An Early Note from the Post Office about Christmas Posting 2013

I haven't been shopping in town recently but I will hazard a guess that the shops are already displaying Christmas Cards and Gifts so maybe I am not writing this too early.

Anyway, thinking about posting for Christmas, the last posting dates for sending Surface Mail are as always unseasonably early; in fact by the time you read this you will almost certainly have missed at least one of them!

For parcels sent by Airmail there is no rush, you have until the beginning of December for the furthest destinations. However, if you are planning on sending parcels via the slower option of Surface Mail the recommended last posting dates are:

Monday 30 September All non-European destinations except those mentioned below.

Tuesday 1 October Middle East and Far East (except Hong Kong & Singapore)

Tuesday 15 October South Africa, Hong Kong, Singapore, the USA & Canada



Tuesday 5 November Eastern Europe, Greece, Cyprus, Turkey, Malta & Iceland

Tuesday 19 November Western Europe

Remember that parcels sent outside the EU need to have a customs form attached, these are available at the Post Office Counter. Also remember to put your name and address on the top left hand corner of the front of your package; this will enable Royal Mail to return your item should overseas customs authorities refuse it entry into their country.

A reminder about size and weight for parcels sent abroad.

Before you go out and buy that drum kit for your musical grandchild in Canada, may I remind you of the maximum sizes for sending items abroad with Royal Mail.

The maximum total of (length + width + height) is 90 cm (approx 3ft) with the maximum single dimension of 60cm (approx 2 ft). Also, the maximum weight is 2 kg.

It is really easy to exceed these and then the parcel would cost a great deal more to send via Parcel Force. It is sometimes cheaper to split a heavy parcel and send two packets.

Dangerous Goods

To comply with national and international regulations governing the carriage of mail, and ensure that mail in transport does not present a danger to the general public, Royal Mail must restrict or prohibit certain items from their network.

So this year we will also have to ask you what are the contents of your parcels; not just because we are being nosy or looking for gift ideas ourselves, but because there are packaging restrictions on items containing, for example, batteries, nail varnish, aerosols etc.

Specifically C, D, AA, AAA type Alkaline batteries must be new and in their original retail packaging. Lithium batteries (the type commonly found in mobile phones and laptops), cannot be sent alone, they must be packaged with the equipment. Beware, for overseas mail, some countries do not permit the import of lithium batteries at all.

As always, come & ask us at the Post Office Counter for further advice.



Reporting from the Parish Council meeting

Parish Council Observations

Having expressed interest in becoming a commentator to cover parish council meetings, your intrepid reporter found himself seated at the "Press table" on Thursdav 19 September with 8 councillors (one away on holiday) and Chairman Mike Taylor ably supported by Parish Clerk Peter Smith, running through 16 agenda items in 90 minutes. Having no previous experience of these meetings, I expected the discussion to be focused on the size of hedges, the quality of street lighting, need for new signs, the efficacy of drains, parking problems, muddy lanes and the like. I wasn't disappointed.

School parking


The first and biggest discussion was about street parking around the school at drop-off and pick-up times. Two members of the public spoke about the danger of the current situation, and there was general agreement that it was a mess which had been made much more difficult by the interminable reconstruction work at the school. The twice mentioned the Chairman possibility if a fatality if nothing was done. 20 minutes' discussion on this, with calls for more police and school involvement. cones. double vellow

lines, new lay-by markings, possibly a walking bus service between the school and the Kings Arms car park etc. No dissenting voices but what action to take? Short term, cones might appear, then white lines will be repainted and double vellow ones might be considered. School PTA and governors will be approached. Roger Bingham hinted that any action requiring county council involvement might "take some time." No surprises there.

Slape Lane

The next interesting discussion was about Slape Lane. Apparently the county council have money to improve bridleways which, if not spent, goes back to the Treasury. Some council engineers have estimated £60,000 plus to raise the standard of the Lane to "bridleway standard." Councillors were sceptical that this would fix the situation underlying because springs will continue to cause problems. However, there was some reluctance to look a gift horse in the mouth, but nothing will be decided until options are detailed and costed by the engineers and the contribution required by the parish council is clarified.

Lights out on Neddy Hill?

Another fascinating debate was about whether action was required to object to a threat from Electricity Northwest to remove lighting at the bottom of Neddy Hill. Apparently they have renewed

posts but have given 6 months notice of the intention to remove existing lighting. It couldn't be more bizarre. It was agreed to write to Electricity Northwest and try to warn them off.

