BURTON MEMORIAL HALL

Our new series of fundraising Nature Talks at the Hall has proved popular this year, so a big thank you to everyone who has supported them thus far, and we hope you will enjoy the talks we have lined up for the coming months.

In June, in support of Swift Awareness Week, the talk will be preceded by a short walk along Main Street from the Hall, past the Royal Hotel as far as Manor House and back to the Hall so we can see where the current Swift nesting sites are. The walk will be led by Bryan Yorke and Reg Hesketh and take up to 30 mins. (If the weather is too bad then we have an alternative indoor option planned!) Once back in the Hall there will be tea and biscuits followed by a short Swift update presentation (approx. 30 minutes) by Brvan Yorke. The date will be Thursday 28 June, and we will set off from the Hall just after 7.30pm.

In July we will be having a night of bees with Dr Fred Ayres of the Lune Valley Community Beekeepers group. This will be on Thursday 26 July at 7.30pm and we are delighted that it will comprise two interesting talks separated by our usual tea and biscuits.

"Does the honey bee have a future?" (approx 40 mins) will be followed by "The changing face of beekeeping" (approx 20 mins) which looks at the new thinking about bee husbandry focused on the needs of the bees rather than the needs of beekeepers and the production of honey. There will be time afterwards for questions. The Lune Valley Community Beekeepers have a

holistic approach to beekeeping, which means their interests are not only directed to the needs of the bees but also the environment of which they are an integral part.

On Saturday 3 November we are holding a one-day Artisan Fair in aid of Hall funds. The aim is to fill the Hall with tables selling home made or artisan items and foods, rather than just craft/art items. Anyone who wants to book a table please get in touch with Anne on 781306.

PC Observations...

J.M. Reporting from the Parish Council meeting

At the Annual Parish Council Meeting on 17 May. Alan Wren stood down after 3 years' service, positively leaping out of his seat to make way for Paul Rogers who was unanimously elected as the new Chair. Sarah Colver is the new Deputy Chair. Representatives were then appointed for various village organisation committees _ Burton Recreational Trust (Sarah Colver). Burton Education Foundation (Sarah Colyer), Local Area Partnership (Chris Nolan), Quarry Liaison Committee (Jane Hopwood), School Governors (George Isherwood), the Fireworks Working Group (Alan Wren) and the Conservation Group PsiCA (Jane Hopwood, Paul Rogers).

Prompted by a question from Marion Plowright, Roger Bingham gave a short history about Burton Education Foundation's origins following the closure of Burton's Grammar School in 1881. Grants are now available for young people aged between 16 and 25 years who live in the parishes of Burton-in-Kendal. Beetham and Arnside. Grants are to help with the extra costs of attending college, university or apprenticeships. More information grantsat

Paul Rogers then explained that the role of the South Westmorland Local Area Partnership was to improve information sharing at parish level, and provide a forum for discussion on priorities, services and funding. More information at www.southlakeland.gov.uk/your-council/partnerships/local-area-partnerships-lap/south-westmorland-lap/.

After dealing with various administrative tasks, the meeting moved on to discuss the ownership of land in The Square. problematic This is because the ownership is not clearly registered at the Land Registry and the PC resolved to aet Parish Council ownership clarified before money is allocated from PsiCA funds for various projects to conserve and improve the area. Jane Hopwood volunteered to lead this. starting with the east side. Local residents will also be interested because there is confusion about the ownership of the land in their house deeds and how the land is insured.

Roger Bingham, on behalf of the three Tory District Councillors recently elected, thanked Burton residents for





their support. SLDC now has 19 Tories, 3 Labour and 29 Liberal Democrat councillors spread over 18 wards.

Councillors once again (it happens every month) lamented the lack of action from Cumbia County Council Highways Department to follow up their declared intention to improve flood resistance in Burton. The flood resistance officer. Doug Covle. action but promised nothing has happened.

It was agreed to purchase 658 daffodil bulbs to be planted in clumps of the south side of the village to beautify the entrance along the A6070.

The commemoration of the end of the Great War was again deferred. A new idea to hang poppies from lampposts with the names of the 20 soldiers from Burton who were killed was discussed but Councillors want to synchronise their ideas with other societies in Burton and the School.

Outstanding items such as the maintenance of the Speed Indication Device and the kerbstones in Main Street have been resolved.



CONSERVATION AREA NEWS

Burton's Conservation Area (centred on The Square but including buildings on the Main Street both north and south of The Square) is about to receive what is 'Partnership termed Scheme in Conservation Areas' funding, or PSiCA for short. The partners are the Parish South Council. Lakeland District Council (SLDC) and Historic England (HE). Funding has been secured to restore around a dozen buildings that are most 'at Risk' and to enhance the 'Public Realm' area – The Square itself. Parish Council has The pledged funding for the public realm areas only, although we, as partners, will be involved in and able to influence decisions on other enhancement works. We have also secured extra funding for 'Public Participation' which will involve a series of talks and workshops, given by experts in their field. The Parish Council will be hosting these in the Memorial Hall at intervals over the 3 vear duration of the PSiCA and we are currently working with Cumbria Action Sustainability (CAfS) for putting together a programme of events

The first event will be on Energy Efficiency in Buildings. The events are open to all parishioners and are free. Other workshops will be 'Heat Loss and Thermal Imaging' – something we hope that Burton Morewood School children might be able to get involved in, and other practical advice and demonstrations relating to preserving and enhancing the life and efficiency of buildings and how to care for Listed buildings and buildings in Conservation Areas.

