Dear Editor,

Church Tower Appeal Update

I'm writing on behalf of Burton Church to express our thanks to the Onion Show Committee for their most generous donation of £200 towards the Tower Restoration Fund. Your kind gift is much appreciated.

As far as the actual work on the tower is concerned, the first stage of the restoration project is coming to an end. This is the stage that includes all the investigations and surveys etc, lets us know the detailed condition of all the parts of the tower, and allows the architect to produce the final plans for the complete remedial work. On the whole much of the condition of the tower is as expected, although a detailed timber survey has revealed fairly consistent high levels of damp in the majority of the embedded timbers.

The main concern now is how to make the tower waterproof once all the structural restoration work has been completed. The original idea was to fill the gaps between the stones on the east wall with grout, but this is now considered to be extremely difficult due to the state of the stones, and the large

number of voids within the internal structure of the wall which will also need to be filled. The solution proposed by the architect now is based on her knowledge of the construction and medieval treatment of towers in general, and the evidence that still exists on our church tower today, and this is to reinstate the overall lime render and lime wash coats that existed in the past. In effect we will be restoring the external condition of the tower to how it used to be. The actual colour of the lime wash has still to be decided. but will be chosen to be in harmony with the rest of the building. As the option of reinstating the lime render etc. is the firm recommendation of the architect, this has been accepted in principle by the Parochial Church Council, subject to its approval by English Heritage and other interested bodies.

When the final details of the design have been agreed by all concerned, the next stage will be to go out to tender for the actual repair work itself. At this point we will know exactly how much money we need to raise to finish the work.

As the project progresses it is planned to provide further updates via the Burton News on the work itself and the associated fundraising efforts.

Due to her sudden illness Judith Ellis, our long-standing DM, is standing down, so we are seeking someone to "fill her boots" and take on this vital monthly task.

Calendar Girls a review

The BADS' production of Calendar Girls honoured the original Girls with a production full of insight, pathos and humour; the standard of performance was extremely high. With stage-setting and re-settings plus many costume changes expertly accomplished. The entire production was sensitively and skilfully directed by Alyson Yates, the driving force behind this talented ensemble, who also played the part of one of the Girls. The production never lost sight of the fact that this is a true and evolving story of ordinary people and how they dealt head-on with tragedy and hope.

To pick out individual Girls in this case seems inappropiate as it mav be interpreted as one of the original Calendar Girls to be more important than the others. So, to simply say here that each BADS Girl gave a superb of understanding. performance poignancy, fun, humour and wit, grace and empathy, all of which underpinned the meaning of friendship and respect for human frailty. We were privileged to watch these individual, very talented women as they drew us into their world of the Calendar Girls, where ordinary lives were made extraordinary. Grief, insecurities, dreams and hopes were all to be captured within a fund-raising



idea, then the heady excitement of the trials and tribulations taking it forward, to the triumphant publication, a calendar of photographs: the now famous collection of the almost, but not quite, nude ladies of the Knapeley branch of the WI. And to the BADS Calendar Girls who now grace the pages of their own calendar, we salute you.

However, there are three cast members appearances whose cameo were notable: Alison Flanders who plaved Brenda Hulse, a guest speaker arriving at the WI to deliver her lecture, Broccoli the Green Vegetable to much giggling asides from her captive WI audience. Brenda. sober-suited. seemed а hesitant, hapless figure as she fumbled through her notes, spectacles glinting in the light adding a comical myopic look to her appearance. Undaunted, she started to speak, on and on she droned until the endless praise of the vegetable almost began to pass into legend. Suddenly she exclaimed, "Of course, broccoli is closely related to James Bond," her WI audience sat up taking notice as Brenda sought to explain its connection: Cubby Broccoli... the film director. Encouraged by the attention, specs flashing wildly Brenda began to recite the entire list of Bond movies only to be ushered away by the formidable WI Chairwoman. By this time Brenda had the entire and real



laughing, applauding audience firmly in the palm of her hand. A small but, impressive tour de force by Alison Flanders.

