#### Academy Status

As a school classed as 'Good with Outstanding Features' by OFSTED, we are now eligible to apply to convert to Academy Status and have been invited to consider whether we wish to do so. The Governors have the initial responsibility to determine whether Academy Status would be the best option for our school and have been discussing the associated issues.

The Governors overriding concern is to ensure that we, as a school, continue to provide the very best opportunities for the children at Burton Morewood C of E School. Given the ever-changing economic position and the impact of potential further cuts on specific funding for our school, the Governors are assessing whether Academy Status would offer advantages over the current local education controlled structure.

We believe the key benefits for our school in becoming an Academy could be:

A significant increase in direct funding to our school.

Greater control over the school budget to achieve the very best for our children

Freedom from local authority administration to reduce the burden of bureaucracy allowing us to focus on teaching and learning whilst providing a rich curriculum Opportunity to replace local authority services more effectively and efficiently from other sources

The Governors are taking advice from other schools and professional advisors. Should the Governors determine that they believe Academy Status would be in the best interests of the whole school community, it would also be necessary to consult and obtain approval from the Diocese.

Whichever option is chosen by the Governors, there would be no change to the Christian character and ethos of our school and the links to church and the

Diocese would be maintained. Likewise there would be no change to the admissions policy. Parents, staff and the church would continue to be represented as they are now through the governing body.

One after another, as winter relented, the sounds and sights of spring appeared, like bright milestones. On January 24th the snowdrops along our shadiest flowerbed showed milk-white buds. On the 27<sup>th</sup> the the collared doves began to tune up -

not yet their full triple coo. By February the snowdrops were a full white thicket and purple crocuses were glinting here and there. By March 1<sup>st</sup> the rooks had begun to built nests in the surviving tall tree north of the Memorial Hall. During the month seven nests grew and grew, bristling black bundles two feet across. wonderfully balanced on the topmost forks. (Fifteen is the Burton maximum over the past



on the sunnier north verge of Boon Walks path and nettles were coming into leaf. On the 17th I saw green on hawthorn hedges, the first dandelion (up at Plain Quarry on the Kirkby Lonsdale road), and the first bumble bee in the garden. On the 27th primroses were gleaming like fresh butter on the southbound bank of the M6 between Carlisle and Penrith. The following day we saw our first violet on the track through the

> Nature Reserve near Holme Park Quarry. On April 5th we saw our first unfurled sycamore leaf, in the woods at Hayburn Wike north of Scarborough, and our first coltsfoot a colony of them under the eave of a double waterfall that cascades onto the shingle beach between the woods and the sea. On April 9th two swallows were perching on a cable above the road at Harewood, between Otley and Boston Spa.

thirty years. The seven or eight at the foot of Tanpits Lane disappeared altogether while Hall Gardens was being built. This year one has reappeared.)

By mid-March our snowdrops were so faded they were no longer beautiful. Daffodils were starting to replace them, dancing with colour on every bank and corner, finest of all the little wild ones dappling the floor of Brigsteer woods like sunspots. From March 14th the long, calm drought set in: high pressure, only the faintest breeze from the east-south-east, just two days with light showers, temperatures as high as 17°. It has been the seventh-driest March for a century. On the 14<sup>th</sup> the first celandines opened their yellow stars



I am not up for re-election this year. In the elections for our two member ward my turn comes up next year. But because of the District Council elections on Thursday 5 May I will avoid SLDC issues. On the county council we are implementing changes resulting from the coalition government's requirement that local authorities reduce their costs by 25% from the 2009 level over the next three years. We do not as yet know if the government will in return give us Supplementary Revenue Grant to enable us to freeze the Council Tax for 2012 -13 as every authority was able to do this year.

At the county's South Area Committee (not to be confused with SLDC) we discussed the effects of the spending reductions. 19 Cumbria bus services are being withdrawn of which 9 are in South Lakeland and will include the Beetham via Sedgwick to Kendal bus which cost about £5 subsidy per passenger. Fortunately Burton's 555 service is to be retained. This costs £78,400 pa with 75% being funded through subsidy at a cost of £3.60 per passenger journey. We also agreed to allocate £50,000 to the young persons' capped fare scheme which enables ticket reductions for youngsters up 19.

The highways revenue budget and minor carriageway



repairs budget is overspent by £10,467. But thanks to an extra central government grant of £2.3m we will step up repairs to pot holes. I think that we deserved a higher grant in view of Cumbria's extensive road mileage compared to our population, our high visitor numbers and also because our winter climate which caused so much damage is more severe than many other parts of the country. Hopefully 'extra-patching teams' will complete their repairs soon. I do not know as yet when the Main Street will be attended to but a permanent repair for the flood damaged road under the railway bridge has been ordered.

The Library review is planned for the Autumn following revelations that in 2010 half a million fewer books (18%) were taken out than in 2005 and that library visits are down by 20%. Fortunately our nearest library at Milnthorpe has seen an increase in use. Other matters being considered are the restoration of the Kendal Canal basin (yet again!) and improvements in local broadband.



