Dear BN,

RE - BURTON MOREWOOD SCHOOL

May I differ about the above school celebrating 50 years. Well yes, the new building is celebrating 50 years, but Morewood School is 150 years old. Take a look at the two books written on Burton in Kendal: Burton and Holme - In Times Past by Anne Hyleman & Kath Hayhurst, also Burton in Kendal, Clawthorpe and Dalton Photographic Memories, by Kath Hayhurst.

"According to the records The Morewood Memorial School was erected by the inhabitants of Burton in memory of Rev. Robert Morewood, vicar of Burton for 23 years."

"The land at BOON WALL (not Boon Walks) was bought for £50 on June 22^{nd} 1867, the school cost £586 9s 2d to build. This school was demolished & the new one built in 1967."

Also from Roger K Bingham's Historical Footnote - July 2002, just a Snippet from - Our Old Schools

"Burton's school current was inaugurated on 24th September 1867 when "all that plot of land called Boon Wall (not "BOON WALKS") now in the occupation of Edward Rooks being 29 yards in breadth and 47 in length was conveyed with all appurtenances and discharged from all copyhold customary tenure as parcels of the manor of Burton - for purposes to be applied as a site for a school for poor persons of Burton and neighbourhood."

The managers were required "to erect a neat comely house with out offices, conveniences and appendages as they think fit, to perpetuate the memory of Reverend Robert Morewood, M. A., late vicar of the said parish of Burton."

Also I am sure that many Burtonians like my husband were educated there in the 1950s!! As probably did their ancestors before them.

So yes the <u>new school building</u> is celebrating 50 years but Burton Morewood School is celebrating 150 years.

Maybe the teachers could get the children to do some research on the school and put on a display of their finds in the school later in the year?

So which is the more important celebration?

Well done Parish Council!

I understand that the Parish Council has recently agreed to support parishioners who wish to make an anonymous objection to a planning application.

I applaud the PC for this; planning applications rarely affect groups of people like Church Bank Gardens who can work together and support each other through the objection process; indeed, I remember Alyson Yates unsuccessful spearheading the application to the estate built on top of but most the old school field. applications massively impact a few households only and it is very difficult for most people to navigate their way through the alien objection process. I remember being really confused about which objections are published and which are not for example; and, although reasonably literate, found myself actually unable to understand the lona and involved explanations given to me when I requested the principles and rationales for such decisions.

Whatever peoples' reasons, living through this process can cause great stress and if the PC can help those who are fearful of possible repercussions when making an objection and in making the objection fit the guiding principles from SLDC then parishioners have more chance of making their views heard and not to feel they are silenced by bureaucracy and worry.

Once again, well done PC.

PC Observations...

Reporting from the Parish Council meeting

The 15 March meeting was a twoparter with the Annual Parish Meeting followed by the normal monthly Parish Chairman Council. Alan Wren presented an up-beat summary of the past year highlighting many good developments in the village. These included the positive response to a funding application to brighten up the centre of the village with Heritage England financial support, expansion of the village school, the forthcoming development of the Royal progress at last with Hotel site. Cumbria Council Highways Department to clean out blocked culverts causing flooding, revitalised а Recreation Trust, and the possibility of B4RN high speed broadband coming to Burton if there is local support.

The positive vibes continued into the regular PC meeting. Two representatives of the WI asked for and got council support for a new notice board to publicise Memorial Hall events. Another resident introduced the Rapid Relief Team's recent litter pick and this was warmly welcomed by councillors who advised about the village boundaries where litter is often found. Burton needs brightening up and

councillors backed an initiative to enter a Cumbria in Bloom initiative with support from the school and village societies.

Several red tape requirements failed to dampen the positive mood. Data protection requirements are getting more demanding. It is a hassle but has to be done. A risk assessment for council procedures has to be carried out and new arrangements for external auditing have be attended to.

Finally, amongst councillors' individual reports, issues of safety of pedestrians continue to be raised. Double parking at school times, speeding cars at narrow points through the village, narrow pavements, uneven kerb stones and village lighting issues were raised. Perhaps with the new spirit of optimism amongst councillors, effective action might be taken soon? With a new spirit of local community spirit, anything is possible!



HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE

BURTON NEWS IN 1968 50 YEARS AGO

JANUARY

A drizzly New Year was made gloomier by a dire economic out-look following the devaluation of the pound the previous October. But the January Sales had cheerful 'offers' like "Twin Pack toilet Rolls 1/3: Hoovermatic Twin Tub Washing Machines 73 guineas; Ladies' Car Coats 99/6 - and from 'Burton Garage' Hillman Imp car £395 and a Ford Cortina £435." Building began on the M6 Lancaster to Penrith extension. A workers' camp was set up at Clawthorpe. A prisoner 'escaped' from Bela River 'Open Prison' - a day before he was to be released because 'he wanted to be caught so that he could be sent back.'

FEBRUARY

As the 1967 Foot and Mouth Epidemic had abated dogs and cats would be allowed to go out, but in any case they did not carry the disease. The agricultural community was shocked by the sudden death, at the age of 52, of Mr J Park of Deerslet Farm.

MARCH

Mid-week Holy Communion services were held in Lent, when the sermon theme was 'The Church's Message' and Gospel Hymns were sung. It was reported that the body of 80 year old Mrs Stephenson, formerly of Reader House was cremated at the newly Crematorium. opened Lancaster Westmorland County Council rejected a proposal to provide a crematorium near Kendal, at an estimated cost £70,000. as 'it would be an unnecessary luxury.'

APRIL

'Noah's Ark like floods' devastated the area. Following protests about inaction Westmorland County Council paid their 'workmen' overtime to clear up the mess. The local MP, Michael Jopling, delivered to the government a petition 5,100 signatures against the threats to sever the canal by building the M6. Mrs Heaton held a coffee morning for Cancer Relief at Dalton Hall, and Rev G Langham held a wellattended Communion service on Maundy Thursday.

MAY

Mr J Hayhurst, Chairman of the building committee, announce a five year plan to extend the ten year old Memorial Hall to provide a billiards room and changing accommodation. Half the £10,000 cost

An 18 year old girl was fined 10 shillings for dangerous cycling on Dalton Lane where her 'man's bike' hit a stationary car.

JUNE

A well-known Burton Change ringer, Mr G Braithwaite, died aged 61. A recently formed Flower Arranging Club held a floral art display of 45 exhibits in the Memorial Hall in aid of the building fund. It was announced that Main Street would be closed for six weeks in the autumn so that a new surface required by the heavy motorway construction vehicles could be laid down. 38 pupils and their teachers enjoyed Morewood School's annual excursion which took them, via Penrith and Alston, to Newcastle where they viewed shipping in the docks before going onto Whitley Bay for tea.

JULY

It was the driest summer since 1951. Many villagers went to see Al Read and Lonny Donnegan on at The Winter Gardens. Morecambe - tickets 5s. dress circle 10s - upper circle 5s. The police introduced Radar Speed Traps which, in the first week, caught three drivers on Hale Moss.

AUGUST

A Jumble Sale raised £12 for the

Church materials Bazaar fund needlework 'examples of and Christmas cards to be sold at the December event were displayed.' A culvert to take the Gatebeck-Burton Thirlmere aqueduct stretch of the pipeline under the motorway site was excavated.

SEPTEMBER

Scott, Wilson, Kirkpatrick and Partners, contractors for the Lancaster to Penrith section of the M6, announced the motorway's specifications. There would be 36 miles of dual carriageway, four miles of slip roads (a newly coined term). 14 bridges, 22 reinforced concrete culverts, a 13 feet wide central reservations and 10 feet wide verges, although parking would be prohibited.

OCTOBER

During the angriest village event of the year there was uproar when 80 year old Mrs Stephenson and her son were given eight days notice to quit as tenants of the former Globe Inn in Main Street. An adjacent property had been which threatened demolished stability of the structure. A protest meeting was held in the Memorial Hall when fears that other properties would be pulled down were voiced but the Globe structure survived.

