

Whenever harsher winter days close in, the image comes to me of a Neanderthal

person standing at the mouth of a cave, staring out under heavy brows at darkening skies, snow-showers whitening through forest on the other side of a valley. Were they frightened, those Neanderthalers in Austria

or France (or our own direct forebears, the Cro-Magnon people), when days shortened, hunting became harder, and more firewood was needed to keep warm and cook? Did they think, best to follow the geese southward to longer days and rains instead of snows?

This year, because a dear friend had died in February and another just before Christmas, some lines kept echoing in my head, written by one poet about the death of another -

Oh all the instruments declare That the day of his death was a dark cold day.

And because we had just come back from a cruise on the Danube from Vienna to Budapest, more of his lines kept coming -

Sombre the sixteen skies of Europe And the Danube flood.

Not that our own trip was in the least sombre - good meals as we glided past dense brown woodlands laden with mistletoe, vibrant music on the boat and ashore in a hotel and a palace. It was just that for me the heart of Europe is haunted. This is where the Great War and the Greatest War were fought. We saw a castle wall pitted with shellfire at Bratislava, and in Budapest the concrete spans which had replaced bridges bombed out by the Allies in 1944 to block the German retreat.

Well, Europe has recovered, more or less, and bridges destroyed more recently have been remade, e.g. the famous Bosnian one at Mostar ruined in the Yugoslav war of the Nineties. And even the coldest winter soon relents. Already (January 8) the yellow-white spikes of bulb shoots are an inch above the compost in some of our planters and the bluish-green blades of snowdrop leaves are pushing up through the

leaf-mould. A single one of our most cherished winter visitor, the small thrush called the redwing, visited the garden briefly. Malcolm Brownsord had a flock of about a dozen in his garden where Vicarage Lane enters Main Street, in late December.

Not long after sunrise one morning I saw the rare sight of a heron flying above the centre of the village. This

gaunt and powerful bird often takes me back to one I saw as a boy in 1942. My brother and I were out on an Aberdeenshire hillside at 6 o'clock on a misty summer morning. For some reason the slowly-flapping, crooknecked, dagger-beaked bird scared me and I still felt eery when we got back to our snug holiday house. Silly, eh? What harm had a heron ever done me? None. What bad thing followed this omen? None. I was just made that way, too imaginative for my own good, which is partly why I worry so much about the extinction of species and global warming. For some reason I'm not bothered about meteorite collisions or the ultimate cooling of the sun. The collapse of bee populations in Britain and America - now there _is_ something to brood about in the wee sma oors.


W.I. NEWS

Roger Reports...

CUTS are at the forefront in both local and national government since the coalition government's June budget and the Chancellor's December statement. The general aim is to cut expenditure by 25% by 2014 - but as e.g. Health and Education will have smaller reductions, other services will have deeper cuts. Thus Cumbria County Council needs to reduce expenditure immediately by £42.8m. in a budget of over £400m. It is made up of £34.7m of lost central government grant and £8.1m of 'funding pressures' like inflation, and demographic changes like the growth in the proportion of older people requiring more care. The good news is that there will be no increase in Council Tax for 2011-2012, which will be partly covered by a government grant of £5.1m. Next year the county will need to find a further £13m in 'savings'. Examples of other cuts in government grants include the Sports Partnership grant down from £600 to £200k. Further economies might have to be made in School Improvement Partnerships (£244k), Cycle Training (£120m), Adult Education (£2.6m) and Teenage Pregnancy (£258m). Inevitably, some of my own favourite themes might be affected.

So far I have not heard about possible reductions in Highways expenditure but there may be cuts in Archives and Libraries. In 2005 when I was the

responsible county cabinet member I was able to 'save' all but two libraries and most library vans. Another hard look will now be made at smaller libraries and at mobile libraries which cost £70 per book taken out! Home deliveries hopefully will continue and - a reminder - if you know anyone who might need a home delivery of library books please ring Rose at 01539 713500.

Other cuts might affect the fire service. Burton's service by retained fire fighters should not be affected, but I will be opposing the merging of Milnthorpe and Arnside Fire Stations because high tides could cut off the main roads between the two villages - so if the station was at Arnside the fire engine might not be able to get through to Burton - so we would be even more dependent on mutual aid from the Carnforth-based Lancashire service which is also facing cuts. Plans for a Regional Fire HQ at Warrington have been shelved and the Cumbria service will be based at Penrith but it needs a computer update costing £400,000.

