Local Government needs to become more "bottom up", and in order to return proper power and authority to those who live locally, here is an idea which your readers may like to get their teeth into....

- We should have an elected Regional Government for the North West, based at Preston.
- We should have one elected Unitary Authority for Cumbria, based (eventually) at Penrith.

Cumbria must speak with one strong voice (not very good at this) if it is to promote, and fight for, Cumbrian interests against the might of the "City States" of Manchester and Liverpool. Hence, it is crucial to have just one Unitary.

• The existing District Authorities should be disbanded, and be replaced by elected and re-empowered Town Councils (eg Kendal, Ulverston), Rural District Councils (eg South Cumbria), and Parish Councils.

I read with interest your article on broadband for Burton, and have every sympathy. The outlook for an ADSL service in Burton is not promising; certainly if you don't ask you will never get. However you may like to know that there is an organisation based in the village that has been doing more than most to try and remedy the situation.

In July 2002 the Country Land and Business Association (CLA) launched a national campaign, Broadband Rural Britain, to help speed rollout of affordable broadband in rural areas. We have had considerable media attention and have made progress in many areas.

- * We hosted at meeting at our Belgrave Square HQ for broadband campaign organisations including Broadband 4Britain, RDAs, DTI, DEFRA other interested parties.
- * The DTI invited The CLA to present the Business Case for Rural Broadband to the country's largest ever broadband conference at Birmingham NEC in November. David Hendon, Head of the DTI's Communications and Information Industries Directorate, categorically stated that rural businesses must have the same access to broadband as urban businesses.

Our campaign continues, and you can take some comfort in the fact that the CLA office in Burton is working as hard as anyone to help bring broadband to the countryside. To date we have received over 1500 messages of support; you can find out more on our web site at www.cla.org.uk in the campaigns section.

* We have met with the NW RDA, Cumbria Broadband Initiative and BT regionally to lobby for faster rollout and to gather support.

- * We have arranged for an Early Day Motion to be tabled in Parliament, stressing the importance of broadband in rural areas. This now has over 100 signatures of support from MPs
- * We are planning a series of broadband awareness days aimed specifically at rural communities in the north west.

You can still help by pre-registering your interest at www.bt.com/broadband and also by registering at www.cibi.org.uk - the Cumbria Broadband Initiative is doing tremendous work to deliver broadband to rural Cumbria, and by registering on their site, you will help them determine who gets it first.

Finally a quick note on trigger levels. According to our conversations with BT these represent the true costs of converting an exchange. Unfortunately smaller exchanges can actually cost more to enable, sometimes requiring building extensions and cooling systems to enable the equipment to work. BT has stated that it expects a three-year return on its investment, so perhaps you can see why some trigger levels do not appear to be logical. That said, we still believe improvements must be made to the registration system; 200 on-line gamers is one thing, but ten businesses must be valued at more than ten registrations. We are continuing to lobby on this point.



By the time you read this, the worst of winter will have retreated to its Arctic lair, leaving March to rake us with its bitter westerlies. The crocuses will be shuddering and we'll be longing still more for magnolias, primroses, hawthorn buds. It already seems as though it was another world when we (Rob Crawshaw and I) went up Jake's Rake on Pavey Ark,

Great Langdale, during the early-January freeze. Is it the finest mountain path in England? R. Pendlebury is credited with being the first to climb it, in the 1870s. I daresay the shepherds used it for centuries as a quick way up the mountain, avoiding the looseness of the scree slopes. The diagonal slash of it grooves from bottom right to top left of the cliff. The crag rears

above and below it, streaked black with damp. Stickle Tarn is cradled in the great basin of the corrie. Today everything is spellbound with sunlight, so calm that young guys on the summit are in their T-shirts.

