grandchild in New Zealand, may I remind you of the maximum sizes for sending items abroad with Royal Mail.



The maximum total of (length + width + height) is 90 cm (approx 3ft) with the maximum single dimension of 60cm (approx 2 ft). Also, the maximum weight is 2 kg.

It is really easy to exceed these and then the parcel would cost a great deal more to send via Parcel Force. It is sometimes cheaper to split a heavy parcel and send two packets.

A change this year – Good News – Royal Mail have now introduced a "large letter" size for overseas mail as well as for the UK. So this year, your calendars and bulky Christmas cards may not be quite as expensive to send as they were last year.

#### Dangerous Goods

To comply with national and international regulations governing the carriage of mail, and ensure that mail in transport does not present a danger to the general public, Royal Mail must restrict or prohibit certain items from their network.

So this year we will once again have to ask you what are the contents of your parcels; not just because we are being nosy or looking for gift ideas ourselves, but because there are restrictions on items containing, for example, batteries, nail varnish, perfume, aerosols etc.



Lithium batteries (the type commonly found in mobile phones and laptops) cannot be sent alone, and for international mail they must be packaged in the equipment. Beware, some countries do not permit the import of lithium batteries at all.

As always, come and ask us at the Post Office Counter for further advice.


