

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

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Outdoors

Six weeks ago we saw a buff, middle-sized bird beside the daffodils in our front yard. It flew off before we could identify it. A few days later something similar skimmed across the back garden, north to south. What was it? Roughly the colour of a songthrush; much too big for that. Most likely it was a sparrow-hawk.

Three times in that same week I heard owls calling in full daylight, twice at the entrance to the Holme Park nature reserve, once in the Trowbarrow woods near Leighton Moss. This happens only occasionally before dusk, according to our bird book. Such beautiful moments set me remembering the times I've had what, for me, was a unique glimpse of some fellow creature. Amongst the hot boulders at Masada, near the Dead Sea in Israel, an ibex walked calmly away, its hooves clicking on stone. In the Transvaal, as we cooked supper at the mouth of a cave in the Blouberg, a pair of hyraxes (tiny relatives of the elephant) jinked amongst the rocks. Next morning, on our way up the 1300-foot cliff, as we looked out at a distant settlement (more like a concentration camp with its grids of huts), the air beside us thrummed with wing-beats as a horde of Pallid swifts darted about fly-catching. One of their slim feathers lay on a ledge two hundred feet up. Above our garden two of our own swifts clicked together in mid-air as their beaks kissed.

In the Magaliesberg, north of Johannesburg, a herd of little black antelopes ran and jumped across the

grassland as though on springs and sprinted off - Klipspringers, which suggested the name for our black lurcher Klipper. Near Hambantote in the south of Sri Lanka, the car (with baby daughter in the back) threatened to get bogged down in a mire across the track. The sun was setting. As I reversed and nerved myself to charge through, I saw three crocodiles on a berm two hundred yards away, their great jaws resting on the bank.

Such animal moments need not be exotic. As we fished off the Cornish coast near Penzance, another passenger caught a three-foot conger. It threshed about on the deck, hissing throatily and lunging at people's feet. When the captain tried to kill it by stabbing his knife into its skull, it threshed all the more, with the knife jutting up like a submarine's periscope. As unique a sighting, for me, was the huge dark-brown bird which lifted off from a boulder on Mingulay, in the Outer Hebrides, and cruised off downwind over the sea - a white-tailed or sea eagle, not long reintroduced from Norway. In Torridon (Wester Ross), as I drove slowly through a pine wood, I happened to look left and saw a wild cat glaring at me, with its broad face and bushy tail.

All these moments were like inlets into wild nature - or rather, they were reminders of the nature we belong to and share with eagles and eels, crocodiles and swifts, hyraxes, ibexes, owls, and sparrowhawks. If we harm them needlessly, we're tearing wounds in the fabric of life which includes ourselves. That's why I'm glad when sea eagles are no longer persecuted (the last eggs laid in Britain were destroyed by a Shetland





minister in 1905), and when crocodiles are no longer made into handbags and wallets, and ibexes are no longer hunted for their horns, or hawks poisoned by DDT, or fishing is not for sport but only for our food.

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News from Burton Morewood School

This term in Key Stage 2, Years 5 and 6 are continuing their study of Rivers and doing a special project on the Olympics. Years 3 and 4 are working on a project on Ancient Greece. The younger children are working on their project on Journeys. They are planning a summer visit on this theme too. Year 3 and 4 are looking forward to their visit to the Buddhist Priory at Ulverston.

We are celebrating the Jubilee with a Kings and Queens Dressing up Day. The Quarry are kindly sponsoring a commemorative mug for all the children and these will be presented by them and the Parish Council on the 1 June.

We have also planned two exciting Creative Days, more details later this term. Do have a look at our web site for many photographs of past events. www.burtonmorewood.cumbria.sch.uk.

A big well done to our Year 3 and 4 hockey team who won the Kendal Area Tournament competing against many of the bigger schools. They are now through to the area final. Our Year 3 gymnasts won the local heat at Dallam School and went on to come second in the area final at Cartmel. Our Year 5 gymnasts came a very good second in the local heat.

All of our Year 5 and 6 children had a super time during their ski lessons on the dry slope in Kendal. Thank you so much to all of you who have helped with transport and supervision, we couldn't have done it without you.

Cricket Club and Magazine Club are both running this term for the older children. The book fair enabled us to choose £165 worth of free books. Family Bingo raised £657. The Spring Fair raised £507. Thank you for all your help and support.

The Government have increased funding to schools for children who have free school meals. If you feel you may be eligible, do pop in for a form.

We offer a recycling drop off for batteries, ink cartridges and mobile phones in the entrance hall.

