It's that time of year again...

A Note from the Post Office about Christmas Posting 2016

Unless you are a Newsagent or card stockist, Christmas seems a long way into the future, you've only just got the kids back at school and are settling into a nice familiar routine... but... planning you should know that, ahead. as posting dates the last always, for sending Mail (now Surface called International Economy) are unseasonably early; in fact for the furthest destinations they were at the end of September!

For parcels sent by Airmail there is no rush, you have until the beginning of December furthest for even the destinations. However. if vou are planning on sending parcels via the slower, cheaper option of International Economy the recommended last posting dates are:

- Wednesday 28 September– All non-European destinations except those mentioned below
- Thursday 29 September Middle East and Far East (except Hong Kong & Singapore)
- Thursday 13 October South Africa, Hong Kong, Singapore, the USA & Canada
- Thursday 3 November Eastern Europe, Greece, Cyprus, Turkey, Malta & Iceland
- Thursday 17 November Western Europe

Remember that parcels sent outside the EU need to have a customs form attached, these are available at the Post Office Counter. Also remember to put your name and address on the top left hand corner of the front of your package; this will enable Royal Mail to return your item should overseas customs authorities refuse it entry into their country.

The usual reminder about size and weight for parcels sent abroad using Royal Mail: The maximum total of (length + width + height) is 90 cm (approx 3ft) with the maximum single dimension of 60cm (approx 2 ft). Also, the maximum weight is 2 kg.

It is really easy to exceed these and then the parcel would cost a great deal more to send via Parcel Force.

It is sometimes cheaper to split a heavy parcel and send two packets.



Dangerous Goods

To comply with national and international regulations governing the carriage of mail, and ensure that mail in transport does not present a danger to the general public, Royal Mail must restrict or prohibit certain items from their network.

So this year we will once again have to ask you what are the contents of your parcels; not just because we are being nosy or looking for gift ideas ourselves, but because there are restrictions on items containing, for example, batteries, nail varnish, perfume, aerosols etc.

Lithium batteries (the type commonly found in mobile phones and laptops), sent alone. and for cannot be international mail they must be packaged equipment. Beware, some in the countries do not permit the import of lithium batteries at all.

As always, come & ask us at the Post Office Counter for further advice.

The Cottage, Burton

An application submitted to SLDC Planning Dept on the 6 September (planning ref. SL/2016/0866) is causing great consternation within the village. It is for the property known as The Cottage, on Main Street, and stands immediately to the north of Ryecroft and the Memorial Hall, and almost opposite Morewood School and which do not currently own but. thev according to the application are in the process of purchasing. The application is described as a "Certificate of Lawful Development for Proposed Use of property as a dwelling for 4 young persons in receipt of care as required with no more than 2 carers resident overnight". The applicant is the Witherslack Group which is based at Lupton Tower and which, according to its website, "is a Special Education provider offering high quality special schools and care programmes for children and young people aged from 4 to 19."

The Cottage, which is listed for sale at £575,000, is a four bedroom detached house standing in extensive grounds, which are described by the agent as "This is the icing on the cake. Superb, imposina arounds surround this property, good size gardens, feature archway between lawns, orchard and land. Extensive further drivewav. double width in some areas, detached garage."

The application is described as a "Certificate of Lawful Development for Proposed Use of property as a dwelling for 4 young persons in receipt of care as required with no more than 2 carers resident overnight". The applicant is the Witherslack Group which is based at Lupton Tower and which, according to its website, "is a Special Education

provider offering high guality special schools and care programmes for children and young people aged from 4 to 19." At the September parish council meeting in the Public Forum residents raised concerns about the conversion of a private dwelling in the centre of the village into what appears to be a small children's home, but as the plans had not been received by the parish council the matter could not be discussed by councillors. One member of the public attending on another matter indicated that as the application was for a Certificate of Lawful Development then it could not realistically be challenged, and the impression given was that, despite it being listed as a planning application, there would be no consultation with neighbours or the parish council as happens with standard planning applications. The September draft minutes of the parish council meeting state, "Clerk to request further information from SLDC - The Witherslack Group have applied for a Lawful Development Certificate which cannot be objected." The parish clerk has also indicated that the matter will be included on the agenda for the next parish council meeting on Thursday 20 October.

As a followup to the meeting a resident visited the SLDC planning dept in Kendal and spoke with Belinda Fettis, the planning officer dealing with the case, her notes from that meeting are as follows:

I have spoken to Belinda Fettis today she has been on holiday. She tells me that she has not had time to look into this yet.

The date showing against letters sent out relates not to that happening but to someone registering something against that ref no. on that date. She confirmed that this was separate from a planning application and was a way of finding out whether a planning application is required.

