A Most Modest Hero

A small but significant family occasion took place within the recent Little Cumbrian Tea Room event as John Clifford Berry received from Margaret, daughter the Ushakov medal. This medal is a military honour awarded by the personal decree of the President of the Russian Federation for personal courage and displayed during WW2. The translated citation reads, "On the Arctic convoys, the allied seamen showed true heroism in their long and perilous sea passages being constantly under attack from enemy forces during the appalling weather conditions of the Arctic. The bravery of these men and women who unsparingly fought for Victory will always remembered and be respected."

It was on 4 August of this year when Margaret visited the Russian Embassy in London to receive the medal behalf of her step-father on the instruction of Vladimir President Putin, whose personal message reads, "I have the honour of presenting you with the Ushakov medal." The visit to the embassy was the culmination of many frustrating years of family effort to procure this honour, only to be thwarted time and again by the various agencies involved, including the Foreign Office. PC Observations...

Reporting from the Parish Council meeting

It was all over in 45 minutes at 17 September's PC meeting. It started well with Roger Bingham announcing that it was his 73rd birthday. Chairman Alan Wren (a bit tongue in cheek) apologised for not having a cake ready, whilst Roger reminded us of his many years of service to local, district and county councils.

The Police Report included a Road Traffic Accident, some motorbike nuisance, and some loose cows who had escaped from a field at the top of Vicarage Lane after someone left a gate open. The cows had managed to

At the Open Forum a parishioner, who lives opposite the school, asked for car parking outside the school to be reviewed because getting in and out of his drive can be difficult at peak times. It's an old problem, but a little bit of consideration by parents delivering and picking up their offspring would be very helpful. Roger Bingham reported that he still pursuing action was Department Highways to improve safety at the Boon Town access onto the A6070, including traffic calming measures and white lines.

Planning applications received included a solar farm on land north of Saddler Nook Lane in Whittington. This will cause an increase of heavy vehicles on Dalton Lane unless traffic is redirected along different and possibly quicker routes. Councillors suspected that the developers had not realised that these routes were available and resolved to write to them. A second application for an extension at The Old Vicarage was passed with no comment but Councillor Mason-Hornby thanked the owners for turning up to witness the discussion.

(scheduled for the chop), damaged wings at the playground (repaired), dog waste dispensers (awaiting action!), still no money for the Lengthsman and no response from Highways Department about the outcome of the feasibility study for a footpath to Clawthorpe.

Thank You to Burton

At 8 o'clock on the 25 April this year news started emerging through the internet and over the BBC of a massive 7.8 magnitude earthquake in Nepal. Fiona and I had been back from our visit there just a week. We had been trekking in the Annapurna region and visiting Kathmandu, returning with the most incredible memories of wonderful humbling people and a beautiful land. awakening to the news that morning was immensely upsetting and very worrying for the people as a whole, and for those we had spent so much time with and who had looked after us so well. During our trekking we had been invited into homes and been offered and shared what food and drink they had, despite that being so little. We had visited schools along our path and been continually greeted by smiling faces of young children, more-often than not asking, "chocolate?"

As the hours went by we, as so many of us that week, found ourselves glued to the ever more horrific news; reports of destroyed temples, flattened homes and remote villages which now no longer existed. With a huge sense of futility I sent off an email to our trekking guide, and new found friend, Mekh. Not

knowing whether there was firstly any infrastructure sufficiently intact to carry the message and secondly, whether he was even alive to read it, I waited...

Within school we had assemblies and devoted class time to think of the plight of the Nepalese people and looking at the plate tectonics and geological processes behind the event. A variety of raisina activities organized; a cake sale was held where the children baked and brought in cakes to sell at break times: the money the year 6 children raised at the Spring Fair was shared and at our year end theatrical production of Macbeth collections were taken. Some parents brought in contributions and some children raised money outside school and brought it in. It was a lovely response.

Thankfully, a reply eventually came back, Mekh was alive and well. He had been away helping in his home village of Gorkha, the epicentre of the quake and gave sad reports of the destruction in his valley...

"Saab, As per the paper today, 49 districts (out of 75) schools were affected by the quake: 380 students and 64 teachers lost their lives, 6,902 schools were damaged, which is a big challenge, for the Ministry of Education."





