Autumn in northern Portugal was less mournful than it is in Cumbria: no gaunt leafless trees, no showers of withered leaves falling straight down to rot in heaps, such as we had in late October and early November. As we cruised up the Douro from Porto to the Spanish border, we were surrounded all the way by steep hills terraces into vineyards. The vines, stripped of their grapes a few weeks before, made lone 'hedgerows' of russet leafage. The cool bluey-green of olive trees was unchanged by falling temperatures. The eucalyptuses had all their foliage intact - a weird tree, 'gum tree' in Australia, with its tatters of brown bark and its habit of spitting out fireballs of resin when a wildfire sweeps through.

Outdoors

The peace of the river was like a trance, outside time, untouched by 'double-dip recessions' and collapsing banks and the weapons industry. On this river you rarely see more than a furlong ahead, as it winds and winds between gravelly slopes of schist and tall, cracked buttresses made of granite. The boat has to pass through five dams, built since the seventies to generate electricity and control flooding, so there are now no rapids, no waterfalls, no shingle beaches, just this dark and even flow from the mountains to the Atlantic.

Occasionally a jetty housed a small motor-boat. Occasionally a white-walled, red-tiled villa perched among almond trees and ilex. No river traffic apart from ourselves and a couple of other cruisers. The squarerigged sailboats called rabelos, that carried the casks of port down to the river-mouth warehouses where names like Sandeman, Graham, Dow, Croft, Fereira, and Fonseca are placarded in huge letters on the serried brick and granite buildings, survive only for tourist trips. We can see next-to-no farms from down here on the river, or villages or cottages. Who prunes the vines and picks the grapes, and the olives and figs and almonds, the lemons and oranges? Migrant workers from far away, people from somewhere up in the hills, invisible from our zone of uncanny quietude on the waterway.

Herons stand on the shore, like winter on two legs with the snowy white and foggy grey of their plumage. Martins and swallows curve low above the water, flycatching on their way from the U.K. to Africa. Cormorants fly past, black and vigorous, or else they swim and fish, diving again and again for 35-50 seconds at a time - the same period that I timed repeatedly on the Scottish island of Jura in 1974. Docked at Vila Nova de Gaia as our voyage ended, we saw big fish leap out of the water, species unknown to us, shad, perhaps, or barbel? (We didn't get these to eat; we did enjoy well-cooked cod and octopus.) For a dozen reasons the Douro will flow permanently through my memory now, dark and full and guiet, an artery of Europe, a busy river turned into a reserve for holiday-makers, a sanctuary.

Commenting on the goings-on at the Parish Council meetings

ABOUT NOT SEEING THE TREES FOR THE WOOD? Dalton Crags Forest Design Plan Under Review

The new Dispensation rule came into use, when the owner of the woods, a Parish Cllr, was allowed to sit on in the discussion, being, as he said himself, possibly the person present who knew the most about it! The paper under discussion is too lengthy for A.O. to report on, but it is available to the public, and the PCIIrs particularly asked that Burtonians will involve themselves and offer their views.

It seems that it will be the policy to clear the woods of certain species of tree that were planted there by the Forestry, in particular beech and larch, and some yews, and encourage the natural growth of ash especially, it being the natural tree of the limestone area. Why? Because little vegetation can grow under beech or larch, and it is now policy to encourage biodiversity of other insects, plants, creepy-things and so on. What's more, it seems there is financial encouragement to pursue this policy. The intention is to clear away the beech, which will be primarily sold for fuel. There are other tree types referred to as well, but A.O. can only remember reference to Scots pine, which saddens her, as reaching the pines at the little belvedere clearing is a special pleasure. (And the ash-trees below are beginning to obscure the view of Morecambe Bay).

And anyway Scots pines are yet another species under threat from disease, so they may be due for their come-uppance by slow death rather than summary execution.

Rights of way through the Crags are protected and safe for future centuries. But the PCIIrs bore in mind the mayhem that resulted from the previous felling, and the unsightly quagmires that made walking more or less impossible. It is true that some tracks were restored, but some of the overall destruction remains to this day.

Some PCIIrs were uneasy about removing all "nonnative" trees (what is a "non-native" tree anyway, and how far back historically do you have to go?) Botanists will no doubt refer to the importing of species and the damage done – A.O. saw for herself the sad wipingout of mature chestnut trees in the Blue Mountains (of Virginia) where the trees now only reach the immature stage before dying. (That disease was imported in wood from Chinese tree.)

