OUR PUB IS THE NATION'S HEARTWARMING HERO!

PC Observations...

Reporting from the Parish Council meeting

The 20 March meeting was a two-parter with the Annual Parish Meeting kicking off at 7pm and the normal monthly Parish Council at 7.30 pm. The Annual Parish Meeting is supposed to be a affair parishioners public for and councillors alike to share views in a public forum and hear a talk about some local issue - neighbourhood planning and the future of the local quarry have been the topics in the past two years. This year the Parish Council decided not to have a speaker because public interest has been so small in the past and lo and behold, there were no members of the parish at all for this year's meeting. Zero, zilch, nobody. Nobody from Burton attended a meeting with local MP Tim Farron when he visited Burton last year either. Last year's attempt to involve parishioners in neighbourhood planning also fell on deaf ears. This would have resulted in funds extra for the village Burtonians spring into action when something unneighbourly happens on their doorstep such as a planning application for a house extension or a housing development - and there are going to be some big ones on the way soon - but otherwise they seem to be happy to let things rumble on as they have in the past.

The response of the Parish Council is a shrug of the shoulders basically. 'No one is interested so we won't do anything either.' lt's very understandable а response but eventually it can lead to a negative outlook where Councillors are drawn towards inaction or 'no response' when issues crop up and Parishioners wonder what's the point because life's complicated enough as it is. Perhaps new blood is required on the Council? Judging from some comments made at the Annual Meeting, this would be a development welcome for Councillors. And there is an election on 5 May. Are you/could you be interested in standing as a Councillor? If so contact Christine Davidson on 01524 782694 or parish.clerk@burton-in-kendal-pc.gov.uk right away (before 7 April) to find out more.

Chairman Alan Wren's Annual Report highlighted trends in Council activity over the past 12 months – decrease in consultation with the Parish about local issues from SLDC, decreasing presence of police representatives, increase in planning applications, increase in solar energy applications, decline in local services reflecting funding pressures on library, lighting and drains maintenance from Cumbria County Council and continued concern about parking and dog poo. It was not a very optimistic picture – basically things are going to stay the same or get worse!



Two members of the public came for the normal Parish Council meeting to query how the Council dealt with planning Francis Mason-Hornby applications. thanked them for coming. They asked interesting questions about whether Councillors make site visits (they do), is there a Parish Plan (there isn't), whether approval of a planning application sets a precedent for other applications (it does), and what influence the Council's view about an application has on its eventual approval by SLDC (it might have some influence but it might not.) The Council then reviewed application for a housing extension in Morewood Drive. The plan was 'overbearing and unneighbourly' and unanimously Councillors agreed object to the application.

Other issues discussed included:

Not to have a village beacon celebrate the Queen's 90th birthday but to encourage local groups to organise their own ways of celebrating.

To support any application to have the right of way between Church Bank and Main Street for registration on the Definitive Map of the village.

To welcome and support the Parish Clerk's effort to gain a Certificate in Local Council Administration.

To lament the incidents of horse manure fly tipping which have been occurring around Burton. Someone 'under the cover of darkness' is apparently tipping the offending piles and if you have any information please contact the local police.

To acknowledge the need to respond to a preliminary planning proposal for housing development at Green Dragon Farm.

To reconsider the possibility of reintroducing mobile SID а Indication Display) to try and slow traffic speed through Burton.

To welcome the option help to Parishioners who have difficulty putting out the blue plastic recycling crates – SLDC have a limited number of wheelie containers to help. More information from customerservices@southlakeland.gov.uk or 01539 733333.

To acknowledge the new bus timetables.

To be aware that the PC will be asked by County Council Highways Department 'where the drains are' in Burton so that Highways staff can flush them out.

Vicar's Letter...

The Servant Queen

How many people do you know who are 89 years old, work 40 hours a week, and have been doing the same job for 62 years? My guess is you only know of one – Her Majesty the Queen.

Some rulers are cruel, self-serving and wicked – we have had some like that in our own country's history and there are plenty around the world today – but our queen has been steadfastly hardworking, humble, self-controlled and good. Why is she like this?

Six months before her Coronation she made this request of her people: "Pray that God may give me wisdom and strength to carry out the solemn promises I shall be making and that I may faithfully serve Him and You, all the days of my life." She knows that she herself serves a greater King, Jesus Christ.

