

PC Observations...

Reporting from the Parish Council meeting

Chairman Alan Wren read the Police Report. Surprisingly he missed out the most interesting bit which was that 10 volunteers had been involved in а static observation with Police to report on suspicious activity on major roads in/out of the area. Several vehicles had been stopped between 9pm and 'the early hours'. PC Mandy Coleman thanked the volunteers and said that more neighbourhood activity of this sort was planned. If you are interested please send her an email at Amanda.coleman@cumbria.police.uk.

PC Coleman also reported an increase in 'cold calling'. Please ring 101 if they are a nuisance.

Councillors discussed four planning applications without comment. However the 86-house Green Dragon development at the south end of the village was hotly debated. Councillors have responded before, questioning the inclusion of industrial units, offices and the density of houses on the site. There are also concerns on traffic flows, safety of pedestrian access from the houses to the village, and the capacity of the school to cope with increasing numbers. To date these concerns appear to have been ignored.

There Forum is an Open on Wednesday 3 May in The Memorial Hall from 4pm to 8pm about this. Please go along if you can, although Councillors were afraid that this was going to be another 'All show and no substance' exercise. This is a major development these village and concerns need to be taken seriously.

The playground Inspection has passed a safety inspection with a few minor adjustments to the basket swing and slide requested.

The Speed Indication Device (SID) has been moved by Alan Wren and his son to a new position outside the school. So far it shows traffic speeds in the 20s which is about the safe limit through the village. The strategy is to test traffic speeds in different locations around the village to identify hot spots for speed, requiring action. Police support with a speed gun is also promised.

Paul Rogers proposed with unanimous approval to adopt 'the updated section 1-5 Governance and Accountability for Smaller Authorities in England' minor changes. I'm not sure anyone knew what these changes were. Presumably there is an army of people producing this stuff somewhere. It's good to keep them happy.

An invitation will be sent again.

Brian Cooper reminded us that there is an SLDC scheme to provide free handymen to carry out basic tasks for older and disabled people. Ring SLDC on 01539 733333 and ask for the Handyman Service if you need help.

Roger Bingham said that he is still trying to get action to clear gullies and drains along Main Street, Boon Town Lane and Post Office Lane. This has been going on for so long. No action!

Roger is also trying to get a small capital grant to widen the pavement outside the Memorial Hall where there is no room for wheelchairs, buggies and people have to walk on the road because the footpath is so narrow.

Moira Rowley reported that 'the usual suspects' were causing trouble in and around Boon Town. She asked people to ring 101 to report this anti-social behaviour.

David Haigh and Paul Rogers reported that brambles had been cleared in Plain Quarry. Next meeting on 18 May in the Memorial Hall with an Annual Parish Council Meeting starting at 7pm.

Looking back over the last year...

It gives us great pleasure to say that there has been no change in the Editorial Committee during 2016 which still has nine members, but as our Constitution allows for up to ten members you will note we are still one member short of our full complement, so if anyone feels the urge to join us, please do come forward.

We continue to be extremely satisfied with the excellent printing service from Baytype, which has resulted in a much better standard of reproduction overall, especially of the photographs. Any delays in an issue appearing were due to pressure of work on your Editors and not as a result of the printer!

We have again been fortunate in retaining the services of our Auditor, Nigel Taylor, whose guidance and support for the Treasurer and the Committee has been invaluable, and for this we thank him most heartily.

During 2016, six issues contained 36 pages which makes for a good balance of copy and adverts, with the December issue including January 2017 events, three contained 32 pages, and the final



two were 28 pages. No issue was smaller than 28 pages in 2016 which, for the third year running, is heartening!

We are fortunate to have retained our regular columns by Roger Bingham (Roger Reports, Historical and Footnote), the monthly Letter from the Vicar from Graham Burrows, the Parish Council report from John Mackness, and have had regular news from the Lancaster Canal Trust's Frank Sanderson. and Bryan Yorke's delightful drawings and reports from the Swift Study Group. Occasional articles have also come from a number of other contributors.

Throughout the year BN has offered support and coverage of a wide range of fund-raising activities for various groups and societies within the village or undertaken by villagers for other causes. We have carried regular news & events listings from the Memorial Hall, Pre-School, Youth Club, the Historical Society, the Photographic Society, the First Responders, Outdoor Bowls and The Burton Singers. Helena Nixon has sent in a report from the W.I. each month, and we have had info from Morewood School, Cumbria Police, the NSPCC. The Rosemere Cancer Foundation, Carnforth Rotary and Age UK.

We have covered the regular big village

We have also included information regarding the contentious development at The Cottage and the ongoing development east of Hutton Close. In December we included our usual roundup of Christmas events and activities plus opening times for the Village Store.

The Diary and Events listing are still receiving notices for inclusion well in advance of events, which we are sure is helpful for forward planning by many villagers. We continue to include events from some local societies who meet outside of Burton but who have village members, and we have also continued to include some events at nearby venues such as the Heron Theatre at Beetham and the miniature railway at Cinderbarrow. Several societies and groups have made a donation to BN as a thank you for including their regular listings, events in the and those donations have been much appreciated.

At the year end we had 37 advertisers, and still had an advertising request waiting list of businesses from outside of the village. Adverts remain a standard 1/8 page with one remaining 1/4 page exception and one 1/6 of a page.

Finally, we would like to thank all our columnists and contributors. our auditor. all the members of the Committee who give help and advice to us as Editors, and for all the work they do in writing articles, keeping minutes, managing the advertisers and the money, and in getting the magazine distributed.

