

Don't Bash our Butcher's!

I was upset to read the article condemning our village butcher's in last month's issue, and am writing on behalf of the many villagers who consider them priceless!

We have an amazing village shop thanks to Akis, Gill and the ladies, a highly-rated primary school, a pub... and the butcher's. In most small communities all independent commerce has been pushed out. We are so lucky to have the shop and the butcher's, who support the local economy, provide us with amazing local products, and bring life to our village.

Having lived in a big city before Burton, I know the flip-side. We had no option but big supermarkets, whose meat is far from local, and of a more questionable provenance (not to mention the environmental impact of shipping it across the world - New Zealand lamb?!) John and the team know their cuts and what to do with them. Most importantly, he knows the provenance of stock. John can usually tell you the very beast it's from, nevermind which farm.

If the people of Burton would rather be stuck with only supermarket stuff, anonymously transported across the continent and beyond, often intensively-reared in cruel and inhumane

environments, then more pity us. We would lose a gem which has provided for this community for more than 60 years.

What last month's article also doesn't mention is that the butcher's has not been found wanting in any of the council's checks. They haven't criticised the butcher's for any 'noise', 'smell' or 'general disruption'. As for 'detritus' on the pavement - several objects pointed out as animal fat were clarified to be pebbles. The butcher's load up twice a week at 5am to stock local markets. If that's a nuisance...let's support them! If we gave them enough business, they wouldn't have to journey to Manchester and Liverpool to stock farmer's markets there.

It is understandable that a veggie or vegan will be upset by butchery - but the butcher's has stood on that spot for more than 60 years, and the majority of us do eat meat. Any campaigning could start with the horrible industrial conditions supermarket meats suffer.

If we do kill animals for food, we should try to do it in the most humane way, buying local and free-range. We could spend a little more on the local, tasty, well-reared stock the butcher's sells, and eat meat a little less often, rather than bulk-buying low-quality supermarket meat.

I hope those of us who really appreciate having a butcher's in the village will show them our support by shopping there more - it would be a massive loss to the village to lose their presence after so many decades.

PC Observations...

of the Parish Council meeting

There were two issues brought up in the Open Forum when residents can comment. First, Peter Cummings commented that the recent (8 August) Flood Investigation Meeting following requests by Councillors for county council action to investigate serious flooding in Burton on 12 September and 22 November 2017 had left the situation 'up in the air'. A useful report had been produced identifying some of the causes (inadequate drainage capacity, blocked gullies and culverts, broken sewers caused by gas and electricity workmen), but future action was going to be inhibited by lack of resources especially funds to implement any remedial action. One thing the Council could do was to help set up a Village Flood Forum to keep the pressure on county council Highways Department to repair and maintain the infrastructure that does exist. The Forum could also be a central hub for warning the Highways Department about 'hot spots' which needed urgent action. Councillors voted unanimously to support such a Forum and Councillor Chris Nolan agreed to lead this initiative.

A second issue was raised in the Public Forum about the response to the Council's letter to SLDC's Environmental Health Section about possible health hazards from the butcher's shop. An inspection had been carried out and this had concluded that NO ACTION was needed.

The location of a new Dog Waste Bag Dispenser donated by Carnforth Pet Care led to a lively debate about various options. The eventual winner was at the top of Station Lane near the bench which leads to walks along the canal.

Other topics/invitations mentioned by Councillors included:

- An invitation to residents to attend a 'Show and Tell' meeting about B4RN developments on 12 September. This whole-day event takes place in Melling and more information can be found at <https://b4rn.org.uk/news/>.
- A 'Meet the Villages' event organised by the Landscape Trust taking place in Burton and surrounding villages. This year's event is a Four Day Farleton Festival from Friday 14 to Monday 17 September. The event will explore the high ground of Farleton Knott, Holme Park Fell and Hutton Roof Crag and the villages around the base of this fine hill

- Farleton, Clawthorpe, Holme, Burton, Dalton and Hutton Roof. This festival will include lectures and exhibitions at Burton Memorial Hall and many walks exploring the karst scenery, flora, fauna, history and art of the area. All events are free.