The snow that must have fallen above 1000 feet in the past three days - has it given the Lakeland fells a miss and skimmed straight

over to the Pennines? Everything is bare and dry. The ghyll still rushes down the dale, its splashes frozen into frills of crystal on the stones. When we reach the tarn after an hour's steep slog, it's half ice, thin as plate glass, with exquisite shapes like palm fronds and cirrus clouds glazed into its surface. We buckle crampons onto our boots and the spikes bite into the thick plates and hoses of ice which fill every crevice. There could be no better grip for the feet. We can step up 5- or 10-foot ice-falls more securely than Vibram soles would cling on dry summer rock. Every now

and again, and often enough to be appetising, one of the steeper and longer grooves forces us really to climb, reaching high for a handhold, wedging a haunch against the side of a little gorge. On the saddle near the rowan about half-way up, snow has thickened. We can tell from the tracks that previous climbers must have found boots too

slippery and paused to strap on crampons.



All the way I'm in the company of happy and adventurous memories. Coming up here on summer days with daughter and sons and their boy- and girl-friends, with Anne, with Chris and other friends. And with

Shep the yellow labrador was the coollest of crag dogs and got halfway up, on ice, with unruffled aplomb. When we knew he wouldn't manage the one high (10-foot) rock step and turned back down, he loathed the slithering and finally balked. So we had to put a climber's tape loop and karabiner onto him, tie on the rope, and more or less thrown him down the

Rake - in perfect safety. Hardy the doberman climbed up to the rock step, clawed at it and found it beyond him, then allowed me to boost him up it, spreading his broad black 'hands' for further grip.

The oddest occasion was when I got back down and realised I'd left my camera somewhere up there. Too late to go back up as winter gloaming closed in. So next day, in thickly falling snow, I climbed up the Rake again, past snow-wreaths sagging off the ledges over the drop, and found my camera sitting on a flat rock near the summit. A little drift of snow was just starting to tail away from it. It had been my father's, a pre-War Voigtlander, and its fine German mechanism was intact.

Perhaps this year's find was stranger. As we sat amongst the summit rocks eating fried-

egg butties, I saw, in a neuk lined with snow, a single rosebud. Its outer petals were baked a biscuit brown. A flare of scarlet showed at its tip. Did someone come up here to kiss and propose? Probably the flower was grown in Colombia, flown over in the hold of a

Boeing, and trucked north from London before being left to dry out and blow away on the north-easterly which comes hissing across from Norway via Borrowdale.

TROUBLE can sum up in one word the activities of the District and County Councils over the last month. But, although I share in the general responsibility, I (for once) wasn't directly involved having been struck down by a sudden illness from which, thankfully, I have almost recovered. Thus I missed the Schools Organisation Committee where the decision

to close Lowick Primary School was confirmed following a change of heart from a new member after he had received a telephone call from another councillor. Amidst all the heartrending tales which have even reached the National Media most reports seem to have lost sight of

the crucial issue which is that the longer we (i.e. us Tax payers) keep tiny schools open we threaten the funding and, therefore, the viability of slightly larger schools. I think some months ago I explained that the annual cost to educate a child at Lowick is about £4,000 compared to half that figure at Greenodd School which is two and half miles down the road. Moreover, both schools are C. of E. Primaries serving, I understand, the same ecclesiastical parish and, it is said already half

the children from Lowick go to Greenodd. The number of children at Lowick is, however, boosted by other children being brought in from, reportedly, as far away as Walney Island. As far as I am aware the numbers/ viability situation has not changed in Lowick's favour for over a year - hence the County Cabinet's decision to close the school. Fortunately neither Burton Morewood nor Holme Schools are 'threatened'. But this does not lessen the sympathy which I am

> sure we all feel for the dedicated staff at Lowick, the marvellous support the school receives from parents and the community and, above all, the distress the children may suffer when they go to another school in the next village in September.

On the District Council Trouble, as so often, has been caused by the decision to close more Public Conveniences. As I have mentioned before the impetus has been National and European Health and Safety Regulations which by escalating the costs of upgrading and maintenance have contributed to the closure of HALF the Conveniences in the country since 1997. These figures are not my figures but those reported in a leader in The Times some months ago.



So far South Lakeland has closed about 20% of its Conveniences which is a lot better than the National Average; but so it should be as we are a tourist area.