I proposed to him that it would be wonderful if our children of the village could directly help the children out there in his valley. I wanted to ensure that every penny raised by them was used only for helping them and not in running, however commendable. charities infrastructure. Since then we have sent out close to \$1000 to help them in whatever ways they find most useful. This has been decided by the village education council and they have been most grateful for the donations sent. Photos of the destruction and the ongoing repairs can be seen on the school's Facebook page, along with copies of their handwritten letters of thanks.

This is a little something we have done in our 'spare time' in school, alongside the many other good causes our children and parents have contributed to over recent months. So, from me and above all a small community in Nepal, a very sincere thank you to all of you in village who have made anv contribution. We will continue to send any help we can and those wishing to contribute can do so through the school office. Anyone wishing to see pictures from the trek can do so on my Facebook site and keep up with our efforts at school on our Facebook page.

As a post script, I received an email from Mekh last weekend. During one's

All in all, the advice was that for a family to happen, some time at home might be the first step! His last email read, "for gynaecologist Fiona: Fiona mam, this time no trekking because of off season and big quake, so more holidays, that is more time with wife, as we had lots of talk on the trek, I am finally going to be a dad, wiheeee, said by a doctor.'

Indeed, life from the rubble!

Historical Footnote...

... by Roger Bingham

Burton in 1926 when our longest reigning sovereign was born

For the media, the birth, on 21 April 1926. of Princess Elizabeth Alexandra Mary of York could not have come at a worse time because it occurred when all newspapers were about to be closed down by The General Strike. As a substitute the Westmorland Gazette type-written published sheet а headlined 'Wonderful fortitude of the British People' which reported Government's protection of loyal workers.' They included the non-striking employees of K Shoes in Kendal but not the workers at Holme and Beetham Mills who 'went out on strike.'

But some normal activities continued. At the annual church meeting Burton's vicar, the Rev W. E. Potter, stated that the 1925 expenses were £99 and, that an extension to the churchyard would soon provide '365 extra nine foot grave spaces.' Later. at the consecration ceremony, the Bishop of Barrow denounced the designs of 'atrocious grave stones' and pronounced (perhaps in a reference to the strikers) 'that every member of the church should stand by his brother grievously he may have however lapsed'. The Christian 'sisters'

Other happy occasions included a hot pot supper for ex-servicemen, held at separate venues at the National School and Morewood School, where music was provided, peripatetically, by the exotically named 'Havana Syncopated Orchestra' from Carnforth! A good day out was also enjoyed by the church choir which went on a trip to Liverpool to view a new liner 'SS Franconia.' Fortunately, the passengers (in the topped charabanc) 'had acceptable weather apart for a shower or two near Garstang.

Happily, too, the sun shone for Miss Joyce Brown when 'arrayed in ivory satin beaute trimmed with orange blossom' she married Mr Cyril Hodding' at St James' Church. For less sumptuous wear the Summer Sales adverts included children's dresses at 6/11 (34p), nightdresses at 2/11 and directoire knickers at 1/11.

The rain also held off when many Burton folk went up to Bowness to see Princess Mary - King George V and Queen Mary's only daughter - who was making the first Royal Visit to Lakeland for 20 years. Even so, 1926, was generally held to have suffered the worst weather for decades.

Savage storms brought down hundreds of trees, and incessant rain turned Boon Town Lane into a raging torrent in February. Snow fell in June, and in July several workmen, 'narrowly escaped death' when a building site hut in which they were sheltering on Vicarage Lane was struck by lightning, 'sheets of set asbestos aside to line the bungalow's shattered... walls were When winter drew on, as the miners were still on strike, coal was scarce so Burton's Squire Mr Penrhyn-Hornby revived the Victorian custom 'seasonal benevolences' by distributing coal to the poor widows in the parish.

Even so it had been a miserable year - except, of course, for the birth of the Royal Baby.

Roger Reports... from the District & County Councils

Firstly some sad news: it is now official that the mobile library service to Burton has been 'discontinued'. The fight to save this service goes back to 2004 when I was the county's cabinet member for culture and libraries. At that time I was able to keep open all 'static' libraries, extend the opening hours at Milnthorpe and elsewhere, and we introduced Sunday opening in six main town libraries including Kendal. The money was recouped by closing several Carlisle mobile library routes where most residents lived within two miles of a static library. This enabled us to redirect the library vans to our area; but alas, after ten years respite, our van has failed its MOT - so, as a new one would cost £100,000, in circumstances it could not be replaced. In the last decade the number of users has decreased, although Burton's tally of 29 people who have used the service at least once in two years, is above average.

