BURTON COMMUNITY FIRST RESPONDERS

The Burton Community First Responders are volunteers who live in the village and who provide Emergency Life Support on behalf of the North West Ambulance Service between a 999 call being made and the arrival of the Emergency Ambulance. There are currently four of us in the Burton team and, working with a team based in Holme, we provide cover across the two villages and the surrounding area 24 hours a day, 365 days of the year. We all carry resuscitation kit including a defibrillator and oxygen therapy equipment. In the last 12 months, Burton Responders were called out by the Ambulance Service on approaching 200 occasions to a wide range of incidents requiring emergency medical care, a number of which were immediately life-threatening.

We are currently looking to recruit some new members to our team and hope that some of the readers of Burton News will consider if they may be able to become a First Responder and contribute to this important work. The best way to get more information is to go to the Ambulance Service's web-site at www.nwas-responders.info where there are more details of the role and the training given. Alternatively, you can

get in touch with Alan Wren, the Burton Team Leader, on 781387 or at wrenatgreenbank@aol.com.

PC Observations...

Reporting from the
Parish Council meeting

Councillors were rather subdued at the 15 February meeting because there was a thin Agenda and no progress to report on the nine outstanding action items, many of which have languished on the list for several months. It's rather like the 'kiss of death' to be assigned to this list, which includes organising speakers for council meetings, getting some action on Main Street gully clearing, moving the speed indication device, making progress on the B4RN broadband connection, maintaining Plain Quarry infrastructure and removing a redundant lamppost in Dalton Lane.

Kathryn Smith opened up the meeting with a request that emails to the council from residents be openly discussed so that the press (i.e. Westmorland Gazette and Burton Parish News) might be informed. This was agreed as long as the email did not include confidential information. Three emails had been received –one from a new resident offering support and expertise on Burton's involvement with Historic England to brighten up the conservation area which covers the area around the village square; a

second one welcoming the village shop renovation and a third to promote the 'Happy Pebbles' initiative by the Brownies.

Other items discussed at the meeting included a welcome to new councillor Chris Nolan, elected to fill the casual vacancy that arose following Moira Rowley's resignation. Councillors then agreed to raise an objection to a planning application to build a two-story side extension to 10 Hutton Roof because it was overbearing and unsightly in relation to School House and its visibility from the main road.

Brian Cooper, SLDC district councillor, reported that Burton was now part of a new larger ward for the forthcoming May elections and would now return three councillors instead of two.

Jane Hopwood reported that the progress on the application to fund improvements to properties and infrastructure in the central village conservation area was due to be decided on 12 March. Jane also welcomed the interest from new residents offering support and expertise in preserving Burton's character reactivating the possibility of a Neighbourhood Plan and new funding.

Paul Rogers reported that gully clearing

Thank you from Burton Pre-school

As most of you will know, Burton Pre-school has recently moved over to its new home Burton Morewood CofE Primary Academy and is now run by the school. As you can imagine, this was a difficult decision to make, with the pre-school having run from Burton Memorial Hall for many, many years. Sadly, outside pressures and 'red tape' have increased dramatically in recent years. Pre-school was struggling to run as a voluntary committee-led organisation and was becoming less and less financially viable. Many similarly run pre-schools have closed down in the past year due to factors such as the introduction of '30 hours funding' and increasing costs. In previous years, we have had to fundraise over £4,000 just to break even, and foresight saw the same eventually happening to Burton Pre-school, possible outright closure at short notice – something we desperately wanted to avoid, for everyone's sake. Hearing that the school was planning on a new building, an opportunity was seen to save Early Years education and childcare for the children of our village by moving the location and running of the pre-school to the school.

The transition has definitely been a

VICAR'S LETTER...

On the Map

Denesh Divyanathan is from Singapore. His mother was from a Chinese Taoist family. His father was from an Indian Hindu family. One day he asked his father about the stirring tales of gods and kings and heroes in the Hindu scriptures, "These are just myths aren't they, these things didn't actually happen?" His father said that they were myths but that they would teach him how he must live. In time, Denesh decided that he did not need myths in order to be able to work out how to live and he began to call himself an atheist.

Then he came to England to study economics and a friend persuaded him to come to church. Finding everything in church boring he began to flip through the Bible in the pew and was very surprised. He was struck not by the size of the Bible or its elegant language or its grand themes, but by the maps included at the back – maps of the ancient world, boundaries of nations and empires, locations of cities, rivers and recognisable coastlines and routes of the journeys made by Israelite ancestors, marching armies, Jesus and his disciples, and by the apostle Paul. For the first time he realised that the Christian faith claims to be about real

historical events taking place in real earthly locations.

That was just the beginning of a long journey from that moment of surprise to Denesh's present conviction that the Christian faith stands because of the historical truth of the events in the Bible, both the Old Testament preparations for God's sending of the Christ, and supremely the birth, life, suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus.

