OUTDOORS

What better place to pass a reflective hour than a ruined quarryman's cabin above the man-made canyon of Penny Rigg near Low Tilberthwaite, east of Coniston? Well, perhaps the birchwoods on the coast of Raasay, between Skye and Applecross. Or the harbour at Diabaig in Wester Ross. Or a woodsman's hut above Peralta in the foothills of the Apuian Alps in Tuscany. Or a cave in the Blouberg in north-west Transvaal, where you can sleep before tackling an epic climb. There is so much to choose from. The beauty of Tilberthwaite is that it's less than hour's drive from Burton and then ten minutes' uphill walk. And the ruin is available at all times, with no booking and little competition. It has everything you could wish for, except a roof, or running water, or glass in the windows window, actually, which is one foot square and facing east onto seemingly endless ripples of wooded fells, green dimming to blue and hazy grey.

The six-foot outer walls have lost their roofing timbers. An inner wall is just the right height for sitting on and for accommodating a packet of turkey-and-stuffing sandwiches from the shop and a bottle of juice (not from concentrate). The back wall houses three binks or recessed cupboards, a broad one flanked by two smaller ones, giving the place some style. No doubt the window would have been blocked by a bag of straw or bracken when the wind blew too keenly. I'm assuming from such details that the place was no mere tool-shed or gunpowder magazine, although it does lack a hearth.



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I've made myself at home for an hour or two in many buildings of the kind, especially in the Scottish Highlands and Islands. What they have never kept, or very rarely, is any remnant of the life lived in them. I once found a yellowed Ready Reckoner in a croft house, its pages nibbled by mice. This was a new ruin, its caved-in roof still lying amongst nettles, and the owners, two unmarried sisters, still kept sheep on the land they had left, which could be reached only by boat or footpath. In Arisaig in Argyll I found fine traces of the old life - seven cuts on a stone windowsill where knives had been sharpened. (They were like two in the wall niche outside our own back door.) Almost always the household gear, the utensils and crocks and stools and bedsteads, have been taken away. The Arisaig house, I know, must have been vacated for good in the 1840s, when the whole crofting township was evicted by a grabbing Scottish judge called Lord Cranstoun.

This dale of Tilberthwaite has been quiet since the 1950s, when quarrying for slates finished here (apart from a few one-man operations in the Nineties.) For six or seven generations it must have resounded with hammering by drillers and blacksmiths, with horse noises, with explosions and the clink of wedge-headed hammers, as millions of cubic yards of slate were extracted, reft and dressed, and exported via Coniston Water and the harbour at Greenodd.

The two sheepfarms remain amongst monumental oaks and sycamores and many new voices are heard as walkers and mini-bus-loads of schoolchildren arrive at the Access Area to explore the gully and the fells beyond - also, I hope, to see and touch the beautiful,



intricate stonework of the sheepfold which Andy Goldsworthy the land artist and Steve Allen the waller from Tebay built up a few years ago. Today, when we came here to top-rope a few steep routes in the unusual quarried gorge which cleaves the fellside, a party of men were doing the same - bonding or team-building or whatever is supposed to happen on these outings. After our lunch in the cabin they had gone away and the man-made cliffs were free for us to climb and dangle until our strength ran out - much earlier than it used to.

Roger Reports On.... Schools, Police, Fire, Archives...

First some good news: Cumbria Police Force was judged to be the third most-successful in the country. Crime rates are generally falling and response times are improving. Locally our Police Community Support Officers (who attend the Parish Council) are popular and hopefully will help curb a perceived upsurge in anti-social behaviour often by children. Even so our young people are doing well. The University of Cumbria started officially on 1 August with undergraduates coming from the county, other parts of the UK and from abroad. It has been confirmed that our main secondary school Queen Elizabeth, Kirkby Lonsdale, is officially judged to be 'outstanding'. There are now 1400 pupils and this year the 'A' Level results 'were excellent, the best ever and the GCSE results were also very good'. At the October Governors meeting the closure of the school on the second day of term caused by the breakdown of the water supply was discussed. Despite my own fears about children being dropped off at pick up points miles from their homes very few difficulties seem to have been experienced, as distinct from inconvenience. Contact numbers etc. are already required from parents before their child enters the school. Future emergency plans will include earlier

