

SOUTH WESTMORLAND NEIGHBOURHOOD FORUM

This month it was Burton's turn to host the regularly held meeting of just about the nearest most of us get to Those in the Know. This account is not an exact report of what happened. You'd have to attend more than a single meeting to know that, I suspect. And your reporter knew very few of the participants by name. Most of them GAVE their names of course, or were introduced by our ever-present Dist Cllr.

The meeting was very well-attended. In fact it began to seem as if it might have to be transferred to the main hall. And who did the audience come to see? The interest of the Agenda was wide: Our controversial Police Commissioner; the Manager of a local Nature Reserve; a report by our local PCSO; our local Hospital Voluntary Car Scheme; and Community Grant Applications. Other jtems on the Agenda were Connecting Cumbria and Community Noticeboard, without a doubt very significant, but not too promising for excitement.

Richard Rhodes was far too experienced to give a "speech." Instead he gave a compelling and perceptive talk which captured his audience's attention, and surely their sympathy

He dwelt particularly on the plight of young offenders and their spiral of downward with little progress. possibility of breaking out of their disadvantaged background. His talk was anecdotal and absorbing, and bore little relation to the rather unfortunate Press coverage he's had since being elected (only 16% of electors voted, and that, we were told with pride, was the highest vote in any region.) Was this really the man who had turned up to meetings in a hired expensive Merc, giving rise to the suspension of whistle-blowers who were subsequently exonerated, at enormous cost to the authority?

new vehicles will doubtless lift some of the burden off hard-pressed police officers. There other were improvements too. But your reporter was left wondering how many of these would have come about anvwav. intervention without the of Commissioner of Police, yet another costly layer of bureaucracy.

HOLME PARK QUARRY NATURE RESERVE

It was a comforting sort of irony that the following talk was of beauty and good hope. Peter Smith described how this small but fascinating nature reserve is (very effectively) managed. It seems the principal objective is to encourage the successful breeding of butterflies. Bracken is controlled, by beating it "bruising." This down - known as encourages the growth of violets, a key plant in providing food for the rare high brown fritillary. Reg Hesketh showed slides he'd taken over 200 visits to the reserve of the impressive variety of species of butterflies. There were many and they were all exquisite, with the wonderful names that lepidopterists were inspired to them: speckled wood, grayling, skipper, brown fritillary, small pearl-bordered fritillary, ringlet, comma, and others this reporter was unable to list, being so taken with the slides that passed before us almost too swiftly to fully appreciate. There was a brimstone, looking rather pallid, and an orange tip with white tips

to her wings, which Mr Hesketh explained was because she was female. Tough luck, really, as orange ones are so attractive. Maybe the males think differently. The ringlet made its first appearance on the reserve in 2010. By 2013, 229 were counted! An encouraging fact conservationists. All too soon wonderful array came to an end. But in case it all seems too saccharin and beautiful to the reader of this account. we were reminded of the voracity of nature by slides of a ragwort plant before and after the depredations of the cinnabar caterpillar. Locusts came to mind, as we gazed at the stripped stalk of a plant so recently clothed in leaves.

And: Burton Parish Council Voluntary Car Scheme

This most helpful service is a tribute to the people who volunteer to drive those unable to get to hospital themselves for whatever reason. We were given the stats: In 2011 (census) Burton had a population of 1495. living in households. Of these 348 were over the age of 65 (23%.) There were 85 single pensioners. The Voluntary Car Service performs a key part in giving lifts to those in need, and from the above figures it can readily be seen that a need is likely to arise. (Your reporter has taken advantage of this service and is most grateful for the opportunity, being herself unable to drive when it gets dark.) We were told that in 2013

there was one co-ordinator, and 11 drivers. They drove 25 different passengers and in all made 104 journeys. A real contribution to the community.