As a successful academy we can apply to the DFE for special funding for building work. As ever, they work to a tight time scale, so we are applying for planning permission in the hope that even if we are not successful this year we can apply again in the future. We wish to improve our hall as well as toilet, cloakroom and classroom facilities.

Please take care parking and driving around school. Do not park on the faded white lines as you turn into Morewood Drive and remember, the space by the main gate is for disabled badge holders only. We have a petition in the office for the 20mph campaign; do pop in to add your signature.

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Commenting on the goings-on at the Parish Council meetings

The only change in the council 'chamber' since last month was a ladder leaning outside the window on the Chairman's right. It looked like the set for a highbrow play on the Edinburgh Fringe, or maybe a piece of gear left by a careless spook who'd been installing a bug above our heads. GCHQ Cheltenham are probably not worried by what goes on up here, so none of us felt seriously threatened.

Business was much as usual, except for an opening tribute to Richard Boddy and a silence in his memory.

PC Jess Bullock's crime report showed a small rise on last month's zero - an attempted break-in at a garage and two metal thefts. Cllrs. hoped that the police crackdown on this trade would include a stop to the untraceable cash payments that are made to the villains by the scrapyards. A less valuable theft was bags of clothes left out for a charity to collect on Morewood Drive.

The P.T.A. is hoping to replace playground equipment next month. It was suggested that a Cllr. could look at the old gear to assess it - he was reluctant to do so, since 'if they think it needs replacing, they're probably

right.' On another aspect of what nowadays gets called 'infrastructure', the Chairman reported a mess of bottles being left at the disposal point at the Memorial Hall. He clears them away and ends up 'with his hands stinking of old alcohol.' The M.H. Committee should tackle the problem, perhaps by imposing a refundable levy on bodies hiring the Hall.

In the public forum the only villager to raise a point was Alt. O.'s colleague from the Westmorland Gazette on behalf of 'us ancients on the Press table. Would the Cllrs, please speak up.' The Chairman endorsed this and seemed to think that nobody would take a blind bit of notice. Which is true.

The accounts were as usual lucidly and exactly presented by the Clerk, who also presented the schedule of funding for Jubilee events in June. C.C.C. are offering £500 only if the bodies involved would agree to be monitored and to present all receipts, which he considered 'onerous.' The events concerned include the Village Party, which will cost £300; the Sports Day and Carnival (£400); mugs for the children (which the quarry is funding); and some lesser costs. If each grant is divided between the Parish Council and Cumbria C.C., this will bring in the same money with no need for the monitoring, etc - a cunning plan which everyone agreed with murmurs of admiration and relief.

The royal oak sapling has arrived! The Chaiman pointed triumphantly to a little white box three feet long and four inches square which was lying on the counter. No sapling in it, sad to say - it's being looked after in its wee flowerpot by the Clerk's wife. The Clrs. can't think

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yet where to plant this tiny wand. Unsuitable sites, for what will be a giant oak one day, were duly chatted about, until the Chairman reminded us that 'by then we'll all be dead.' So the tiny wand will be looked after by Mrs Parish Clerk for a year while the ideal site appears to someone in a dream. When a protective cage for the oak was discussed, Alt.0. was ticked off by a Cllr. for revealing its probable cost in last month's B.N. when he, the Cllr., was angling to get one for nothing. I suppose this shows how cunning and inthe-know you have to be when you dabble in political journalism.

The P. Council's quarterly newsletter - is it necessary? Does it cost too much? (£360 p.a.) Some thought it should be replaced by an e-version. Someone else thought people might ignore this whereas they probably read the paper letter when it comes through the door. Others thought the door-to-door delivery gave people a chance to buttonhole the Cllr. doing the delivering. Others again have never once been buttonholed in eleven years. It was decided by 4 votes to 1 to try an e-version for a year, with publicity to say that a paper version can still be picked up in the shop and elsewhere for people who are still, as the Chairman put it, 'e-illiterate' - almost as new a word as 'zumbathon' and 'slebrity'.

Just as Alt.O.'s concentration was fading a little, a rivetting agenda item was reached: No. 11, 'To determine what, if any, comment to make on the developing arrangements for dealing with alleged breaches of a future code of conduct.' This may or may not be as fine-spun and remote as the mediæval

research into how many angels could stand on the point of a pin. One Cllr. suggested (jokingly, of course) that 'We could do what Jeremy Clarkson suggests, take 'em out and shoot 'em.' Eight minutes or so were spent in mocking this latest 'meaningless consultation', as the Chairman put it, while Alt.O. found himself wondering if it was significant (or mattered in the least) that three of the seven males present sported beards. Their venerable appearance, like frost on a clump of grass, certainly adds to the collective look of mature wisdom.