liaison with local radio and with the police to help them deal with traffic grid lock. I was pleased that my QES governorship has been renewed - so that I have now been in office for a guarter of a century! On the county council we have increased funding for children with Special Educational Needs and made a grant of £24,870 for holiday and out of school childcare support. The South Lakeland Committee has again agreed to support the Sandgate Hydrotherapy Pool in Kendal and I and several other members have taken part in the Schools Democracy Week. At a special Kent Estuary Neighbourhood Forum at Milnthorpe, local young people listed the facilities they required which included a designer shopping centre, a ski slope, youth shelters and indoor swimming pools in each village. Top of their requirement list were a youth cafe and a skateboard park. The latter is always mentioned but it is my impression that skateboards are not as popular as they were. Perhaps some of BN's younger readers could let me know? One thing which was clear was that 'no way' did the young people want a traditional 'ping-pong and pop' youth club. I remain concerned about rural isolation of young people some of whom do not see folk of their own age from 3.30pm on Friday until 8.30am on Monday. I am hoping that the Cumbria Rural Infrastructure Programme (CRISP) might be able to assist in transport arrangements.

As there is continual worries about speeding I have asked, again, for speed checks to be made in our area. I am also keeping the authorities up to date on the pothole saga. At a recent conference at Warwick University my report was well received on the useful work of our excellent lengthsman and of the





cooperation on the scheme between parish councils and the county council. We have had an excellent Fire and Rescue Service report. The number of people injured in dwelling fires has reduced from 56 in 2004/ 05 to 19 in 2006/07 possibly because 60% of households now have smoke alarms compared to 33% in 2001. The county council is also 'exploring' a 'mesh network' for an expanded CCTV. This should increase public safety perceptions but even so I worry about rights to privacy. I am told, we are already the most 'surveyed' nation in Europe. Please, what do you think?

I am still very busy on cultural affairs particularly with the Theatre by the Lake, Brewery Arts, Prism Arts for adults with learning needs, Arts in Education and, currently, the Kendal Mountain Book and Film Festival on 9-18 November. As chairman of the Archives Committee I am pressing for Saturday opening for the Kendal Records Office. Reports that the Royal Hotel might be reopening has also prompted me to enquire whether part of the extensive premises might be used for a Library Link as part of 'the pub at the hub scheme'.

Some problems persist.We are up to the eyes in planning the 2008-09 Budget which, because of the £10m pa we have to allocate to meet the job equalisation costs, might mean so called 'efficiency savings' and/or cuts in services. Yet another Kendal traffic survey has led to more meetings on that intractable subject. We are still seeking new ways to reduce and dispose of waste and I was taken on a tour of a disposal plant at Dumfries at which metal, plastic and paper were processed into recyclable material and other waste was reduced 'biologically' in



what appeared to be huge compost bins. On inspection of the M6 extension north of Carlisle - the so called 'Cumberland Gap' - I was struck by seeing only about thirty work people on the six-mile site compared to the hundreds of 'personnel' I saw at the CAPITA HQ where the new road and other enterprises are organised.

Finally I believe a reasonable and, I hope, amicable planning compromise was made on the Croft House Barn application. I, along with several residents and representatives of the applicant, spoke at the SLDC Development Control Committee which gave conditional approval for a smaller scheme which, hopefully, will reduce traffic, conservation and neighbourly issues. I remain concerned that the barn along with other historical properties in Burton are not 'officially known' to the authorities and, personally, I would like more of our heritage features to be listed. But there are pros and cons about listing - as there are, I suppose, on every public matter.

Even the Carboncopies sighed when he came home with the bumper pack, "The baby doesn't wear nappies Dad, she wears pants," said the oldest Carboncopy. "Dad doesn't do shopping," the youngest Carboncopy reminded him.

I lift the nappies out of the pannier outside the supermarket. "Are you coming in?" I ask. He shakes his head and tells me he'll look after the bikes. "Shall I take the Carbonbaby in with me then?" He says no, so I leave him outside, tinkering with the gears.

