PC Observations...

J.M. Reporting from the Parish Council meeting

delegation from Cocking Yard dominated the Open Forum at July"s Council meeting. They came complain about the noise, the smell and the general disruption caused by vans loading and unloading at the butcher's shop from 5am and throughout the day. Residents have complained directly to the shop, but to no effect so far. The shop owned by David Crayston but leased to Brown's of Littledale, originally as a retail outlet, has turned into a wholesale supplier. The vans block access to residents' houses and are a health hazard as well because they attract flies and leave detritus on the pavement. Councillors were very sympathetic and offered to write a letter to Public Protection at South Lakeland District Council to ask an investigation. They urged residents to do the same on the basis the more noise about unacceptable situation, the better the chance of some positive action.

Marion Plowright, also in the Public Forum, picked up on the situation with the butcher and possibly echoing what many villagers think, asked "what is happening to our village?" New housing, more traffic and greater

demand on an already stretched village infrastructure from incoming residents maior concern. Pedestrians through the village are already having to cope with narrow pavements. The school is at full capacity. The road through the village positively is dangerous at times. Drainage and flood protection measures are inadequate. The quality of life for villagers is under threat!

The proposed residential housing development at Boon Town by South Lakeland Housing - 29 houses - was the next item on the agenda. No detailed plans have been submitted but a consultation meeting has already been held to which villagers were invited. Councillors are observing a "watching brief" but the usual concerns were voiced – drainage, capacity, more demand on the school. pedestrian access from Boon Town to the school and village shop. Moreover, had a "Needs Analysis" for more housing been carried out? The architect at the consultation meeting seemed unaware of these capacity pressures, which is worrying.

Amongst other issues discussed:

1. A fund to support the centenary commemoration of the end of the First World War was approved

- 4. Action from Cumbria County Council to clear out drains and gullies is promised from 8 August.

- 6. The PSICA conservation initiative for the central area of Burton will pick up again with updates in Burton News from October.
- 7. A brass plaque to honour 6 First World War servicemen whose names are missing from the stone plaque in the church will be put in place before the centenary in November and wooden crosses will be used to mark servicemen's graves for the centenary.

their own holiday leaflets and finishing their work on 'The Lonely Beast'. They had an interesting visit to the Barrow Lifeboat Station at Roa Island and witnessed the boat returning from a real emergency. They have also enjoyed kick rounders on the school field.

Year 2's writing was focused on 'the best summer holiday ever'. It could be based on travelling to the moon or something a little more ordinary! They also learnt about Christopher Columbus and their writing involved creating a diary as if they were Columbus and how he may have felt on his travels. They have completed their Andy Goldsworthy art sculptures using only what nature provides, and they finished adverts for the perfect their job explorer.

Years 3 and 4 had a relaxing visit to the Manjushri Temple in Ulverston. It is a centre of meditation, open to everyone to enjoy peaceful surroundings. They enjoyed learning about how Buddhists live and the positive effects of

meditation. Year 3 are continuing to study the Ancient Greeks and this time they turned their attention to the history of the Olympic Games, with a carousel of ancient Olympic games in PE. Position and direction was the focus for their Numeracy and they created their own game of Battleships, using coordinates. In Literacy they have been sillv sentences creating subordinate clauses, and in Art they have been looking at the work of Roy Lichtenstein and creating their own Pop Art!

Year 4 have been focusing persuasive writing and studying how adverts encourage us to buy things we may not even need or want! Two pupils from Year 4 joined two pupils from Year 5 for the last South Lakeland Pupil Parliament (SLPP) meet of the school year in Grange-over-Sands. They meet 3 times a year with 12-13 other primary schools to learn about democracy, local and national issues, and learn how to debate issues respecting other people's opinions.

Pupils from Years 5 and 6 usually go, but we were all busy on our Bikeability week, so two Year 4 pupils got an early introduction to the SLPP and they will now be the new reps along with the existing Year 5s, who will move into Year 6.

Along with our contribution to SLPP we had a great morning celebrating the achievements efforts and of the Suffragette movement. We had an 'Equaliteas' morning, with our information pack coming directly from the Houses of Parliament. We shared cups of tea (and juice for those not so keen on tea) and cake - of course - and played a game about the progress of the Suffragettes. It is 100 years since Parliament passed the Representation of the People Act 1918, which allowed the first women and all men to vote. We learnt a lot about the hard work and suffering of some amazing women.

Year 5 enjoyed a STEM morning with Dallam School. STEM stands for Science, Technology, Engineering and STEM is supported by the Government, charities and employers who want to encourage young people to engage and achieve in STEM subjects. They work in schools and colleges across the UK. Year 6 entered a competition to create a new invention. Working in groups, we received four distinctions and one highly commended award for a solar powered charger for a laptop, a solar panel controller for a PS4 and Xbox1 and a rubbish bin that can turn waste into power.

For the last two weeks of school we were in charge of our own display boards in our classroom and were allowed to choose any topic we wanted. It has made us realise that presenting work needs planning, accurate measuring and patience to create an



interesting board and show the right message. Teamwork was key!

