A week ago as I write, i.e. on September 2nd, Shepherd's Crag overlooking Derwentwater seemed to embody summer's essence. Warm air breathed on the skin. Bunched masses of oak and sycamore leafage stood motionless above their shadows. An occasional pulse of drizzle blurred the skylines of Causey Pike and Skiddaw where the mantles of heather looked like spilled red wine. Now autumn is on us. Nights are cooling (2 degrees forecast in mid Wales, 5 in Aviemore). Wormcasts are speckling the bowling green. The monumental chestnut trees by the road over Hilderstone Moss are showing flares of rust on their seaward faces and a harvest moon rising above the knott towards Dalton looks like a cheese rolling up the sky, first orange as Cheshire, turning yellow as Cheddar, then white as Lancashire.

Shepherd's Crag, above the road between Lodore and Grange, is almost invisible from the road in summer behind tapestries of leafage. Then a tower of rock stands up and looks out at you through the oaks and ashes, yews and hawthorns. Mossed boulders are jammed against the roots of trees. Slatey scree avalanches out of the shadows. The cliff was

neglected for generations by climbers looking for taller or more mountainous things. A lonely pioneer called Bentley Beetham, who had been on Everest in the Thirties, discovered many of the rock routes by himself. Now it's worn smooth and clean by thousands of feet. My children used to go there with their teachers. One day, on the Brown Slabs area, I saw a whole class of mentally handicapped children swarming fearlessly over the steep slope, giving out strange crowing words of their own.

Today it's quiet and still and, yes, the signs of summer passing are here right enough. Yellow splashes on the birches. Layers of droughtcrisped leaves thickening on the ledges. The blossom of heather, both ling and bell, is shrivelled and bleached and gives out almost no honey odour when I stoop to smell it. In this place with its many bushy or grassy nooks, you can be as close to nature as your heart desires. A treecreeper works up an ash trunk, then onto and down the next tree, probing for grubs and insects with its fine, curved beak. On our first route, Jackdaw Rib, one perfect black feather is lying on the first stance, and the whole wing of a bird is melding into the humus near our rucksacks. Mostly we have to share the terrain with large black ants. Halfway up our second route, Shepherd's Delight, I climb past the obvious resting-place to avoid a big nest - a heap of conifer needles that hotches all over with the wee creatures.

I have to brush them from my forearms. At the foot of a rockface files of them are travelling south and north, like shoppers in a city street. Only a few have been so wayward or fancyfree as to climb up the rock. They look at a loss - will they go on up or get back to work? One pauses on the tip of a grain and stays there like a climber paralysed by fear or else standing still for a few minutes to 'shake out' and let the glycogen build up again in his arms. It was still there when I left.

It's a humanised world here too. Small quarries have eaten into the fell. Much of the scree is man-made. Grange must have been built from this stone and from the bigger quarries up the dale at Quayfoot Buttress and the Bowderstone. The paths back down from the tops of the climbs must have been trodden first by men with picks and hammers, drill-bits and dynamite. One guarried face is uniquely beautiful, still naked blue-grey, no moss or lichen and rippled all over with sinuous flutings, as though it was worked to make beauty rather than to win building stone. A low wall of piled chunks may well have been a shelter where the workers ate their bacon butties and drank cold tea. Now it's a haunt for birds and squirrels, and for the climbers whose calls echo from invisible sources amongst the oaks and aspens.

WHAT A WASTE!

'The only place in South Lakeland where you cannot see a wheelie bin' was the verdict of Burton Parish Council's chairman when we were at the bottom of the deepest chasm during our very enjoyable and instructive tour of Holme Park Quarry on 11th September.

Judging by the telephone calls to me and to SLDC's 'Recycling Hotline' the noisiest recent issue was the expanded recycling scheme. A new blue box, for glass, tins etc. has joined the blue box we had already for paper together with a new grey wheelie bin for non-recyclable waste. These, we have to use in conjunction with our, old, green, wheelie bin which will be required for 'green' or garden waste. Clear isn't it?

Burton, Holme and Milnthorpe were chosen for the pilot scheme because we have a mixture of houses ranging from properties with long drives to those with only street frontages. We are also socially balanced with older people who may have health difficulties, working families who may be out at collection

times and we have some second homes.

People's attitudes have varied from approval, via support frustrated by confusion about dates (I'm in this category) to angry denunciation along the lines of 'I pay my Council Tax and I expect my waste to be taken away irrespective of whether I've used the right coloured bin or put the right coloured bin out'.

You can refuse to have recycling bins if you have little recyclable waste, or you prefer to go to the 'bring sites' e.g. bottle banks or tip, or, you have not enough space to store them or because your house frontage is on a narrow pavement. But if you do not want the green waste bin or the blue boxes you will get only one, grey, bin collection per fortnight.

If you are unable to put the bins and boxes out, perhaps because of health reasons or regular absence from home or because your house is unsuitable: e.g. steep steps, you may have a doorstep sack collection. But this arrangement will have to be verified by the Council. If so please ring the assisted collection officer Bob Chubb on 01539 733333 ext. 7113.

a government requirement that all districts should recycle 14% of their waste by 2004. South Lakeland recycled about 10.3% in 2002 and we had an above average use of Cumbria bring sites. But SLDC's figures do not take into account that most of us south of Kendal use the Lancashire recycling facility at Carnforth Level so, locally, we are probably even better at recycling than the statistics suggest.

There are two linked causes: 1) we are running out of tipping 'infill' sites and 2) the government has increased landfill taxes as an incentive to reduce waste. Since Walney Island and the Kendal Fell tips closed there are no landfill sites in South Cumbria. The Lancashire Salt Ayre tip at Skerton will soon be full and our non-recyclable waste might have to go to Blackpool.