The Queen serves us because Jesus served her, as every Easter reminds us, by laying down His life as a sacrifice for sin. The royal crown is topped by a cross for good reason. In her 2011 Christmas Day broadcast the Queen said, "Although we are capable of great acts of kindness, history teaches us

that we sometimes need saving from ourselves – from our recklessness and greed. God sent into the world a unique person – neither a philosopher nor a general (important though they are) – but a Saviour, with the power to forgive."

Mark Greene and Catherine Butler have written a superb illustrated book to mark the Queen's 90th birthday. It is titled 'The Servant Queen and the King she serves' and demonstrates, often in her own words, who has been at the heart of the Queen's selfless reign. Her Majesty's own foreword to the book includes this, "In 1952 I asked the people ... to pray for me as I prepared to dedicate myself to their service at my Coronation. I have been – and remain – very grateful to you for your prayers and to God for His steadfast love. I have indeed seen His faithfulness."

We plan to obtain some copies of the book to give to those who would like them. If you would be interested please speak to a member of the congregation.

In the last year we were called out by the Ambulance Service on 196 occasions to a wide range of incidents requiring emergency medical care, a number of which were immediately lifethreatening. A huge thank you to all of you who support our First Responders in many ways and enable us to continue responding to 999 calls. Our AGM is at 8.00pm on Wednesday 27 April in The King's Arms.


Many of you will have seen the new bright green box which was installed a few months ago on the wall of the Memorial Hall. This box houses a Public Access Defibrillator - a potentially lifesaving piece of kit if someone suffers a cardiac arrest. If you find yourself needing to help somebody who has collapsed and needs urgent phone for an ambulance on 999; the operator will mobilise the Ambulance and the First Responders and will guide you on what to do - including giving you the code to open the green box.

To learn more the new defibrillator and to learn some simple skills which can save lives by helping you to know what to do until the First Responders or the Ambulance arrive, please seriously

As I write (20 March), we have been under high pressure with the weather for several days, and I have noticed that the bird migration has almost come to a halt with very few birds passing through, although these beautiful sunny days you could be forgiven for thinking lots of birds should be passing through Burton. So any day now I would expect things to change if the forecasters have got it right. The last week of March can be very interesting having in the past had early Swallows on Hutton Roof Common, and arrivals of the Chiffchaffs in Thornleigh and every chance of a Wheatears sat on the walls of Dalton Crags (deforested).

On 15 March over Dalton Crags I was treated to a very rare sighting of the spirit of the "Green Woodpecker" (see photo below). Seriously the sky was filled with "Lenticular Clouds" which eventually became lots of various shaped flying saucers. On my way back and reaching the Plain Quarry Car Park I was treated to a very early Small Tortoiseshell Butterfly hawking the area.



On St. Patrick's Day (17 March) I went over to the Park Side of Hutton Roof to check out our treasured Daphne Mezereone, that sweet smelling flower. Sure enough some of the flowers were open but the majority of the plant were still in bud and needed another week at least before you saw their full beauty. Other early flora included the Celandines and quite a few primroses coming through.

I was told, and shown recent photos, of the Glow Worm larvae being found on Farleton Fell (early March). It also later transpired that a sighting of the actual Glow Worm beetle was seen on Dalton Crags (upper) back in 2011. Far too early yet, but must try and locate around the June time. Will I be able to stay up long enough to allow this is another matter!

By the time you read this I would expect the Swifts to be leaving their wintering quarters to make the long perilous journey back to us, what could be nicer than hearing those little black beauties making their presence known with their "screaming" as they fly above Main Street in little squadrons. We are so privileged to have these magnificent birds on our very own doorstep.

condition I needed help from someone who went out and about and would be passing chemists, so I phoned my "busiest friend" idly noticing it was noon and wondering if she would be in. My friend answered and listened to my story and then told me - she had a box of Animal Wool which I could have as she no longer needed it. She then went on to say that after a bite to eat she was going to the Memorial Hall, firstly to get fish from Ian Donahue (every Tuesday 12.30 to 1.00) and then into the Hall for Badminton. However, I had not anticipated a grey car, male driver, two children, obviously late, who had not seen the struggle to get me in the car

Having lived in Burton for 42 years and hoping to die here I am aware that things have changed, but living in a village does mean accepting life here has differences from living in a town or city. Living in a village means we are dependent on one other far more than we ever thought. Look at the history of our village, how the Memorial Hall came about etc. In the end ANIMAL WOOL beats RANTING any day.

Historical Footnote...