- The on-going initiative to include 6 unrecognised veterans during the centenary of the end of the First World War in November.
- The agreement to plant more daffodils near Heron Syke at the end of September to welcome people to Burton.

FLOODING

The Flood Investigation Report Open Meeting

On 8 August, Colin Parkes and Doug Coyle from Cumbria County Council (CCC) met with invited residents in the Memorial Hall to discuss the flood investigation report they had prepared following two major flood events in Burton on 12 September and 22 November 2017. CCC is the lead local flood authority and they were legally required to respond following these incidents.

The residents listened with interest and patience to the explanations about the three 'hot spots' - The Square, The Creamery and the area at the bottom of Neddy Hill. The report documents how the flooding occurred - the reasons being extraordinary levels of rainfall and the inadequate infrastructure capacity to drain the water away aggravated by the water bringing with it large amounts of gravel and detritus which blocked culverts and gullies. CCC had clearly taken the survey seriously and residents were generally pleased to see their effort.

However, the recommended actions were less impressive. Although they

include repairs to culverts, diversion of water flows, better maintenance and further investigations of infrastructure issues, it became obvious that the different agencies involved do not talk to each other in a coordinated way and that actual action would be delayed by shortages of resources and especially funds. A 'resilience forum' was suggested to try and bring different agencies together. Residents and local property owners should act to ensure that their properties were protected, including laying sandbags, moving valuables, installing flood gates and letting CCC know of anticipated flooding threats.

Very calmly and constructively, residents started to respond with comments such as 'we've been telling you for many years with no action', 'Highways Department are part of the problem resurfacing roads with adverse cambers and failing to maintain gullies as legally required' and 'why not prioritise short term and cheap actions'.

Colin and Doug lamented previous failings and showed good will by staying on to listen to individual cases of flooding on residents' properties together with ideas to allay future incidents. A new Cumbria Strategic (i.e. long term) Flood Partnership could be set up they proposed but how could

residents have faith in such a body being able to do anything tangible in the short term? As one resident asked at the end of the meeting 'what can we take away from this meeting?' They hoped to hear some purposeful and actionable scheme to help but red tape, the difficulty of organising multi-agency dialogues and a lack of resources may well obfuscate this and leave the only effective action as local community action and further lobbying of CCC as the lead local flood authority.

Pray for no downpours - divine intervention might be the only recourse!

FLOOD FORUM

Following the recent meeting held in the Memorial Hall on the 8 August 2018 by Cumbria County Council, updating those who attended on the efforts made so far and of the

provisional plans made to prevent a repeat of the recent flooding, it has been decided to set up a parish-wide flood forum.

Whilst the information presented by the Council was informative and promising, it did not go far enough, and these plans do not in anyway start soon enough to help those affected in the past and those who may be affected next time.

It is planned that the forum will act as a mouth piece and information centre for the Parish. Giving people a chance to air their views and concerns, to give people a chance to put forward ideas that the Council may have over looked, to share with the council local knowledge of water ways, buried historical water courses etc. All information presented to the Forum will be shared with the County Council in order to assist in a speedier resolution.

Information, advice and links to services and will be available through the Forum to all interested parties. This information will cover things such as what to do in the event of a flood, how to prevent or minimise flooding to your home, flood resilience measures etc, who to contact in the event of a flood, and when available, how to claim financial assistance to carry out flood defences to your home.

It is hoped to set up a web site in the very near future containing all the above information, but, until then please let me know by email of your interest, your concerns and of any help you can give or if I can be of any help to you.

Roger Reports...

From the County & District Councils

August, as always was quiet with many 'officers on leave'. Even so, I toured Burton with a highways officer. Many repairs and the provision of new signs have been achieved. But, yet again, gullies especially on the A6070 opposite the church, grass is growing through the gratings. I have also passed on complaints about the breakdown of the 'smiley' speed warning sign near the school although this is a parish and not a county responsibility.

Pre-holiday pressures were aggravated by big rows over the chronic persistence of pot holes, the acute failure of the Oxenholme to Windermere railway service, the county's delays in repairing the broken-down Windermere Ferry, and widespread grumbles about damaged bridges like Crooklands Bridge and closed ones like Badgergate Bridge at Hutton Roof. Moreover, if anything, councillors routine work is greater than ever. In July, I seemed to have county meetings in Carlisle or Kendal almost every day, plus SLDC's main summer Council and two Human Resources Committees.