At the checkout I load a basket of vegetables onto the conveyor belt, enjoying the peace and quiet without screaming kids and babies. Someone even packs my pannier for me. But as I'm about to pay, a shout from the entrance breaks the silence. "What are you doing?" Carbonlite stands by the entrance with his hands on his hips. "Shopping," I reply. "Shopping? But you only came in to change some nappies and I've been standing outside waiting for you for twenty minutes." The assistant smirks, along with the rest of the queue behind me. "Come on, we need to go," he shouts. "But I've got to pay for these," I tell him. "The Carbonbaby is crying," he yells. "What am I supposed to do with her out here? You've been twenty minutes you know," he looks at his watch and stomps about in the doorway. Now everyone in the other queue is smirking as well. "It's a trolley dash?" I remind him, trying not to shout across the supermarket. "A what?" he says. "A Trolley Dash!" I yell, pulling my credit card out of the swiper and legging it outside with the shopping.

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We cycle home in the sunshine still bickering. "Right, next week we'll just do the dash bit and leave the trolley out of it then shall we?" I say. "Look I thought you were just going in to change some nappies," he sulks, "Anyway, what's for lunch?"

"Pampers," I reply, changing gear and dashing off without him.

Preparation

Remove any stalks, wash and dry the apples, and push a lollie stick in the stalk end. Put all the ingredients in a large heavy-based pan and bring to the boil, stir to prevent burning. Check it with a sugar thermometer toffee needs to be 150°C/300°F, or you can test by dropping a little onto a saucer of cold water - the toffee is ready when the drops set straight away. Dip each apple into the toffee, remove and let it cool for a short while then dip again, and repeat until each one is thickly coated with toffee. Dip into a bowl of cold water to set the outside and place on sugar-dusted tray until completely cold. Takes about 30 mins to make.

Comments on the goings-on at the Parish Council

BRIEF AND TO THE POINT (mostly)

Three members of the Parish Council were absent, but the remaining members made up for them in good humour, and, best of all, brevity.

Once again there was no Police presence, although an apology for absence was received. But no report, proving how squeaky clean and uneventful the village of Burton was, well, this month anyway. One PCIIr produced a police officer's hat, rather small, but it suited him. He offered himself as "the Police presence," and he looked the part, though A.O. has to admit that he proved to her that policeman get younger all the time.

Seats thoughtfully placed for 'members of the public' remained sad and empty, with even the bus shelter lobby giving the meeting a miss this month.

Reference was made to the objections raised last month to the plans for converting the barn behind the West Square houses, though no plans were on view. It appears the whole issue has "been settled amicably," according to Dist Cllr Bingham, though with conditions, and the revised plans have been passed by the Planning Cttee. It seems the conversion can now go ahead.

Wheels Scheme

The Chairman distributed leaflets about a new transport proposal which should help people living in rural areas who have no easy way to get to other essential places, for example, to visit relatives in hospital. It will particularly apply to those not on a bus route, or near enough to make their own way to one. The leaflet will be displayed on the parish notice-board.

Vehicle-activated Traffic Sign

It seems Burton can have one of these, shared with some other parishes. It would be in operation here for some weeks at a time. But we've got to provide a post for it. Cost: £500. A.O. was left puzzled. Did we have a post last time? Is it to prevent naughty people running off with the sign? There surely can't be many people who covet a vehicle-activated travel sign, though there'll always be one, come to think of it. And it could come in handy for timing your dog when it chases rabbits. PCIIrs will make enquiries about getting a cheaper post.

Bus Shelter(s)

The Steering cttee reported they had "identified" (silly word) two suitable sites on Main Street for a possible bus shelter. One is at the end of Glebe Close, the other is next to the Creamery. It was reported that only one member of the BMH Cttee was in favour of having a bus shelter at the Memorial Hall. A similar shelter to the one at Yealand, 2m in length, with room for four seats, would cost around £1898. It is hoped that funding can be forthcoming from CCC. The topic is ongoing.

The Lengthsman All present had praise for the job the lengthsman, Mr

Holmes, had done since he was appointed, and it was unanimously agreed his efforts had greatly improved the appearance of the village. It is hoped it will be possible to share him, on an ongoing basis, with Holme, after this year's contract runs out.

Editorship of the Parish Council Newsletter

The Chairman wishes to relinquish this task. The matter will go on next month's agenda.

Reports

Concern about a wall adjacent to Caterpillar Walk was expressed. It was feared the wall was in danger of collapse. The PC will notify the building contractors responsible for upkeep.

A gatepost adjoining Vicarage Lane has been repointed.

