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
Dear BN,

My 'outdoors' for quite a few days recently was the view from a 2nd floor window of Blackpool Victoria Hospital (Ward 38). The scene outside is ample and green. The trees of Stanley Park crowd in from the right. Ahead they part into avenues and copses round the fairways of the municipal golf course. In the distance eastward, beyond massed leafage and scattered roofs and a line of pylons, hills bulk up, blue under filtered sun or greyed by mist and rain - the fells near Chipping.

Outdoors

This could hardly be better - well, it could be the white shell-sand beaches of the Outer Hebrides, or it could be the flow of the Eden through meadows where it enters the Solway near Rockcliff. There just are no hospitals there. The wildlife here on the northern I fringe of Blackpool is mainly gulls: herring gulls waddle like ducks across the grass, even daring to invade the one green I can see from here. Bigger ones, blackbacks maybe, patrol beneath the low Lancashire cloud-wrack, bound for some shore or rubbish-tip. Wood pigeons hurtle above the treetops with powerful wingbeats. The half-wild, or would-be, wildlife is the gibbons in the invisible zoo nearby. Each morning at about 7 o'clock they caterwaul like donkeys braying.

The 'tame' life is of course the golfers - mostly in foursomes, a few pairs, the occasional loner. I'm working on a theory that the better players are not in the foursomes. These jolly groups tend to lunge and jerk. They rock backwards instead of rotating at the hips and getting their weight smoothly forward through the stroke. Quite a few of the paired golfers and the loners get it right. I've seen few exceptions to this. I suppose it stands to reason that the bigger groups are more in it for the mateyness, a little less for prowess at the game.

All this is semi-guesswork. I'm going on a view of dark figures in the middle distance. Why can't they help us spectators by wearing light-coloured clothing? The one tee I can see is a good three hundred yards away about a hundred yards further than I usually hit the ball in my golfing prime. So I can see only the strokemaking, not its results. I do reckon, though, that if you know a game, you can tell good style from poor style even in the smallest things. Once when I was climbing on Sca Fell East Buttress with my son Neil, we saw a climber on a very hard route nearby and Neil reckoned from the least movement the man was making to put on or take off a piece of gear that he must be ace. It turned out to be Dave Armstrong, one of the finest Cumbrian rock pioneers of the eighties.

My ideal of the outdoors is not really spectating from a hospital bed. It did keep me going nicely for several days. It reminded me of growth and freshness and free energy, and it was a delightful improvement on the old hospitals with their high windowsills, the rows and rows of beds with little for the patients to look at but each other, and a view (if any) of grubby walls, fire escapes, and the back-ends of Victorian towns.

Roger Reports...

Burton

First the good news: Cumbria is a safer place. In 2006-07 a reorganisation of the Fire and Rescue Service involved the substitution of the full night time professional cover at Kendal Fire Station by part time 'reserved' fire fighters. This was so controversial that when attending a neighbouring church as a lay reader I heard an intercession asking that Cumbria County Council would not condemn the public to fire deaths! Saved funds have been used for youth projects and public information. The happy result is that compared to 1,662 fires in 2003 call outs have reduced to 1,175 in 2008. Deliberate 'primary fires' are also down to 90 and the number of 'unwanted calls' are down from 66 to 59 which is very low by national standards. In the last year 11,464 Home Safety Fire Checks were carried out, an increase of 1,000 pa. Every home in Cumbria is eligible to apply for FREE check by Fire and Safety personnel and usually takes about half an hour. To arrange a visit please ring 0800 358 4777. Also there is a new SLDC Customer Contact Centre line 0845 050 4434.

The bad news was the floods on 25 October which severely tested the Fire and Rescue Service when, in our area, nearly four inches of rain fell in twelve hours. I was out and about most of the day and quickly informed the service about the floods at the south end of Main Street and elsewhere. Though at 10pm I saw water lapping the doorsteps the houses were not flooded unlike several others in the district. Even so. around Burton I have rarely seen the waters rise so guickly. As a result I have asked that the drains at the bottom of Vicarage Lane and on Station Road, on the A6070 near the Quarry entrance and, regrettably, the newly repaired Tanpits Lane culverts (which did not cope) should to be looked at again. The Clawthorpe floods, which as usual appeared 24 hours after the rains stopped, were no worse than I've seen before but I've asked that the pipe installed two years ago

should also be inspected. Please let me know of other floods.

Long running issues affecting the district council include Kendal Museum whose management might be taken over by Kendal College, new security measures for the unoccupied medieval Castle Dairy and the future of New Road car park where a cycle way and a landscaped green are planned but which cannot be implemented until property rights have been clarified and alternative parking provided. At Grangeover-Sands there is a debate over the future of the Berners Pool site. The pool was only built about ten years ago after a long campaign to replace the old out door 'Grange Baths' closed in the 1980s. A government proposal for limited years council house tenancies could be controversial. SLDCs policy is to allow couples and single people to remain in a three bedroom house after their families have left home. New laws might enable them to be compulsorily re-housed in smaller properties - though we have almost no rural bungalows.