With the Burton and Crooklands Ward's

boundary extension having included nine parishes, getting round the parish councils consumes more time. In the county, apart from the Barrow area, our Lower Kentdale County Division is furthest away from Cumbria's Carlisle HQ than any other. To save on officer's time and travel the county no longer rotates important meetings round the main towns like Barrow, Whitehaven and Kendal. I do not, as yet, know whether, after taking into account members' extra travel costs, if any overall savings have been achieved.

A district council economy to cut down on paper and postage by increasing on-line communication has created objections on SLDC. Although I have used a computer for over 30 years I still believe that councils expecting members to have IT skills amounts to imposing an educational qualification on candidates - which may be contrary to the Representation of the People Act. I know of several county, district and parish councillors who, although they may have a home computer, rely on others to help them. Planning applications pose a particular problem

for parish councils where the clerk often distributes paper copies to the PC planning sub-committee. But, if only a smaller computer with an A4 size print-out was to be available then important architectural details might be missed, especially on Listed Building applications like those for the Royal Hotel.

Nevertheless, savings still have to be made of £80m pa in the county's next budgets, especially as the recent pay award of between 2% and 3½% for staff and teachers will increase the salaries bill. Other increasing costs are bound up with the needs of our older population. Already, adult social care costs twice what is spent on highways, despite 'the state of our roads' remaining the public's biggest grumble. Similar problems persist concerning my work as a member of the Police and Crime Commission. Only 65% of police finances cover crime and motoring. Dealing with missing people like teenagers leaving home and older adults 'getting to wandering' are particularly expensive, as the mental health service may be involved. In case of mental health problems a Single Point 24 hour round the clock access number of 0300 123 9015 might be useful.

Cumbria Police has now been officially rated as 'good'. Even so in 2017/18

crime increased by 12.4% for all categories, except homicide, to 3,144 incidents which the Commission states is, "largely attributable to improved crime reporting." Thanks to the rise in police tax the number of officers has increased by 25 to 1145. Police and community support officers are now trained as retained fire fighters. This is part of the programme for amalgamating the 'Blue Light' Police, Ambulance, and Fire and Rescue Services which, it is claimed, will increase efficiency and reduce demands on the council tax. We'll see!

VICAR'S LETTER...

Life Explored

“All men seek happiness. This is without exception.” So said Blaise Pascal, the 17th century inventor, writer, theologian, physicist and mathematician (remember Pascal’s Triangle?)

We’re all looking for happiness but it’s not obvious to us how we can find it. Life can be good and satisfying, but so much is bad and disappointing too. And when we do find happiness in something or someone we learn by painful experience not to assume that it will last forever.

Blaise Pascal described how there *“was once in man a true happiness of which there now remains to him only the mark and empty trace, which he in vain tries to fill from all his surroundings”*. Pascal recorded on a piece of paper his sense of the spiritual inferno in his mind as he realised at the age of 31 how that aching void in his life must be filled: *“Fire. ‘God of Abraham, God of Isaac, God of Jacob,’ not of philosophers and scholars. Certainty, certainty, heartfelt, joy, peace. God of Jesus Christ ... Joy, joy, joy, tears of joy ...”*

Life Explored is an informal and relaxed group where you can think and talk about these things. Each session includes a stunning short film and provocative discussion questions. Short presentations help us to engage with the traditional understandings of age-old Bible texts that are often perplexing to contemporary minds.

Life Explored is for anyone who wants to find contentment and happiness in life. It’s run by ordinary local Christian people and is completely free. You don’t need to know anything about the Bible, and you won’t be asked to pray or sing. You can ask any question you like, or you can just sit and listen.

HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE

by Roger Bingham

1938 A TROUBLED SUMMER

For long afterwards, the summer of 1938 was remembered as the time when Britain nearly went to war with Germany for the second time in less than 20 years. The cause was that Hitler's Nazi regime wanted to take over the German-speaking part of Czechoslovakia. Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain expressed general astonishment 'when he said it was incredible that we should be about to go to war over a far away country about which we know nothing.' He would be equally astonished that, nowadays, local lads go to the Czech capital, Prague, for stag nights!