The War Memorial has been tidied up in preparation for Armistice Day.

Four saplings on Ewan Mill Lane have died. There is concern that the rowans have contracted some fungal disease.

Whodunnit??

The parish-owned grass verges on Boon Walks are beginning to be badly damaged by the parking and turning of vehicles. To discourage this, PCIIrs placed four posts in the grass as a deterrent. Two of the posts quickly disappeared. Hopefully these will be replaced by large heavy rocks which one PCIIr, with the help of another, undertook to provide.

Now the above account looks a bit ordinary, but it's a pity you weren't all there to hear the discussion, as I promise even such an apparently straightforward matter can turn out to be very amusing - funny, even-indeed.

Quarry Liaison Report

The PCIIr rep reported that new wheel-washing equipment was on the way, which should lead to cleaner roads when the trucks leave Holme Park.A short meeting but a good, meaty one.

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BN's Bonfire Night Treats... YORKSHIRE PARKIN

Ingredients 4oz soft brown sugar 8oz plain flour 4oz butter 8oz medium oatmeal 8oz syrup 1 teaspoon ground ginger 1 egg



¹/₂ teaspoon bicarbonate of soda

1/4 pint milk

Melt the sugar, butter and syrup over a low heat. Beat the egg well and add to the syrup mix with some of the milk. Sift the flour, oatmeal and ginger into a bowl and pour into the syrup mix. Dissolve the bicarbonate of soda in the remaining milk and add to the rest of the mix. Stir well, then pour into a greased tin, 11" x 9" x 2". Bake until firm in a moderate oven (about 1 hour). Keep for about one week before eating.



Burton Pre-School Family Session

For many years, Burton Pre-School Committee Members have run a Family Session on Wednesday mornings during school term time, for babies and toddlers and their parents or carers. 

HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE by Roger Bingham AN AUSTERITY ROYAL WEDDING

'A flash of colour on the hard road we have to travel' was Winston Churchill's comment on the wedding of the heir to the throne Princess Elizabeth to the former Prince Philip of Greece, who having been briefly 'Lt. Mountbatten R.N.' became on his wedding day HRH The Duke of Edinburgh. Earlier and subsequent Royal occasions had been celebrated with nationwide festivities as those of us who remember the Charles. and Diana event in 1981 will recall. But in November 1947 times were very hard indeed. Although the glow of victory, only two years before, had waned Burton people collected £15:2s:6d in for the Earl Haig poppy fund. Many villagers went to Kendal to see the Border Regiment being given the Freedom of the Borough where there was a big row over the cost of refreshments - 2/6 for the soldiers and 12/6 for the officers and councillors! A bankrupt and exhausted nation was still struggling with shortages of all kinds. Despite clothes-rationing, brides could 'be eligible for an extra allocation of points' for a wedding dress.

Although Miss C. M. Whiteman wore white when she married Mr C Hargreaves at Burton that November most brides did not try to emulate Norman Hartnell's glittering creation for Princess Elizabeth, choosing instead 'something they could wear again'. A Burton in Lonsdale bride suffered a greater - though no doubt temporary - deprivation when she married a German prisoner of war from Bela River because he had to be back in camp by 10pm! That autumn petrol for private motors had been reduced to one gallon a month, bread was rationed (which it had not been in the war), the bacon ration was cut to two ounces a week and £200 was raised in a Conservative raffle for a pig. Housing was in short supply and inadequate. In our county of Westmorland, which provided so much water for the big cities, half the houses did not have 'water laid on'. And there was no television! Hence the Westmorland Gazette reported 'with no organised outlet for public demonstrations of their loyal rejoicing the vast majority of Westmorland people had to content themselves with hearing at their firesides the wedding ceremony and the commentaries on the brilliant procession on the wireless'.

'Rain and leaden skies served only to emphasise the drabness of the national austerity blanket which had dampened in advance all possibility of public celebrations on a large scale'. Moreover 'in view of the existing difficult in industry and on the recommendation of the Board of Education it was decided by the Westmorland Education Committee that no souvenirs of the occasion should be given to the county's school children'. Even so in most local villages something was done for the children. I was just five at the time and can remember a bonfire at Heversham where I saw fireworks for the first time. These had been allocated in the shops at one firework per child and had been kept over from 5 November.





