solution is to install a quantity of echo-reducing panels on the ceiling and the walls at the rear of the hall. This will reduce the echo time (currently over 4 seconds) down to a shade over 1 second. It's that big echo time which makes the hall so noisy as every sound bounces around the hall and intereferes with subsequent sounds. Improving the acoustics will not only help at events such as music and drama productions, but will also make a better environment for Pre-school, table tennis, Boys' Brigade, and all the other user groups. We need to raise £2,700 for the panels, so we've agreed Saturday 28 July for the dance night/gig. Music will be by Aurora, the fabulous village-based five-piece band which comprises Mo and Kellie Witham, Ian McCutcheon, Mike Slinger and Dave Allsop. There will be a wine and bottled/canned beer/lager bar (so please don't fetch your own) and soft drinks, and in the interval we'll have a raffle and a whisky roll to help boost the funds too. It will be a night of music to dance to, so dust off your dancing shoes, dig out your gladrags and come and boogie the night away. Tickets on sale from 1 July from Burton Village Store, £6 each, and only 140 tickets so get yours soon! WELLS FOR INDIA

Thank you for your support at our craft stall during the recent Art & Craft Exhibition at BMH. £222 was raised for Wells for India: £200 provides an underground rainwater storage tank to hold 25,000 litres and collect the monsoon rains to meet the water needs of a family for the next 4-8 months. In periods of drought when stored water is used up, the taanka serves as a storage tank for water brought by camel or tractor tanker. £5 provides a family with water during the drought season. This area of N.W. India is roughly the size of the U.K. and is home to 60m. people. Although the economy of India is growing, 1/3rd of the world's poorest people live in India. Where possible, Wells for India works with local partners to provide year-round access to water. Rajasthan has very erratic rainfall, with only 100-500mm. in a few summer months. Temperatures can rise to 50°C. and droughts are frequent. Life, particularly for the women, revolves around the need to find, fetch and store water. Water is the key to good health. Thank you for helping bring water and dignity to the poorest people of rural Rajasthan.

Outdoors

What are we to call the path that leads uphill from the north-east corner of the Square? I still think of it as the Post Office path, from the days when the P.O. was housed in No.1 and Ken Casson was postmaster. Kath Hayhurst, Burton's historian, says its proper name is Boon Town Path. Some call it Shit Alley, which is quite unfair (Morecambe Prom. is much worse). Anyway, it is a perfect footway, an easily accessible, half-wild thoroughfare which Burtonians can use and enjoy in freedom and safety.

Once winter is over, and any mud has firmed up, the path becomes a channel of beautiful growth. I've counted thirty-three species there. If I were more knowledgeable, I could probably add a dozen more. That includes trees, bushes, flowers, and ferns; not grasses or mosses. The place is a living calendar. Almost before its verges have started to green and thicken, blackthorn blossom appears, like snowshowers caught amongst dark bristling twigs. A little later the north verge is one long constellation of celandines. This year they closed down like little umbrellas once that biting cold April set in. Not long after, cow-parsley raises its handsome stalks like miniature green trees, and climbing vetch glints purple amongst nettles and buttercups.

Such a place is a living chronicle and a trigger for all sorts of memories. Silverweed reminds me of its flourishing on the machair of South Uist and above the shingle beach on Mingulay; the islanders used to eat its roots. Dockens remind me of rubbing their leaves to take the smart out of nettle stings - my father showed me how they often grow next each other. The path is not a thoroughfare only for people. Blackbirds run along it for yards before swerving off above, or into, the hedges. Butterflies waltz and flutter along its space, although they could easily 'escape' into the fields. Even water uses it, leaching slowly from the higher ground. It often takes three days before heavy rain sends down a flow to the barred drain beside the derelict beer garden behind the Royal.

How old is the path? Its straightness suggests an early 19th century date, when much of England was portioned off (and landlords grabbed the commons.) Oblong fields suggest that kind of fairly recent date. When I was doing fieldwork in Swaledale with Maurice Beresford, an expert in lost villages, he told me that the oldest fields often have curving edges because when somebody breaks new ground with a spade, he usually works outward on an arc from where he started.