Items through quickly

What else? Next year's draft budget was received with a plea to councillors by the Clerk to advise him of any ideas/additions required. A list of outstanding actions previous from meetings was noted. They remain outstanding. Some things take a lot of Oh and by the way, some time. planning applications were received and accepted or not pending further details. Good things to report were the continuing donation to the Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal, the success of the recent Recreation Trust 10K run and the solid state of the council finances.

Overall

Overall I was impressed. True the last 30 minutes dragged a bit. Some councillors rearranged their papers after an hour hoping for a quick getaway but this was not to be. The meeting was well run. Everyone was constructive and representative of village opinion. This is democracy and bureaucracy in action. It takes a while but things hopefully will get done in time.

Focus on Sue Woodburn Head of Burton Morewood Academy

You don't need to be in Sue's presence long to realise the passion she has for her job and the joy she takes in being the head of this Academy; the first voluntary controlled one in Cumbria. Her enthusiasm is undiminished though she has been at Morewood since 1992 arriving via Kendal and Arnside, by then having realised her love of village church schools. With Morewood's solid links to family and community the children have an appetite for learning and for her the opportunity to bring that to them along with ample helpings of fun, exercise and activities not normally found on a state school agenda. The school's growing reputation means that the number of pupils has risen from just over a 100 in 1997 to 192 today. Sue feels the school should have no more seven classes each with than а maximum of 30 pupils and an intake of 30 pupils per year has been set in order to preserve that maximum; she sees no future changes being made to that Of the present 192 2/3's are number. village children and 1/3 from places like Carnforth, Priest Hutton, Borwick and Holme.

With the strong feeling that life can be fun as well as educational Sue has put





in place а curriculum that encourages а love of learning gathered and about her a staff of 9 like-minded teachers and 11 support staff (out of the 20, 10 live in the village

whilst Sue lives Nook) whose in commitment and wish to make a difference echoes her own. The clear give intention is to children the opportunity to reach their full potential.

Sue clearly feels that the change to academy status was the right thing for Morewood, as it has given the power to tailor the curriculum to suit the pupils, the right to employ its own staff, and take on the training of 10 teachers. This shared 50/50 with the University of Cumbria, and the income is of great benefit to the academy funds. The power to change teachers' pay and conditions much criticised by the NUT is not going to be used here. Sue is adamant that her staff has reacted so well to the greater freedom and changes that there is a new buzz about the place and that they are coming up with good ideas to help her drive the business forward. The teacher training was as a result of a suggestion from her assistant headteacher, who now leads that initiative.



Sue moved to Cumbria as a teenager and attended Kendal High for a time. She met her husband. also а headteacher, there when they were both aged 16 and they have lived in this area ever since. Their two sons inherited their parents' love of the profession and one is now a teacher married to a teacher whilst the other is training to be one alongside his wife.

When asked about the future and what it may hold, Sue laughed saying she has no 5 or 10 year plan but that new challenges from all directions keep the job fresh year on year. One thing on which she is very clear is that she will continue to work to make a difference, not only for the children's academic needs but for their comprehensive development. The passion which brought her to this school clearly burns on.

Historical Footnote by Roger Bingham

Peace and War 75 years ago

"Best Show since the War" was the verdict on Burton Show and other agricultural shows in the Autumn of 1938. The headline meant the First World War, whose impending centenary is now attracting so much attention. Entries at the show, which was held in Dalton Hall Park. numbered 327 compared to 311 in the previous year. "Sheep were particularly strong while the improvement in quality of cattle and horses was notable. A new feature was a section for home industries. The well filled classes covered needlework. embroidery, dressmaking, handicrafts and among the 250 entries were some from as far afield as the Isle of Wight." The high agricultural contribution was surprising as "harvesting and in some cases haymaking were still occupying the attention of farmers."