Yet, despite possibly being oblivious to mid-European geography, Burton folk in 1938 wearily prepared for war. Most plans concentrated on air-warfare. It was feared that Burton might have air battles overhead as the RAF would repel invaders away from heavily populated areas like Barrow and Preston. It was also claimed that Burton required extra protection because, with Holme Mills and a main railway line, it was classed as an 'industrial village'.

Consequently, an Air Road Precautions team was organised with a rota of ARP Wardens, each responsible for 250 people. They received 15 hours anti-gas instruction at Milnthorpe and collected gas masks from Kendal Town Hall, where 3,000 masks were distributed 'daily from 8am to 10pm except Sundays'. Three sizes were available including Mickey Mouse masks for children - but cradle-type masks for babies were not yet ready. Requests for masks for horses, farm stock and pets were ignored.

Meanwhile, normal life continued. A village collection brought in £2:13s:10d for 'Waifs and Strays' - which is now called the Church of England Children's Society. Presentations were made to Miss Corless when she retired after 40 years teaching at Morewood School.

With 326 extra council houses being planned for Sandylands in Kendal there were demands for more rural homes. In Burton, a court case secured possession of a house in Cocking Yard so that it could be modernised to avoid its being 'condemned.'

Regrettably, it was a lousy summer. Storms brought down trees and floods swept caravans away in the Lake District. Even so, Burton men's 'trip' to





Alston and the Choir's outing to Blackpool went ahead.

At a drenched Burton Show entries had dropped. Compared to 1935, cattle were down from 69 to 61 and sheep from 90 to 76. Surprisingly, heavy farm horses were up from 88 to 101, perhaps indicating that tractors had not caught on, although they had been introduced in what was now being called the 'last war'.

During show week war fears peaked. Querulously, the Prime Minister flew on his third peace mission to Germany. Back home, school children were evacuated from London and, locally, it was headlined that '20,000 refugees from the north-east to be billeted in Westmorland'. As there were no public air-raid shelters, householders were advised to dig 'emergency trenches', in their gardens.

Then, on 1 October, Armageddon was averted when Neville Chamberlain returned from a Conference at Munich to proclaim a settlement made with the 'German Fuehrer and Chancellor Herr Hitler'. This he believed could bring 'peace for our time'. But Burton's euphoria was dimmed when the electricity failed at the evening thanksgiving service.

It was on the 28 July that the majority of our village Swifts left us to start their long journeys back to Africa and since then the Main Street has been almost silent and we have not been hearing the familiar screams coming from our most welcomed guest.

After saying all that guess what! We still have one pair of Swifts in the skies above Burton or we did have at the time I am penning this (20 August). I can't be 100% but think the late breeder could well be holing up in the front of the Royal Cottage. I guess for me it's quickly becoming a record for our village that we should have a family of Swifts staying with us so long.

I am trying to get up to the Holme Stinted Pastures regular to check out if any Willow Warblers or Chiffchaff have dropped in overnight, taking their rest whilst on their annual migration, and on most days at this time of year you may just about hear their part contact calls giving away their presence. Also I go on to Holme Park Fell in search of Wheatears and Whinchat which usually drop in to these areas.

This is the week when I also try and get up Lancelot Clark Storth (Cumbria Wildlife), because just higher up than the Memorial Seat there is every chance of seeing returning Spotted Flycatchers which stop off at this point. I had one year up to 12 of the birds which obviously indicated there must have been more than one family party present. Also on the same equivalent routing I have found them in the lower part of Dalton Crag. (Usually around the 21 August in most years).

The bird observatories are now starting to record high numbers of Willow Warblers, Tree Pipits, Wheatears, Whinchats, Flycatchers calling off so I guess that's the sign that the main migrants are on their way back to Africa, with most of the adult Cuckoos having already arrived back in Africa. Our young Hutton Roof Cuckoos should also now have started their long migrations.