Denesh Divyanathan is now the minister of a church back home in Singapore. Like us here in our village church, he aims to proclaim these world-changing historical events believing that Christian faith stands or falls on this. If you're not sure whether the Bible is myth or history then come along. Our church Bibles also have maps in them! And we aim to warmly welcome all those who come through the doors of our church and to be ready to answer any question that you may have.

HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE

CHURCH NOTES

Burton Church figures significantly in most accounts of the village and also of our old county of Westmorland. Though its role as a Christian worshipping centre stems from the so called Dark Ages, around 600 AD, its oldest fabric consists of the recently restored and displayed tenth century sculpture of Christ accompanied by two other figures. Though dating from the Viking Age with Nordic features, they were said by a Dr Kendrick in c.1900 to show, also, Anglo-Saxon features in 'the last stage of disintegration'.

The first references to the church occur in early Norman times when in c.1092 the church at 'Burtun' and 97 carucates of land in 'Clerc-thorp' (Clawthorpe) were granted by the local war-lord Ivo de Taillbois to St. Mary's Abbey at York, to which it belonged until Henry VIII dissolved the monasteries in the 1530s.

The first reference by name of a priest was 'Henry / parson of Burton' who witnessed a document about Cockersand Abbey in 1205. By then the

Norman Church Tower was already standing along with parts of the North West wall. The north aisle dates from the 12th century as does the south-east chapel which an early photograph shows had round Norman arches that were removed during the Victorian 'restoration' in 1872. At that time, also, the original 13th century east window was transferred to the current vestry. The south aisle and most of the rest of the building date from the 'perpendicular' architectural period c.1350-1550.

In 1936 the Royal Commission on Historical Monuments of Westmorland added that 'the south porch is probably medieval but retains no old features'. Nevertheless, the steps down into the church illustrate the effects of the gradual earth slippage down the slope from the church yard caused partly by digging graves.

In c 1694 the Rev Thomas Machell 'the Antiquary on Horseback' provided the first description of the church 'as a pretty good old building with two rows of pillars and a square tower, with three bells. There are two isles (sic) - one on the north side belonging to Dalton Hall and one on the south side belonging to Preston Hall (at Preston Patrick). The Church is dedicated to St Helen, indicated by a well about 60 yards from

the church which bears the saints name'. Nicholson and Burns in their History of Cumberland and Westmorland (1777) repeat this description and the dedication. Even so Machell had also added that church's rush bearing ceremony was on the feast of St James (27th July).