Meanwhile, all the show goers were obsessed with fears that a new war was about to break out over Germany's threats to Czechoslovakia. Air Raid Precautions (ARP) wardens were recruited by Mr Cummings and First Aid Lectures from District Nurse Rodd were held "every Friday evenina at School." Down Morewood at the National School villagers gueued to be



fitted with gas masks and leaflets were distributed showing how to dig a "refuge trench." More practically, preparations were made for billeting some of the 20.000 refugees planned to be evacuated to Westmorland from north eastern cities like Newcastle. But in the nick of time. Peace for our Time was secured when the Prime Minister. Neville Chamberlain. made the agreement with Herr Hitler at Munich. Burton's peace celebrations included a special church service and there were cheers for Mr Chamberlain at an exserviceman's supper, where a "toast to the fallen" (of The Great War) was raised

Then, briefly, village life seemed to return to normal. The WI heard a talk from Mrs Smith of Morecambe on dress makina: testimonial fund а was organised for Miss EJ Corless who had served the village school for 40 years; £14:8s:5d was collected for the NSPCC: and Miss Kendal and Mr Dobson won a spot dance at the Tennis Club Social. On 11 November a "good number" gathered at the War Memorial and Poppy Appeal raised the £10:11s:0d. Finally, just before Christmas, early lambs were born at Green Dragon Farm. Yet, despite all the autumnal hopes, only 10 months later a conflict even greater than The Great War broke out which is still, invariably, known simply as The War.

Roger Reports...

from the District & County Councils

September was particularly busy, with meetings almost every day and a 192 County Development Control mile round trip on site visits. We also had an interesting seminar on wind farms. This followed a United Nations ruling that the UK is at fault in "ignoring local opinion" when some of the current 252 on-shore and 279 off-shore wind farms were installed. Invalid reasons for objection include an individual's right to a view, arguments about efficiency e.g. "they never seem to be working", and "equitable provision", e.g. "why should our area have lots of windmills and the National Parks none?" Valid objections include damage large scale to windmills landscape such as on Wainwright heights, the cumulative effect of many wind-farms as at Killington, or by sequential development like turbines dotted along the M6. Other reasons include effect on highways, ecology and archaeology, e.g. at the Silfield, Gatebeck, inquiry my stating that construction traffic would damage mediaeval hedgerows was accepted as a valid objection.

Meanwhile planning for the 2014-15 budget goes inexorably on. The new county administration has not undertaken to keep the Council Tax at its present level, (unchanged for four



years) but is nevertheless trying to make £88m savings as the government grant is to be cut by 10%. 150 staff reductions are envisaged. I will continue to press for at least the current funding for highways, and, on a lesser scale, the retention of the mobile libraries.

Thanks to a government grant of £7.38m the Cumbria Cycle Strategic Network is to be expanded but I do not as yet know whether our area, which already has cycle tourist routes, will be affected.

Increased grants to carers are planned and, following some notorious national cases, an extra £608,000 has been allocated to Children's Safeguarding Services. Happily, juvenile crime (committed by 11-17 year olds) fell by 30% compared to the previous year. There are 45,000 young people in the age group and the 1% crime rate is one of the lowest in the country.

Controversially, an attempt by the Local Government Minister, Eric Pickles, to prevent councils paying the wages of staff absent on trades union duties was thrown out by the courts. I understand that, currently, trades union representatives cost the county £500,000 p.a.

Another change is that 20% of the

government's new homes bonus is being diverted to economic regeneration. Although the district's share of the council tax is only about 13% compared to the county's 66%, SLDC is aiming at no increases and has hopes of improving services like waste collection to 80% of public approval.

A trial of separate receptacles for plastic is being made in Kendal. I have mentioned that putting out another blue box could create obstructions where houses open out directly onto the street. May remind you that householders unable to move their wheelie bins and blue boxes can ask for a doorstep collection by ringing 01539 733333.

Following a mildish winter we have ample supplies of salt and grit, and I am pleased that flood prevention work is being carried out in Neddy Hill and Tan Pits Lane. I have asked that the gullies in Main St and elsewhere be scoured ere the winter storms begin.

Hutton Roof Crags Nature Reserve

After 56 years, and thought for a long time to having become extinct, the rare holly fern has recently been rediscovered on Cumbria Wildlife Trust's Hutton Roof Crags Nature Reserve. The new record has aroused much interest both locally and further afield, even as far as the British Museum.

The plant was found after all this time following extensive searches by local Burton naturalist Bryan Yorke, who is on the nature reserve on most days searching, recording and illustrating its rich wildlife. Bryan says he's even more delighted because the Hutton Roof Crags record is believed to be located as the lowest altitude ever recorded for this species in the whole of the United Kingdom.
