PARISH COUNCIL FURTHER COMMENT ON REQUEST FOR OUTLINE PLANNING PERMISSION SL/2015/0427 ON LAND TO THE EAST OF HUTTON CLOSE, BURTON-IN-KENDAL

On 5 April 2015, following a public meeting, Burton-in-Kendal Parish Council wrote to you with its opinion of the proposed housing development on the land to the east of Hutton Close detailed at paragraph 3.92 of the Land Allocations Document.

Having taken into account the subsequent comments of the land owner and the views of residents, the Parish Council has resolved to object to the proposed outline planning application.

There are four main areas of concern with the proposed plan: the impact the site density and layout will have on neighbouring properties and the longer distance views, the inadequacies of the access road and its junction with the A6070, the lack of footpath access for future residents of the site, and the biodiversity of the site.

Site Density and Layout

The Land Allocations Document required a good site layout, design and landscaping to minimize the impact on

views from adjoining properties and on longer distance views. This has not been achieved. The Parish Council believes that the number of properties being proposed is considerably more than is possible if the planning guidance in the Land Allocations Document is to be followed. The developer apparently believes that he is required by SLDC to build 29 properties of which 10 are "affordable". As far as the Parish Council are aware SLDC has only ever issued indicative numbers and always maintained that the final numbers would depend on the planning process. The caveat to minimize the impact on views from adioining properties and on longer distance views can only be met if considerably fewer houses are planned.

The Parish Council is concerned that planned immediately houses are adjacent to existing bungalows and that these would have an overbearing impact especially on the low lying bungalows of Hutton Close and the properties on Vicarage Lane. The land owner has commented that none of the planned properties are less than the legal minimum distance from existing dwellings. This flies in the face of SLDC's guidance to minimize the impact. There is no obvious reason why houses should be planned to be built so close to existing bungalows contrary to the planning guidance.



It is also of great concern to the Parish Council that the design of the site and dwellings has not made significant attempt to reduce the impact on the view of the village when approaching from the north. properties are all standard estate designs and the result will be that the view from the north will be dominated by the new estate. There is also concern that the land drainage has not been considered in the design. In recent years a number of heavy rainfall events in the area have caused problems from inadequate top water drainage. The Parish Council would expect any new development consider these more extreme events especially given the closeness of the existing Church Style houses to the planned soak-away area.

A further concern is the siting of the play area which it was felt is rather hidden in a corner of the site where it is hoped trees and hedges will be retained. The Parish Council believes that there is space for a significantly larger play/recreation area in a more open part of the site.

Access on to the A6070

Church Bank Gardens is the only access road for the site. It is an unfinished and unadopted road. It has a steep gradient where it meets the A6070 which is itself on a gradient. The

Parish Council believe that there is scope to make the junction safer by creating a landscaped village entrance in this area which would have the effect of calming traffic and importantly allow a usable footway and safe bus stop to be created. An appropriate solution to the junction should be agreed and implemented, before work on the site begins. The developer has proposed that development would not start until Church Bank Gardens was brought up to standard and adopted. Given the unfortunate history of the Church Bank Gardens road it would be appropriate that SLDC impose and enforce a condition on any planning approval given to any development, that a road adoption agreement is agreed and put place before any development commences and that Cumbria County Council adopt Church Bank Gardens, the new estate road, and any footpaths before the first occupation of any dwellings the proposed on development.

Pedestrian Access

The Land Allocations Document makes it clear that pedestrian access is a concern for this site and that the plan should address pedestrian access to the village. This has not been done. Unless this is done the Parish Council believes that there is a danger of creating a development effectively dependent on cars for access to village

amenities which, as the crow flies, are nearby. Despite what it says in the Land Allocations Document the South East Corner of the site does not join a public bridleway. The site adjoins a field which adjoins the bridleway. The plan proposed by the developer does not incorporate access to the bridleway. It is also important to note that using the bridleway to access the village would involve a significant uphill walk from the site to the path and then down into the village. It is not an appropriate path to consider for access to the village. It would however provide access to the fell. There is a second narrow footway, described oddly as an alley in the Land Allocations Document. This is a narrow passage which is not wide enough for prams or wheelchairs to pass pedestrian. It exits on Main St onto a narrow pavement just passed a blind bend. It is not a suitable solution. Pedestrian access down Church Bank Gardens onto the A6070 is possible, however, like the bridleway, it takes residents out of their way. If this were to be considered the only viable route then considerable effort would need to safe movement of be put in to pedestrians across the A6070 and widening of the pavement between the iunction and the Church to allow safe passage into the village centre. The new site lies between the village and an employment site and nursery school at Clawthorpe. It would be sensible to construct the footway to Clawthorpe as

part of the work to allow safe pedestrian movement around the village.