Verdict. In the first four days of the scheme 500 enquiries were received and, more to the point 56 tons of recyclable waste was collected from our 'Milnthorpe area'. This was made up of 24 tons of green waste, 21 tons of paper and 11 of glass and cans which is the equivalent of seven wagons of landfill rubbish.

Unitary Authority

Cumbria's scheme for a Unitary Authority based on the County has been published. It claims that it would save money eventually about £5m p.a. in five years out of a budget of about £500m! But they would say that wouldn't they?

So far the Regional Government programme is the Boundary Commissioner will visit all of Cumbria on one day in October. They will report in February 2004, with a 'final report' in May and a Referendum in October. If the North West (Congleton to beyond Carlisle) votes in favour of Regional Government there will be elections in May 2005 for the 'Shadow' authority and for the two members from all of Cumbria who will represent the current County area in the Regional Assembly.

As I've said before I don't think many Cumbrians, of any political party, want a change but if we are out voted in the Referendum by Manchester and Merseyside we will be have to put up with it. Meanwhile we are worrying about next year's Budget and any Council Tax increases. Please, wish me Luck!

Shelter – to be or not to be? That is the question... and where!

As a village, we are very good at producing some 'cracking' youngsters. We value our youth and want to see them grow into caring acceptable adults. So the question to be decided about is 'Are we willing to see the youth shelter scheme happen in Burton, and if so, where?'

A few positive things to dwell on:

The young people would be involved in selecting a design and raising funds so that it would be THEIR shelter, and hopefully respected as such. (We already know that users of our village facilities such as the MUGA have full respect, whilst the non-users are the ones who cause problems).

Burton Recreation Trust was set up to provide facilities for all the community to use. For those less sporting, it may enable them to use the facility in a sociably acceptable way.

A few less positive thoughts:

The shelters cost a substantial amount of money (in order to be vandal proof) and if people are going to support the project they may prefer the money went towards for

example, an extension to the sports pavilion to enable more young people to use more permanent all-weather facilities. This could be open on several nights each week and include a café/indoor games area.

Should we really be encouraging the young people to use the Recreation area? Some people feel that we already have enough problems with people abusing the site. (Although maybe this would keep them away from the school?)

You may have your own thoughts, and we would like to hear about them as soon as possible. The Parish Council survey had a definite positive response from several members of the community, but we would like more information from you. 

HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE by Roger Bingham

THORA HIRD: "A lass unparalled"

Except possibly for her fellow 'sand grown un' Eric Morecambe (ne Bartholomew) Thora Hird was the only more or less local celebrity to become a National Institution.



Therefore, it was appropriate that her Memorial Service was held at another National Institution, Westminster Abbey. I had the honour to be invited and was tickled pink when my name subsequently appeared in 'The Times" amongst those who attended between Christopher Beeny (Edward in 'Upstairs Downstairs' who was also Thora's 'nephew' in 'In Loving Memory') and Lionel Blair the impresario. My seat was reserved in the North Transept opposite the family seats and just below the Abbey pulpit. Representatives of royalty and establishment figures like (Sir) David Frost, Lord (Melvin) Bragg, Baroness (Betty) Boothroyd (former Tiller girl and 'Call me Madam'Speaker) and Greg Dyke, Director General of the BBC, sat in the Nave. Greq read the second lesson from John 14. Its opening verse 'Let not your heart be troubled' might not have been totally apt for him as he had just rushed in from the Hutton Enquiry.

Headed by the Archbishop of York there were scores of clergy including Thora's 'Songs of Praise' colleague Roger Royle. But, the

biggest stir was provided by a Salvation Army band which, with streamers flourishing and tambourines tingling, marched down the full length of the Abbey crashing out 'Onward Christian Soldiers'. The other Hymns were those Thora sang at childhood seaside missions: 'What a friend we have in Jesus' and the 'Battle Hymn of the Republic-Glory, Glory, Alleluya'.

I was invited not because I might be a minor local representative but because I am a minor writer who works occasionally for the BBC etc. I also dedicated my book 'Lost Resort? The flow and Ebb of Morecambe' to 'Thora Hird-Morecambe's Best Loved Daughter'. Mainly on the phone Thora provided many anecdotes of her home town for 'Lost Resort?' She claimed to remember the annual Burton trip to the Resort and, also, that she and my mother went to night school together. But she



said that she was three years younger than mother whereas as actually their ages are the other way round. My mother remembers that Thora was 'always late' and 'got into trouble for wearing purple nail varnish'.

I recall how after one visit home

"Come, ye thankful people, come"

Sunday 12th October is our Harvest Family Celebration and we'd like to invite everyone to join us as we gather to praise the God who so generously provides everything we need. villains come from afar, up the M6. (The Jackal, now behind bars, came from Bolton).

We were handed a useful leaflet about how to protect our homes. If you belong to Neighbourhood Watch you get 10% off your House Insurance. Just a thought.

Terry Belshaw had an attractive personality and was a good talker. I was sorry when he left.

The Footpath to Morewood Drive

This has been cleaned up a bit by SLDC but it can't be adopted yet because of the siting of a sewage outlet. It can, however, be named, and suggestions for a name are to be sought, possibly from the school, who lost the land in the first place. Kidnapper Lane, has also been tidied up (it leads from the Square to Vicarage Lane).

The Mirror (Haven't we had enough of this?) Now A.O. must have slipped up here. She genuinely believed there really WAS going to be a mirror, finally, at the top of Tanpits Lane. But it's by no means as certain as that. The mirror at Crooklands, one PCIIr said, was "rather big". Another thought was that mirrors give no idea of speed or distance. After discussion it was grudgingly agreed that a mirror was "better than nothing". Oh well. A