Then, there is Susan Stokes, who gave a gloriously over-the-top performance as Marie, the social-climbing Chairwoman fast losing control of her branch of the WI. Her hair, startlingly changing colour as she moved from outrage over the naked calendar, to grovelling subservience around the visiting aristocrat from Cheshire. In the end, beneath layers of scarves, rainbow hair and bluster we. and she. discovered a previously well-hidden bewildered kind heart. Susan and Stokes, a joy to behold.

Now to Steve Johnson, in the character of John Hill, the sunflower loving gardner who is the essence of the play. Steve gave an outstanding performance as visibly he moved from health into slow terminal illness. A finely honed portraval of restrained despair, adding a dignity of sorts to this pernicious disease. As the cancer progressed, through to John's last diminished appearance in a wheelchair, his voice faint and receding - perhaps a metaphor heralding his own imminent demise. We. the audience had witnessed distinguished and а Steve memorable performance by Johnson.

Reporting from the Parish Council meeting

All the councillors were present and correct for the 21 November meeting. This was the first at which the new parish clerk – Jane Johnson – was in office. I didn't notice any formal thanks to Peter Smith for his sterling work as Jane's predecessor but maybe this has happened informally.

From the public seats, Kath Hayhurst asked for support for reprinting leaflets about four Burton Walks and received welcoming comments. Charis Twist has been working hard on the Triangular Garden at the Tanpits Lane/Station Lane junction and the PC gave thanks to her for this.


Contrasting views about the future and the past emerged. With regard to the future and the possibility of harnessing wind power, an application to erect two 35 metre tip-height wind turbines at Green Dragon Farm was turned down. In relation to the past, a new sign welcoming traffic to Westmorland (which technically disappeared in 1974) will be coming soon at Heron Syke. It was initially designed to be put up for the Queen's Jubilee celebration. Opposition voiced last meeting fell away now that the cost of the work has been cut by £100, even though it will

still cost the best part of £400.

Surprisingly, councillors had no comments to make in response to the county council budget consultation process. Was this acceptance of the futility of making comments? It seemed so. Another indication that no-one ever listens was signalled by the council's delay in commenting on the Local Development Framework and the Neighbourhood Plan for Burton. It was put on the Agenda for next month but then it could be too late to comment anyway.

The mobile library! Last month Roger Bingham reported that there will be no money to keep it going in 2014. It now turns out that it will most likely carry on until the mobile van dies completely (it is on its last legs). It might come to the same thing. On a positive note, the council noted that the bonfire celebration and the opening of the new school extension had both been very successful events.

Car parking round the school? It was a hotly debated topic last meeting but it is not even on the Outstanding Items list this time. Eleven of the twelve outstanding items were still to be resolved, six of them waiting for county council or SLDC action. They include road repairs, Slape Lane grant, speed monitoring, Shop Front scheme and a one-way system for Memorial Car Park.

Historical Footnote by Roger Bingham

1943 - A Wartime Winter

For Britain the Second World War took a turn for the better after our victory over the Germans at El Alamein in October 1942. With fears of invasion abated it was again legal to ring church bells, which had been silenced since 1940 except to warn of the approach of the enemy. But because lights had to be obscured between 4pm and 8am a merry peal could not greet the New Year as Burton's belfry lacked blackout.

But with victory in mind Burton had already jumped the gun and, in January 1943, a social for the War Memorial Fund was held in the National School followed the next week by a War Comforts Dance, featuring the Bela Band. The village children enjoyed a tea party in the *"Methodist Hall generously provided by the Squire Mr C. W. L Penrhyn Hornby."* In return the children collected £2 to be sent to Lady Cripps' Aid to China Fund.

Yet, pessimistically, Burton's civil defence workers received instruction on "the welfare of the public in event of invasion." Although "most people will have a task to perform" they should not leave home if the Wermacht assailed Burton, as the allied counter attack had been impeded by refugees during fall of



France. "Slit trenches should only be dug in gardens if supervised by the military authorities." Moreover, the Air Raid Wardens were ordered to make a "census of tools."