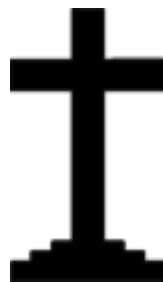

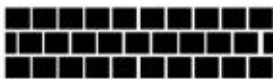

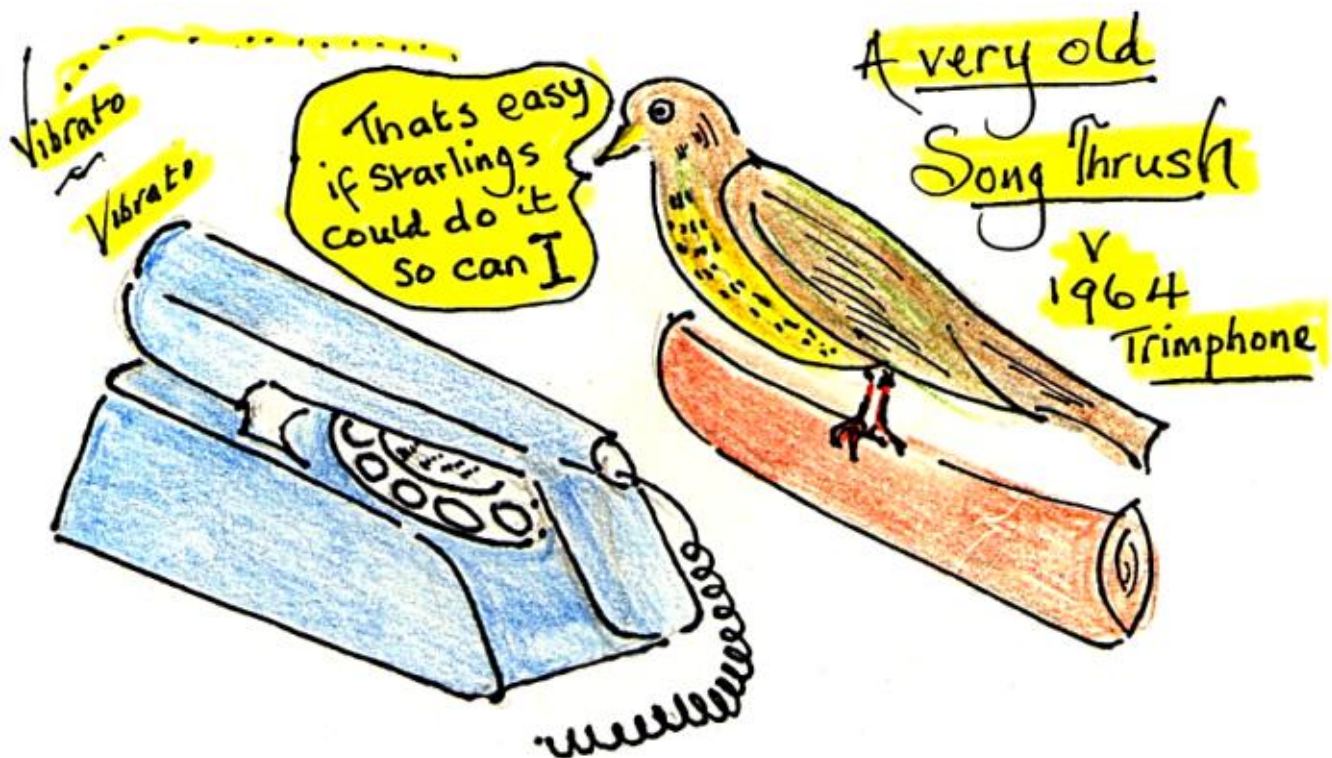

ploughed fields low to the ground in the same area. Also had some nice reports from Reg saying that his Yellowhammers have also been visiting his garden in Morewood, which seems to have become an annual pilgrimage for them at this time of the year and long may it continue, but as yet very few other local records of Yellowhammers from the houses off Vicarage Lane, although we do have another record of them being seen over on Mowbray Drive. I have had some nice sightings of the Tree Sparrows and also had occasional reports of them mainly from the Vicarage Lane areas. It's been so nice to be able to confirm that Marsh Tits are regulars seen and heard in Lancelot Clark, and also they are holding territory from areas along the "Nineteen Trees" stretch, and quite regularly visit the bird table at Pear

Tree Cottage which Alec and Linda have had the pleasure to witness over recent months, and also it's been great to hear about the Blackcap which continues to visit Gil and Graham's garden on Vicarage Close. Information is also coming through that our Cuckoos have now left South Africa and are currently heading North, in fact one of the radio-tagged birds has already reached the west coast of Mid-Africa. We normally get our first bird back in Dalton Crags somewhere around the 1 May.

I would imagine the first butterflies should start emerging this month and certainly worth looking out on sunny days for the lovely Brimstone.

Roger Reports...

From the County & District Councils

February was a quiet month, compared to January, when we were still engulfed with problems resulting from the November floods. So far the flood abatement work in The Square seems to be reasonably successful, although the restoration of the cobbles still needs doing. Perhaps, we might get a grant if SLDC's suggested plans for improving Burton's street scene go ahead. Meanwhile, I have diverted a grant from delayed projects elsewhere towards extending the kerb in front of the houses in Tanpits Lane which should reduce pebbles being washed into gullies from the gravelled verge.

I have contacted the district and the county councils following complaints about the Church Bank building site. SLDC have confirmed that the new properties are in line with the planning permission, but I am still awaiting information from Cumbria Highways about access from A6070.

Meanwhile, the 2018-19 budgets have dominated all councils. The Police Budget has risen by 5.42%. The increase will be used to provide 25 more officers and the retention of all 95 support officers whom, we are told 'will

continue the delivery of a strong proactive visible presence in our communities'. I hope we will see them! At SLDC's Human Resources committee we discussed introducing the Living Wage for 80 employees who only receive the Minimum Wage. Any changes would have to be in the 2019-20 budget. I will report this year's district Council Tax next month as SLDC's budget meeting is after BN's deadline. SLDC's increase is likely to be 3.99%.

The district's reserves of £750,000 are above average while the county's are lower. I am particularly concerned about the reduction in Cumbria's school balances which will stand at £0.675m on 1 April 2018 compared to £3.284m on 1 April 2017. The county council's tax requirement is £225,304,985. South Lakeland's share at £60,300,183 is the highest and Eden's is the lowest at £27m - the disparity being caused by the size of population combined with the highway mileage. On 15 February, the county's budget amounting to £380m was fixed. The council tax share is £217m; £84m comes from business rates and just under £80m comes from government grants. The CT share was fixed at 1.99% with an additional 2% for Adult Care which at £143m is the highest sector compared to highways at £50m. With a total rise of 3.99% the rate for a Band F property (value

£120,000 to £160,000) will increase by £73 to £1,850. Thanks to a last minute Government Rural Services grant of £1.1m some savings were reduced but an opposition attempt to use the extra funds for rural transport was defeated.

My main grouse this year was about derelict council property in Carlisle which was vacated in 2016 when a new £14m HQ was opened. Better news is that the county's long troubled Children's Services have had an 'improving' OFSTED assessment with the Adoption being rated as 'outstanding'.