So if we rid ourselves of some species, and leave only ash, what happens when the air-blown disease sweeping Europe hits Dalton Crags? Shall we be treeless? Or will some sturdy trees weather the disaster? One PCIIr claimed that 10% of ash had survived in Sweden, though trees take a few years to die, so it may be too soon to reach any conclusion.

A letter will be circulated by the Clerk to PCIIrs before being sent to the Forestry Commission. Burton-in-Kendal is fortunate to have many residents who take a



keen interest in the surrounding countryside. Some are botanists of renown, so the Parish Council is appealing for them to come forward with their views and comments.

Other Matters

He's Sorry

Asked by a member of the public, in the Open Forum, a PCIIr who is part-owner of the Royal Hotel and environs, said it was now up for sale, as bank loans which they had hoped for were not available in the current financial climate. He expressed regret that the group had been forced to this action. And A.O. is pretty disappointed too. To her knowledge some of the residents nearby had offered no objection to the development because of goodwill towards the developers, all of whom were local. This PCIIr reassured the PC that the land at present on lease to the Recreation Trust was not part of the sale. Well, it wouldn't be much of a bargain, as its lease has still some years to run.

Entry of the gladiator

Late on in proceedings the meeting was interrupted by one of our District Cllrs, pronouncing the exciting news (to him) that there had been a 30% turnout for voting in the Police Commissioner election. In fact it was 29% as A.O. read subsequently. But that's still one of the highest in the country.

N.B. Police have not yet been able to secure a base now that the Milnthorpe Police station has been sold. A.O. wonders what base the new Police Commissioner will have?



Highways waylaid

A PCIIr reported that he had a stroke of luck, managing to meet Mr Bath, of Highways after a different meeting. This PCIIr at last seemed to make some progress in putting forward some of the dissatisfactions of the PC with some of the fairly recent repairs to roads in Burton. Possibly this will bear results. As ever, the Highways stuff is ongoing.

And A.O. is going on. Too long.


Harvest Festival Boxes -A Reminder of Christmas Past

At the Lunch Time Special in October the Revd. Mike Newman, Chaplain to our Armed Forces, gave an interesting illustrated talk about life for them in Afghanistan.

He told us that our Armed Forces are highly professional in their duties and demonstrate a tremendous spirit of comradeship and bravery, despite differences in nationality or faith.

We were given an insight into the Field Hospital with equipment second to none in this country, manned by very skilled men and women in the medical profession. It was encouraging to hear that prompt attention is given to the injured, well before they reach hospital, in the helicopters fitted with emergency equipment.

There is a Chapel shared by ministers of different religions, with services, prayer meetings, Bible studies and private interviews with the Chaplains taking place.

When colleagues are killed, a Thanksgiving Service is held for their lives and, before their bodies are transported home, there is a special parade on the tarmac.

Our speaker saw his role in a threefold way -

Nurture the living Comfort the dying Honour the dead

And ended his talk with the following prayer that you may like to use,

Heavenly Father, we commend to your gracious care and keeping all the men and women in our Armed Forces at home and abroad. Defend them day by day with your heavenly grace, strengthen them in their trials and temptations, and give them courage to face the perils that beset them, and help them to know that nothing can separate them from your love, in Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen

The book follows on from two previous volumes and contains a fascinating insight into the lives of the people who lived here then.


As well as births, marriages and deaths, there is news about the schools, churches and chapels.



Historical Footnote by Roger Bingham

BURTON'S MISERABLE CHRISTMASSES

Christmas is not always Merry. Thus in 1901 it was reported that "Burton's festive season was marred by accidents and illnesses. Many entertainment and children's parties were cancelled on account of diphtheria. Robert Hayton's daughter died at Holme and several Burton patients were taken to the Kendal Sanatorium." Tragically at Christmas 1903, "Annie Allan, aged 6, while dining with her parents suddenly fell off her chair and expired in moments." One month old Sarah Metcalf was found dead and James Holmes a farm labourer lost four fingers in a threshing machine at Holme Park Farm. Yet again the children's parties were cancelled - this time because of mumps. The New Year was brightened by an unseasonal display of May Pole Dancing at the National School Prize day, but less seasonal attitudes led to 23 local court convictions for "obscene language." A literally doleful tale was told the next year when "Mrs Shorland-Ball with her accustomed generosity distributed warm cloaks for the children and Major Hornby (the Squire) provided free coals for the needy." Unfortunately a bronchitis epidemic reduced attendance at the main Christmas service where "the choir rendered Maunder's Christians Awake." White Christmases could bring misery rather than merriment. The Great Frost' of December 1894 to March 1895 included six weeks when on every day the temperature fell to below freezing point causing the Vicar the Rev Chastel de