On the same theme, Burton's Young Farmers' Club heard a lecture on farm implements and also on the care and maintenance of tractors. Even so, the of the Farleton Ploughing report Competition noted that "before the mist had cleared from Farleton Knott 16 of horses were at work" teams compared to 14 tractor entrants. The award for the oldest ploughman went to Mr Dobson of Burton who had been "the Champion Ploughman half a centurv ago."

That times were still hard was revealed by the ingredients in the Women's Institute's Christmas Pudding recipe: Rub 3 ozs cooking fat into tablespoons of SR flour until like breadcrumbs; mix in 1 cup of bread crumbs, half a pound of mixed fruit, 1 apple, 1 potato, 1 carrot (all finely grated), 3 re-constituted dried eggs, 3 ozs. sugar, 1 teaspoon mixed spice, half a teaspoon of nutmeg. Stir in 1 tablespoon of lemon juice (if available); mix in 1 teaspoon of bi-carb dissolved in 3 tablespoons warm milk. Stir well. Put into basins and steam for 2 and a half hours. Why not give this taste of a wartime winter a try?

Vicar's Letter ...

Ring out the bells!

In our cities now a church building can easily be dwarfed by the surrounding blocks of flats, shopping centres and offices, but when old churches were originally built it seemed appropriate that they should be much higher than all the buildings around them. Here in our village the church can still be seen for miles around but we have other ways of obscuring its significance, chiefly by thinking of it as an interesting, beautiful, but largely irrelevant, ancient monument.

For the last year church services have alternated each week between Burton and Holme with the other building lying empty on a Sunday morning, but our two Church Councils have recently decided that, from January, Morning Worship will be held in both churches every week. We have agreed to service times of 9.15am at Holme and 11.15am at Burton.

Why might this be significant? To have in any village a weekly gathering to worship the Lord Jesus Christ is significant. The trail of people heading for the church declares to the other rulers and "gods" of our age that there are some who still firmly believe that Jesus is really King of Kings and Lord of Lords; the open door proclaims that the church is still a welcoming place of refuge for those who see their own brokenness, and the loud singing calls to others saying, "you are living in God's world as if he isn't there, come back to your senses and return to him."

Maybe one day we will even find a way to ring the bells again and call the village to worship the living God and his great Son. As Mary was told about her soon-to-be-born son, "He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High ... his kingdom will never end." (Luke 1:32-33)





Roger Reports...

from the District & County Councils

On both the district and county councils we have been engulfed with budget issues implicit in the efforts to meet the coalition government's guidelines about reducing expenditure. Cumbria has to make £88m savings in the next four years, starting with a reduction of £22m for 2014-15. So far the biggest economies have been made in staffing, as over 1,000 personnel have obtained voluntary redundancy.

South Lakeland is hoping not to increase its 13% share of the Council Tax; the county has yet to make a firm proposal about its 66% share, but the Police and Crime Commission's 15% share is likely to go up. Also on Council Tax matters the discount for dwellings vacant for up to 6 months is to remain at 100%. The number of dwellings empty for over two years has reduced, probably because a 150% tax is now levied. Discretionary rate relief will continue for voluntary organisations like village halls, sports clubs, parish run public conveniences (which now have charity status!), and some rural post offices and general stores.

Overall about 98% of Council Tax levied is collected so that, despite hard times, both councils have received good OFSTED reports for financial



probity. SLDC's reserves for instance have increased by £1m to £3m. But is this too high?

Improvements in Children's Services remain a county priority, while SLDC is concerned that its economic aim of developing the M6 corridor (which will impact on Burton) has not yet been fully delivered. In view previous of controversy over cuts in the Fire and Rescue Service, proposals to remove one of the Kendal area's two pumps were approved as fire and accident figures are down. The savings are being allocated to buy a new gritter vehicle which, after winter, can be adapted for general use. SLDC has also economised by improvina maintenance so that new vehicles need not be obtained for at least another year.