Sadly I was unable to join Burton's van users at a meeting with officials on the 7 September as I was taking part in a funeral for a member of the Cumbria Deaf Association of which I am chairman. But, as a partial help, it was announced that a library 'stack' service would bring books to the Memorial Hall

coffee morning, to be held generally at the former van times on the first Monday in the month. Books can be ordered in advance and home delivery for long-term house-bound users will continue. The house-bound contact number is 01539 713520 but medical and social services references might be required. 'Sam the Van', the mobile library's attendant was not a council employee. Nevertheless, I was pleased to hear that he is likely to be retained by his agency employers.

Road news is mixed. My contribution to our parish's lengthsman of £1,000 pa for 2016-17 should be approved at the relevant meeting in November. Perhaps more importantly, as part of my helping the Parish Council's plans for traffic calming, I have contributed £3,500 to altering the Priority Give Way markings at one of the narrowest parts of Main Street between the King's Arms and Boon Town. Let's hope it works! have been completed on Repairs Vicarage Lane and other roads. In response to my complaints about the surface dressing not being extended to cover the badly eroded stretch of the A6070 up to J36, I was told that the Clawthorpe to Burton part was done to correct a faulty camber which had, it seems, contributed to a number of at least potentially serious accidents. To whole length the up to the Crooklands roundabout might have delayed all the work for another year.

It's that time of year again... A Note from the Post Office about Christmas Posting 2015

So now the kids have been back at school for a month and the summer holidays are a fading memory, the inevitable countdown to Christmas has begun. (As always Akis will know, to the minute, the time left until our "Day Off".)

So, planning ahead you should know that, as always, the last posting dates for sending Surface Mail (now called International Economy) are unseasonably early; in fact for the furthest destinations they were at the end of September.

For parcels sent by Airmail there is no rush, you have until the beginning of December for even the furthest destinations. However, if you are planning on sending parcels via the slower, cheaper option of International Economy the recommended last posting dates are:

- Monday 28 September
 — All non-European destinations except those mentioned below
- Tuesday 29 September Middle East and Far East (except Hong Kong & Singapore)
- Tuesday 13 October South Africa, Hong Kong, Singapore, the USA & Canada
- Tuesday 3 November Eastern

Europe, Greece, Cyprus, Turkey, Malta & Iceland

 Tuesday 17 November – Western Europe

Remember that parcels sent outside the E.U. need to have a customs form attached, these are available at the Post Office Counter. Also remember to put your name and address on the top left hand corner of the front of your package; this will enable Royal Mail to return your item should overseas customs authorities refuse it entry into their country.

The usual reminder about size and weight for parcels sent abroad

Before you go out and buy a scooter for your grandchild in New Zealand, may I remind you of the maximum sizes for sending items abroad with Royal Mail.

The maximum total of (length + width + height) is 90 cm (approx 3ft) with the maximum single dimension of 60cm (approx 2 ft). Also, the maximum weight is 2 kg.

It is really easy to exceed these and then the parcel would cost a great deal more to send via Parcel Force. It is sometimes cheaper to split a heavy parcel and send two packets.

Royal Mail have now introduced a "large letter" size for overseas mail as well as for the UK. So this year, your calendars and bulky Christmas cards may not be quite as expensive to send as they were last year.

Dangerous Goods

To comply with national and international regulations governing the carriage of mail, and ensure that mail in transport does not present a danger to the general public, Royal Mail must restrict or prohibit certain items from their network.

So this year we will once again have to ask you what are the contents of your parcels; not just because we are being nosy or looking for gift ideas ourselves, but because there are restrictions on items containing, for example, batteries, nail varnish, perfume, aerosols etc.

Lithium batteries (the type commonly found in mobile phones and laptops) cannot be sent alone, and for international mail they must be packaged in the equipment. Beware, some countries do not permit the import of lithium batteries at all.