The district council's budget at £14m approx is much less than the county's. Even so SLDC's government grant for 2011-12 is £1.2m (17%) less than in 2010-11. Already staff numbers are below 600 compared to over 700 five years ago. Of course, everyone wants to cut bureaucracy, but there is bound to be trouble if e.g. planning applications will take six months instead of six weeks to process. Increased charges might help - though as in recent parking increases they might not be cost effective. On parking I am still opposing the removal of Kendal's New Road free car park until alternative parking has been introduced.

Our other main concern is South Lakeland's Local

Development Framework which, when first announced in 2008, caused uproar. Proposals for Burton are now less drastic than feared and there will be provision for some affordable housing. Suggested 'residential' sites are between Church Bank and Vicarage Lane, northeast of Morewood Drive, between Boon Town and the recreation area and at the corner of Dalton Lane with some 'mixed' use sites off Tarn lane - behind Green Dragon and at Clawthorpe Hall. I will be giving further information later, but in the meantime contact the LDF Manager, Dan Hudson, at 01539 717490 developmentplans@southlakeland.gov.uk.

Burton and Holme Community First Responders Annual Report For 2010

Burton and Holme Community First Responders provide vital Emergency Life Support on behalf of the North West Ambulance Service between a 999 call being made and the arrival of the paramedics. As well as covering the two villages, during 2010 we've been asked to attend incidents as far away as Lupton, Yealand and Warton, covering a population of around 4000.

All 15 members of the team are volunteers who carry pagers and can be called out rapidly, but only by Ambulance Control at the same time as the paramedics are dispatched. We're trained by the Ambulance Service in Emergency Life Support including Cardio - Pulmonary Resuscitation, Defibrillation and Oxygen Therapy. We only attend immediately life-threatening incidents, however, & are never asked to attend road accidents, trauma or the under 12s.

Two First Responders attend the patient with the life support equipment, whilst others look after any relatives, record vital medical information for the paramedics and help guide the ambulance to the address. All team members wear high visibility jackets, carry Ambulance Service I.D. badges and are bound by a strict confidentiality agreement.

During 2010, the team was called out to 66 incidents including Christmas and New Year's Eve. This included 36 to Holme, 18 to Burton and 9 to the Capernwray

area. On average, we arrived on scene in just 6 minutes, many being well within this time and up to 21 minutes before the arrival of the paramedics. The age range of the patients varied from 25 to 90.

25% of the callouts were to patients experiencing breathing difficulties with a further 25% to chest pains, a possible indicator of a heart attack. The team also attends unconscious patients and those suffering other life-threatening conditions such as choking, severe allergic reactions, strokes, fitting, drowning, electrocution, overdoses and severe haemorrhage. We are on duty 24hrs/day, 7 days/week, 365 days/year as callouts can occur at all times.

To operate, both Burton and Holme, who fundraise independently, need about £2500 per year for pager rental and continual equipment replacement. A massive thank you is therefore due to all those of you who have raised money for the team in the last year, which continues to secure its future. A CLEAN CHIMNEY IS A SAFE CHIMNEY

The cold winter months and the continuing rising fuel costs have seen many home owners reopening old fireplaces or installing multi-fuel stoves and using wood and coal to heat their homes. Firefighters at Kirkby Lonsdale and Milnthorpe Fire Stations have seen and attended an increase in chimney fires. Regular sweeping could prevent the majority of these. Sweeping also reduces the risk of dangerous fume emissions that may be present if there is a blockage in the chimney or flue.

Station Manager Callum Graham says, "To keep the risk of fire to a minimum, it is vital that all flues and chimneys are maintained in good working order at all times. This is just as important for appliances that use gas as those that burn coal, wood or oil."

Modern chimney sweeping is an efficient and clean process that removes the build up of soot and clears any obstructions such as birds' nests and leaves.

If people take a few simple precautions they can make sure that they and their homes are safe. So before you light up, think about the following:

Chimneys using smokeless fuel or bituminous coal/oil should be swept at least once a year.

Chimneys using wood should be swept quarterly when in use.

Ensure a fireguard is in front of the fire at all times, spark guards can prevent a fire.