As the meeting crumbled into a general conversation, it was noted that nobody, nobody whatsoever, would like the now vacant butcher's shop to be turned into a take-away, and anyway it would require permission for change of use. So Alt.O., along with A.O., may never be able to dash across Main Street at the last minute for a cheeseburger or a plate of chips with curry sauce.

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Historical Footnote by Roger Bingham

BURTON'S HOT AND COLD SPRING - 50 YEARS AGO

The weather in the early months of 1962 grabbed public attention. After a mild January, February was cold with 20 days of frost; then in March temperature rose to 65 °F and reservoirs sank to threaten a water shortage.

Summer-time began with a heavy snow fall and 'the coldest April day - since 1903 except for 1947.' Then at Easter the sun and the motorists came out.

There was a fatal accident at Beetham Bridge, Burton was pulverised with holiday traffic, 1,860 cars per hour went through Kendal, and such were the crowds at Arnside that there were demands for a public car-park; 50 years later they are still asking!

On the 20 April the first swallows arrived - two weeks earlier than usual - and it was warm enough for Burton cubs and scouts to brave camping in Dallam Tower Park. Then, as April merged into May, a furious gale was followed by eleven days of rain.

Local farmers were worried about the damp bringing on twin lamb disease. Even so, they joined in a shoot which bagged 80 carrion crows.

Easter wedding headlines included, 'Mr J Atkinson weds Miss J Atkinson at St James' Church,' Funerals

included those for Mrs Mary Crayston of Barton Row, and of Leonard Wildgoose of Drovers Way. He was a First World War veteran who had been wounded at Ypres, and had then worked as a platelayer on the railways. He had also, perhaps appropriately, kept a large flock of poultry including (domesticated) geese.

Meanwhile the body of a German Prisoner of War who had died at Bela River Camp in the 1940s was exhumed, to be buried, not in his divided home land, but at a POW cemetery in Staffordshire.

In Burton, Mr Francis Howarth died at his daughter's home at Heronsyke. He had worked most of his life on the Dalton Hall estate and had served in France and Belgium in the First World War. In the Second War he was awarded the British Empire Medal for commanding the Burton Home Guard.

In June the will of Mrs Maude Burrell, widow of Capt T. A. B. Burrell of Fern House, earned a headline on the Westmorland Gazette's main news page, 'Burton Widow leaves £25,728!'

By and large, life was becoming easier. Rediffusion ITV started, but there were worries that Border Television would not reach Burton. TVs could be rented for 7/6 per week, with fridges at 3/6 and washers at 5/3.

Finally Mrs Boldy won a WI competition for a soap sculpture, and the ladies were treated to a talk from Mrs Taylor of Silverdale on 'correct corsetry.'

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A team of 8 Cumbrian cyclists have taken up the monumental challenge of riding 1,000 miles from Land's End to John O'Groats. The ride will take 10 days starting 20 April, covering around 100 miles per day. They are fundraising for Alice's Escapes, a new charity founded by Ulverston teenager, Alice Pyne, and her family. The charity's aim is to provide holidays for seriously ill children and their families, one which we think is such a worthy cause.

One of the cyclists was Simon Broomfield, formerly



of Burton and now living in Ulverston. Simon's wife Cathy, who is the daughter of Burtonians Reg and May Hesketh, was driving one of the support vehicles. On Tuesday 24 April the team reached Burton, which is almost the half-way point, and BN was there to meet them and have a chat whilst they lunched in the car park. Tuesday's leg was Warrington to Ulverston, and the team were in fine spirits despite a drizzly day. This was, they told us, a nice level section so fairly easy riding!

After a stop of around an hour, and to the accompaniment of cheers from the children at Burton Morewood School, who had escaped their classrooms to wave the team off, the cyclists set off for Ulverston, where they would be met by a police escort and where Alice's charity *Alice's Escapes* would be launched the same day. Cathy told us that, so far, the trip had raised around £6,000 and they hoped that figure would increase over the rest of the journey.