Sometimes when you walk up the path an engine throbs beside you - a tractor, invisible on the other side of the hedge where the concrete road runs up to the barns in the field above. It's like taking a 19th century walk with a 21st century soundtrack. The path will once have had practical uses, since it links the village centre with the old orchard at the top. There was a garden there too - its elegant tooled gateposts stand at its entrance. One apple tree, long unpruned, still drops its yellow fruits onto the patches of snowdrop foliage. A few currant bushes run wild in a corner. Sloes flourish at the orchard's northern exit - why does nobody pick

Commenting on the goings-on at the Parish Council meetings

A New Face for a Diamond Year and what's more it's not another masculine one

True, the newest P.Cllr. has been in place since May, but her presence was a welcome surprise to An Opinion after her own long absence from the scene. A.O. wishes her all good things and hopes she'll stick it out, being, as A.O. suspects, new to the slow-moving and often frustrating committee scene. What a pity, though, that Burton still can't muster enough candidates to have a genuine election.

PUBLIC FORUM

This is the part of the meeting where residents of Burton feel strongly enough to muster their strength to put their point to the meeting. For the rest of the time they are expected to keep quiet and just listen (unless business is suspended.)

A 20 mile speed limit through Main Street - New Campaign

A.O. has been present at so many P.C. meetings, that she knows this idea has long ago been discounted. But changes happen, so who knows if this campaign will bear fruit? As far as P.Cllrs. are concerned,- after more than one consultation with the Highways Dept.-, there can never be a 20 m.p.h. speed limit on an Aroad. (Main Street, part of the A6070, is a de-trunked A-road, but it still keeps the 'A' designation.)

The group who are campaigning for a 20 m.p.h. limit had elected one of their members to prepare a carefully documented list of traffic incidents that had occurred on Main Street. The incidents are many and various. Some were never reported to the Police (though witnessed by one or other of those present), and some were not particularly the result of undue speeding, but they did serve to illustrate the hazards of the often narrow and bendy street.

Not everyone can be expected be familiar with the conventions of P.C. meetings. So it was confusing for all (including some P.Cllrs.) when the direction was given for the case only to be presented by the Forum, and discussion by the P.Cllrs. to await the relevant item listed in the P.C. Agenda. The Chairman moved this item forward for said discussion, and had the campaigners waited after their presentation, they could have heard the decisions and comments of P.Cllrs. But they didn't wait, and A.O. sympathised with them in this situation, which seemed to be a bit of a mix-up all round.

So here is A.O.'s take on the P.C. outcome: it was generally agreed that there was no chance of the imposition of a 20 m.p.h. limit. (A.O. wonders if it would be worthwhile finding out if there are any precedents for such a limit on any English A- roads?) The Clerk is to invite an S.L.D.C. Highways official to talk to the P.C. about the traffic problems peculiar to Burton. Some practical suggestions re traffic were made. e.g. that there should be a designated Exit and Entry point at the Memorial Hall car park, for which the P.C. would pay for the signage. And road markings already suggested but not carried out might alert drivers to lack

of pavement and so on.

Police Report

Our very own C.P.S.O. was unable to be present, being tied up with Appleby Fair. In her written report she warned of the continued theft of metal, particularly war memorial plaques and so on. And the theft of bicycles – in Burton a shed was broken into, and a Raleigh bike stolen. Other crimes in Burton were the theft of £5000 worth of tools stolen from a lockup. Another bizarre episode occurred as food for a buffet was being unloaded from a van/car at the Memorial Hall, a man approached and offered to help carry in the food. His offer was accepted, and afterwards he drove off with the vehicle! Needless to say, if you can help with info about any of these crimes, the police would be grateful. Not to mention the victims.

A.O.'s report so far hasn't even begun the nitty-gritty business of the Parish Council. So here some of it is, in what hopefully will turn out to be a nutshell:

Surplus to Requirements?