She says that the application needs a response before Nov 11th and that when a letter goes out that will be shown on the planning number above.

She says that the certificate would relate specifically to this request and, even if granted, would not cover any future changes either in numbers or in use.

Any future changes in number or use would be subject to the usual planning rules.

If they wished to extend or build then this would require the usual planning permission.

Neighbours have expressed several concerns re this application:

1. That there seems to be no normal consultative procedure for such certificates - none of the neighbours (despite what it have been notified says on the SLDC website about notifications being sent out on 16 Sept) of what is clearly a change of use from a private dwelling (planning category C3(a) use by a single person or a family) to a shared household with carers (class C3(b) up to six people living together as a single household (who do not need to be related to each other) and receiving care e.q. supported housing schemes such as people with those for learning disabilities or mental health problems.) In this application there would be four permanently resident children and two carers present on a 12 hour shift system drawn from a pool of nine care staff. The Town and Country Planning

(Use Classes) Order 1987 apparently allows for the change of use from class C3(a) to C3(b) without the need for normal consultative planning consent being required, even though there is a change from private dwelling to business use!

2. That the land surrounding the present house is capable of accommodating larger buildings for an increased number of children, so they view this as being a toe in the door method of gaining change of use at a later date.

3. That there could be an increase in anti-social behaviour by children.

4. That the value of their own properties adjacent to, or nearby, The Cottage would be adversely affected.

5. That Witherslack Group have already advertised in the *Westmorland Gazette* for care staff for a facility at Burton in Kendal.

Clearly there are lots of questions to be answered, and it might be sensible for the village or the parish council to call a public meeting to discuss the matter, especially if, as is feared, the parish council is not to be formally consulted about the application.

PC Observations...

Reporting from the Parish Council meeting

Public Forum

Members of the public outnumbered councillors two to one at the PC meeting on 15 September. They were very concerned about two issues:

1. The application for a change of use at The Cottage, a four bedroomed house opposite the school, which has been for sale for over a year. The end use of the house is to be a children's home, which residents protested was very unsuitable in terms of type of use and its location. Feelings were running high but councillors had not formally received any plans so this was put on the Agenda for the October meeting.

2. All-day parking up and down Morewood Drive, on the Memorial Hall Car Park and on the A6070 because of the growth of the school. Although the expansion two-storey next (a extension) has included room for 5 more car spaces within the school parishioners called boundary, this wholly unsatisfactory and called on the PC to press South Lakeland District Council Planning to make planning approval conditional on realistic extra provision (several times 5) even if it

means taking up planted areas within the school grounds. Councillors were very sympathetic but it has to be recognised that this issue has been going on for years now so although the PC might write to SLDC, there was no guarantee that this condition would be Mike Taylor reiterated his approved. view that the school should act itself as a responsible body within the village to make more car parking spaces available whatever it took. Parishioners also called for better communication from the school about what they intended to do to alleviate the parking pressure.

There is no doubt that Burton is going to see major changes in the coming years. Plans to increase housing at both ends of the village and at the Roval Hotel site will increase the population by a third. Incorporation of mixed use (housing and industry) within the Green Dragon plans; expansion of the quarry without any legal agreement to restrict heavy goods vehicles through the village, the increasing pressure on parking, road safety and village services, a children's home in the centre of the village – all these developments are imminent and will change Burton's character and personality. If you feel concerned about your village, come to the next PC meeting on Thursday 20 October at

Anti-social behaviour

After resident concern about anti-social behaviour by known teenage boys, PC Mandy Coleman brought one of them to the PC meeting and he made a verbal apology for his behaviour. Councillors accepted the apology and let's hope he never does anything like this again. Another boy sent in a letter which Councillor Wren read out to the meeting. Again the hope is that this means a change of behaviour.

SID is coming

Councillors agreed to spend £3,560 on a speed indication device in an attempt to lower speeding vehicles approaching the village to the north and south. The device is similar to the one already in use at Endmoor.

Other discussions / actions or inactions 1. A new aluminium framed Notice Board was agreed for the Memorial Hall, cost £512

2. Protection of the Church Bank pedestrian access within the planned housing development seems to 'have been forgotten' and with the planning application coming before SLDC Planning at the end of September, planners need to be reminded.



3. The feasibility study for a path between Clawthorpe and Burton continues to be ignored by district and county councillors. The study cost £7,000 (not PC money) and seems a huge waste of money.

4. Cllrs reported no communication from Highways at county council about the need for urgent action to protect vulnerable houses from flooding this winter. Drains remain blocked and no action is forthcomina!

5. Fire hydrants are unusable around the village. United Utilities have been informed by Parish Clerk Christine Davidson but so far there is no action.