#### Commenting on the goings-on at the Parish Council meetings

#### AFFRONT, OUTRAGE, AND INCREDULITY

#### **Outrage Number One**

Well, perhaps that's putting it a bit strongly, but it turns out that the plans submitted by the Burton Services for a wind turbine near the summit of Tarn Lane have been re-submitted because they failed to take into account the blades of the turbine, which add another 17m to its 50m height. Lovely chance for outrage, of which Pcllrs took full advantage - "In that case I withdraw my "yes" vote", declared one PCIIr. - "You'll be able to see it from Burton," was another disgusted comment. Confusion reigned. Was it a "yes," or a "no" or what? now that circumstances had changed. Only one PCIIr stalwartly maintained the view that all possible opportunities for renewable energy should be grasped. "Put 'em all out at sea." muttered another. A.O. is aware that this is a solution regarded with trepidation by many coastguards, and it's not so simple as it seems. But possibly the potential loss of life at sea is a fair tradeoff for Burton's disfigurement on the approach to the Burton Service Station? No objection was raised to planning application from the Service Station for illuminated advertising signs at the BP garage.

#### **Outrage Number Two**

This was in response to a ludicrous map sent to the PC from On High (i.e. Cumbria County Council's Senior Transport Policy Officer.) This outlines the TIMBER TRANSPORT AGREED ROUTES. In the covering



letter is the assurance that the map is the result of consultation with reps from the timber industry, viz. landowners, agents and timber hauliers. A.O., and more importantly, PCIIrs, were left wondering how the above officer earns his money. The map suggests transporting timber from the Hutton Roof timber yard through Hutton Roof and down Clawthorpe Lane, and down both Dalton Lane and Vicarage Lane - both of these through the centre of Burton, along the A6070. The impossibility of the Clawthorpe suggestion is obvious to anyone who knows the terrain, and so is the disruption that heavy trucks, often with trailers, would cause through the centre of Burton village. More aggravating still was the fact that the best solution has already been agreed with Irvings (Hutton Roof) and it works as satisfactorily as can be expected. A "forceful" letter of objection, outlining practical reasons, and suggesting that the present arrangement should remain, is to be sent on behalf of the PC. This entails bringing timber traffic down Dalton Lane, then left along the A6070, thus avoiding the narrow centre of Burton. If the initiator of the map got off his behind and came and had a look, it is surely likely he would see the practicality of the present situation. A.O. suggests it might be helpful if one of the conditions of his employment should be to check these routes in person.

But both the topics recorded above were by no means the earliest in what was a mercifully short meeting: First came Chairman's Announcements, the main one being the date of the Referendum (May 5) for or against the Alternative Vote, and at the same time, the election of a Dist Cllr. Burton has a very high voting record, so hope was expressed this will be the case at this election.



### **Open Forum**

#### 1. Fire Service Report

Fire Station Mgr Callum Graham disappointed all when he announced before giving his report that he is to take voluntary retirement. He had seemed so committed and enthusiastic. And best of all, he lives in Burton, which had carried a sort of reassurance that we could all sleep a bit more safely in our beds. He gave a positive Annual Report for Milnthorpe Fire Station. Fewer incidents have occurred, and no house fires, or any fatalities as a result of fire. Two firefighters have been recruited and are undergoing training. Five new fire engines, specially-designed narrow models to cope with narrow country lanes, have been commissioned. The PC Chairman thanked him for a comprehensive report, and wished him well in his retirement, as does A.O.

### 2. Police Report

PCSO Jessica Bullock sent a spandy report which was the envy of A.O. who would certainly take about a week to produce such a smart document:

a) The theft of fuel and scrap metal has become a problem – though so far no reports of such incidents in Burton. Residents are asked to keep a lookout for suspicious vehicles, and in particular to note their registration numbers.

b) An anti-windfarm sign in a garden was vandalised (set on fire).

c) An "altercation" arose after an RTC in (so A.O. understands) Main Street. Police enquiries are ongoing.

### **More Council Business**

Not much else to comment on, really. It was a mercifully

3. The PC rep on the Memorial Hall cttee reported that Phase 1 of the improvements programme (toilets) was progressing. He was a bit vague when asked about Phase 2, but hopefully details will be forthcoming.

4. A PCIIr made a strong case for further investigation into causes for flooding in Main St. at the Old Creamery.5. No progress so far re flooding under the railway bridge, or on resurfacing faults in Main Street.

6. It was reported that the cattle are grazing again on Burton Fell.

And now A.O. is off to graze on a cream bun and an Easter egg. Happy Easter, everyone.