A.O. has never pretended to be a whizz at figures, but a helpful check-up on the obfuscating numbers in his meticulously-prepared financial report from the maestro himself, confirmed her impression that Burton Parish Council finances are in excellent health. If you count a surplus of at least £4000 (taking all possible costs owing or possibly about to be owed into account, and still allowing for a surplus of around £5000.) Now since this is money we have all contributed to, it's to be hoped that it can be put to some extra use that we can all benefit from. This is a pet bug of A.O.'s - the fear that something awful is about to happen, or may happen

and £4000 will put it to rights is remote. If the banks go bust we'll be glad we at least have extra park benches or daffodils to comfort ourselves with. Even if we have to burn the benches for firewood or eat the daffodil bulbs (they're poisonous. It's a joke.) So go to it, P.Cllrs. Branch out on some new and surprising project to take our breath away.

The Milestone at Dalton

The PC accepted Able Memorials £304 estimate for refurbishment. This will include the £150 grant from the Milestone Society, the provision being that guidelines from the Society are followed.

Daffodils

The suggestion that daffodils should be planted on verges converging on the village was discussed. Most seemed in favour of choosing native species rather than the hybridised varieties. Concern was expressed by a member of the public that any planting might impede the use of verges which she felt are essential to preserve as refuge for pedestrians on the major road. It was agreed that this should be taken into account when selecting planting sites. The cost of bulbs is to be investigated.

Reports (Just a few of them)

- 1. Plain quarry Strimming has been done round the picnic tables. Care has been taken to preserve growth of the service trees, a local species, near the steps, by reducing other vegetation.
- 2. Memorial Hall Report (in his absence) Unable to attend, the representative submitted a written report: The request for a plastic recycling skip will be considered later. So will the matter of Christmas lights

Historical Footnote by Roger Bingham

Burton in the Summer of the Austerity Olympics, 1948

Britain's last Olympic Games in 1948 received minimal coverage. Television would not reach Burton until 1951, austerity cuts reduced newspaper reports, and newsreels of The Games 'on at the pictures' in Lancaster or Kendal lasted barely ten minutes. So, inevitably, local folk concentrated in coping with a changing world. There were complaints that recently 'civilianised' German prisoners of war from Bela River Camp had failed to give up their seats to ladies on crowded buses. Councillors contended that a move 'to allow Sabbath games would empty Sunday Schools' while 'women police would be no earthly use in Westmorland.' They also refuted a Boundary Commission proposal to join the old county to North Lancashire.

Everything was in 'short supply'. Bread, un-rationed during the war, was now 'on the ration', tinned food sent by the Canadian Red Cross was distributed to old-aged pensioners, while Lakeland hoteliers predicted ruin when a cut in the basic petrol allowance threatened to keep visitors away. Clothes rationing caused most brides to choose every day wear, but Betty Kendal of Dalton Lane was able to boast that when she married Peter Tyson at Burton Church she, exceptionally, had a 'white wedding - just like (almost) Princess Elizabeth.'

Agriculture was booming, although weather conditions were variable with the hottest Whitsuntide on record, followed by a wet August when there were only four days without rain. Mr. W. Parsons of Overthwaite sold a Shorthorn bull for £500 and Mr. W. Dobson's bull from Dalton Home Farm won first prize at Lunesdale Show. At Burton Show local champions included Messrs. Newsholme's Shire horses, Mr. W. Bainbridge's Ayrshire Bull while Mrs. Pemberton, Mrs. Cummings and Miss Lees dominated the domestic classes. Cake ingredients included dried egg powder but Mrs. E. Crayston acquired the shelled variety to win a W.I. competition for 'the prettiest dyed egg.'

Property sales included a Vicarage Lane bungalow which realised £3,100, four times its pre-war value. 14 acres at Sandy Gap brought £1,100, 8 acres at Hilderstone £700, 9 acres at 'Bleazes' (sic) £700.

Miss S. Bell 'proprietess of Burton's oldest business namely a confectioners' died and, also, Mr. R. W. Bainbridge. He was 'an authority on Pedigree Cattle and a clever musician' being St James' Church organist. During the war he had performed for E.N.S.A. and, previously, had accompanied silent films on cinema organs.



The Vicar Writes...

Great Olympic Moments Paris 1924: Eric Liddell - The Flying Scotsman

Olympic history is full of dramatic and inspirational moments. My favourite occurred long before I was born – during the 1924 Olympics in Paris. Scotsman, Eric Liddell, was tipped to win the 100m. Shortly before the games, he shocked the sporting world and annoyed British Olympic officials by pulling out of the event. The heats were scheduled for a Sunday and Liddell, a committed Christian, believed that Sunday was a day for worship not running. He was accused of lacking patriotism and of wrong priorities, but Eric would not budge and sacrificed his place in his strongest event and best chance of winning a gold medal.