Meanwhile plans to implement the Local Area Agreements plans to link parishes are going ahead. Although in our area there appears to be little interest from the general public, many parish councillors have attended special meetings about joint management of services. In the case of the shared lengthsman scheme there has already been successful cooperation between parish councillors and the county council. I am, however, worried that there may not be enough parish councillors and other people with sufficient time for the new arrangements. Councillors are not, of course, the only volunteers. Our many supporters include the lay members of the Standards Committees who check on efficiency of councils and occasionally deal with misdemeanours. The lay Chairman of SLDCs Standards Committee Peter Smith, from Clawthorpe, has just moved on to a similar role on the Police Authority where I am sure he will be as highly appreciated as he has been while supporting the council.



Comments on the goings-on at the Parish Council

IS OUR BUS SHELTER BACK TO FRONT? Stern words from an (ex) member of the Working Party

Apparently it isn't, because it mustn't back up against a wall that might need maintenance in the future, we were assured. The subject arose when the PC Chairman read out e-mails from an ex PCIIr who considers the shelter is an eyesore, an obstruction for buggies etc, uncomfortable to sit on because you have to face backwards from the road and can't see approaching buses. and generally that recommendations from the working party have been ignored. And so, she claims, have her e-mails sent to the chairman. He says he read them out to the cttee meetings. But no-one can remember if he did or not, and they aren't minuted. No use asking A.O. as she wasn't at the meetings.

Anyway, presumably the shelter is there to stay, barring a sad Saturday night incident. A.O. asked a colleague on BN, "Why is the little bum-rest (hardly worthy of the word 'seat') tilting so perilously?" That's to deter dossers from sleeping on it, she was informed. Now here's an opportunity for Burton to get into the Guinness Book of Records, for the narrowness alone presents a challenge to any skinny competitor ambitious enough to spend a whole night there without falling off.

Police Report

CPSO Rachel Thomas presented a full report, while apologising for the absence of PC Suart who was offduty. Police were alerted to the following incidents in Burton:

1. A caller aroused suspicion when he asked householders for donations to a children's cancer charity. He was found to be genuine on investigation.

2. Report of youths in a car cruising round Burton Park.

3. Youths reported on BMH roof (they'd gone by the

time the police arrived.)

4. Criminal damage to a car parked on Neddy Hill.

5.Complaints of loud music at the Kings Arms.

6. Youths reported in a garden in Mowbray Drive.

The PC thanked Rachel for the report, and various matters were raised and discussed with her (e.g. dangerous parking, monitoring of the Rec Ground and the garden of the Royal Hotel etc.)

Public Forum

Burton Playground

The indefatiguable Committee were there to present their progress report. So far they have raised £369, and if they can increase this to £750 they'll be eligible for a grant of £1500 from the Hadfield Trust. They got a heartening response from a PCIIr who runs a popular charitable event, who promised them a donation from the profits. They are getting stuck in to the task of fundraising, and recently attended a course in Kendal which hopefully helped them with some useful information. * Later in the meeting, PCIIrs reported that a rep from Impact had visited the playground and had agreed to improve the rubber matting, the fencing and the gates, and to provide a litter bin and a non-slip ramp up to the gate.

Another PCIIr held aloft a document which A.O. understands records the excellent record of this extensive firm both at home and abroad. Is it A.O.'s imagination or was this document viewed with less than enthusiasm by other PCIIrs? It has been a matter of wonder to A.O. that Impact (housing trust for the houses built on the playground) is held in such esteem, but has been pretty remiss till now when dealing with Burton.

Vicarage Lane end

A resident from Dalton expressed dissatisfaction about the bell-shaped bumper-thing (sorry, there must be a better description) at the junction of Vicarage Lane and Main Street. He suggested it was a greater hazard than the wall it protected, and there were PCIIrs present who agreed with him. But the general consensus was that it's there now and not much can be done about it.

All those raising matters in the Forum departed and PCIIrs got on with the agenda.

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The Precept

Agreed. A precept of £10,375 will be requested from SLDC.

The Parish Plan

When all suggestions are collated there will be a general discussion on which elements to include in the final document. Some suggestions raised wil require advice from Highways experts.

Allotments

Since WW2, it's a statutory obligation for councils to provide allotments if 10 or more residents request them. The Chairman has received 10 such requests, and PCIIrs agreed to pass these to SLDC for advice. In addition they will appeal for any spare land in the village which could be put to such use. A couple of sites were suggested at the meeting, though it was feared that such land was in short supply in Burton. No doubt there will be further progress (or otherwise) on this matter in the future.