Things are rapidly slowing down now. but I did manage to check out the Autumn Gentians on the Farleton side quite close to the area I have called the "Saddle" which has a lovely natural stone "saddle looking" sculpture. There were hundreds of them dotted around main footpaths in this area. the Surprisingly most of them were of the "white" variety and only some 10% of the beautiful purple colours which you generally associate with this species. I guess we would have had at least 300 if not more. Not a bad tally when in the past years numbers have probably only reached maybe a dozen or so at best. It's been a good year for this species and also for Betony and Common Rock Rose which seemed to have sprung up everywhere.


Well we have started with the Visible "Bird" Migration watching and I have been up off Vicarage Lane recording. But this year has started really poor. Where have all the Meadow Pipits gone, in fact where have all the small passerine birds gone? We have known

for a while now that things have not just been right with the upland breeders especially the Meadow Pipit numbers dwindling so drastically, and it's too early to be able to tell what's going on, but numbers of moving birds have been so thin on the ground. To try and give you a example, by now I would have expected maybe up to 300 or 400 moving through Burton over a 3 hour period, this has been the case for a number of years. But for some strange reason this year we are lucky to get 10 to 15 birds over in a one hour period. I am in constant daily communication with others who are also recording poor counts throughout the North of England, although the counts are better down the East side of the country.

Swallows have been leaving our shores in their thousands, and it is presumed they peaked on passage somewhere around the 15 September. Yet there is still evidence of good numbers locally, especially behind the St. James/Tanpits areas as I write (20 September 2015.)

Chaffinches are just starting to come through on their moves South, again slow and poor numbers compared to the same time in past years, and hopefully they will continue to rise in numbers up to about the middle of October and then we should start to see the influx of continental Chaffinches coming through, along with their rare cousins the Bramblings.

From the middle of the month I expect be hearing the "see-ip" of the Redwings as they start to enter into the country, followed a week or so later by the mighty flocks of Fieldfare, which will peak as a rule to the end of the month. Depending on the wind directions on any particular days we could get thousands making their way from the Aire Gap directions and up across Dalton/Burton towards the Lythe Valley. Some years though, like last year, we drew a blank with only a minimal taking this particular amount on passage route. It all depends on the prevailing winds at the times of their arrivals which routings they take across the country, so it's fingers crossed.

This month also should start to see the numbers of Starlings swelling, in particular at Leighton Moss, as the continental birds start to come into the country from the Baltics and Scandinavian countries. Usually the peak will be around the 26th of the month.

Odd parties of Pink Footed Geese have already been recorded, but they too should start to increase in numbers as we get into the first week or two in October.

The Demise of the **Mobile Library**

So, it's over, done and dusted, RIP'd and suchlike expressions as our trusty second-hand, often-repaired mobile library van has been shunted off to wherever ancient mobile vans end their davs. The discontinued service has been a life-line to many down the years and is already greatly missed leaving behind profound disappointment that the council decided in its wisdom that, it was no longer able to fund repairs but, kept the loyal library users in the dark for six weeks before making its fate known via an announcement on Radio Cumbria. As guestions began to arise as to why in the first place, when money was perhaps more plentiful, that a new van was not then thought to be a long-term better investment of Council Tax revenue. Moreover, it is rumoured squillions of funds are readily available for new council offices as local services are left to die

However, we are where we are, is there a way forward, that is the question? In view of an alleged lack of interest by Parish Council albeit Bingham is understood to have made appeals. Thus approaches were made to Kendal Library directly for help by users and to give them their due, Kendal staff responded phoning around for feedback and ideas. This direct

action by locals culminated in three senior council officers accepting an invitation to attend the monthly 'Library (minus library van) Coffee Morning.' The officers attended a packed C. M. and were inundated with comments. complaints and ideas, not forgetting praise for the long-suffering driver of the now defunct van. It was on the whole a good humoured event. The officers were fed coffee and slices of Akis's famous cakes. They suggested Library Book Drops as one possible way forward, a plan that will need to be explored as space and the logistics of scheme will need serious discussion by all concerned, including the village shop and the Memorial Hall committee, but for the time being there is no alternative other than trips to Milnthorpe Kendal libraries. or Meanwhile, there is an added burden for Stephanie who manages Burton Book Club, who now has to make the journey by car to Milnthorpe library in order to to deliver and collect club books.

The officers who attended the Coffee Morning have since sent an email of thanks for Burton's lively interest in exploring alternatives and offered their help and advice as and when future plans develop.