We will be engaging consultants to advise on the enhancement work and also to help us prepare a Village Design Statement. This document has

great relevance to the village as it can influence the design of new developments such as the proposal for the Green Dragon. It also provides a cohesive long term strategy for the village. We will hold workshops relevant this. design to and professionals will give guidance on 'Why Design Matters'.

This Partnership Scheme is for the village – to enhance and improve our built environment. We hope that you will become part of it and that the scheme is a true partnering event – everyone's opinion matters. Please get involved. The Burton First Responders are holding a Heartstart evening, where you can learn more about basic life support skills, including CPR.



Roger Reports...

From the County & District Councils

Firstly, I am honoured to thank you for re-electing me as your South Lakeland District Councillor on 3 May. My political party colleagues Brian Cooper and Tom Harvey also send thanks for their election. Brian has, of course, been the member for the former Burton and Holme Ward since 2008 and Tom, who now lives in Clawthorpe, was the member for Grange for ten years.

Our new Burton and Crooklands Ward Burton, parishes: comprises nine Hincaster, Holme, Hutton Roof, Lupton, Preston Patrick. Preston Richard. Sedgwick and Stainton. So, we had far more houses to visit and there were more candidates. Way back in the 1980s I was three times returned unopposed. Later on I normally had just one opponent. This time we had ten parties. The candidates from four Burton and Crooklands Wards results were: Bingham Roger, Conservative, 1,534 votes; Blunden Simon, Green, 134; Casson Paul, Labour, 174; Cooper Brian, Conservative, 1.218: Eccles Sheila, Liberal Democrat, 984; Harvey Conservative, 1,205; Herbert Tom. Christine, Lib Dem, 898; Lethbridge Wendi, Green; 145, Singleton Karl, Lib Dem, 881; Wickham Claire, Green, 154. elected for four years, Brian for three and Tom for one year - so there will be another District Election next year.

I got more votes than any of the 51 elected members. The next highest was lan Stewart, Lib Dem for Arnside and Milnthorpe, and the third highest was my Lib Dem next door neighbour Rupert Audland. In the Burton and Crooklands boxes there were just 4 rejected papers, the lowest in the count. In other wards some boxes contained many 'spoilt' papers because voters had put their crosses by more than three names. As far as I could gather most Burton voters had got the hang of the new system which at the start of the campaign hardly anybody had grasped. Thus, my constant doorstep burble of 'you can vote for three candidates who can be all from the same party or you can pick and mix' might have worked.

Hardly any non-local topics came up. Only one person mentioned Brexit. But on the morning of the air raid on Syria one resident said she would not vote for the Conservatives because 'the





Tories are taking us to war again'. The topics commonest were potholes, followed by speeding traffic, planning issues and, (even in Burton ten miles from the town) the removal of Kendal's New Road Car Park. Surprisingly, few people mentioned last winter's floods although during the six weeks it seemed to rain everyday. As always everybody was friendly. Only three people refused my leaflet but did so in a most polite manner. For once, few of our posters were damaged but several suffered in Kirkby Lonsdale and in Kendal. Finally I am pleased that at long last the kerb has been extended at the bottom of Tanpits Lane to prevent flooding. Will it work? We'll see.

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VICAR'S LETTER...

One Way

A few of my words from the funeral of my mother-in-law, Daphne Murnane, who died on 29 April having lived for the last $4\frac{1}{2}$ years in Holme and then Burton.

"What happens when I die?" Going first to the cross, he will open the way to his Father for others. Jesus doesn't show them the way or tell them about the way. The

HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE

by Roger Bingham

Woolly Minded Forebears

Until quite recently early summer was the most traumatic time for the majority of Burton's inhabitants. These were the sheep: for mid June was clipping time. In c.1900 there were estimated to be 12,000 sheep in the Burton area. Further back, sheep had figured prominently in the rules concerning Burton Church Tithes paid towards the Vicar's income or 'stipend'.

Historically, a sheep's value lay in its fleece. Nowadays flocks are bred mainly to produce lambs for meat. Consequently with fewer mature sheep required for their fleeces the availability and consumption of mutton had reduced.

According to a tithe list made in 1732 wool, from the June 'clipping time', was important for the vicar: 'every person within the parish that shears 10 fleeces of wool in one year shall first choose 3 fleeces and then the vicar takes one. If he shears nine, eight, seven or six he shall choose three fleeces and then the vicar takes one, the first fleece he touches. If he shears five fleeces he shall pay to the vicar half a fleece. If



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under five sheep, he shall pay the vicar one penny a fleece to be collected a week before midsummer's day. (24 June). There is also due for ten lambs dropped in one year he shall pay the vicar 10 pence per lamb' while for just one lamb 'a half-penny should be paid to the vicar'.