NOVEMBER

The final phase to build three- and fourbedroom bungalows on Mowbrav Drive was advertised. The Mother's Union went on a coach tour to Longridge, the Trough of Bowland and to Garstang 'where tea was taken. The return journey was through Lancaster on the A6.' A £67.000 extension was opened at Queen Elizabeth Grammar School, Kirkby Lonsdale to replace 44-year old 'temporary class rooms.'

DECEMBER

A competition, which attracted 120 entries, for a name for the new stretch of the M6 was won by Mrs Rigg of Kendal with the choice of 'Westmorland Highway.' During the closure of Main Street, photographs appeared in the Westmorland Gazette showing bus crews escorting passengers through the rubble to reach a duplicate bus on the other side of the road works. In the event the re-surfacing was completed six days earlier than expected. A correspondent to the Gazette complimented the workers on their efficiency and good humour when 'bad temper has been conspicuous by its absence.'



It's been a lovely day today (20 March) and I guess Vernal Equinox has come round again and for once it's sunny! So let's hope things are beginning to get better, it's been a crazy month with the weather, and subsequently the wildlife have obviously been on a roller coaster with strong winds, heavy rains, plenty of snow and everything else in between.

At the beginning of March there were plenty of displaced Tewits (Lapwings) about and they were reported from the back of Dalton Business Centre, also I had them at the field opposite the Old Station Inn (now rebuilt into a large dwelling) and what we think may have been the same birds were seen again in the fields opposite Church Bank, also spending time in Curwen Wood Park. More were also reported from Hilderstone.

Also at the beginning of the month we had lots of reports of Fieldfare around with a party of at least 100 in Curwen Wood Park, also individuals or small parties were recorded from both Vicarage Close stripping some rowan berries, and also an individual feeding in a garden on Morewood Drive. Also a party of about twenty birds reported from Dalton hamlet. Also had some nice reports of a 200 party heading north over Burton and also some in the fields at Hilderstone (records via Reg).

The Yellowhammers are still visiting Reg's garden up on Morewood Drive on a daily basis.

Song Thrushes are singing on their territory but most have been a little subdued because of the weather, the same situation has occurred with our territorial Skylarks, although after saying that things began to spring back to normal today (20 March), I had several on territory and singing on Holme Park Fell.

I was wondering if we have had a "fall" of Stonechats I had up to five in upper Dalton Crags on 13 March with a further two seen the following day on Holme Park Fell, normally we would only have our resident overwintering pair on Dalton Crags. Also had a large party of up to 30 Meadow Pipits crossing over Holme Park Fell and heading out to the NW on the same day as the Stonechats.

Sand Martins were seen at Leighton Moss on 15 March and a possible Swallow was crossing Holme Stinted Pastures on 19 March. A Wheatear was reported back at Ocean Edge foreshore at Heysham on 16 March, and also up to five Chiffchaffs were reported on the same day down at Middleton Nature Reserve nr. Heysham.

Further afield flocks of up to 700 Hawfinches have been reported down in Surrey.

Please be on the look out for "Herds of Whiteness" (Whooper Swans) passing over Burton heading north, which they normally do anytime between the 18 March and the first week in April.

This next month should see our Swallows coming in good numbers from about the end of the first week and peaking towards the third week of April. Our House Martins can be a little later than the Swallows, and our Swifts should be back with us from anytime


from the last few days in April, but usually about the first week in May. Also in April we will get our Chiffchaffs and Willow Warblers and Blackcaps, and towards the end of the month we should start to see our Garden Warblers and Tree Pipits. From mid-April it is always worth checking out upper Dalton Crags for the "big" Wheatear (Northern Greenland "leuchorrae" group) which may stop off for a day or two to feed up and break journey to Iceland their long or Greenland (or even the Faroe Islands). And also in the last week of April (but usually 1 May) we may get our Cuckoos back in Dalton Crags.

Hutton Roof's beautiful sweet smelling Daphne Mezereone is going to be late this year, and is expected to flower around the end of the first week in April, and so I have already got a visit booked in my diary. Also I have been checking out lots of Early Purple Orchid

rosettes at the top of Lancelot Clark Storth now beginning to show and hopefully we should have yet another good show anytime from the middle of April onwards.