Safe and convenient pedestrian access to the village amenities must be considered an essential condition of the development, and that this pedestrian access should be completed before first occupation of any dwelling on the proposed development.

Safeguarding the Biodiversity

The Land Allocations Document notes the scope to safeguard the biodiversity of the site by retaining hedgerows and trees and retaining woodland within the development. lt is disappointing therefore that the design removes all the hedge and trees along Church Bank Gardens. This will not only reduce the ability of the site to support biodiversity but also remove natural screening between the new site and existing properties. The measures put in place to protect the biodiversity of the site should be addressed in the plan for the site and SLDC should impose and enforce a condition of any planning permission granted for any development to protect, conserve and enhance the biodiversity of the site.

PC Observations...

Reporting from the Parish Council meeting

There was really only one item of interest at June's meeting – the proposed housing development at Church Bank Gardens.

Three members of the public – all Church Bank residents - spoke about their opposition to the scheme and asked the Council for their support.

Outline plans have been received by the Council and a response to the local planning authority is now needed. Councillors have at previous meetings voiced their concerns about the developer's intentions but no formal plans – even in outline – have been available.

Although there were differing views on the priority of these concerns, there was unanimous support in a vote to object to the outline plan on the following grounds:

- 1. Vehicular access to the development site from the A6070 via an access road is unsafe and needs to be made safe before any development of the site can proceed.
- 2. Pedestrian access is unacceptable and restrictive for people with prams

and wheelchairs.

- 3. The development builds some houses which are overbearing and unneighbourly in relation to their proximity to properties in Hutton Close and Vicarage Lane.
- 4. The visual impact of such a dense development for those entering the village from the north will be unsightly.
- 5. The biodiversity impact will be negative with the loss of hedges and other habitats.
- 6. The impact on the village infrastructure including sewers has not been thought through.

Brian Cooper, who is a local South Lakeland District Councillor, advised concerned villagers to come to the next district council meeting when the plans will be discussed and speak on each of the objections for up to 2 minutes each in a prepared way rather than each person objecting to the same thing.

Other items discussed included:

- 1. The Police Report included the theft of equipment and horse tack to the value of £5070 at a stable in New Mill Pastures; thieves broke in through locked gates and doors.
- 2. The Clerk's computer will be updated



to a value of £600.

- 3. Kath Unsworth has retired from the Burton Education Trust after 30 years service and was warmly thanked by Councillors.
- 4. Councillor reports included a request from Moira Rowley for the Council to support a Dog Poo dispenser for those using local lanes to walk their dogs and leaving them in a disgusting state.
- 5. Brian Cooper said that the Storth Engineering expansion plan was coming up before the Council at the next meeting.
- 6. Paul Rogers reported the good news that Cumbria County Council had cleaned out drains along Main Street and sprayed gutters to kill off weeds.
- 7. Peter Smith reported that Electricity North West are offering to help the infirm and elderly when there are power cuts, through a Priority Services Register, call 0800 195 4141 or visit www.electricitynorthwest.co.uk/priority.
- 8. Roger Bingham reported the continuation of a grant for the village lengthsman, no progress on rural broadband provision as yet, unlikely progress towards a unitary authority in the near future, failed OFSTED report on local Cumbria Children's Services,

and mixed reaction to a celebration on September 9/10 this year when the Queen will have been on the throne longer than Queen Victoria was.



The trip is on Tuesday 14 July, leaving by coach at 9am from BMH.



BEAUTY ALL AROUND

Our neighbourhood is full of beautiful stone things, as you will have noticed. What I mean is not the works of nature although many of the crags and outcrops are beautiful - but the crafted pieces that you come across on byways, along lanes, in woods, and on the coast. The one I've enjoyed most often lately is the six-foot-long, threefoot-high boulder a few yards southeast of Warton Main Quarry. Some master sculptor has made it into a seat and the back of it is an eagle. At the centre the bird's beak looks westward between staring eyes. The wings have feathers each, cut into limestone. I'm not saying it's comfortable to sit on. The beauty of it is the stern ferocity of the bird as it looks out from its belvedere over the great broad gleams of Morecambe Bay golden or grey-blue according to the weather and the time of day.

Other stones are less easy to come across. In Lunesdale, on the track northwards to Whelprigg up the hill from Casterton, Andy Goldsworthy the land-artist has installed a series of massive boulders, like penned bullocks, in the sheepfolds that flank the way. A photo of one of them has been showing recently on the screen beside the check-out at the shop. These were part of his project to restore old folds and make them signify once again in the countryside. You could almost miss them as you walk past. Once you see them, they become features, very much of the land, made out of its materials, not foisted onto it like the towers and obelisk that loom around some skylines.