The value of wool varied according to the type of sheep. Lakeland Herdwick sheep's fleeces which weighed about three pounds sold in 1792 for 6 pence a pound. The next year, when war broke prices rose out. wool owina to increased demand by weavers making cloth for the army's redcoats. Hosiers also needed wool for the thick stockings worn below soldier's knee breeches. When in c. 1820 the War Office put the forces into trousers the military stocking trade was ruined.

Nevertheless, as the population was rising the demand for finer wool for clothing increased. Locally, a finerwoolled Silverdale breed was introduced.

In 1794 John Pringle reported to the Board of Agriculture that *'in the townships of Burton and Holme where the breed is kept, five sheep yield an average of a stone of wool which is worth 8 pence a pound. At a medium of the whole parish of Burton for eight years from 1772 to 1779 it required six*



fleeces to weigh a stone'. Consequently we can admire our woolly minded forebears for keeping up to date with effects the wider economy had on the productivity of our green pastures.

I can't be absolutely sure but I do think we have at least two pairs of Cuckoos on Hutton Roof, we have our usual one that frequents Dalton Crags and Lancelot, and we have another calling bird that frequents a line between Newbiggin, Kelker and the Rakes (part info thanks to Mike Westgate). On several occasions last year and again this year I have heard a bird calling from west of the timber yard as though in a wooded clough or forestry area. I cannot weigh up whether this is one of our birds already mentioned or whether it is a new location!

On 5 May, along with John Osborne (Natural England), we did our annual "Dawn Chorus" walk over in Park Wood for the Hutton Roof village and for once we got great weather and as usual had a good attendance to check out the 15 species, which included some of our migrants including the Garden Warbler, Blackcap and Willow Warblers. We were also pleased to hear the distant Cuckoo. our area especially with Garden Warblers and Willow Warblers, with all the regular territories taken up but lots more new territories formed as well. It's really good to report good news for a change. I have not yet done my annual Redstart survey, but already I have had the Kelker bird calling from his usual spot!

Just as you may expect, the lovely Purple Orchids Early have been outstanding, with several hundred on the top of Burton Fell and again a couple of hundred at the top of Holme Stinted Pastures. I managed to check most of the variables which are of particular interest to me, and did find a couple of nice mixed tone colours amongst the many magenta offerings. Our sole double pure white albino Early Purple Orchid in Lancelot did come through OK again this year and did start to look stunning but sadly got taken down by hare or rabbit just before its prime. I think perhaps I will try and cage this one in readiness for next year's appearance.

We are having a great year with the Fly Orchids just starting to flower (20 May), I have done a rough survey from the six sites I have found on Hutton Roof and our total numbers stand at 30 flowers (approx.). Already only last week we found a further 7 new to us plants to

add to the records (thanks to help from Dr. Richard "Hawkeye")

The primulas have been phenomenal this year with good numbers of Primrose, but an exceptional yield of Cowslip especially in the areas of Dalton Crags (deforested) and parts of upper Lancelot.

Our beautiful Angular Solomon's Seal came on very quickly, it had shoots of 2" by the 5 May, yet within ten days the first flowers were showing from the same plant. I have so far checked out about 10 populations out of our total of 40 populations on Hutton Roof and most of them are looking great.

Our rare ferns are looking pristine at the moment, especially the unravelling new Rigid Buckler Ferns and the Limestone Ferns, I need to get up on the very top and check out our special Holly Ferns soon.

Last months (May) butterflies so far have included a lovely Holly Blue on Burton Fell (record via Robert Ashworth), also I had my first Dingy Skipper at Plain Quarry on 21 May and I have recorded, Peacocks, Orange Tips, Speckled Woods, Large Whites and Green Veined Whites. One day I decided to do some photography of plant shoots and to see how long it was

before they reached a mature flower and in some cases it was only a question of a fortnight from "the off".

Four of our village Swifts arrived back by 7.30pm on the evening of May 3 and by May 11 the numbers had swelled up to 15 birds. We held our first Swift watch on 17 May when members of our group met at the Memorial Hall at 8pm and did a count of all the regular nest sites. We did establish at least one of the regular sites being used. It's very early days yet! If anyone would like to join us why not come along on a Thursday night. The next game was against a very young Carnforth 3rd team. Holme bowled them out for only 50, with skipper Sam bamboozling them with his leg spin in taking 4-17. There was a first senior wicket for Ethan Burton in the innings and plenty more to follow I'm sure. In reply Holme knocked them off in only 13 overs without losing a wicket as Neil Moysey, playing a few classic hockey shots in his 40 not out, was ably supported by Olly Wolfenden (8 not out).

The Bank Holiday fixture was away at Arnside away. The hosts scored 257-5 and declared after 38 overs. B. Till scored a century. Holme batted doggedly with Moysey once again to the fore as he made a career high 65. At the end of their 42 overs Holme had scored 120-8, not enough for any points but a spirited resistance against one of the Division's stronger sides.