This does not mean that I support the reported 'threat' to the Devil's Bridge or the Milnthorpe Square Toilets. The latter were rebuilt a cost £79,000 about 18 years ago while throughout the eleven years when I was Chairman of the old Environmental Health Committee the renewing of The Devil's Bridge Conveniences was a hoped for scheme. Under the new Constitution introduced in October 2001 decisions like the

closure of Toilets are made by SLDC's Cabinet. Major or controversial decisions are then confirmed -or rejected- by the relevant Scrutiny Committee and/ or by the full Council. So as Chairman of the Council I am anticipating a revolt against losing our (W.C.) chains!

Unlike The Lake District National Park which was severely criticized, South Lakeland got an excellent report from The National Audit Commission. SLDC was commended for its Financial Management, anti-fraud procedures, internal audit, up to date performance plan, IT programmes, Staff Training and Risk Management. Our Performance Data collection meets statutory requirements but could be improved and our 8% contingency fund was just "satisfactory" The Commission also noted the continuing streamlining of Scrutiny Committees in order to reduce duplication of meetings, the creation of an independent management trust for the Kendal Leisure Centre and some progress in the provision of Social Housing. The effect on resources of the Foot and Mouth Crisis was also acknowledged. Inevitably, no hopes were raised about any further financial help from Central Government. This is a pity for,

as I mentioned last month, The Council Tax for both the District and the County is likely to go up by at least 11% - better than many similar authorities and not as bad as our worst fears but still Bad Enough!

I have just returned from an Agenda Planning Meeting for the County Learning and Recreation Panel which I chair. The main topic will be the provision of Early Years Education. Central Government only subsidises full time education for Children starting school the term after their fifth birthday. Cumbria, however, has had a policy since, I think, 1974 of admitting "rising five's" who are children who

have reached the age of four. Thus under Cumbria's policy a child whose fourth birthday is in September could be admitted at once, or the next, January. Under the government's policy the child would not go to school for another year. The difference in cost amounting to millions has to be met by the Cumbria Council Tax Payers.

Much as I would prefer the government to meet this cost out of National taxation I still think it is right to let children of 4+ go to school.

But as always please let me know what you think. And despite all our Troubles Spring is on the way!



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An other Opinion...

Having been called out of retirement to do an "emergency cover" your correspondent was encouraged to find that most of the issues the Council is now dealing with are different from when I retired some two and a half years ago. Having said that, the problems of flooding on the A6070 at Clawthorpe and the discharge of sewage into the stream near Moss House Farm continue to rumble on! The infamous Capita plc now seems to have some responsibility for the flooding problem, and they maintain the drainage is working properly despite all the evidence to the contrary.

At least this meeting took place against a melodic background: the final rehearsals for the Burton AllStars Show, taking place the following day. I particularly enjoyed the rendition of House of The Rising Sun: well that gives my age away doesn't it? A bit of music is always helpful to get you through the more boring bits of meetings, especially when you don't really understand what is going on!

Apparently there is a new scheme called Vital Villages, under which Burton can bid for a £10,000 transport grant jointly with Holme. As ever the bureaucracy is in danger of overwhelming the initiative. To apply we will need yet another survey of the village to establish that there really is a need for additional transport. There is even a grant available to do the survey! It was pointed out that most households in Burton have access to cars, so the main demand would be from older people and teenagers. So expect another questionnaire (eventually), but do fill it in if you want some new transport facilities. It was suggested that, rather than just asking for a more frequent bus service, we might look at a wider interpretation of our transport needs: how about cycle paths, more footpaths, a walking bus to reduce traffic taking children to school, or bus link with Kirkby Lonsdale?