Unfortunately the cost of the municipal cemeteries (e.g. in Windermere and Kendal) has increased "because of the decline in the death rate." Of concern to the living, a county wide smoking ban in children's playgrounds is to be implemented, as there are still 900 lung cancer deaths in Cumbria each year.

South Lakeland's (scrap) metal site licenses will now cost £280 pa and metal collectors' licenses will be £140. Collectors will have to wear an official badge and I have asked SLDC to check that collectors operating in our area

from Lancaster will be similarly supervised.

Although I understand that there are still enough grit supplies for Cumbria's roads this winter (as reported last month) the new county administration is not providing more grit boxes. Moreover, if I bought any out of my members' special highways allowance, I - or the Parish Council - would have to pay for replenishing the box cost ing £160 a go!

On highways I was delighted to hear from residents that the repaired drainage in Tan Pits Lane and Neddy Hill coped with the cloud burst on 2 November. Junction 36 has now been resurfaced. Opinions are still divided about whether the delayed provision of a roundabout for the Auction Mart should go ahead as most drivers from Burton seem to be managing. As always please let me know what you think.

More importantly, all the Best for Christmas and the New Year.

Hutton Roof Crags

Coppicing, a traditional method of cutting trees to the ground to stimulate long thin poles, has started again at Hutton Roof Crags after a two-year break. Although the coppiced area of woodland is surrounded by a deer fence, we found that deer were still managing to get in and eat the regrowth posing a serious problem for the woodland.

This year we have erected a smaller, deer-proof fence around the two coupes (roughly two thirds of a hectare) coppiced. which are being This woodland management method is areat for lots of woodland wildlife as it lets light into the woodland floor allowing flowers to grow and therefore butterflies to thrive.

Last year was good for one the nature reserve's specialities, the high brown fritillary butterfly as well as the other types of fritillary butterflies. Hopefully the coppicing done this winter will help these unusual butterflies to thrive even more next summer - subject to good weather!

Cumbria Police News

Reported Police Logs are as follows for the past month. Number plates were stolen off two cars on Hollowrayne and the other on Dalton Lane. House to house enquiries were carried out with a negative result. Please report any suspicious activity seen in your area as it may link in with our enquiries. Cumbria Police on 101.

In the surrounding area a couple of caravans have been broken into and the televisions stolen, we urge you to remove any valuable items when not in use.

Police are warning shops to be vigilant about shoplifters during the busy run up to Christmas. For the last two years shoplifting crime figures have increased throughout November and December, with the top two weeks in the year for shoplifting occurring during these two months. In north Cumbria some initial analysis suggests that a large amount of recent shoplifting incidents have also targeted food, as well as the usual easily concealed items.

Superintendent Mark Pannone, from Cumbria Constabulary, explains: "There is some anecdotal evidence to suggest that there has been an increase in people stealing food and essentials



across the country. This time of year can be difficult for everyone, particularly those who are struggling financially. While I am sympathetic to these problems the fact remains that stealing is against the law. There are many charities and organisations dedicated to helping those who may be experiencing difficulties, and I encourage anyone who is struggling to contact them for help and support."

Neighbourhood Policing Teams across Cumbria will be working to reduce shoplifting offences during the festive period. The operations aim to prevent shoplifting from occurring, but if it does happen to also be able to quickly intervene and respond. Some of the plans include a mixture of patrols in town centres, with both high visibility and some plain clothes officers. Shopwatch radios utilised - allowing officers to communicate with shops around potential shoplifters. Priority locations will be targeted and will be dealt with in conjunction with prolific offenders. Shops encouraged to write banning letters. Distribution of the Lock 'em Inn leaflet. Those charged with shoplifting offences will be given bail conditions preventing them from entering commercial premises.

Anyone who has any concerns or information about shoplifting in Cumbria is asked to get in touch with Cumbria Police on 101.