6. Councillor Isherwood asked for a Facebook page to be opened to go alongside notice boards, the web site and the email access afforded to residents communicate village to matters. Christine Davidson will investigate, especially the need to moderate content to avoid any legal implications.

7. Next meeting Thursday 20 October, Memorial Hall, 7.30pm.



Vícar's Letter...

Going round in circles?

Because most of us have cupboards full of food and easy all-year-round access to shops, we don't have the same sense of relief and gratitude to God that our forefathers felt when the harvest was safely gathered in with enough to last until next year.

Our annual harvest thanksgiving services teach us not to take daily bread for granted; we are to keep thanking God for all that he generously aives us. Produce is brought to decorate the church (as a visual reminder of God's good provision) and to be given away afterwards so that we share with others from can the abundance that God has given us.

But as well as reminding us to be thankful, harvest also asks "what's the point of it all?"

One ancient book* traditionally read by the Jews at harvest time raises this question:

"What does man gain from all his labour at which he toils under the sun? Generations come and generations go, but the earth remains for ever. You assume your life has meaning and that your work is important. But when you look at cupboards full of food, savings accounts full of money, the mown lawn and the clean car, the children growing up to step into your shoes, what is it all for?

It's now that time of year for me to be on sentry duty just on the high ground of Vicarage Lane, getting up early (Oh 'eck!!) and doing my daily counts of birds passing through our village whilst on visible migration to their destinations further south.

This morning (21 Sept) in just three hours I had over 300 Chaffinch passing over our village heading south east, presuming they probably travel over to next stop Capernwray and then maybe onward to Arkholme and on and on and on. This will have only been a token of what really goes through at this time of year, because they come through on a very broad front and besides the corridor I watch there is also another corridor down near St James Close where birds can be seen actually going in a line south almost following the motorway on their journey south. In fact I have tried to summarize this time of year from many hours counting over several years and I would estimate it possible that we actually get as many as up to 2,000 Chaffinch a day which would mean up to 100,000 during the time of Autumn migration would have passed over our village, and that's only Chaffinch. We also have large numbers of other regular species like Meadow Pipits, Linnets, Goldfinches, and Swallows Martins and Pied Wagtails and Reed Buntings. Just at the present it is very likely that most of the birds coming our way could well have come from over the Whitbarrow or Lyth Valley areas and areas further north, but before long you also get continental birds as well which will before reaching us have travelled from far as maybe the Baltics or as European areas to be with us and these too will travel the skies of Burton whilst making their onward journey south.

So far I have had my worst year yet for migrating Swallows with far less numbers being seen than in previous years. I would in most years get large bands going through taking a corridor along the line of the trees above Lancelot and above Russell Farm in Dalton hamlet, but very few have gone through this way this year.

Quite a few skeins of Pink Footed Geese have been recorded coming through our skies. I had my first skein of 21 birds on 10 September which is very early, usually I have my first from around the 16 September. It will not be





long now before we are getting our winter thrushes Fieldfare, Redwing, additional continental Song Thrushes and Blackbirds expect them from early to mid October and usually peaking around the third week of October. We will also soon get additional continental Starlings (usually peaking October 25). Many of the Starlings have travelled from the Baltics or Northern Europe and make their winter home with us and roosting each night at our local RSPB reserve at Leighton Moss.

Did you know that lots and lots of Red Admiral Butterflies will have flown over the village on recent sunny days, In fact I had ten coming through above the maize during one of my bird counting spells on 13 September all going through in a direct line to the south. I have had this going on quite late in the year, in fact during the 1980s on one sunny morning on the 2 November I had several coming through whilst Fieldfare watching passing and Redwing. I never at that time realised they were also making a long migration back into Central Europe. I know migration is difficult for small birds, but never realised that such a fragile little butterflies also migrated.

Most of the flora has finished and I guess I might just get some time searching out the rare ferns on Hutton Roof but this will have to wait until the





bird migrations have almost finished.

I have now completed the full summary of the 2016 Swift watches and details and photos can be seen on the following link:

Its been another great year for our Burton in Kendal Swifts and I hope you have enjoyed it as much as I.

Hope to see you again next year when the Swifts should again be flying the skies from around the 4 May 2017.

Historical Footnote...

... by Roger Bingham

Burton around '1066 - and All That'

14 When, 950 years ago, on the October 1066, William of Duke Normandy became William the Conqueror by beating the English at the Battle of Hastings he didn't conquer Cumbria because most of our county was in Scotland. Burton was on the edge of things being dangerously wedged between the two kingdoms as a sort of 'no man's land'. Moreover, the area was continually being squabbled over by the native Cwmry and Anglo-Saxon people and the descendants of Norsemen who had settled here only a century earlier.