Reports

1. A farmer PCIIr reported that rural crime was on the increase locally, with thefts of farm machinery having happened in neighbouring areas recently. He warned that suspicion should be aroused if farmers were approached by tarmac-ers possibly eyeing up the territory.

2. The school has received a transport grant and will probably use it for better provision and training for cyclists.

3. Plain Quarry. Considerable improvements have been made to the site. The entrance has been vastly changed with potholes filled in and improved drainage. The height restricion bar has been replaced with a new one. An effective stile has been built at the upper end of the quarry (old buffers like A.O. can clamber over this one, unlike the mingy edifice that passes for a stile in the lower part of the quarry. Though to be fair there's a perfectly good kissing gate there too.) There are now 5 cows grazing in the woods. All who have met them agreed that they seemed docile.

4. In addition to the lengthsman we now have a visiting highways steward. She comes from Hale, so is familiar with the area.

So the Chairman suggested a regular review should be kept on the audit status of the Bank of Ireland, where Burton PC money is held. (it seemed a reasonable question to ask.) And at hand was Dist CIIr Cooper. Disappointingly, he said this couldn't be divulged as it was "A Political Matter." Hmmm. Always a bad sign when politics is given as a reason for anything. Thanks!

A big thank you to everyone who attended and sponsored the "Pink" party in the Kings Arms on Friday 31 October in aid of Breast Cancer Awareness. Also huge thanks to Yol Metcalfe for the loan of her expert equipment without which it could have been a lot more painful for Steve and Stuart. SLDC Recycling News

guide to

This month we will try to provide a guide to some of the terms that you may have heard to describe ways of dealing with waste as an alternative to landfill sites.

Anaerobic Digestion

This is a process whereby bacteria break down the waste in a controlled environment. This produces a biogas, which can be used to generate heat or electricity or as a vehicle fuel. The matter left as a residue at the end of the process can be used as a soil conditioner. Anaerobic digestion can be used to process almost all types of waste.

MRF (sometimes known as 'murf')

A murf is a Materials Recycling/Recovery Facility and is a process where waste goes through a series of sorting mechanisms that take out various recyclable materials as they pass through. This can be done by mechanical methods, such as magnets or optical recognition systems, or by hand. Each of the sorted material streams can then be recycled and the remaining waste sent for disposal or other processing.

Mechanical Biological Treatment (MBT)

MBT is a series of processes. Initially the waste is sorted, possibly using a murf, followed by biological treatment of the remaining waste, such as anaerobic digestion.

Energy from Waste

This can be a by-product of the anaerobic digestion process as the biogas is burnt to generate heat or power. Alternatively waste can be processed to produce a fuel, which can be burnt in conventional boilers.

Whether waste is sent to landfill or otherwise processed, the use of kerbside boxes and recycling banks is an essential part of the way your waste is handled. By separating materials at this early stage they can be quickly sent for re-processing without going through a lengthy sorting process. 2008 has been a significant year for South Lakeland as we completed the introduction of the kerbside recycling service to all parts of the district. This helped reduce the amount of waste sent to landfill and around half of the domestic waste collected is now recycled or composted. Recognition of the progress made came as the district was named as having the second highest reduction in the amount of waste generated by each person during 2007/08. This is a reflection of the changes that each resident has made to reduce the impact our lifestyles have on the environment.

However Christmas is always a time when more waste is produced and we will be adjusting our services accordingly for you. The green waste collection service is suspended from 14 December to 11 January and this means we can provide a weekly collection of landfill waste over the festive period. Don't forget that when the green waste collections resume you can use the bin to recycle your real Christmas tree if it is small enough to fit inside the bin. There are also green waste banks at the four Household Waste Recycling Centres where your tree can also be disposed of in an environmentally friendly way.

Recycling box collections continue on alternate weeks, providing a convenient way to recycle your paper, glass and cans. Your box can be used for your Christmas cards, but wrapping paper isn't collected and should be deposited in your grey bin.

There are some changes to the waste and recycling collection days over the Christmas and New Year period. Please check your collection calendar or see the local press for information about the changes.

Our Customer Contact Centre will also be open until Christmas Eve if you have any questions about the services provided; it will then be open on 29, 30 and 31 December from 10am to 2pm before fully re-opening on 2 January.

We are also working with the Salvation Army and local supermarkets to provide additional collection points for Christmas cards during January. These will be at Asda and Morrisons in Kendal as well as the Booths stores in Kendal and Kirkby Lonsdale. There will also be a collection point at South Lakeland House in Kendal.