Olympic officials asked him to run in the 400m. He agreed, but his times for the 400m. were nothing special – certainly not Olympic standard. Nevertheless, Eric got through the heats and the semi-final, qualifying for the final by the skin of his teeth.

As Eric left the hotel for the race, a team masseur pressed a folded note into his hand. Sitting in the stadium changing room, Eric unfolded the piece of paper. It read, "It says in the Old Book: Him that honours me, I will honour. Wishing you the best success as always." In the race that followed, Eric Liddell led from the start and crossed the finish line 5 metres ahead of his nearest rival, in the world record time of 47.6 seconds. It was an unexpected and astonishing victory.

The following year, Eric shocked many people again when, aged just 23, he turned his back on a glittering athletics career and went to China as a missionary, where he taught science and preached the Bible. In 1941, the situation in China was so dangerous owing to Japanese aggression, that the British Government advised all British nationals to leave. Eric decided to stay and carry on his mission work, but managed to get his pregnant wife, Florence and two daughters safely out. He didn't see his family again.

Following the Japanese invasion of China in 1943, Eric was interred in Weihsein P.O.W. camp where, in horrific conditions, he continued his life of Christian service, helping the elderly, teaching the children, and organising games to lift morale in the camp. A P.O.W. exchange was negotiated for him, but he selflessly gave it to a pregnant woman, choosing to remain and serve the other prisoners.

On 21 February 1945, aged 43, overworked, malnourished and suffering from a brain tumour, Eric Liddell, the Flying Scotsman, who at the end could only stagger, died as a prisoner of war.

For many, Eric's decisions to not to run in the 100m. and to then give up his athletics career and the fame and wealth that came with it, for a life of service and hardship in China, seemed bizarre. Why would he do that?

The answer is simple. For Eric, athletics was not the most important race. Living his life for Christ was. And Olympic Gold was not the most important prize - eternal life with Christ was. He firmly believed the Bible's message that this life was preparation for the next, and lived constantly with the eternal realities of heaven and hell before him. That's why he was willing to make such sacrifices in the here and now. And what an impact his short life had on those around him. He was so heavenly minded that he did so much earthly good.

With eyes fixed on Christ and the future, Eric Liddell ran this race we call life well. He's now enjoying the prize of eternal rest that Jesus won for him. Truly inspirational! Enjoy the Olympics.

Roger Reports...

from the district & county councils

Firstly, well done for the magnificent Jubilee Celebrations. On a rare summer's day the Children's Sports had the biggest turn out that I can remember and the Art and Crafts and History exhibitions were excellent. While at the beacon on Heversham Head (where as the youngest Boy Scout I lit the Coronation Bonfire in 1953) we saw that Burton's blaze was the first to be lit. Personally I was flushed with pride to be asked to open the Jubiloos, and congratulate everyone on raising £100,000 for the refurbishment of the Memorial Hall where, the next day, I was privileged to welcome 60 people to an enjoyable and instructive Age UK exhibition. This event linked in with my role as Cumbria's "Older Person's Champion" and my serving on the Safeguarding Adults Task and Finish Group, which is seeking to protect vulnerable people from exploitation and abuse and to ensure quick and appropriate access to services, including (my special hobby horse) plain English in communications.

Yet again Cumbria's Councils are considering replacing our 'two-tier* district and county councils with unitary authorities which we've had since 1974. Previously I argued against a single council for all Cumbria because of our diversity and enormous area. Burton is nearer

