Spoiling the Neighbourhood

Isn't it sad when someone comes along, acquires a piece of land alongside your home, applies for planning permission, then simply for profit, proceeds to disrupt the lives of others by erecting buildings in front of and alongside your home, why should this be allowed?

I am of course referring to the proposed site alongside Hutton Close, where my wife and I came to live three and a half years ago.

When I was told that this narrow strip of land could be built on, in my estimation it could only hold around 12 dwellings, certainly no more than 15, (I say this because I built my own home in the 1970s) and then when I learned that 29 dwellings had been planned for this small piece of land I could hardly believe it. Why must modern planning be so congested, people need roo to breaths, space to park their cars - other than the pavement I call this "Battery Henhouse" planning. It may look good on paper, but not when you have to live so close together.



The priority should be for "Starter" homes for the young, who want to get married and bring up families.

This small piece of sloping land acts as an efficient soakaway system, so if the proposed planning goes ahead one can only hope that the properties at the lower end don't suffer surface flooding as a result, whenever we get heavy downpours.

These lovely open views over everyone's garden walls will be gone forever if this small piece of land is built on - two thirds of the dwellings are quite unnecessary anyway. So what is the point of building any more, unless all for the young, they are the ones who really need them.

Reporting from the Parish Council meeting

the absence of In vour usual correspondent I found myself attending both the Annual Parish and Parish Council meetings. The first kicked off at 7.00pm with all but the Chair and Clerk sitting in the public area. We were given a talk on the history of the quarry by the personable apprentice and trainee manager Dean Holmes, under the watchful eyes of Steve Rigby the Operations Manager. Quarry meeting continued with the Chair's report on the year - which he obviously hates and would like to be rid of. After which the public forum raised no comments and so the meeting closed.

The Parish Council meeting got under way at 7.30 after a return to the more formal seating and the arrival of 10 members of the public. Item 5 on the agenda was the Open Forum, and many of those present spoke on the proposed development of the field adjacent to Church Bank Gardens. As a result of the open meeting facilitated by the Chair on the 5 March revised plans had been received by the Council but it is clear that opposition to any development on this site is strong and will not easily be quashed.

complained about the way the Council had dealt with a planning matter before a previous meeting but had not been present at the time. The councillors listened to the points raised.

Moving on to item 6, the consideration of planning applications, the same member of the public tried to speak again only to be prevented by the Chair, after which a general comment was made that anyone applying for planning permission was free to attend meetings and speak in the Open Forum on planning or any other matter should they wish to do so.

Item 10 - R76M Church Bank Gardens - was brought forward at the request of Councillor Rowley. Council decided that all the many letters and emails received on this matter should be sent both to the Simms and the Planning Committee SLDC for information at background when the plans presented - said to be April/May this year. At this point most of the public left to return to the comfort of their homes or maybe the pub?

This seems to have been a good idea as the rest of the meeting was pretty run of the mill stuff, the only good news was the approval of payment of my cheque for plants bought in Autumn for the triangle garden.

The end of meeting round up brought



news that the Royal Oak has now been planted in what is hoped to be its final position; Boon Town residents are complaining of cars being left in the car park by people not in the village; a planning site visit relating to the position of a new crematorium had taken place this week — evidently surrounded by much controversy. There has been no response from SLDC to the request for information on the footpath from the village to Clawthorpe.

The meeting was finally rounded off by the good news that the Great Grey Shrike has been seen on Dalton Fell.

Historical Footnote...

... by Roger Bingham

BURTON IN THE YEAR OF WATERLOO 1815

Burton, around the time of Britain's and her allies victory over Napoleon Bonaparte at the Battle of Waterloo in June 1815, was enjoying a peak of prosperity. The population had grown from 548 in 1801 to 574 in 1811 and would reach 673 by 1821. By contrast, a century later the 1921 census recorded only 538 inhabitants.

In 1815 the village had a healthy mixed economy of agriculture, trade and industry with a short-lived emphasis on road transport using the Heronsyke-Eamont Bridge Turnpike. There were day and night stage coaches to the south and north and, also, horse-posts to meet the Yorkshire Mail at Kirkby Lonsdale and for the Ulverston Mail at Milnthorpe. The main coaching inns were the King's Arms, Green Dragon, and the Royal Oak. Anthony Harrison and Thomas Varty ran carrying services to Lancaster and Kirkby Lonsdale.