A big thank you to our team of distributors who turn out come rain or shine to deliver the News. To our advertisers and subscribers, and those who support our annual envelope appeal for donations, we owe a huge thank you to all of you individuals, groups, events, and local businesses who financially support the ongoing provision of Burton News.

And lastly but not least, to Gill and Akis in the newsagents who have carried on with being our collection point for copy for each issue. They also pass on copies to more remote villagers for us, offer copies of BN in the shop, and hold the all-important donation box for our annual appeal.

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Holme and District Local History Society SUMMER OUTING

This year's outing will be on Tuesday 6 June to Naworth Castle and Lanercost Priory.

Naworth Castle has been home to the Earls of Carlisle for about seven hundred years, the seat of the Howard family and residence of the current Earl, Philip Howard. Castle Howard, in Yorkshire, is perhaps the more well known branch of the Howard family but Naworth is the family seat. Naworth contains wonderful portraits, paintings and tapestries and has one of the most famous and impressive Great Halls in northern England.

Lanercost Priory was built in 12-13th century as an Augustinian house of prayer, mainly built with stones from the Roman Wall. It is renowned for its stained glass, particularly ones by Burne-Jones and William Morris. It also houses furnishings inspired by the Arts & Crafts Movement.

The coach will leave Burton Memorial Hall at 8.45am, then will pick up in the centre of Holme at 8.55am.


BURTON W.I.

Birdwise April has been a great month as you would expect with the arrival of my first Wheatear (Eurasian Oenanthe) on the 1 April and seen on the walls of upper Dalton. On the same day Mike Lee (from off Vicarage Lane) was lucky enough to see a Red Kite going over. Also on the same day down in Manchester several flocks of Redwing numbering approx. 500 in total were seen heading over to the East/North East (per Simon Johnson). Obviously a sure sign our Thrushes were heading back to their native Scandinavia. The same day I had my first Willow Warblers with three in Lancelot Clark Storth (CWT) and two in Burton Fell.

The day after (2 April) also proved productive with a further six Wheatear (Eurasian) plus close by a "Exhultation" of 21 grouped Skylarks in the fields as you commence to climb the pavements on to Farleton Fell. The following day I could only find three Wheatear, but did have my first of the year Yellowhammer back on territory near to Newbiggin on Farleton. I also had my first Swallow on 3 April flying over nearby Dockacres.

Over the month there has been a gradual increase in Willow Warblers and only yesterday (20 April) I had no less than 50 plus singing birds scattered around Dalton and Lancelot Clark Storth (CWT). I remember on or around the same day some 5 years ago when I had over 100 Warblers singing away between Plain Quarry and Park Wood. Some of these moved on the following day.

Our first Swallow was back on territory at Green Dragon Farm on 7 April (per Robert at Kendal) and a further three Swallows were back at Russell Farm on 9 April (per Alec at Dalton). The 12 April brought in my first Blackcap in Lancelot Clark Storth (lower section) and by 15 April I had no less than six separate birds calling from within Lancelot.

It will not be long now before our beautiful Swifts are gracing our Main Street, screaming away and chasing one another whilst at the same time negotiating the many wires in their paths. Already a Swift has been seen on 17 April heading North over the Chew Valley further down the country. I expect ours to be coming back to the village on or within a day or so of the 4 May. People regularly say how can you be so precise with the date! It's quite simple really because that's the day which has proved most regular over the



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last 8 years. I guess for some of us we are a little concerned about their outcome this year with not knowing when the work on the Royal will commence. We are just hoping and perhaps praying that the birds will be able to go about their business without problems in the short time they will be with us and before they head back to Africa in early August. Anyone interested in our "Swift watch" which is usually for one hour or so on a Thursday please come along we meet at the Memorial Hall about one hour before dusk. Dates and times will be published in our Burton Swift Bird Study Blogsite which can be seen at: https://burtonswiftbirdstudygroup.blogs pot.co.uk/

On the 19 April I had two of the "Big" Wheatear belonging to the leucorrhoa which call off in Dalton race (upper/deforested) on their way to their respective breeding grounds in Greenland. Iceland the Faroe or Islands. To think these birds have travelled all the way up from South Africa and they are only about half way along their journey when they reach us. The birds are slightly larger (only ringers who have them in the hand would measure the larger primaries.) They stand more upright. They are slightly darker on their backs (not always) and they are more orangy around the throat and upper chest, and



the best give away is the late arrival time for this species and the usual grouping (mid to late April onwards). Usually the birds time their arrivals with the hatch of small craneflies.


Our pair of Stonechats in Dalton (upper/deforested) have been a pleasure to watch all month whilst on their precarious low perches whilst wavering about in the wind!

As I write this (21 April) our Garden Warblers have not yet arrived, although I would expect them any day back to the Plain Quarry, Lower Dalton areas. Our Cuckoo generally makes his appearance about the 1 May, our local House Martins should be back any day and of course our long awaited Swifts from early May.

Our flowers are doing very well and this month (April) have seen, Dog Violets, Parsley Piert, Primrose and the Cowslips, start of Rue Leaved Saxifrage, and only yesterday (20 April) several of the Early Purple Orchids started to show with much have Magenta starting to show through. The most beautiful Blue Moor Grass has sprung everywhere and before long the Wild Strawberries will be coming out, they are in flower as I write.



You can take part in our Cross Bay Walk Challenge as an individual or with family or colleagues - it's a great day out, so why not share the experience with your friends?