Burton, of course, did rather well: 'Celebrations. Former local members of the National Fire Service gave a fancy dress parade for the children followed by a dance to celebrate the Royal Wedding. About 70 children paraded before the judges - Mrs Birkbeck, Mrs Caunt and Mrs Nevison (Mayoress of Morecambe). Principal prize winners were 5 years and under Master B. Carruthers and Miss S. Leeming, 6 to 8 V. Philipson, 9 to 11 E. Duckett, 12-14 M. Crayston.' I wonder if anyone took any photos despite the leaden skies sixty diamond years ago.



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SLDC Recycling News

Focus on Paper Recycling




During October we will start collecting paper,

glass and cans from the kerbside at another 11,000 households in the district. This will mean that the recycling service is provided throughout South Lakeland, although the green waste collections will not start for the remaining households until next April. During the coming months we will be telling you about the recycling processes for the materials we collect, starting with paper.

As with all the materials the guidelines we have in place are determined by the end-users of the recyclables and their requirements. Paper needs to be kept as clean and dry as possible and separate from other waste. After your paper box is emptied the paper is taken to a local Transfer Station, in either Kendal or Barrow. From there it is taken to the paper mill for processing.

At the mill the paper is put into a hydropulper, where it is mixed with water to break down the fibres. It is then cleaned and any contaminants, such as staples, are removed. The resulting pulp is then dried and ready to be used in the manufacture of new paper products.

Most of the paper we collect is used for newsprint, which has a high specification, or the manufacture of household paper products such as tissue paper and kitchen roll.

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The Vicar Writes...

Just a Shadow

Dr Donald Barnhouse was a well-known American church leader in the last century. Sadly, his wife died early on in their marriage. His young daughter couldn't understand why her mother had to die. She went to her father and asked, "Daddy, you always told us that Jesus died for us, why did Mommy have to die too?"

He wanted to give her an answer her young mind would understand so told her he'd think about it. Two days later, as they drove to the funeral service they got stuck in traffic. As they sat there, Dr Barnhouse noticed a large truck in front of them. The sun was shining and the truck cast a huge shadow across the road.

He turned to his daughter and said, "Honey, if you had to be run over, would you rather be run over by the truck or by the big shadow of the truck?" She answered, "I'd much rather be run over by the shadow because the truck would hurt a lot." He responded, "Darling, that's sort of what Jesus did for Mommy when he died on the cross. He accepted the truck of God's judgment so that only the shadow of death went over Mom."

Death is a reality we cannot avoid. But as this story tries to explain, the real pain of death is the judgment that follows. According to the Bible, everyone will be raised up some time after death and be judged by God for what we have and haven't done, "Man is destined to die once and after that face judgment." (Hebrews 9:27) That's a very scary thought. Every one of us has

done some wrong and failed to do some right somewhere along the line.

However, the great news is that Jesus absorbed our judgment on the cross. He died in our place to take our condemnation away, so that only the shadow will run over us. That's what Jesus meant when he said, "I am the resurrection and the life. Whoever believes in me will live even though they die and whoever lives and believes in me will never die." (John 11:25)

Even when we die it doesn't have to mean condemnation. It can mean life. This is the most astonishing aspect of Jesus' teaching on death. He offers free forgiveness and eternal life to anyone who will take it. The big question then is, have we taken him up on his offer? Are we relying on Jesus for forgiveness and eternal life? Do we accept that by dying in our place and rising again he suffered our judgment? If we do, his promise to us is very straightforward, "Whoever believes in me will live, even though they die." He's the expert in this area and will keep his promise.



BN's Bonfire Night Treats...

BONFIRE TOFFEE

INGREDIENTS

- 1 lb sugar, preferably Demerara
- 1/3 pint water
- 1 ¼ ozs butter
- 2 level tablespoons golden syrup
- 1 teaspoon vinegar

Preparation

Put all the ingredients into a strong saucepan and stir over a steady heat until the sugar has dissolved. Bring to the boil and cook until the mixture reaches the 'hard crack' stage, 290°F. To test for the hard crack stage drop about half a teaspoon of the mixture into a cup of cold water, if it is hard then it is done, if still soft and chewy cook for a little longer and test again. Pour into oiled or buttered tin and either allow to set as a slab or mark in squared as toffee becomes partially set. Break when completely set. 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