Burton's many professional people included the Rev Bryan Waller, vicar; Rev Gawen Hodgson, curate; William Clapham, solicitor and clerk to the magistrates and agent to the Norwich Union Fire office: James Irvine.

surgeon; Michael Pearson, Grammar School Master; Joseph Ridley, excise officer; and John Williams, Esq., oculist. Other officially registered esquires or gentlemen were William Atkinson, Thomas North and Henry Ovington.

Trades men included Septimus Bainbridge. stonemason: **Thomas** Beetham, tailor; John Cocking and George Morland, blacksmiths; Richard Danson, seeds man; Luke Harrison, joiner and wheelwright; Anthony Helm, grocer: Robert Jackson and John Towers, shoemakers: Richard Giles Thompson, and William bakers: Edward Tomlinson, tanner; Richard Wilcock, butcher; and Richard Wilson draper and hatter. Only one farmer, Francis Wilkinson, is registered in the contemporary Parson and White's Directory.

But in 1815, out of 16 weddings the occupations of six grooms were husbandmen or farm labourers. Two arooms. John Rooking and John Wearing, were flax-dressers (at Holme Mills) and there were two carpenters, Luke Harrison and Thomas Greenup. John Foxcroft who married a Burton girl, Ann Bush, was a weaver from Heversham. 26 baptisms included Stephen, a "base child of Deborah Wilson of Coat Green a spinster."

With only 19 registered burials the Burton death rate was lower than for



births. There were three octogenarians' deaths: Catherine Thexton (88), George Pinder (80), and William Swainson (83); four infant deaths under one year old, and one child, Ann Wadeson from Warton, who was seven.

Church accounts, recorded by Church Wardens John Dixon, Matthew Hutton, Robert Hebblethwaite and William Roberts, included 4d each for a dead otter and a "foumart", 5 shillings for sparrows from Dalton and six shillings for the same "vermin" from Holme. Robert Birkett received five guineas for "teaching the children", while repairs to the church clock cost £2 13s 6d.

Nowhere, however, is there a mention of the Battle of Waterloo, although the 6s 6d paid to the church bell ringers might have included a payment for a Victory Peal. But tucked in amongst the matter of fact church statistics there was a verse from an Easter Hymn, If Angels sung at our Saviour's birth. On that Auspicious Morn, We may imitate their mind, now that he again is born.


Sports' Day - Monday 25 May

Vícar's Letter...

Better than a dusty old book

Alexander the Great was just 20 when he became ruler of Macedonia in 336 BC. For the next 13 years he led the Macedonian army on an incredible military campaign, capturing the whole of the Persian Empire and adopting for himself the title "King of Kings."

Alexander was a Classical hero, a ruthless warrior-king with a huge ego. Such a man would not be acceptable to us today as a leader of Britain. We want our leaders to be strong but we expect them to serve us (the Prime Minister is the First Servant.) We want them to be on the side of oppressed people everywhere, not conquering and robbing other nations for us. Our heroes are not those who selfishly dominate others but those who jump into icy water to save others or who remain at the controls to steer the plane away from houses. So what changed our definition of true heroism, and why don't all cultures in the world agree on this?

The Indian writer Vishal Mangalwadi* has given a simple answer, which is all the more compelling because he has looked in on Western culture from the outside: he says we have been deeply influenced by one man and by the book

that tells his story. This man's influence has been growing for 2,000 years but has been most deeply felt in those countries where the Bible has for hundreds of years been read and absorbed — in North America and Britain, and elsewhere in NW Europe.

Far from making us proud we should be grateful and alarmed that the source of this influence is now largely blocked up. How long will it be before the reservoir of habitual self-sacrificial love dries up?

Jesus said to his disciples, "Whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant." Even he, Jesus, had "not come to be served but to serve and to give his life as a ransom for many." Good Friday has given us a very different kind of hero.



Roger Reports... from the District & County Councils

'Money', they say is "at the root of all evil": and it certainly felt like it at the Budget Meetings for both Cumbria County Council and for South Lakeland District Council. Also, both councils hit the headlines for non-financial matters. At the county, a councillor was photographed using his mobile phone - though, I personally didn't think he was any more reprehensible than the many other members who seemed to be glued to their iPads and tablets.

On the District, while discussing tourist attractions, a member declared that Kendal would become a more attractive venue if Lap Dancing clubs were introduced but by whom he did not say. This was a new idea to me, for although know about such ı geographically named dances as the Highland Fling, the only possibly Scandinavian dance ľd previously encountered is the Skaters Waltz. Also, tourist topic the unsuccessfully to curb the development of the fields near Scroggs Wood on the attractive southern (A6) entrance Kendal because the site is of archaeological importance, as it is close to the remains of the Roman fort of Watercrook. But I am hopeful that a fuller rescue dig rather than just a deskbased survey may be carried out. One never knows, with full excavation we might uncover a major attraction like that of Vindolanda near Hadrian's Wall, which 50 years ago was, like Watercrook today, mainly under the meadows.