Roger Reports...

from the district & county councils

Owing to the district council elections on 3 May I will restrict my comments to county council and general matters. Firstly an apology about my last month's suggestion that Burton residents could go to Hale Moss to see the Olympic torch leave the county on the A6. Unfortunately I had assumed that the torch would be carried by an athlete. I have subsequently learned that it will be conveyed in a lorry for most of its zig-zag journey through the county. Thus, on Friday 22 June the torch's entourage will leave Bowness, at breakfast time, for Kendal, where it will be collected by the first of a relay of runners at the top of Windermere Road, and then twine through the town to Helsington Laithes on the A6, to be driven eight miles to Milnthorpe. Here, at 10 am, it will be run down the hill, through the traffic lights to Bob Parrot's shop at the end of Beetham Road, when it will go back onto the lorry to be convoyed to Lancaster. As far as I know it will not be 'run' through Carnforth and the half mile trek through Milnthorpe will take about ten minutes.

The county council is considering its priorities now that the various savings are being implemented in accordance with the decision not to increase the Council Tax for 2012-13. These include rebuilding Cumbria's six most dilapidated schools (none are in our area), the refurbishment of care homes and a new home at Barrow, the future of rural bus services following a cut in grant from the coalition government, library reorganisation and investment in the Newton Rigg University campus. As always highways will have a top priority. But thanks to a 'mildish' winter we have excellent stocks of salt and grit. Wider issues include the boundary commission reports on possible extension of the National Parks and new county division and parliamentary constituency boundaries. I believe that division boundaries will not change until after next year's county election, when our Lower Kentdale Division could lose Mansergh to the Sedbergh - Kirkby Lonsdale Division. Political parties will not be able to chose prospective parliamentary candidates for the envisaged 2015 General Election until the constituency boundaries are fixed.

Growing problems include the rise in number of lookedafter children, when nationally the number of fostercare children has reached 10.000 for the first time. Also the number of children on the Protection Care Plan has increased, but compares well with the national figures. Good news includes the reduction in the amount of waste going to landfill, GCSE achievement is above the national average, and the gap between pupils on free meals and other Key Stage 4 pupils is narrowing; repairing highways is much quicker - down to 7.5 days, and more people believe that the police are dealing satisfactorily with crime and anti-social behaviour. Also the Cumbria Community Messaging service, which includes Neighbourhood Watch, and provides information on trading standards and emergency services, is expanding - contact

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The Vicar Writes...

The Titanic's last hero

100 years on from her tragic maiden voyage, the world remains captivated by the Titanic and the stories of those on board. For me, the story of John Harper stands out. He was the minister of a Baptist church in Glasgow and was sailing on the Titanic to conduct a mission in Chicago. A gifted evangelist, his preaching had been used by God to lead many to Jesus Christ.

Survivors reported how, in the days leading up to the disaster, Harper shared the love of Christ with those he met on board. When it became apparent in the early hours of 15 April that the ship was doomed, Harper responded with courage, compassion and faith. He woke his daughter, wrapped her in a blanket and carried her on to the deck. Kissing her goodbye, he handed her to a crew member who put her safely in lifeboat number 11. Harper then gave his life jacket to another passenger, effectively ending his own chance of survival.

Survivors later told of seeing him on deck surrounded by people, pleading with them to receive Christ and praying for them. As the the Titanic disappeared beneath the surface of the North Atlantic, Harper was left with hundreds of others fighting for his life in the icy water. Using a floating piece of wreckage he swam up to every person he could find, urging them to turn to Jesus Christ. Four years after the Titanic went down a young Scotsman rose in a meeting in Hamilton, Canada, and gave the following testimony:

I am a survivor of the Titanic. When I was drifting alone on a spar that awful night, the tide brought John Harper, also on a piece of wreck, near me. "Man," he said, "are you saved?" (He meant, "Do you have God's gift of eternal Salvation?") "No," I said. "I am not." He replied, "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and you shall be saved" (Acts 16:31). The waves bore him away, but brought him back a little later. "Are you saved now?" he asked. "No," I said, "I cannot honestly say that I am." He said again, "Believe in the Lord Jesus Christ and you shall be saved." A short while later he went down, and there, alone in the night with two miles of water under me I believed. I am John Harper's last convert.

As Harper's biographer, Moody Adams says: "Harper's last convert was won by Harper's last words...There were many heroes on the Titanic, but, helping others as he drowned, John Harper was the last." (Moody Adams, The Titanic's Last Hero, Ambassador p.25)

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Look out! Hitch-hikers about!

Picked up a hitch-hiker recently? Many of you may have unknowingly provided a means of transport for some very sneaky, adaptable and UNWANTED species of plants and animals, and dropped them off in our precious waterways. Invasive non-native species, or INNS, are becoming more prevalent throughout the UK and Cumbria and can have devastating impacts on our ecosystems, recreational and local amenities, infrastructure and the economy. They are now the 2nd greatest cause of biodiversity loss globally.