Space - and time - dictates that there isn't much room for more. revealing to hear the requests for help with funding for community projects (e.g. improved lighting for the Heron Theatre, a project run entirely by volunteers.) Community playgroups, rebuilding a wall collapsing behind a bowling green, were requests, worthy and apparently endorsed by those entitled to give the green light. Burton News was once the recipient of one of these grants (a new printer) but that was a long time ago.

PC Observations...

Reporting from the Parish Council meeting

The 20 February meeting had almost a full turn-out of Councillors. Chairman Mike Taylor's gavel thumped the desk at 7.30pm as usual and we were off, with Mike seemingly determined to get the meeting over in an hour. 15 items on the Agenda and the first five were over in two minutes, including the Open Forum where the public can voice any concerns they have. (Someone had hopefully set out 8 chairs for the public, but they remained stubbornly empty.)

Planning applications usually take a few minutes as councillors voice their comments about design and access regarding proposals. different the Outline planning applications particularly disliked as no-one really knows what this means or could lead to. One councillor even branded one outline planning application "immoral" because it could lead to the applicant making some money if the application was accepted.

Further items on income and expenditure accounts and sundry payments were passed and then item 10 came along. The council is going to buy a 400 kilo plastic grit bin for Tanpits Lane, but should it be green or should it be yellow? Five minutes of debate and

nearly a referral to the next meeting but then a decision was made. Item 11 - a feasibility study for a Burton to Clawthorpe footpath will go ahead so that the council can refer those interested to its findings (although the path may never be built.)

The lengthy list of Outstanding Items finally pruned as councillors abandoned hope of the county council doing anything about several road improvement problems - resurfacing Main Street, repairing verges on Moss Lane, etc. Other items are taking an interminable time but were not dropped, as the historic Westmorland County sign, road markings Clawthorpe, Slape Lane upgrading, speed mentoring through the village, Jubilee Walk leaflets, and the Shop Front scheme (time has nearly run out on this one, so next time it will be dropped.) Parish Councillors then individually passed on comments they had received about potholes, storm damage. playground maintenance needs, dog poo and vehicles mounting pavements in a dangerous fashion as they drive through the village. Roger Bingham reported that TanPits Lane flood prevention ("imminent" for some time) was still in that state. In the end Mike didn't get the meeting finished in one hour, but 75 minutes is pretty good aoina!

Burton's Ancient Stones

At the Neighbourhood Forum held in Burton Memorial Hall (18 February) Kath Hayhurst, Keeper of the Burton Archive, asked for a grant on behalf of the Holme & District Local History Society. This is a part of that report...

For several years we have been trying to establish a heritage corner in Burton church. Recently we have commissioned a local joiner to make a shelf and a box in order to display the ancient cross pieces. We would now like to have interpretation panels for each item.

These stones are the oldest known evidence of settlement in the village: 10th-11th century.

They are all made from coarse/medium grained sandstone, and probably from four different crosses, of the Viking-Anglo/Saxon style.

Mr John Chalmers, the village school master, is said to have "rescued" the cross pieces from various gardens in

the village, and brought them back to


the church. He died at Beech Cottage in 1921.

The crosses pre-date the church (the oldest part - the tower - is 12th century) and they were probably set up at a place where people met to pray.

If we obtain a grant we would welcome ideas for the design of the panels.

I enclose drawings of the stone cross relics, and the reproduction which appeared on the Millennium Mugs and literature.





Village People...

Born Joan Lawson in Lancaster in 1919, Joan Foster was the fifth of nine children. When she was just a year old her father became signalman on the railway at Yealand and the family moved there to live in the cottage which came with the job. Joan remembers that each time her mother gave birth - at home in those days, as those of you watching *Call the Midwife* will know - the other children and their father moved into the signal box.

In 1941 Joan married Jim Foster a waggon driver from Burton and they rented Bell Cottage, a typical 1 up, 1 down, in what was then Riggs Yard, now Cocking Yard, for 12s 6d per week. This was to be their home for the next 9 years and where their 3 children were born. In 1950 the family moved to the new council houses being added to Drovers Way.