Extinguish the fire before going to bed or leaving the house.

Do not light fires using flammable liquids such as petrol or paraffin.

Have your attic checked occasionally when the fire is alight, checking for smoke from cracks, defective brickwork or mortar joints.

A fire in the home can be devastating, but ensuring that chimneys and flues are well maintained greatly reduces this risk. We have attended a number of chimney fires in older properties recently where the flue lining has failed, exposing joists that have built into walls decades previously. If the lining is failing and the chimney hasn't been swept then there is a real risk of fire spreading into the roof, floors and ceilings of the property, often undetected until the fire breaks out. It is easy to forget about getting chimneys and flues swept because you can't see when it needs doing, but ensuring that this is done every year will help you to stay safe. If in doubt, have your chimney inspected by a competent and approved chimney specialist.

The Citizens' Advice Bureau

As is their custom, this organisation sent their annual request for a donation. Burton PCllrs have turned this request down in previous years. PCIIrs requested that residents who use this route inform the Highways Hotline of their concerns, as the more people flag it up, the better chance of action being taken.

Traffic cones were hoisted into action, and work has been carried out that hopefully improves pedestrian safety. The Vicar Writes...

What is the Church?

What comes into your mind when someone mentions the word church? Do you think of a building? Or a denomination – the Church of England or the Methodist Church? Perhaps it's an activity like singing or praying that you think of, or an event like a wedding, baptism or funeral. Interestingly, when the Bible speaks of church it's only ever talking about people – and a particular sort of people at that. Church is a gathering of people who believe in Jesus and who seek to live their lives for Him. According to the Bible, a local church ought to be devoted to the things listed below, and as the church in Burton and Holme we're trying to put these things into practice.

Devoted to the Bible as God's word: We believe that the Bible is God's perfect truth and our aim is to preach and teach it clearly, thoughtfully and relevantly, helping everyone to know God through Jesus Christ and to live for Him in the 21st century. The centrepiece of our Sunday meetings is, therefore, a talk from the Bible relating it to everyday life. Through this we seek to build up Christians and help those who are not Christians to find out about the Christian faith.

Devoted to fellowship: Fellowship means "togetherness." The church is people who spend time together and who care for one another. So, as well as our Sunday meetings, we have a good number of weekday activities for all ages that help us hang out together.

Devoted to prayer: Prayer is simply talking to God and asking him for things. A significant part of our tlme is given over to this when we meet together. It is a huge privilege for Christians because God listens to us and enjoys giving us what we ask for – except when what we ask for wouldn't be good for us and God has something better in mind!

Devoted to praise: this means we remember all that Jesus has done for us, especially His death on the cross for our sins, and we respond by telling God how great He is and thanking Him for His love and mercy to us. Two of the main ways we do this when we gather together is by sharing Communion and singing.

Devoted to reaching out: We are not meant to keep the good news about Jesus to ourselves. Jesus wants people to know the joy of His rescue. So, some of our activities (like the Christianity Explored Course) are focused on making Christ known to those around us.

Everyone is welcome at our meetings and, whether you're a committed Christian or you just want to find out more, we'd love to see you. A word of warning, however, before you come: this church is full of sinners. Everyone who comes here is one. That's why we need Jesus. I wouldn't want you to be unnecessarily disappointed.

Historical Footnote by Roger Bingham

1911 - BURTON NEWS A HUNDRED YEARS AGO

JANUARY - The mosses were flooded on New Year's Day. At Messrs Shepherd's Matting Works at Holme Mills Joseph Crump was killed when he fell and fractured his skull having caught his foot in some loose yarn left on the floor of the 'willey room'. Another accident occurred at Dalton Lodge when as 'Mrs Howard was proceeding with her household duties she was alarmed by the cries of her three year old daughter who was enveloped in flames. Dr Gosgrave was quickly requisitioned and the patient (was) soon recovering slowly'.

FEBRUARY - The vicar the Rev F.W. Carpenter gave a talk on the 'history of plants' to the Church of England Men's Society. When 96 people attended a Whist Drive in the National School it was reported that 'these functions appear to be gaining an increasing popularity'. Mr F. Bailey died of 'ruptured blood vessels in the lungs brought on by consumption'. He was 'of a bright and cheerful disposition'. Mr J. A. Atkinson was presented with a silver mounted ebony baton when he retired as conductor of Burton Ladies Choir.