Requests had been received for the Parish Council to get behind a campaign to bring Broadband internet access to the village. Unfortunately they didn't really seem that interested: the feeling was that people have all the information they need, so there is nothing more that the Council can or should do. I think they are making a big mistake. I, and I suspect others, have actually spent quite a long time on the BT web site trying to register my interest in Broadband and still haven't managed to work out how to do it. The Parish Council don't seem to realise just how important fast access to information will be in the future. This is rapidly becoming an essential basic utility, not just a toy for gadget lovers. Areas which cannot offer this utility will certainly be disadvantaged economically in the future. The Parish, District and County Councils all need to be pushing for some form of fast internet access to be brought to rural areas sooner rather than later: if not Broadband then some other affordable format. Maybe we need this even more than we need improved transport facilities?

The results of the Village Plan questionnaire had already been circulated to Parish Councillors, but your correspondent didn't get to see them. The responses had been analysed, and the main issues which had been raised had been distilled. After some discussion about the wording of the report, the Council agreed that it would be released for publication in Burton News, so look forward to reading it in next month's edition. The Council then discussed how it would respond to the issues raised. After further discussion they decided to have an additional special Council meeting to consider how to respond to the issues raised and formulate an Action Plan. This meeting will be on Thursday 13th

March at 7.30 in the Memorial Hall, and will be open to members of the public wishing to observe. So if you want a preview of the issues and to hear what the Council intends to do about them, then put that date in your diary.

Your correspondent had not realised that plans were well advanced to construct a Jubilee Memorial Panorama on Slape Lane, a bit like the one on Arnside Knott. This would give information to walkers on the points of interest they could see from the site. It would be quite an expensive venture - upwards of £2,000 - but grants may be available to help with the cost.

Should the Council now pursue a Traffic Regulation Order to ban all HGVs from the village? The quarry is co-operating fully and actively supporting the current ban, but a rival company, Hanson Aggregates, insist on sending its lorries through the village. Apparently the County Council had always been supportive of a Traffic Regulation Order, but the Parish Council had been against the idea. There seems to be little concern in the village about lorries at the moment, only four people raising it in the Village survey, but if you know differently then let the Council know. After listening to years of debate about our relationship with the quarry it was good to hear that they are acting as a responsible part of our community. This can only be to the benefit of all of us.

The quarry apparently contributes to something called the Aggregate Levy Sustainability Fund, administered by English Nature, which is available for approved local projects which meet their criteria. There are also funds to buy land which will improve public access for recreational purposes. There seems to be quite a lot of money available for such projects at the moment, but it has to be spent by 31st March 2004, so

things will have to move fast by the usual bureaucratic standards of local government!

The Vicar writes...

Death Meets its Master

In chapter 5 of his gospel account, Mark introduces us to Jairus. He was a ruler of the local synagogue, a powerful man. But he was powerless to deal with the situation now confronting him. His little daughter is dying. Desperate, he runs to find Jesus and begs him to come and heal her. As they make their way to Jairus' house, some messengers bring the news that he and every parent never wants to hear: "Your daughter is dead. Why bother the teacher any more?"

Jesus, however, ignores their message and says to Jairus: "Don't be afraid; just believe." What an outrageous thing to say. Jairus has just heard the most terrible news, yet Jesus says, in effect, "Don't worry, just trust me." Now to say that to a devastated father you have to be supremely confident of your own power.

Moreover, as they come to the house, Jesus says to the mourners: "Why all this commotion and wailing? The child is not dead but asleep." Thinking that he's speaking literally, the mourners laugh at him. They have seen the corpse.

But Jesus goes in to the dead child and taking her hand says, "Little girl, I say to you get up!" His word is immediately effective: the girl stands up, walks around and is reunited with her parents. Little wonder "they were completely astonished." The message is clear: it's as easy for Jesus to raise someone from the dead as it is for us to rouse someone from sleep. What authority! Even death, our most feared and powerful enemy must bow to the power of Jesus, the Son of God.

The challenge to us is this: having seen Jesus' authority over death will we trust him with our own death? We all have to die one day. If Jesus does have authority over death, then it would be madness to ignore him, to say "I'm not that bothered" or "I don't have the time." The Bible teaches that all those who die trusting in Christ, all those who "fall asleep" in him, will be raised to eternal life. Jesus' apparent power over death is certainly worth exploring.

HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE by Roger Bingham

For Sale in Burton 1798,1843,1876

Our ancestors were not obsessed with housing booms as our society has been. But they were interested in property sales especially by Auction where you could have good day out inspecting otherwise private premises, comparing the property for sale with one's own possessions and then, at the Sale, seeing who bid for what and at what price. In an era often lacking in entertainment a Sale was a pleasant social interlude in a humdrum existence. For local historians Burton Sale notices tell us much about the interrelation of agriculture with other rural industries. This is shown in a handbill of 1798:

"Coppice Wood. TO BE SOLD, By Auction, on Wednesday the 7th. November, At Mr. John Rigg's, Royal-Oak, Burton in Kendal, Westmoreland, ALL That Fine And WELL-GROWN COPPICE WOOD called DALTON PARK - containing about 135 Statute Acres, be the same more or less; the above is in a Ring Fence, and has been well taken care of, is now fit for Hoops, Charcoal, and other purposes, and lies within one Mile of Burton, near a good Turnpike Road. Thomas Hebblethwaite of Dalton will shew the Premises, and further particulars may be obtained by applying to PETER ROBERTS, Winwick Hall near Warrington."

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

It is a measure of improved literacy and of quicker communications that, although there was no penny post for another 50 years, 'particulars' had to be obtained in writing from a town 60 miles away.

In 1843 Messrs. W. R. & H. A. Gregg, of Kirkby Lonsdale were the Solicitors responsible for the following announcement which refers to another rural industry - Lime burning.

"TO BE LET By Proposal - and to be entered upon next Spring-all that FARM called CRAG HOUSE Situate within the Parish of Burton-in -Kendal, consisting of a commodious Dwelling House, with suitable and convenient Outbuildings, Garden and Orchard, and about 36 Acres. Statute Measure, of old inclosed Arable, Meadow, and Pasture Land, and an Allotment containing 35 ACRES.... now in the occupation of WILLIAM PARK. There is an excellent and well-accustomed LIME KILN upon the ESTATE, -with an abundance of good LIME STONE, and the taker will be permitted to burn Lime for sale. Mr. William Holme, of the Sportsman, Hutton Roof, will shew the Farm and further particulars from Mr Abbotson of Burton-in-Kendal, the Proprietor..."



On 5th of July 1876 Mr Mathew Derome offered for sale, at The County Hotel, Lancaster, a mixed residential and agricultural estate.

"Valuable VILLA RESIDENCE, Farm and Accommodation Lands, near Burton, Westmorland, including 'THORN LEE' A newly erected and well finished Villa Residence, with Garden, and outbuildings adjoining; very compact and DESIRABLE FARM, AT DALTON; convenient outbuildings and most valuable and DISIRABLE ACCOMMODATION LANDS, Near To Burton, the whole containing FIFTY-SIX ACRES OR THEREABOUTS, Statute Measure".

In the car park fans anxiously clutched tickets and huddled together for warmth. The long queue snaked around the block, peopled by the young, the young at heart, and a few punters who'd joined the queue thinking it was for Bingo. Then magically the doors opened to reveal a hall lit by beams of red and gold, and in scenes only matched by the autumn preschool jumble sale, there was an almighty stampede for tables. Burton-in-Kendal was ready to rock.

And how it rocked. From Johnny Cash to Edith Piaf, no musical style was left undisturbed. And no one on in Burton, Borwick or Holme was left undisturbed either as the soundman revved up the volume on the new village P.A. system. Burton Memorial Hall became Wembley Stadium as the lights went dim and the crowd went wild. Dave Williamson was in the building.

For the second time in their short history the Burton Allstars shone brightly. So now, as the band pack up their costumes, and prepare to hawk their video around prospective record companies, I look forward to another week of life in Burton. But my morning walk to the paper shop will never be the same again. I'll be scrutinising every pedestrian for snatches of song, scanning my newspaper for stray sequins, and locking up my sons in case the Weather Girls are off to the butchers in their French knickers and fishnets. It seems a red plastic umbrella can hide an array of musical talent.