When Mrs Foster moved into the village 73 years ago the Main Street was home to 4 banks, 2 pubs, 1 temperance hotel, a joiner, 5 grocers, a police station, doctors, vets and a cobbler who not only mended shoes but made clogs and sold shoes. There was a butcher, a garage, bicycle repair shop, blacksmith. Miss Bell's cake baker's shop, a post office. Morewood school, a reading room and, for the sports enthusiasts, a bowling green and

At that time a Mrs Newsham sold milk by the jug from a bogey, Mr Rowbotham the photographer lived in the little sweet shop on the east side of The Square and had his studio where Dial House now stands. Doctor Robertson, the public vaccinator, owned the first car in Burton and was driven about by his who once left Carnforth without him after he put his parcel of supplies, but not himself, in the back of the car and closed the door. The village coal was brought from the canal wharf by horse and cart and the tannery on Tanpits Lane was run by the Bradshaw family. The hides were taken to Carnforth station in a horse and cart owned by Mr Bush, who let the children jump aboard for a ride.

Many years before the swill, or basket, maker lived in the Riggs Yard house that became the Fosters' home. He went out of business and his trough went to paying off his debts, this now can be seen in Croft House field. Mrs Foster remembers the stream coming off the fells, past the cake shop in The Square, across Croft House field to the pond used by the village animals, and another crossing in front of the cottages built for the gas workers, now called Barker Terrace. The retort house and gas works at the bottom of Neddy Hill having closed about 1928.

Call Gary on 01524 782857 &/or visit www.geccleaningservices.com The present Memorial Hall site was home to battery hens owned by a Mr Pemberton and the many other hen huts from Drovers Way to Yealand Lane, which Mrs Foster's husband Jim used to look after and light up each evening. They found that the hens laid more eggs by extending the daylight hours in this way.

Over the years Mrs Foster has been a keen and energetic supporter of village life, a committed member of the WI, the Mothers' Union and the British Legion. where she was standard bearer for 10 years. She was also involved in many activities at the church and Memorial Hall. Kath Hayhurst tells me that Joan Foster is an accomplished artist. They first met in 1977 at art class and Joan is now the senior member of Burton Art & Craft Society which began in 2005. An example of Joan's work A study of hydrangeas hangs in the reception room of the Memorial Hall, and she also features on the Millennium Mural in the same room, holding a picture of the canal bridge.

Although no longer able to get about as she would like, Mrs Foster retains the independent spirit typical of her generation, still living in the family home where her three children, who no longer live in the village, visit her five out of seven days a week.

Blood Bikes - A Vital Service

Have you heard of Blood Bikes?
No, neither had we until chatting one day with Dave Alderson of Bay Blinds, who, it transpired, has been a part of this merry band for some months, so we wanted to know more about the Blood Bikes service. Their Chairman, Paul Brooks explains below what it's all about...

What are Blood Bikes, or more specifically what & who are North West Blood Bikes Lancs & Lakes?

North West Blood Bikes Lancs & Lakes, otherwise known as NWBB L&L, went live in May 2012 with the aim to transport blood, samples, breast milk for premature babies, and other urgent medical items out of hours, completely free of charge freeing up vital funds for our local hospitals. To date we have over 220 volunteers and have made in excess of 4,000 collections and deliveries for local hospitals in the 22 months we have been running.

The organisation is always looking to recruit volunteers into a variety of roles, from operational motorcyclists to admin support, duty controllers, and fundraising posts. In addition, the organisation is also looking to attract sponsors to support its continued operation and expansion.

Until we began helping our local hospitals they relied heavily on taxi and courier services to provide them with out of hours urgent transport, costing the local NHS tens of thousands of pounds each year. The formation of NWBB Lancs & Lakes was set to put a stop to this and allow the NHS to spend money on patient care instead. Having now completed over 4,000 runs, at a conservative estimate NWBB L&L have saved the hospitals in excess of £200,000 in 22 months, which would pay the wages of maybe 4 - 5 specialist nurses and more.