MARCH - A song 'When I Am Tall' by five small children brought down the house at a children's concert produced by the Head Teacher Mr F.W. Corrie who thanked 'the mothers for making the necessary dresses for the children'. A committee of 28 gentlemen and 9 ladies was formed to organise the village celebrations

Tel: 01524 781973 Fax: 01524 781239 Mob: 07831 231492 for the Coronation of King George V and Queen Mary. The Squire Mr H. G. S. Hornby, who was elected chairman, offered to lend Dalton Park for the sports. It was hoped to restore the Market Cross as a permanent memorial.

APRIL - At Easter Boy Mummers paraded the streets as Jolly Boys acting traditional plays centred on the legend of St. George and the Dragon. Pace Egging was also popular. Motor traffic passing through the village was 'the most excessive ever experienced'. 66 years old William Barnes of Millnest who had been blind for 44 years was burned to death. 'Pointed remarks' were made at the inquest when it was reported that the deceased, after falling into his kitchen fire, had apparently rushed out of his house before collapsing on the canal bank but nobody had come to his assistance.

MAY - Miss Hornby resigned as the Chairman of the Conservative Habitation of The Primrose League. Under the heading 'Social Intercourse' it was reported that the CEMS had enjoyed a pleasant evening at the Vicarage where the Rev and Mrs Carpenter 'made every effort to promote the comfort and pleasure of their guests'. There were 31 candidates for grants from the Burton Educational Charity which, following in changes in the regulations, were fewer than in a recent years.

JUNE - Coronation Day celebrations commenced with the ringing of the Imperial Peal on the bells of the parish church. At 9.30am a procession headed by the Halton Band marched from the Market Cross to Underfell and then returned to the church where 'Miss Christine

Carpenter (gold medallist R.A.M.) niece of the vicar sang "O Worship the King".' Afterwards, Coronation Mugs were distributed by Mrs Shorland-Ball, and Mrs Cosgrave pinned on the breast of each child a button hole of sweet peas and gypsophila. There were 700 entries for the sports in Dalton Park where, as in the rest of the village, 'the profusion of flags and banners presented a gay appearance.' Late afternoon rain led to the postponement of the fancy dress and decorated cycle procession which took place later in the next week 'accompanied by Tired Tim's mouth organ Toy Band'.

JULY - A fortnight long Railway Strike 'paralysed' communications. The Westmorland Gazette was worried about 'the exodus from the countryside' caused by the emigration to the USA and to the Empire especially Canada and New Zealand. At the Whit Hiring Fares farm labourer's wages for six months work were higher than normal. Rates for Head Men were £16-£18, Second Men £11-£14 and Youths £6-£9. Very few women stood for hire'. Burton was 'enlivened' by a contingent of Yeomanry (Territorial Army Volunteers) who were in camp at Farleton scouting an imaginary enemy through the village. At 5 am crowds climbed Farleton Knott to see aeroplanes competing in a '£10,000 prize air race' but they only glimpsed two 'distant specs' on the far horizon.

AUGUST - 17 shillings and sixpence left over from the Coronation celebration funds were donated to the children's annual 'excursion' to Morecambe which was attended by 200 Burton residents. After years of complaint the village street was resurfaced with sprayed tar from Church Bank to The Square followed by a 'new mixture of concrete and pitch' as far as Heron

Syke. Harold Nelson of Bolton-le-Sands was fined £1 with costs for 'reckless motor-riding' through Burton. P.C. Elder said that the accused had covered a distance of 14 yards less than the measured 200 yard length at a speed of 26 miles and 550 yards per hour which the magistrate pronounced was 'altogether unreasonable' as Nelson 'knew the village'.

SEPTEMBER - Mrs Dobson provided 'a capital dinner' at The Green Dragon for the Atkinson Estate Rent Audit. The agent, Philip Rheam, hosted the event as the landlords lived in New Zealand. When a 'Liberal Van' visited Burton local Conservatives expressed opposition to the Liberal Government's Bill introducing payment for M.P.s. 84 Conservatives attended a Primrose League Whist Drive held in Morewood School at which Captain Bagot the Conservative MP warned that Home Rule for Ireland would bring anything but peace to the country. He also stated that 'socialistic views' voiced by a hand full of recently elected Labour M.P.s would not work.