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Historical Footnote by Roger Bingham

An Autumn Depression - Burton during the World Economic Crisis 1931

On the afternoon of 23 August 1931 the Royal Train sped down the main line through Burton. It was taking George V back to London only 48 hours after he had left the capital for his annual holiday at Balmoral. Normally the monarch travelled to Scotland at night, so this journey earned the headline King sees Westmorland. As he never actually visited any part of Lakeland his glimpses of local features like Burton Church might, therefore, have been all he ever saw of our old county. Perhaps, also, he was too worried to notice as his unexpected journey had been prompted by an apparent collapse of the world's financial services. He might even have been planning the formation of an all-party National Government which, at his prompting, soon emerged to cope with the crisis. It was headed by Ramsay Macdonald who had been Prime Minister in the Second Labour Government of 1929-31. Ramsay was mocked as being both a dour Scotsman and a 'champagne socialist'. He was also said to be the lover of Lady Londonderry whose daughter, Lady Maureen Stanley, was well known in our district as she lived at Witherslack, being the wife of Westmorland's MP, Oliver Stanley. Both the Stanleys campaigned in Burton during the General Election held in October, in which Oliver was returned along with 470 other Conservative MPs who had the largest parliamentary majority ever. But it was at Kendal where a heckler challenged Maureen about her knowledge of agriculture by asking 'How many ribs does a pig have?' She replied, 'Come up here and I'll count them'.

Politics apart, with an extra 6d on income tax and a penny on a pint of beer it was the economy that mattered most. Already Westmorland's ratepayers had grumbled when the teachers' salaries reached £13,307pa - not each, but for all of them! The teachers grumbled even more when their pay was cut by 10%. Because of government fears of disorder police pay was not cut, though their uniform allowance was reduced to one pair of new trousers per annum. The local force also lost two men - so Burton's bobby had to cover Holme as well. Fortunately unemployment was

low, with only 26 out of work in the Milnthorpe Labour Exchange area, which included Burton. Meanwhile the weather was awful. June was 'the second wettest for 60 years'. Snow fell in October and, though the cause was not meteorological, triplet lambs were born at Dalton. Happily, Burton Show 'held in the ideal surroundings of Dalton Park was made more alluring by genial weather' but there was a big drop in the farm classes 'owing to the waywardness of the season and the consequent delay in coping with the hay harvest.'

It was also fine for 'Spaniel Trials' in Dalton Park held in November which featured 'some of the finest English, Cocker and Springer spaniels ever seen in England, Scotland and Wales. It was a common sight to see a spaniel sitting quietly at its master's feet while another dog came and retrieved a shot rabbit or pheasant from under its nose'.

The sun also shone for the wedding of Corporal Arnold Bell of Priest Hutton to Muriel Dixon of Russells Farm. She wore a gown of 'ivory satin chameuse with pearl embroidery'. For those wanting every day wear, economic deflation had led to price cuts. Sale bargains at Lamberts of Kendal included 'Rayon Scarves' at 11d and 'ladies Art Silk Stockinette Dresses' at 4/11. For Christmas the store advertised 'Three piece suites £6:15,' 'Gramophones - superior models delivered on first monthly payment 8 guineas - Buy British! Buy Now!'

The festive season was unimpeded by the financial crisis and there were larger than usual congregations at the traditional services. Modern notes were also sounded at Burton Bowling Club's Whist Drive and Dance when the music was provided by the 'Ohio Jazz Band (of Carnforth!) So, most Burton folk had a Merry Christmas 77 years ago.





Burton-in-Kendal COMMUNITY FIRST RESPONDERS In association with North West Ambulance Service NHS Trust

In December 1999 Burton-in-Kendal First Responders went live and a team of 24 volunteers from the village started turning out to help residents who had dialled 999 requesting an ambulance for collapse, chest pain, difficulty breathing and various other complaints. In these nine years we have attended in excess of 100 calls.

Today there are only 6 and we now respond with our neighbouring team in Holme in order to keep the scheme working. David Taylor, their team leader has been looking after Burton's training and assessing for over 12 months, and without his help we could not have continued, as the Ambulance Service is stretched to its limit with the training side. I can't thank him enough for his help.

Burton's team is NOT going to fold, it will continue to run with Holme but our finances will remain separate. Although I am retiring as a First Responder when my own assessment is due, Ros Looker and myself will still look after the finances - and any donations can still be directed to me at Low Gables, Vicarage Lane. Two of our own team, Alan Wren and Matthew Noble will take over the day to day running of the team looking after pagers and equipment.

With the team having only six members, we are in dire need of new members and enquiries should still be made to myself. No medical knowledge is required as training is given.

Details of callouts will be in Burton News in the New Year - in the meantime can I thank all Burton team members, past and present for their support and on behalf of the Burton team wish residents of our village a very Merry Christmas and Happy New Year.