I have been invited to give my presentation "Orchids and Rare flora of Hutton Roof" at the Memorial Hall at 7.30pm on Thursday 26 April. I am hoping to show some lovely orchid photos along with several showing the rare hybrid and the many varieties we have up on Hutton Roof which are of national importance. I am sure if you are interested in the flora of our local area you would enjoy this, so please come along on the night, it would be great to see you and you would also be helping to support our Memorial Hall funds.

Roger Reports...

From the County & District Councils

Having suffered more than most South Lakeland places during the November floods our area got off relatively lightly during the unprecedented (for early March) "Beast from the East' cold spell. Accordingly, I was not snowed under with complaints. Unlike during the floods, the county website provided regularly summaries and at least the main roads were gritted day and night. But please let me know of any problems or suggested improvements.

I reported the Cumbria County Council and the Police and Crime tax budgets last month. On 27 February, South Lakeland was the last Council to fix its budaet. SLDC's Net Revenue for 2018/19 of £12,931,100 included a rise for Band D properties of 2.7% of £5. Also, the Precept for parish council schemes, such as play grounds and maintenance. extra village were approved. Burton's precept is a slight reduction on last year of - 80% and will amount to £28 pa for a Band D property. Comparative local parish Band D precepts are: - for Holme £35, Hutton Roof £34, Milnthorpe £37 and Heversham £29.

The Budget papers also illustrated the

diversity and costs of the district's services like 'Noise Air Water Pollution' £256,000, Lake Windermere £328,000, Street Cleansing £280,000 and Car Parking £66,000. £8,000 was also allocated for 'Dogs' which, as we do not have Dog Wardens patrolling our streets, I understand, includes the cost of caring for stray dogs. Even so, owners who reclaim their strays can be charged £25 per day for kennelling but, (and I've not yet found out why), 'the total minimum charge' is £144.

At the same Budget meeting, after long debates, we unanimously approval schemes to reduce plastic waste and, with strong all party support, for cancer radio therapy treatment at Westmorland General Hospital. As a member of the Police and Crime Panel, I was involved in choosing Mrs Michelle Skeer as Cumbria's Chief Constable, who was formerly the Deputy Chief constable.

Finally, there is a campaign to reduce road signs which according to The Times 'have doubled in 20 years, wasting confusing money and motorists'. Having obtained myself, grants and otherwise supported welter of No HGV, speed limit including Smiley, school and other signs for around Burton, please let me know of any you think are unnecessary.

Our family has recently become involved with the Silverdale branch of a charity called "Friends of Chernobyl's Children". The charity organise respite care for children from Belaruse whose lives are still affected by the Chernobyl disaster. Host families look children aged 7 - 12 years and give them fresh air, healthy food and good fun for one month every year for 5 years. Last year we had two 7 year olds come and stay with us and they will be coming back again, along with 10 other children, in June this year. These children are from very deprived backgrounds and they arrive extremely poor condition; malnourished and literally in the clothes they stand up in. They stay with families in and around the Silverdale area including Burton, Yealand and Carnforth.

I would like to make three appeals:

Firstly: to those who have internet access, please just take 5 minutes or so to visit www.focc.org.uk/ and have a look at the work of the charity.

Secondly: to those who have children of a similar age, please have a look for any unwanted good quality clothing which you could donate to the children. We can not take jumble nor do we want mountains of old baby clothes or dressing up clothes; just clean, good quality, practical everyday clothes and shoes for the children to wear while they are here or winter shoes and coats for them to take home. Please contact me at the number below to arrange collection / drop off of clothing.

Finally: the charity are always looking for new families to host children. Most families take one child and usually have their own children of a similar age, but anyone is welcomed to come and get involved. Day care is provided every week day allowing families to get on with normal routines. Please get in touch at the number below if you feel you could help out by in any way from hosting children to baking cakes for coffee mornings or for packed lunches during their stay.