# Historical Footnote by Roger Bingham

# A BURTON 'GRADUATION'

Most families are familiar with modern graduation ceremonies when our young people are awarded their degrees. Historically, fun and games to mark a young person's acquiring adult qualifications go back to rituals associated with the end - or 'loosening' of an apprentice's seven years training when he became a fully fledged craftsman. The end of his apprenticeship did, indeed, represent emancipation, for generally a youth of between 14 and 21 had to live with his 'master' where in return for a tiny, though progressively increasing wage, he was taught 'the secrets of the trade'. The apprenticeship contract was known as the indentures because it was drawn up on a double document - with one copy for the master on one side and the other for the apprentice - or his father - on the other. The two parts were then separated by a jagged or 'indentured' edge which in case of disputes could be matched to guarantee the authenticity of the agreement.

Locally the terms were very strict. Regarding the apprentice it was laid down that the 'apprentice his said master he shall dutifully serve, his secrets keep, his lawful commands gladly do. Cards dice or other unlawful games he shall not play, taverns or ale houses he shall not frequent, fornication he shall not commit, matrimony he shall not contract'. As part of instructing the lad 'after the best way, method or manner that he can' the master could 'in due manner correct and chastise him'. It was no wonder that at the end of his

training or servitude that the former apprentice believed he was entering a new life.

The antics when he bade farewell was called 'burying the old wife'. According to Daniel Scott in Bygone Cumberland and Westmorland (of 1899) 'at Burton around 1800 the late apprentice is taken into a room adjoining that where the party is met to celebrate the loosening, and after an old woman's cap is put on his head, the body is enveloped in a white sheet. He is then taken upon the shoulders of his comrades into the banqueting room round which he is carried a few times, in a not very solemn procession, and finally placed upon the boards whereon a grave is chalked. A kind of funeral is gone through, and the old wife is buried'. The lad then changed into a brand new set of 'decent wearing apparel' provided, according to custom, by the master whose service he was now free to leave as 'journey-man'.





# The Epic Tri - April 2011

So why would a national fund-raising endurance challenge have a connection with Burton? The answer is the village pub! When Ann France of the Kings Arms heard on the online social media site, Facebook, about a John O'Groats to Lands End cycle challenge passing through the village on Thursday 21 April, she promptly rang the support team and offered them food in the pub. The support team accepted with alacrity (perhaps they'd heard how good the Kings Arms food is?!) and at around 9pm the support team vehicles pulled up outside the pub on Main Street, where a small group awaited the arrival of the mad cyclists themselves.

The two cyclists Ant Emmet from Kendal and Bruce Duncan from Keswick, along with their support team, took over half of the pool room at the Kings Arms, much to the bemusement of the Sports Committee who were meeting in the other half, and proceeded to consume vast quantities of liquids along with the Kings Arms' excellent sausage and mash, whilst having their legs and shoulders massaged and treated by a team of physios, including Burton's very own Graham Theobald.

What made this trip somewhat different to others was firstly that it was being done on a tandem by Ant Emmet and Bruce Duncan - two of this country's top adventure athletes. And secondly, before setting off from John O'Groats on Wednesday 20 April they had already completed the Bob Graham Round, a gruelling trek over 65 miles, 42 mountain tops, overall a 27,000ft climb, all in less than 24 hours on Monday 18 and Tuesday 19 April!



They reached Lands End on Saturday 23 April at just after 2 in the afternoon - having cycled 874 miles, and being rather saddle-sore - some 16 hours behind schedule as a result of various adventures with the bike itself, and having very nearly being driven off the road by a car just a few miles short of their destination. After a short time to catch their breath and be photographed they were being hustled into the support van and heading on to stage 3 of their epic challenge.

Stage 3 was the annual Devizes to Westminster International Canoe Race, which takes place each Easter weekend on the Kennet and Avon canal and the river Thames. Ant and Bruce had entered in the senior doubles section, with a purpose-built kayak created by Fyne Boat Kits of Burneside, near Kendal. The Devizes to Westminster isn't just a canoe race though: along the canal the paddlers have to get out of their craft, get it out of the water, and carry it around locks - 77 obstacles to navigation which are called portages by the teams - and then get it afloat again with them in it and paddle to the next portage point. On reaching the river Thames the crews had to catch the tide at Teddington Lock, which they did with seconds to spare on Sunday night! Their progress downstream to Westminster aided by the outgoing tide meant they reached the finishing line at around 11.55pm on Sunday night, and were placed 73rd out of 108 teams at Westminster. The Devizes to Westminster course covers 125 miles and has to be done in less than 24 hours. By that time Ant and Bruce had been on the go almost non-stop for 6 whole days, and at the time of writing have managed to raise much of their £25,000 target for Cancer Research UK but donations to their fund are still welcome - if you'd like to help



them reach their target you can make a donation online at http://uk.virginmoneygiving.com/team/theepictri

We watched their progress via their live tracker (GPS) feed on the internet all the way and we were exhausted just thinking about what they did. How they have the stamina to handle such extreme endurance events we really don't know, and I'm in total awe of them. I'm not normally starstruck but watching what these two men have done this week has made me realise just what giants they are amongst men, and I'm humbled to have met them and shaken their hands when they stopped at the Kings Arms here in Burton on Thursday evening.


# Burton Memorial Hall **PAT Testing**