Cumbria hosts a number of rare and protected wetland habitats. These unique areas are at risk from imported pond and ornamental garden plants and animals found in shipping ballast released into UK ports, all of which can thrive here and out-compete native species and degrade the habitat. When contained and managed responsibly, these plant species can be considered as pleasant additions to gardens. However because of their ability to grow and reproduce rapidly, when allowed to escape into the wild they cause huge and damaging impacts.

You may wonder how some of these species become so invasive, so here are a few facts: Himalayan Balsam – can produce up to 800 seeds per plant which are spread from their exploding seed pods. The seeds also survive dormant for up to 2 years in the soil before germination. Japanese knotweed – can reproduce and spread from a piece of root/rhizome the size of your little fingernail! (0.6g) Floating pennywort - can grow

up to 20cm a day. Killer shrimp – can survive out of water for 6 days. Crayfish plague – is a fungus which can survive between 6-22 days without a host under wet or damp conditions.



South Cumbria Rivers Trust, Lune Rivers Trust and the Cumbria Freshwater Invasive Non-Native Species Initiative are striving to protect, control and eradicate INNS from our catchments across south Cumbria and the rest of the county – a huge undertaking. We need the support and help from local residents, organisations, businesses and visitors to stop the spread. So how can you help?

1 - Check Clean Dry

Check all clothing, footwear and equipment before leaving a river or lake and remove any plant fragments or invertebrates and leave on site. Clean if possible with tap water to remove anything you might have missed. Then, ensure everything is thoroughly dried before visiting a new watercourse.

2 – I Spy...

Enjoy a walk out and about? Help us to survey the catchment whilst you're out enjoying the countryside and get into areas you may not have been before. We need to find source populations of INNS so we can start our control efforts from the headwaters down to the coast. Training and equipment provided if you can provide your own transport and a bit of time.



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3 - Be Plant Wise

Although it may seem like the right thing to do, please don't re-home your aquatic pond plants in the wild. You might unknowingly have aquatic INNS in your pond. When you clean out your pond, please make sure that you compost everything that comes out and do not put it in the wild. When these plants are released into the wild they can smother our native plants, clog our waterways, exacerbate flooding and remove oxygen from the water which can harm fish, invertebrates and other species.

4 - Balsam Bash

Join us for an hour or few or however much time you can spare to help remove patches of Himalayan balsam from riverbanks with one of our work parties. Meet like-minded people from around the area, get a sense of satisfaction seeing these areas shrink and seeing new and varied native species start to inhabit in the following seasons.

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
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Cumbria Wildlife Trust Hutton Roof Saturday 19 May

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Authors' Day at Dalton

On Sat 21 April Barry and I attended the annual authors' day at Dalton. Now in its third year, this event was the brainchild of Catherine Cousins at 2QT Ltd., an independent publishing services business, who are based in the Stable Yard Offices. The authors' day brings together both would-be authors and those who have actually published their book or, in some cases, books, and gives them the chance to talk informally about how the process works, and how Catherine and her team can help an author achieve their goal. Her aim is to enable and support authors who want to selfpublish, and as Barry has already published his novel, Moonbeams, as an ebook and a print-on-demand paperback, we wanted to explore what other possibilities there are, so information about audio books was of particular interest. There was also a discussion about how to promote and sell your book once it's been printed or made into an ebook, and the reasons why people want to write the books they write.

2QT will undertake to read, for free, any manuscript an author wants to publish, and their initial consultations are free too. If they don't feel a manuscript is ready for publishing they will suggest what work needs to be done, but if they think it's really never going to be suitable for publishing they will say that too, unlike vanity publishing, where anything can be printed if the author is prepared to pay the fee!

Already they have a number of authors who have already produced a wide range of titles, ranging from children's stories to fantasy and historical fiction, memoirs and poetry. One of their new interest areas is outdoor titles: books about walking and climbing, and other such pursuits. Catherine's ethos is to help empower authors, and she's gathered around her a team of people who share her principles and who have, between them, an impressive number of years in the publishing trade. Having local access to the sort of advice and expertise that one normally associates with big London publishing houses is amazing, and can only be a benefit to those who, like Barry and me, have stories we want to tell. Catherine also told us that she has started hosting workshops for writers, run by specialists in different areas of writing and publishing, and a list of these can be found on her website.