They're all part of the land-art movement of the past thirty years. Councils, landowners, and artists have enriched our surroundings without distorting them. The dozens of wooden creatures in the forest at Grizedale are supreme examples of this flowering. So are the wonderful bird sculptures in Morecambe: the bronze cormorants drying their wings on the way through to Morrisons from the Prom; the hefty raptor - surely carved by the same hand as the Warton seat - which stands in the middle of the walkway along to the Stone Jetty. In the Grizedale forest

you often come across these things by chance - conifer trunks fastened together along the ground to make a giant anaconda shape. a small herd of wild boars in a glade.

Andy Goldsworthy has resisted the publication of leaflet guides to his stoneworks. So perhaps I shouldn't have located them by writing this piece. There are other such art-works around the countryside, so - good luck with your walking and looking.

Vícar's Letter...

A book for the plough boy

If your business is illegal and the authorities are breathing down your neck then you could move abroad, continue to produce what you produce have it smuggled back into England. That's exactly what William Tyndale did in 1524 when his chosen trade was getting him into hot water; he wanted to print English Bibles. Amazingly, apart from a few English Bibles read secretly for fear of execution, the only Bibles in England at the time were in Latin, which hardly anyone The pre-Reformation understood. church and Henry VIII did not want people to know what this dangerous book actually said - they might realise that the church had been teaching nonsense, and that the king himself had things to answer for.

So Tyndale fled England having declared to a hostile clergyman, "If God spare my life, ere many years I will cause a boy that driveth the plough shall know more of the Scriptures than thou dost." Living as a hunted exile he translated the New Testament from the original Greek texts into English, had them printed in Antwerp and smuggled back into England where they were eagerly bought and read. Ordinary

people would pay as much as a load of hay just to get a few pages, and would sit up all night hearing the Scriptures read. The authorities did all they could to seize and burn those books.

Tyndale went on to translate part of the Old Testament too, but in 1535 an Englishman secretly working for the King betrayed Tyndale, he was imprisoned near Brussels for 18

months and then convicted of heresy. Tied to a stake, but before he was strangled and his body burnt, he called out, "Lord, open the King of England's eyes." Two years later Henry VIII ordered that an English Bible be

placed in every church in England. These Bibles were revised versions of the texts that Tyndale had created.

500 years on, what is left of the hunger for God's Word that was so characteristic of England in Tyndale's day, and how many of us would risk our lives to defy Bible 'gagging orders' or to handle smuggled Bibles? "Lord, open England's eyes again!"

Historical Footnote...

... by Roger Bingham

A NEW MASTER FOR BURTON GRAMMAR SCHOOL - 1865

Burton Grammar school's old building opposite the church unusually has a double date stone being inscribed, "this ground given by John Hutton of Burton 1689-1785." 1785 refers to later refurbishments whereas 1689 records the school's founder, John Hutton, who was given "free licence to build a school house upon his own land at ye end of his now dwelling at Burton Church Stille" (sic).

Further historical details were reported in the Westmorland Gazette in January 1865, after the governors had met to chose a new master. "The vicar, the Rev Canon Morewood opened the proceedings by delivering an able and impressive address. He stated that, 200 years ago, a bequest was made by John Hutton of East Hindon, Durham. for endowing the Free Grammar School provided always that the master shall be a Master of Arts either of Oxford or Cambridge. and be elected housekeepers regularly attending the Parish Church on Sundays."

The current candidate was a local man: William Henry Nutter, a graduate of

Christ's College, Cambridge. The Rev Chairman reported that as "Mr Nutter's testimonials were in the highest degree satisfactory he trusted that in the master-ship being thus conferred on him, the re-establishment of this ancient school, to which no election had been made for a period of twenty years, would prove highly beneficial to the town and neighbourhood."

"It was then proposed by John Fearnside esq. and seconded by R Jackson Williams esq. that Mr WH Nutter be elected, whereupon a show of hands being requested and the opposition not being worthy of notice, Mr Nutter was by an overwhelming majority duly elected."

In conclusion, the vicar of Holme Rev Thomas Croft "commented on the many eminent persons who had gone forth from thence to take foremost places amongst their fellow men one of whom was his old pupil who was now the successful applicant." Three hearty cheers were then given for the vicar who had recently been ill. Sadly he died only three months later and Morewood School - "for Infants", was founded in his memory in 1867.

Not long afterwards, the Grammar school closed down but, happily, its endowments were diverted in 1878, to the Burton Educational Foundation

Roger Reports... from the District & County Councils

There has not yet been a county council since the General Election though we've had many committees We've and site visits. also presentations on the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIMS) by which housing developers have to pay a proportion of their sale prices to the councils including Parish Councils - so and when the Church Development. (whose planning application has just gone), is completed we should get funds for extra facilities.