Seriously, the county council administration proposal was carried to increase, for the first time for five years, the county's share of the Council Tax by 1.99%. This will mean that a Band D house charge will go up from £1,161 to £1,184. The opposition, supported by some independents, had proposed no Council Tax increase. Controversially. they suggested this would be financed partly by amalgamating some Child Care and Family Centres and under-occupied closing some care homes. There was uproar when the opposition leader suggested that the Children's Clothing Allowance could be paid in vouchers rather than in cash which "might be spent on anything else." The opposition's proposals to keep home to school and college transport and subsidies for rural buses were also rejected.

There were mixed views on the proposal to build a new £10m HQ in Carlisle, with the administration claiming that amalgamation of premises would save £900,000 and the opposition arguing that with a 50%

personnel reduction we have more than enough space at Carlisle's more central offices. But the new HQ "would cut the council's carbon output in half from 1,546 tonnes to 826 tonnes." In Kendal most of the 1960s offices behind County Hall have been demolished. But whether any public building will go there is debatable as the town already has an empty white elephant at K Village.

Everybody, accepted that savings and tax rises were bound up with the coalition government's requirement to cut council spending. Cumbria has slashed expenditure most recently by £88m but there is still another £30m to find. Most economies have been in staffing. The work force which was 10,000 in 2013 is now down to about 7,000 and it is planned to fall to 5,200 by 2018. Up to now most staff savings have been through voluntary redundancy, but the ratio is now 60% voluntray 40% compulsory. to Consequently, members were surprised by encountering demonstration by Unison members as we arrived for the budget. Please what do you think?


Unfortunately only about 600 hundred council tax payers responded to a countywide survey, which was half of last year's response. In contrast the district council decided not to increase its share of the Council Tax, and

rejected an opposition proposal to reduce SLDC's tax by drawing on reserves swollen partly by slippage in failing to complete projects and, also, by economies. These included cancelling the in-house magazine which we were told is widely appreciated by residents. Is it?



The surgery's closure means that the Hall now has a fourth meeting space available for hire. The former surgery, now renamed the Meeting Room, can accommodate small groups (up to 30 persons) and is equipped with the usual kettle, mugs and washing up facilities, and benefits from the free WiFi internet access within the Hall. The recent #Mutley band night in the Hall was a sell-out success, which raised the marvellous sum of £1069 for Hall funds. A huge thank you goes to the band for donating their time, and to those who helped set up, take down, manned the door and ran the bar, and to everyone who came along and supported the event.

Our next fundraiser will be a fashion show by Foxy Lady, with Love Beauty and Le Cose Belle, of Kirkby Lonsdale, which will take place on Thursday 23 April and tickets are on sale from 1 April at Burton Village Store & Foxy Lady.

Just running the Hall costs £76 per day, and our current income from room hire fees is just covering this, but that leaves no surplus for future improvements. The committee is loathe to increase hire

rates unless we have to, as we feel that the Hall should be affordable for any group that needs to use it, so we have to continue fundraising to be able to operate and maintain the Hall, and to undertake our next project, which is a revamp of the stage area in the main Hall. The ceiling over the stage needs to be replaced, the existing timber frame which supports curtains, lights and scenery is getting beyond use, and the stage curtains also need renewing.

These essential repairs will be combined with the installation of stage lights, and a sound system which will be available for groups and party bookings. Although we shall be seeking grant aid to fund this we do need to raise a percentage of the cost ourselves, so every fundraising event is important and we hope that you will come along and support us.

News from the Lancaster Canal

Members of Kendal Diving Club searching for the sunken Diphtheria barge in the Lancaster canal have finally found the boat remains. On Saturday 7 March at 4.10pm she was located in shallow water about 4 foot deep. Walking on the gunwale (Gun'al' in naval slang) Kendal Club members fully identified the barge as a typical Lancaster wooden barge 72 feet in length with a beam of 4 feet.

Lancaster Canal Trust had contacted Canal and River Trust, custodians of the canal on behalf of the Nation, for permission to dive the site before dredging could take place, necessary on this section due to a massive build up of Horse Tail Weed.

This work is needed before the IWA National Trail Boat Festival on 30 May to 1 June can take place alongside CountryFest. Around 30 trail boats from around the country, one from as far away as Southampton, will take part in exercises and a spectacular illuminated display on the evening of Monday 1 June. Definitely a date for your diary.