Boinville to "give out a second distribution of coals to widows and sick people of the village. Each received five hundred weights." In 1907 "a great fall of snow led to a general cessation of out door occupations; also many children were unable to attend Mrs Shorland-Ball's Christmas Party because of bronchitis-again." Half a century later no "charitable donations" alleviated the arctic winter of 1947-8. Many Christmas dinners were postponed until Boxing Day because of electricity failures. The first moments of the New Year were "rent by the shrill notes of steam locomotives whistling on the Main Line to herald the nationalization of the Railways." But simultaneously the trains stopped running when the points froze. Coal mining also seized up and, harking back to earlier times, peats were sold for fuel in the village. Owing to lack of heating the Children's Christmas Party in the National School was postponed until February when the "kiddies enjoyed a rare treat of strictly rationed ice-cream."

Join the Big Garden Birdwatch

Burton Butchers

Do you like watching the birds in your garden? Then take part in the world's biggest wildlife survey – the RSPB's Big Garden Birdwatch.

This is the conservation charity's most important event of the year. It is when people across the country look out of their window and spend an hour of their weekend recording how many birds they see.

Last year, over half a million people counted more than nine million garden birds. The information from this survey helps the RSPB form a comprehensive picture of how well – or not so well - each species is doing.

Over the past three decades, participants have helped the RSPB discover that populations of house sparrows starlings have declined while the numbers of blue tits and goldfinches in gardens have increased.

Doing the Big Garden Birdwatch not only helps the RSPB track the ups and downs of garden birds, but gives you the perfect excuse to sit down with a cup of tea and enjoy the wildlife in your garden.

Roger Reports...

from the district & county councils

All Councils are stuck into the Budget process. On the county council the divisive issue is, can we sustain the record of the last three years by not putting up the Council tax - which in real terms has represented a cut of 4.4% - meaning a saving of £78pa on a Band D home? This contrasts with a rise of 109% in the previous few years. The savings have been achieved by cuts in personnel - amounting to a thousand Cumbria 'officers', mostly through voluntary redundancy. Amalgamation of senior posts, improved IT and sharing services with other authorities have helped, but front line provision is likely to be reduced if the economies go further. So should the Council Tax go up. Please let me know?

On the district council it is debatable if the Parking Ticket machines, requiring car registration numbers to be typed in to prevent transfer of tickets, will be able to recoup the cost of about £330,000. But extra revenue will result if the recommendation of the Scrutiny Committee is implemented, to abolish the ten per cent discount on second homes, which was supported by over 40% of respondents to a recent survey, compared to 25% who strongly disagreed. I disagreed with a suggestion that no Council Tax should be charged on



empty properties because even if no one lives there, properties still require council support to avoid dangerous structure status and may need development control etc.

On Planning the final Public Inquiry is going slowly on South Lakeland's controversial Local Development Framework, which proposed 6000 new houses in the area of South Lakeland outside the National Parks, including 140 for Burton. So the final report will be delayed until the Spring - five years after the first proposals were made!

On Scrutiny we also found that SLDC had not reached targets to reduce the percentage of empty shops or to increase small businesses, but there has been a reduction in carbon emissions and an increase in adults in sport.

Crime rates have dropped - except for alcohol cases which have increased by 1.04%.

Sadly, the county figures for killed and seriously injured (KSIs) on the roads have not reached the reduction target. In south Cumbria between June and October there were 46 slight and 6 serious injuries and 2 fatalities. In the county as a whole there were 139 collisions since January and 5 fatalities. The A590 and M6 in our area are amongst Cumbria's most dangerous highways, with 3 serious and 20 injuries since June, and an M6 fatality during the hail storm on 2 November.

Locally we have more grit heaps and bins than ever before plus the parish grit scheme introduced in 2010. The A6070 is a Priority-2 Route which aims to be gritted



before or during snow and icy conditions. Other routes like Dalton Lane and Station Road/Neddy Hill are Priority 3 which are aimed to be treated within 48 hours of snowfall.

Re cold weather there is a new government-funded Warm Front scheme to provide heating and insulation for low-income households - contact c/o Maria Wardrobe 0800 316 28505.

I have received general support for more 20 MPH zones in residential areas, but there are mixed views about a speed reduction on the A6070/A65 through to Kendal.

Also on transport I have protested about a plan to cut the new high speed Glasgow to London express from stopping at Oxenholme.