Following the lead of other organisations around the country, and staffed by volunteer motorcyclists and controllers, the charity offers an out of hours emergency transport solution to and other healthcare hospitals establishments **TOTALLY** free of charge.

Our volunteers receive no payment and are not reimbursed with expenses. volunteers Most use their own motorcycles or cars when the weather is bad, however we also provide an emergency service using motorcycles, but in order to ride the liveried bikes our riders must have advanced training. funded by themselves. assessment and rides overseen by two of our trainers who have their own riding schools, given

We have liveried bikes equipped with blues & two's in order to carry out lifesaving emergency collection and deliveries, particularly for whole blood, platelets and drugs, and the riders of these have further specialist training. With assistance from the Medicines and Henalthcare products Regulatory Agency (MHRA), all our riders are trained in the handling and carriage of all the items we carry.

But, the service does more than just deliver blood supplies. For example the Milk Bank at the Countess of Chester Hospital regularly despatches donor breast milk to the Lancashire and Cumbria Hospitals for sick premature babies. These journeys can cost in excess of £100 and nhave to be paid for by the receiving hnospital. This money will be saved and can again be spent directly on patient care. NWBB Lancs & Lakes are providing this urgent lifesaving transport service to the milk bank (itself a charity) free of charge; and now, funded by ourselves and the Lancashire. people of established a satellite Milk Bank, at the Royal Preston Hospital, which serves all the hospitals in Lancashire and the Lake District.

Vícar's Letter...

A simple confession

"It's not that I'm against Christian faith, I just like to believe what I believe without a public fuss."

"Christians are entitled to believe what they like but they shouldn't expect their views to be taken into account by those who create laws or run our country."

"The Christian faith should return to its simple origins when it was about one brilliant teacher and those who chose to listen to him."

Well, one of the earliest and simple confessions of Christian faith Jesus is Lord, but that was never a private belief that didn't "interfere" in public life. The resurrection was proof that God had made Jesus Lord, and therefore that the Jewish authorities should not have killed him; that claim didn't go down well. And in the centuries since, many Christians have discovered that this simple confession has been enough to deprive them of their property, their employment, their family and even their life

So too today. Christian faith is a direct challenge to any authority or power that tries to ignore the risen Lord Jesus. If Jesus is Lord over this world then everything is under his command, including the economy and the weather. If Jesus is Lord then his words must determine what my family believes and how we use our time. Jesus gets to declare what the church must teach and who can be its leaders. And, in the state, Jesus has the right to say when tax is legitimate, what marriage can be

and what constitutes a crime.

That's the simple and original Christian faith: "If you confess with your mouth, Jesus is Lord, and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved." (Romans 10:9)

Roger Reports... from the District & County Councils

The main concerns in February for both SLDC and the councils were the budgets. But as neither had been passed as BN went to press the details will follow next month, but it seems that both the district and the county will accept the Local Government Minister's offer of a 2% subsidy providing that the Council Tax remains static. As Cumbria has to make savings of £22m, to cover a projected overall four year reduction of Council Tax of £88m, some service cuts are inevitable. So far I have not heard of any drastic losses like the Mobile Library or lowering of the Highways Budget - for pot holes! Even so I am glad that the flood abatement work on the A6070 near Holme Park Quarry and on Neddy Hill should have been completed very soon - but how often have I said that?!

The county's subsidies of £33,000 for the Sandgate Hydrotherapy Pool and £47,5500 for the Citizen's Advice Bureaux are remaining, South Cumbria youth services are flourishing and the Youth Council has produced a colourful magazine "BLINK". Attendance at the weekly Youth Club in the Memorial Hall remains high. More worrying are possible cuts in bus subsidies which might affect the mobility of teenagers, as evening and weekend services

might go. Last year 167 young people aged between 5 and 19 from around Burton, Holme and Kirkby Lonsdale used the A2BNoW transport card, compared to 135 from Kendal, the next highest area.