... by Roger Bingham

Sixties Springtime in Burton 50 Years Ago

As it was 1966 - it really was 'The Sixties' but they weren't really the 'Swinging Sixties' in Burton. The village's 'Over Sixties' were called Old Age Pensioners in a report of their 'trip' (not on drugs but on a coach) to Blackpool to see 'The Sound of Music'. Clearly not yet women's libbers, the WI pronounced that the 'Chief value of women is in the home' and 32 Institute members 'were captivated by Mrs Bouch's talk on how to make soft toys.'

Up in Kendal a report of a 'facelift' to the Market Place stuck to an older usage when it said that the improvements made the town look 'Debonair and Gay'. Though life might seem old-fashioned there were plans to modernise death as the first proposal was made to build, at a cost of £12,000, a local Crematorium.

Unfortunately, bright days were rare as throughout the year the weather was lousy. Sheep were marooned on the mosses at the New Year, though, on the fell, 'seven foxes were caught despite the weather' while nine inches of snow shrouded the Lakeland heights at

Easter. Then came 'the wettest May since records began' in time to douse the Prime Minister, Harold Wilson, when he toured South Westmorland.

Whitsuntide was marred with deaths on the Kent Estuary Sands, up in the mountains and two fatal road accidents. Also, during the Bank Holiday 'Burton was choked by traffic' which was trying to avoid a new one-way system at Skew Bridge on the A6. Relief was on the way as it was announced that the northwards extension of the M6 would be started in 1968. 'Sensationally' it would go between Burton and Holme.

Meanwhile, a resident of Morewood Drive was fined £5 for having 'defective tyres.' Home life was changing and 19 inch television sets (which were only black and white until 1968) could be rented at 7/11 per week and, for cash, a 'Hoover de Luxe Cleaner' cost 32 guineas. 'Reasonably priced homes' available in Burton included 'modern semi-detached bungalows on the edge of the village (St James' Drive?) with no road charges and good sized gardens from £2,675.'

Old and new themes were voiced at the annual Parish Meeting which was attended by 33 residents. The Chairman Mr T.J. Dobson reported the sad death of the previous Chairman,

Mrs Marion Crayston, who had been a stalwart of the Amateur Dramatics and of the WI. 'To the satisfaction of the residents' a new bus stop had been erected at Clawthorpe but another one was requested for near Green Dragon. 'Sites for public conveniences and a road crossing for The Square were matters of urgency.' New street lights wanted at Church were Thornleigh Drive and by the Vicarage. Regrettably it was noted that, although 'the council had provided land for a children's playground, as it was little used the matter might have to be reviewed as it was costing £5 a year.'

But at least one young family was happy, for a daughter, Anna Victoria, had been born to Pamela, nee Bingham, and Andrew Thurnhill of Woodlands, Clawthorpe. This event, incidentally, made Roger Bingham an uncle!

Roger Reports... from the District & County Councils

For the last month my Council business has been more of the same with a heavy focus on the post-flooding situation, the budgets - and dustbins!

Counting the cost of the floods is not yet completed, although removing flood waste has cost SLDC £600,000, which has contributed to a reduction in the Council's surpluses. My latest figure for Government grants for infra-structure repairs is £40m but the sum will probably be much higher. So far most residents have accepted that priority repairs must be on major A and B roads - even so I am pressing for interim pothole and also for repairs white resumption in lining work including on Main Street at the entrance to Boon Town.

Refuse collection problems are still persisting and, since the 'new rounds' were introduced last October, I have received complaints weekly. So called 'fringe communities' like Clawthorpe where the new lorries are too 'fat' for Piper's Lane, and Hutton Roof - where half the village was ignored because the collectors were told (by whom - I don't know) that the area was in Lancashire - have suffered most. But

failure to collect on stated days and confusion between green boxes / grey bins days still occur in other areas. Meanwhile, workers who stayed on from our old much-appreciated gangs are having to work the Windermere round.

Promises that recycling collections of cardboard and plastic - being 'trialled' in Kendal will be soon be extended to Ulverston is little consolation for us who would rather, I think, do without the extended service if we could just get the new arrangements to work and our old 'lads on the lorries' back.

As predicted both SLDC and Cumbria put up the Council Tax respectively by 2% and 4% - but half the County's increase is 'ring-fenced' for Adult Social Services. The Council Tax for bands for Burton are A £1,102, B 1,285, C £1,469 D £1,653 E £2,020 F £2,388 G £2,755, H £3,306.

In the County Budget discussions the most controversial topic concerned increases in bus fares for post-16 school and college students. Now that all 16+ people have to be in education, if they are not employed, paying fares which can amount to over £1,000 pa seems unfair. In the 'fair fares' debate I argued that school bus fares discriminated against rural people.