Some of the Swallows have started their return very early this year with high numbers leaving the country already e.g. on the 7 August there were 2247 counted down in Gloucestershire and over 200 going through Spurn Observatories. To back this up I was also kindly sent a photo from Ed Duckett (6 August) which showed over 140 Swallows collecting on his

telegraph wires at Clawthorpe, which I took to be an indication that they were getting ready for leaving us and this would also tie in exactly with the large numbers recorded elsewhere and mentioned earlier (7 Aug). Usually I start to look out for returning Swallows from about the first week in September, but this year they are going for it early.

It will not be long now before I start my bird migration counting (vismig or visible migration) on a regular daily basis because, before we know it, we will be getting lots and lots of Meadow Pipits, Chaffinch, Wagtails and a host of others moving through our area, all heading south. I usually start counting from about the 10 September and continue this through until after the Thrushes and Starlings have arrived at somewhere around 10 November. We will be hearing our first Pink Footed Geese arriving from Iceland within the next fortnight (usually from about the 14 September).

Not much about flora-wise at the moment but one very nice plant I am eagerly awaiting has to be the Autumn Gentian which will be showing on Hutton Roof and Farleton by the end of August and early September. I am told it's been a cracking year for Wild Mushrooms.

Lots of butterflies but mainly Whites, although I have also had quite a few Grayling this year.

And don't forget the Farleton and Hutton Roof Festival with lots of activities going on: Walks, Talks etc. (with lots of activities being held in and around Burton and the Memorial Hall.) Check out the full 32-page programme on my website at: <https://arnsidesilverdale.blogspot.com/>

The Big Summer Pebble Art Hunt



One of the most popular activities for children this Summer seems to have been pebble art. The idea being that youngsters collect up small stones and paint or otherwise decorate them, then hide them around the village or further afield, for other children to find.



A few Burton parents formed a group on Facebook to promote the idea and it has really taken off, with pebbles being hidden around the village, left on the doorsteps of friends, and even taken on holiday and left in places such as London and Anglesey for others to find.



The Facebook group now has over a hundred members and posts photos daily of the pebbles the children are decorating, and then photos of when they find pebbles left by others.

News from the Lancaster Canal...

Canal & River Trust admit to massive leak on the Lancaster canal.

In an article in the *Floater Magazine* August 2018, Canal & River Trust (C&RT) say either water is being stolen, or there is a massive leak from Killington, where 20 million litres per day are recorded, as usual, going into the system, but very little reaches the canal.

Water going under the M6 at Millness is over three notches below the normal 500 mark. This causes a slow current, a build up of silt and of course, encourages excessive weed growth, that slows the water current down even further.

This bodes ill for the intended bi-centenary planned for June 2019, where trail-boats from all over the country are invited. At the last trail-boat festival in 2015, C&RT had to dredge the canal, regrettably in the nesting season, which many locals criticised, and the situation is now worse.

Add this to the leak estimated at 5,000 gallons per day at Cinderbarrow, reported to C&RT in 2014, and other listed leaks, there is no doubt that this is a serious problem, and there is a tremendous amount of work to be done before any festival can be successful, and it is hoped all canal organisations and enthusiasts rally round and try and work together to help.

Crooklands bridge

I am sure readers will be as concerned as I about the damage caused by heavy traffic to the grade II listed

Crooklands Bridge 166 on the Lancaster canal, near Kendal.

I have been reporting the damage to this lovely old bridge for some years, and note that recent damage has displaced the second course and moved the parapet top stones so much that they are now at risk of being pushed beyond the point of balance, which could result in the heavy parapet stones dropping into the canal or onto the canal towpath, risking injury to walkers.

This bridge, on a county road, was designed for horse and cart, and is clearly unable to cope with the heavy vehicles which use it to get to the weighbridge on the nearby industrial site.

There is talk of extending this site by a further 19 acres, which will only bring more heavy vehicles over a listed bridge which actually needs traffic to be diverted away from it. A junction with the A590 is surely a more sensible answer.

This would enable the Canal and Rivers Trust, which must be frustrated by the need to make constant repairs to this listed bridge, to effect a more permanent repair, thus ensuring that towpath walkers are not severely injured or killed.

I am very much hoping that Cumbria County Council and the Canal and River Trust can agree that the situation is becoming increasingly dangerous, and will be able to work together to remedy the situation.