OCTOBER - The parish council decided to light gas lamps in the streets earlier in the month than previously. An 'octogenarian' Mrs Dickinson died at Sandy Gap Farm, the residence of her son. She had been a widow for 36 years and had previously farmed at Thrang End, Yealand. It was reported that the Horticultural Show held in the Morewood School had been a great success and that a magnificent display of orchids and ferns from Mr Shorland-Ball's garden at Underfell had been much appreciated. They had been arranged by his head gardener Mr. Herdman.

NOVEMBER - There were fierce storms and floods



and windows were blown in during a hurricane. Mr Alston treated the CEMS to a lantern lecture 'showing beautiful views from the Trans-Siberian Railway.' Many local people were struck down in a severe epidemic of bronchitis.

DECEMBER - Mr Bradshaw gave 'an entertainment and a capital tea' for the school children while Mrs Shorland-Ball donated 'a number of red cloaks to the school girls which will afford good protection from the cold and wet and which are generally appreciated by the recipients'. 'On the Sunday evening before Christmas the church choir sang selections of carols and anthems in the Market Square and afterwards visited the principal residences in the locality'. After Christmas Evensong the church bell ringers gave a feu-de-joi in honour of the day'.

TONY WEYMOUTH 1938-2010

Tony Weymouth, who lived with his wife Marion on the west side of The Square, died three days after Christmas. He was a bright light in the village and he will be sorely missed and vividly remembered by many of us. For years he had struggled most stoically with cancer and with gruelling treatment for it, determined as he was to keep up the family activities: walking, writing, and theatre work which had always been his life.

Born in Kent, he had come to Lancaster in the Sixties as one of a wave of mature students who helped to shape the new university. They were eager to learn, and to speak from their own experience; to work intensively at their specialisms, and to supply the talent and bubbling energy for papers and magazines, festivals, demo's, and epic parties. Tony's specialism was French Studies, which at Lancaster was uniquely broad-based and up to date. He went on to teach at what is now the University of Central Lancashire in Preston. He loved France, also Greece, and this devotion to Europe fired his expertise in how the media deal with events such as the recent Balkan wars. In retirement he published three influential books, the last on the Kosovo crisis.

He experienced things to the full and as a whole: the food and wine of a country as well as its cinema and books, its hills and forests as well as its politics. He read and re-read with the close attention of a scholar, and also opened literature out into the community through the excellent productions of modern plays that

he directed at Warton, where he first lived when he came north. Marion too directs theatre with the finest skill and this unity between them lives on in the rich and characterful interior of their home.

Talking to him was delightful because he was bright and many-sided and humane. He loved to garden and to walk, covering endless miles with Marion and with friends, as much as he loved to think and debate. He was wholeheartedly taken up with his many family, from the younger members (children and stepchildren) to the older (he faithfully visited his mother in far-off Ramsgate into her extreme old age.) His equanimity towards the end was a true gauge of the man and makes the loss of him a shade less bitter.

Riding for Regain

From the marble towers of a moghul's mausoleum (the Taj Mahal) to the pink palace (Hawa Mahal) in Jaipur by handcycle (19-28 November 2010)

The objective of the ride was to raise money for REGAIN, the only charitable organisation dedicated solely to improving the independence of British men and women who have become tetraplegic as a result of a sports injury. Tetraplegia results from a severe spinal cord injury which interrupts messages to the brain and therefore causes paralysis below the injury to arms, legs and internal functions. As a tetraplegic myself as a result of an injury playing rugby in 1966, I am very keen to help the charity to help others who have suffered similar injuries diving, falling off horses, falling off mountains, mountain biking or in other sporting pursuits.

The distance was 390 kilometres. The time to complete the ride was 5 days. The weather was supposed to be dry and warm but in fact 4 days were wet and cold and caused some problems for the group of 6 disabled and 27 able-bodied cyclists. However everyone finished and in doing so will raise over £50,000 for REGAIN.

We saw great poverty in India alongside examples of magnificent architecture from the times of the moghuls. In the villages the people were warm and welcoming after the initial shock of seeing a troop of muddy bikers careering through their streets. They greeted us with the cry 'Ta Ta' and in some cases a begging hand. Those that stopped to distribute pens or sweets were quickly mobbed and had to escape.