Thus, the place names of Clawthorpe and Holme are of Scandinavian origin while Burton and Dalton stem from Anglo-Saxon words. From the 'ton' part of Burton (spelt in 1066 as 'Burtun') we get the name town while the 'bur' might refer to a fortification necessary in a frontier area. According the to Conqueror's Domesday Book of 1085 Burton's neighbouring areas were still in the hands of Scandinavians as Kirkby Lonsdale -'Kirkecabi Lauenesdale'- was ruled by a Viking Torfin while Kendal -'Kirkecabi in Kentdale' - had a Celtic chief called Gilmichel.

Burton's overlord in 1066 was Tostig Godwinson. He was the brother of King Harold (who got it in the eye at Hastings) who himself was killed by Harold's forces when he and his Viking allies were slaughtered at the Battle of Stamford Bridge a fortnight before the Battle of Hastings.

Domesday Book listed Burton under Yorkshire but the parish was not assessed for taxation. It was only in 1092 when the Conqueror's son William Rufus incorporated Lakeland into his domain that Cumbria became part of England. It was as a reward, for the campaign's obligatory rapine and slaughter, that Rufus granted to his henchman, Ivo de Taillebois, all of Kentdale which is why, 900 years later, the parish - though ten miles from Kendal is officially Burton in Kendal.

Mike Halhead 1942-2016

A former teacher at Burton Morewood School, Mike Halhead, has passed away after a long illness.

A Kendal Grammar School student, Mr Halhead left the school at the age of 14 to support his family as a joiner at W H Ainsworth, Kendal, but an injury stopped him from practising the profession, leading to a career in teaching.

Gaining his teaching certificate as a mature student at Charlotte Mason College in Ambleside, Mr Halhead taught at Burton Morewood School and later at Heron Hill Primary School in Kendal. He will be remembered by older residents of the village, who will no doubt recall his enthusiasm for both teaching and football.

Mr Halhead was a qualified FA Coach who received his FA Preliminary Badge, one of the very first FA coaching qualifications, when such qualifications were not common.

During a career across four decades Mr Halhead coached at several teams including Arnside, Burton Thistle FC, Netherfield AFC and Westmorland youth teams.

Mr Hoare said: "What I learnt from Mike was that if you put the effort in and believe in yourself, you can achieve anything."

Mr Halhead had two sons, Paul and Richard, and four grandchildren, Matthew, Nathan, Olivia and Sophia.

Roger Reports... from the District & County Councils

Despite the August break council matters were busy enough especially in our immediate locality where, at long last a few of the long impending highways repairs delayed by last winter's floods have been rectified. Unfortunately only days after anti-flood work had been completed at Dalton and on the A6070 we had two inundations on the 22 and 26 August. On both days the roads seemed to me to be flooded more quickly than in December though they went down generally within 24 hours. On both days I was out and about reporting the usual offending areas like the south end of Main Street, Tan Pits lane and the A6070 by the Quarry and at Clawthorpe, which prevented some vehicles getting through though successfully risked it. Yet again blocked gullies seemed to be the problem, although I was assured that they had recently been drained. Higher up Clawthorpe Lane, even several hours after the rain ceased, the force of water powerful enough to have seemed turned a turbine, and I have asked that engineers senior investigate the problem.

But I have a big grouse which I raised at full council, that on the flood days I



could not get through to the Highways department either in Kendal or the main HQ in Carlisle. Worst of all the e-mail reply from a senior officer said that he would be away until the 30 August and in the meantime messages to him would not be monitored! So I had to report problems to Highways hot line -(0300 303 2992) and to the police. This is not good enough I'm afraid.

I have also been involved in some contentious planning matters, including a site on Vicarage Lane - where I had to wait for a reply until all three (!) planning officials had come back from holiday. Although the application has been passed, concerns about the Church Bank Gardens development continue, although I contend that work cannot start until the approach from the A6070 has been widened, more speed warnings are installed and the issue of the path alongside the former National School has been resolved.

At the September county council the always awkward issue of councillors allowances came up again. My political group abstained though a 1% increase in line with a rise for staff went through. Currently Cumbria councillors have the second lowest pay scale in the country, although as the most rural and sparse county we have the longest journeys compared to a city authority, where it might only take minutes to go to



meeting or to see an officer. Here a round trip to Carlisle for an average two-three hour meeting takes six hours and for colleagues from further away even longer.

I have had no feed back yet about renewed Whitehall suggestions to amalgamate district and county councils as unitary authorities, with all councillors getting a basic £37,000 pa -(£29,000 pounds more than now!) irrespective of what positions they hold. But then pigs might fly.

All the best and please keep me informed so that I can continue my pestering!