Our school will open again on Tuesday 4 September, so the next input from the new Year 6 class will be in the October issue.

Roger Reports...

From the County & District Councils

Summer - especially when 'it's a phew what a scorcher'- brings its own opportunities and problems. Farmers literally made hay while the sun shone but then worried about lack of water. Similarly, as the highways teams were gritting melting tar surfaces I was already nagging the council to make sure that our gullies were cleaned out in order to cope with the inevitable cloud burst finale. Meanwhile, some local fire fighters joined in attempts to Saddleworth douse the conflagration. But the Milnthorpe Brigade wasn't initially called on as the team had to be available to deal with emergencies on the M6.

Also on transport, at the full county council angry views were expressed about the break down of the rail service on the Oxenholme to Windermere line caused by - 're-scheduled' time tables. Doubts were also raised about the 'belt and braces' retention of the emergency bus service after the train service resumed on 2 July.

The glorious weather also brought a record attendance at the Appleby Horse Fair. A local member disputed Police claims that the event had gone off peaceably and, along with

councillors, quoted instances of misbehaviour allegedly caused travellers. Nearer to us, there were several problems in Kirkby Lonsdale and, within our Lower Kentdale Ward, at Hutton Roof but I didn't hear of any issues at Burton. As a member of the Police and Crime Commission panel I have mentioned these worries to the Commissioner.

A bigger row resulted when one political group accused those reporting problems as being racists, as some travellers are apparently designated as being an ethnic minority. This was news to me even though the Lancaster school where I was senior teacher for 17 years had one of the highest proportions of children from travelling families in the land.

'On the roads' I am supporting the recommendations of a government report that the speed limit should be reduced to less than 60 MPH on narrow lanes. It has always seemed silly to me that, while over the years I have helped extend limits on the A6070, off the main





road 'careless' drivers can increase their speed to up to 60 MPH, for instance up Dalton and Clawthorpe Lanes and also on the narrow routes across the mosses. On Moss Lane I am still pressing for the over-deep ditch at the junction by Storth Machinery to be made shallower.

Several in-house matters also concerned the council. It turns out that. despite previous assertions, it is now legal for members to film debates on their mobile phones providing they remain seated and don't scan the public gallery. I joined in more serious complaints about delays in officers providing written responses questions raised at council. It took six weeks to get an answer to my complaint that, after the council took over social work for deaf people, they have to employ interpreters to go along with the social worker whereas the Cumbria Deaf Association's carers can lip read and use British Sign Language.

Next month I will report on a survey I and a council officer hope to have made on our highways including road signs - many of which need cleaning or replacing - or even removing altogether. Please keep me informed.

HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE

by Roger Bingham

BURTON ON THE PHONE

Eighty years ago Burton was in decline. The population, which in 2011 was just on 1500, was 528 in the 1931 census, compared to 578 in 1906, and 673 in declining picture was 1821. This observed by William Palmer in his 'Verge of Lakeland' of 1938. He talked to the postmaster Robert Bell who admitted, "the place is in decay, the inn signs and everything else is shocking short of paint. The people don't buy here as they used to. It is into the bus and off to Lancaster or Kendal". As we talked the bell of the telephone exchange (which was in a semidetached house on Boon Walks) kept ringing four times in as many minutes. "That's the only thing" the real life Mr Bell said "that keeps us awake - and mostly it's orders for towns. There's no industry here.'

Yet a look at the Burton and Holme Telephone Directory both confirms and contradicts this gloomy view. To begin with there were only 44 premises on the phone. This was not so unusual, as when in 1941 my parents got 'the phone in' our number was Milnthorpe

54, in a place with 1000 inhabitants, while my father's Stoneleigh Surgery number was just Milnthorpe 7. Burton the Post Office was number 1 and the Squire C.W.L. Penrhyn-Hornby was 2, while Mr J.B. Hoyle at Burton's next biggest residence at Underfell was number 16. Other private numbers were Miss Bradshaw 34; Joseph Davis 22; M L Greenshields 38; Miss Lees at Burton Hall 11; Miss Lindsay 29 and Professional Captain Marton 30. numbers were headed by Dr William Howell Robertson at Rye Croft 5 and the Rev W.Y. Potter 12. But neither the District nor Martins Bank, which like the solicitor L.G. Powell of Talbot, Rheam Webster of Milnthorpe attended half a day week in Burton, had phones.

The more go-ahead trades people on phone included P. Cumminas 15; G.E. Dobson, engineer 17; J. Ireton Cattle Dealer 7; G.H. Penell Cars for Hire 10; and W. Taylor General Stationer 4. Despite Mr Bell's pessimism, industry represented by Wm Goodacre & Sons Ltd at Holme Mills 28; Holme Park Lime Stone Co.; 9. Burton and Holme Station was 27; the Police Station 21; and the Station Hotel 25.