School crossing patrols seem to be on the way out as the county cannot recruit lollypop ladies or gentlemen. Unspent funds will go towards the SID (speed indicator device) programme or to flashing 20 mph warning signs such as those outside Morewood School. I am helping the school and parish council sort out potentially dangerous parking on Main Street at the start and end of the school dav. and have made enquiries about warning signs - but would these be effective? Please have you any fresh ideas to mitigate this long running problem?

Dallam and Queen Elizabeth secondary schools officially enjoy Outstanding status. At QES 47.91% of pupils come from Cumbria, 35.63% from Lancashire and 16.46% from North Yorkshire and I am currently enquiring how support services like psychiatry, which varies between the pupils' home counties, can be standardised and upgraded.

As Cumbria's Older Persons' Champion I am currently following up checks about safeguarding vulnerable residents in care homes following the notorious abuse suffered by some

victims in a north Lancashire care home.

Demography is the statistical basis on which local government works. The 2011 census highlighted that older people now outnumber young people below 16 in South Lakeland. Other population statistics show that. 95.6% compared to a national average of 80%. South Lakeland has the highest proportion of White British Residents. But minority groups have increased by 2.5% since 2001. 97.8% of residents speak English as their first language; 0.7 % - 754 - residents come from Poland. Polish and British Language (for deaf and hard of hearing people) are the largest alternative languages after spoken English. 53.9% of South Lakeland people are married compared to a national average of 46.6%; 0.2% are in Civil Partnerships. The district has a high proportion of Christian residents at 68.1% compared to a national average of 59.3%, but the local figure has fallen from 79.1% in 2001. A welcome statistic is that crime in South Lakeland has fallen from 4,500 in 2010 to 2,500 in 2013, making us the fourth lowest crime district.

Finally the councils are supporting a Food Festival, which is something people all ages can enjoy! But west Cumbrians, especially, must be careful as Copeland has been reported as the UK's district with the most obese

Historical Footnote...

... by Roger Bingham

BURTON'S CURIOUS CARVINGS

important Burton's most historical artefacts are, arguably, the sculptured stones preserved in the parish church. Pevsner's Buildings of England of 2005, for which I was a local consultant, reported pieces of a 10th or 11th century showing cross. Christ in Majesty treading a serpent with the figures of John and Mary by the empty cross; other fragments have an irregular zig zag and a defaced wheel head. The "serpent" cross is particularly significant as, by mixing heathen Viking symbols with the Crucifixion, it indicates that Burton's Nordic ancestors were less pagan and possibly less savage than they are usually regarded. The Viking and earlier Anglo-Saxon stones which included wheel-cross were а 19th discovered during century restoration work.

In 1892 J. Chambers also recorded "two old carved stones, one in an arch in the south wall near to a piscina" (drain for communion ablutions) which were carved with the arms - "lozenge, argent and sable" - of the Croft family who were Lords of the Manor in the thirteenth century. In 1893 the antiquarian Rev WS Calverley recalled

that "in 1844 was found the head of a wheel-cross. It was seen by Mr T. Wilson in a stable near the church."

They were sketched by Mr Chalmers of Burton School and photographed by the village's professional photographer Mrs Sutcliffe. He also made plaster casts and "treated" the sculpture with dilute acid from which he deduced that the "yellowish-white freestone" carvings resembled sculptures of a similar period at Heysham and Halton.

The cross shaft was "of a finer-grained stone, which though hacked with a pick, is very neatly chiselled; but cheap and poor in design as if to get as much appearance as possible with the least expense of invention."

He admired especially "the figure of Christ trampling on the old serpent, whose feeble wings flutter at its neck, while its head writhes round to bite the heel of Christ - who is naked, except for a loin cloth." Regarding John, Mary and the angels "standing by the untenanted cross," he wondered if they had been modelled on "the ante-Norman thanes or ladies of Kentdale."

Thus, he believed these reminders "of stirring folk in a stirring time deserve kindly remembrance and the courtesies of the grave." Curiously, they might, be the earliest depictions of local Burton people.