to Wales than to some other parts of Cumbria while Carlisle is closer to Edinburgh than to Barrow. It is now suggested that there should possibly be three authorities, with South Lakeland linked either to Barrow or parts of Eden. This would ensure some economies by linking services like waste disposal (county) with waste collection (S.L.D.C.) There would be fewer councillors which might be a 'democratic deficit' as a unitary ward could e.g. involve linking our Lower Kentdale Division with parts of Kent Estuary where, altogether, we currently have six district and two county councillors. Unavoidably the new unitary councillor would be a full time politician who would require a salary and an office staff. But it would mean fewer elections as the unitary authority would be chosen every four years. Elections could increase if proposals are accepted that members of the national park authorities, most of whom are nominated by county, district and parish councils, should be directly elected. Though clearly more democratic, problems to be considered include whether only residents in the parks should vote, which would mean that neighbouring areas could be ignored like our Lower Kentdale Division which bridges the gap between the Lake District National Park and the Yorkshire Dales (on which I serve.) Also should there continue to be four representatives who are chosen by the Secretary of State, because by definition the national parks are for the benefit of the whole nation? A residents-only board might lead to issues like access being settled in favour of landowners who have sometimes tried to limit public footpaths.

Currently the parks and councils are involved in the National Grid's North West Coast Connections Consultation which follows the go-ahead for the

expansion of nuclear power stations at Sellafield. Huge pylons for the power lines' connection to the National Grid could go across or around Morecambe Bay, north of the Lake District (but near Hadrian's Wall World Heritage Site) or, by connecting with a key junction at Old Hutton, go through our area near Hutton Roof. Overhead cables would cost £400m but an entire underground system £2 billion. Please, what do you think?

Parochially, I have again urged that Slape Lane be cleared of soil washed from adjacent fields, and I am trying to get major capital repairs planned for the badly eroded stretches of the A6070 and the Burton-Holme Mills road. I am also planning my annual grants, which have been reduced this year. From the Highways allowance I hope to continue to provide £1000 for our parish lengthsman, and from Members Works I have asked if I can contribute to the playground near Boon Town, although it belongs to the Parish Council.

I know that voice!

One evening whilst listening to INDIGO 106.6fm, the community radio station for Kirkby Lonsdale, where a friend presents the Funky Friday evening show, I heard a familar voice. Swivelling my ears I realised it belonged to Paul Rossi, an old-hand of the music and drama stage, and now, it seems, the airwaves! Tuning in to Paul's Thursday evening show the following week I found that he is followed on air by another Burtonian: lan McCutcheon. So how did they get started? I went to ask them.

Paul explained that he'd been approached, at the school where he works, by a youngster wanting to do some work experience in local radio. He'd approached The Bay! and they had suggested INDIGO 106.6fm as it was closer to the school. So Paul contacted the INDIGO 106.6fm founder, Paul Broadbent, and got the placement sorted. They talked music, which is a big part of Paul's life, and he was offered the chance to do a 2 hour slot of his own, as the station did not have anyone covering blues music. Thinking that 2 hours might be a bit of a stretch, he contacted fellow musician lan McCutcheon, with whom he plays in the band T-Bone, and persuaded him to go halves, lan doing an hour of jazz immediately after Paul.

INDIGO 106.6fm, they explained, was run by the community for the community. No-one gets paid, it's all voluntary, but you are taught how to operate the equipment. "It's all computerised" they said, "operating out a room the size of a broom cupboard." I wanted to know how they found the music they play. Paul said that he uses some from his own extensive collection and adds to it when he finds new songs he like. He reckons to have around 500 tracks so far, and every one he plays has to be logged onto the system so the artists get their fee.

Do they broadcast live, I asked. "Of course!" they laughed, and then confessed that they don't. They usually go into the studio on a Sunday to record their slots, which are then scheduled for their broadcast times. This means they can choose when to record their hour so it fits in around their working days. Will they go live? I wanted to know. "Maybe, one day!" they

said, but this works for them now. Live broadcasts seem to be much more nerve-wracking than recorded ones - it might all go horribly wrong, or you might dry up or...

Paul & lan cover for each other's shows if one of them is unavailable, and they clearly have a lot of fun doing it. They tease each other on and off-air, calling themselves the Smashie and Nicey of INDIGO 106.6fm!

Would they be interested in doing a community radio station in Burton? Quite possibly, was the response. All it needs is the space & the equipment. Anyone fancy providing the space and funding the equipment?

Because of the contours of the land, the INDIGO 106.6fm radio signal doesn't reach much beyond the woodyard on Dalton Lane, so we can't pick it up in Burton, but those with a computer can listen online by going to www.indigofm.co.uk and clicking the Listen Online option. It's well-worth the effort!