Businesses not on the phone. according to Kelly's Directory, included



Well the Orchids are well over now! Where usually they would have gone on into the middle of August, but all this dry weather has wreaked havoc causing severe dehydration to both our Orchids and for that matter lots of other plants as well. I guess a term could be summed up as "short lived bloom".

but most of the Dark Red Not all, Helleborines came through OK, but quickly went over, and the heavier build rare hybrids (Schmalhauseneii) which I quess need far more rain to survive all suffered with stunted growth and quite a lot just gave up midway during their growth and eventually receded back to the ground. Also I checked my regular study area on Burton Fell where we have over 150 of the Broad Leaved Helleborines and none of them made it to full maturity. Again they too suffered with severe dehydration and just gave up. I had three that did produce a few flowers at the bottom of their bent-over spikes and that was it. If you do want to see some of the photos I took of the orchids then please feel free to visit my orchid blog at: www.epipactisatrorubens.blogspot.com

and then go to the left pane and click over "Diary pages for 2018" and you will see all that's been going on with the Orchids.

The wild thyme was obviously suffering, with very little on show, compared to most years when you would normally see it everywhere, especially on the sides of ant hills, but the fritillaries (Dark Green Fritillary) just had to make do with modest amounts this year because the dry weather had severely limited the quantity around. Hypericums were suffering by being stunted or just not coming through in their normal numbers. There was little in the way of Common Rock Rose with full colonies having been naturally burnt out and subsequently I have to report far lower records of the rare Northern Brown Argus butterfly and the blues.

Most of the butterflies were around in reasonable numbers and I had good records of the regulars including Dark Green Fritillaries, Small Heaths, Ringlets, Meadow Browns, Small Skippers, Speckled Woods. It was also recorded that the rare High Brown Fritillery had been seen over in Holme Stinted Pasture.

Our village Swifts seem to have done well this year with so far 25 sites recorded (19 July 2018), but we

hopefully still have more to add yet. It's such a shame but by the time you are reading this, it is possible that guite a lot of our Swifts will have left the village and be on their way back to Africa. The return migration from our village usually starts somewhere around the 28 July, with follow ups during the early days of August. Each week during the Swift season we have held "Swift Watch" when villagers meet up at the Burton Memorial Hall and go around the various Swift nesting sites in the village recording the Swifts activity and which established nest sites are active. Over the 5 years we have built up quite a comprehensive record, which has been so useful in many respects. It also helps to be able to pass on this information in regards to local building and planning concerns. If you would like to check out our devoted Swift pages and the records then please check out the site of the Burton Swift Bird Study Group on the following blog address at: www.burtonswiftbirdstudygroup.blogsp ot.com

A lot of the birds have stopped singing now and the Warblers having actually started going back to Africa. I have had very few Willow Warblers singing during the past month, in fact the odd ones I have had have been giving their contact call of "hou-whit" rather than their full song. The redstarts gave up singing about one month ago. Next month (August) will be the time to check out for returning Spotted Flycatchers and Whinchat, which normally call off around the Hutton Roof areas on their way back.

STAYING WELL!

STAYING SAFE IN THE HEAT THIS SUMMER

Local NHS health leaders want us to know how to enjoy the hot weather without ending up with heat exhaustion.

After weeks of blue skies and recordbreaking temperatures, health leaders in Morecambe Bay are urging people to keep cool and stay hydrated.

Forecasts for the high temperatures are set to continue and with that comes the risk of conditions like heat exhaustion. Heat exhaustion is not usually serious and gets better when you cool down. If it turns into heat stroke it needs to be treated as an emergency.

Signs of heat exhaustion include: headache, dizziness and confusion, loss of appetite and feeling sick, excessive sweating and pale, clammy skin, cramps in the arms, legs and stomach, fast breathing or pulse, temperature of 38C or above, intense thirst, children may also seem floppy and sleepy.

The heat can also exacerbate problems for people with long term conditions including asthma and so it's important that people with asthma have their blue reliever inhaler with them at all times, especially in warm weather.

Advice for keeping safe in the heat: Try to keep out of the sun between 11am to 3pm.

Have cool baths or showers, and splash yourself with cool water.

Drink cold drinks regularly, such as water and diluted fruit juice. Avoid excess alcohol, caffeine (tea, coffee and cola) or drinks high in sugar.

Apply sunscreen of at least SPF15 with UVA protection.

Wear loose, cool clothing, and a hat and sunglasses if you go outdoors.

Look out for others especially vulnerable groups such as older people, young children and babies and those with serious illnesses.

Plan ahead to make sure you have enough supplies, such as food, water and any medications you need.

Never leave anyone in a closed, parked vehicle.

As part of this ongoing process, two draft policies are now available for patient and public engagement and feedback. These policies are: the commissioning of photorefractive surgery for the correction of refractive error (laser eye surgery for common sight problems); policy for the

Hilary Fordham, Chief Operating Officer at Morecambe Bay CCG, said:

"Morecambe Bay CCG is responsible for commissioning a wide range of clinical services, including secondary (hospital), community and mental health services and for paying for those services, for and on behalf of, the local population. In some areas this also includes commissioning GP services.

"We need to ensure this is done in an open, fair and transparent manner but in so doing we must consider the limited resources we have.

"A key role for the CCG is to develop clinical policies that help us make decisions about the use of those limited resources.

"I would encourage any resident with an interest in these policies to visit the CCG website and have their say."