On SLDC, contrary to precedent where convention has been that chairman serves a maximum of two years, a Former Chairman Mrs Sylvia Emmett was elected as the District Council Chairman to replace Evelyn Westward who lost her seat in the May election. Also on elections, plans to change the system whereby SLDC is re-elected in thirds have been raised again. Currently, on the fourth year we have county council elections with in addition General, European, Police Commissioner elections thrown in; so it means that we seem to be perpetually electioneering. I would like all our district elections to be on the same day as we do for the county council. Also I think it would be simpler and less expensive if wards with two members

like ours were contested in the same year. This would change the current arrangement whereby Brian Cooper's seat came up this year while the seat I currently hold comes up in 2016, followed by the county council election in 2017, the Police Commissioner in 2018, European in 2019 and the next General Election in 2020. On the other hand many elections mean that the candidates are in regular contact with the electorate - though I myself do try to be out and about all the time anyhow. But please let me know what you think. Looming over all remains the prospect of the six district councils being merged with the county to form one unitary authority.

Meanwhile, SLDC has slimmed down its structure by abolishing 'member champions' for certain areas as they merely mirrored the roles of Cabinet Committee members. SLDC's and published report glowed with catalogue of achievements. included 96% staff satisfaction: council is on target to build 1000 affordable homes to rent by 2025, 23 new affordable homes have been built at Natland and Kirkby Lonsdale; average time to complete planning applications has improved by 5%; and 70% of South Lakeland businesses have achieved a maximum five-star rating for hygiene.

members, only two of which concerned the council, and no formal investigation has been made about any councillor. SLDC's cabinet also reviewed regulations for stray dogs. This was in a week which saw a sheep dog being 'rescued' from Helvellyn and taken to a new home in Scotland before being returned to its native heath. As a Shadow Cabinet member I was relieved to hear that any unclaimed dog would be re-homed, thorough checks are made on the new carers, where necessary strays would be chipped and, if possible, neutered and that in the last year, only two strays (which had health or behavioural problems) had been put to sleep. Fortunately these rules do not apply to councillors, though we may appear to lose our way while at meetings we sometimes stray from relevant subjects.



Some of the flora, although late, has been quite remarkable. Some fabulous populations of the Common Rock Rose up on the Common, but sadly no Northern Brown Argus butterflies around to enjoy the spoils so far! Fly Orchids have done well this year, also new records gathered on Sanicle, Woodruff and the Heath and Limestone Bedstraws.

Our ferns are doing OK as well with some (new to us) populations of the rare Beech Fern having been recorded, also the rare Holly Ferns and Green Spleenworts are well on their way. Also the rare Bird's Foot Sedge has also been in good numbers again this year.

This month for me will be the start of the orchid recording expecting good results on the Dark Red Helleborine, the Broad Leaved Helleborine and maybe their rare hybrid which we are so lucky to have on Hutton Roof (the main site in the whole of the UK). Also I can't wait to check out the new found Green Flowered Helleborine.

Still the butterflies are struggling with all this cold or wet weather. Noted during June was Small Heaths, and Dinghy Skippers, occasional Green Hairstreak and Brimstones. Be ready for a Painted Lady invasion year, as forecast English Nature and Butterfly Conservation. It was 2009 the last invasion when thousands of them came through over a couple of days. A fantastic sight if you are lucky enough to be under their flight path (2009 some over Burton but main flightpath over Beetham side of the A6.)

The Cuckoo was still present on Dalton Crags at least up until writing on 16 June, Garden Warblers are doing extremely well again this year with several new sites being discovered. Tree Pipits have been much subdued in song this year, possibly on account of the weather, Redstarts holding their own. A new Yellowhammer site recorded on the Kelker side. Crossbills noted on 8 June on Hutton Roof and a nice record of a Hawfinch seen in the garden of Fern Bank in mid-June.

The Burton Swift Bird Study Group had their first meet of the year on 5 June and have met weekly since. The Swifts are doing very well, having occupied at least five of their regular sites, and interesting to note that they are also using at least a further two new sites (previously not recorded.) As yet we

At best so far we have seen a collection of up to 16 birds in the sky at one time above the Memorial Hall, we saw these birds immediately prior to dusk and it was thought perhaps they were nonbreeding Swifts grouping evening before they head to hiah altitudes to spend the rest of the If this was so it would evening. probably mean there could well be up to 30 birds present around Burton when you take into account the breeding birds as well. Some more good news is that Swifts have also been seen flying low over the Clawthorpe Hall area.

Our Swift Bird Study Group are meeting on a weekly basis either on Thursday or Friday evenings for one hour prior to dusk. If anyone wants to join us they would be most welcome.
