This was the first Poppy Appeal since the sad death of Tom Kilbane who organised the appeal, including a doorto-door collection, in both Burton and Holme for many years. In common with most villages it was decided for a number of reasons not to carry out a door-to-door collection this year. PC Observations...

Reporting from the Parish Council meeting

There was a full house of Councillors for the 17 November meeting, and number nearly the same of parishioners, hear to what the Witherslack Group had to say about their intention to run a Children's Home at The Cottage, which they have recently purchased. Two directors of the group spoke about the steady growth of the group which now has 15 homes and 15 schools across the North of England. The modus operandi is to go where the demand is and set up 'family homes' for children who for various reasons have not been able to live in a normal household. They were at pains to say that the homes were not secure units. They have no plans to expand but could not give a guarantee that The Cottage site would be limited to the four-child facility for which they have a Certificate of Lawful Proposed Use from SLDC. They were willing to discuss fencing arrangements houses bordering The Cottage and would 'knock on doors' to discuss this. which sounded like a very arbitrary Clearly approach. there opportunities to learn lessons from this Witherslack's sorry business. consultation process was at best

inadequate. Their Director claimed he had knocked on a few doors, but clearly not on the doors of houses which border The Cottage. The Parish Council distanced itself from robustly representing parishioners' views in a coherent way to The Witherslack Group and SLDC. And SLDC have admitted that, although there might not be a legal requirement to consult third parties, it might be reasonable to seek evidence from these sources (which they did not do). However it is going ahead so it is fingers crossed that it will turn out well.

Moving on, a resident said that whilst welcoming the Speed Indication Device at Clawthorpe, it was positioned on a corner where traffic is already slowing down and does not light up until the vehicle is 10 yards away. The intention is to have two or three sites for the SID and to give more warning to motorists.

Do you fancy becoming a sleuth to help Kendal police? They are looking for local volunteers to work in twos to look out for suspicious people and vehicles between the hours of 9pm and 1am. The volunteers will be equipped with radios to contact the police and be positioned at agreed observation points around Burton. Expenses will be paid.





Vícar's Letter...

AWOL

Some people are missing. The shepherds are all in place with their teatowel head-dresses and their soft-toy sheep, three kings with gold card crowns are waiting off-stage for their cue, the innkeepers are ready with their unwelcoming replies, and Joseph and Mary and the pantomime donkey are approaching. But shouldn't Herod's soldiers be here somewhere. brandishing swords with which to carry out the terrible massacre of the young boys in Bethlehem?

We understand why they are usually left out of the story in children's nativity plays. (Perhaps we need some adult versions too!) But there are good reasons not to forget that the soldiers are very definitely part of the story in Matthew's Gospel.

Firstly, they reconnect the sugary child's version with the world that we really live in and that Jesus was really born into. Tragically, children are all too often the victims of the self-centred actions of adults – whether caught in the crossfire of warring militias, caught in the crossfire of warring parents, or discarded before they are even born.

Secondly, the soldiers remind us that the violence of our world was directed against Jesus Christ himself. From Herod's attempt to kill him at birth, to the Jewish leaders' later death plots and the Roman authorities' collusion with their wishes, Jesus Christ was in the firing line.

In fact, Jesus came into our world knowing full well that this would happen, that the whole world would oppose him and crush him and that he would absorb in his own body all the guilt and the horrifying consequences of our hostility towards him and his Father.

Amazingly, Jesus, knowing how we would treat him, still came.

Wonderfully, the Father did not consult us (there was no referendum or presidential election) when he decided that Jesus should then prevail over his opponents and be installed as the permanent ruler of the whole world:

"Unto us a boy is born! King of all creation, came he to a world forlorn, the Lord of every nation, the Lord of every nation."

You will be warmly welcome at any of our services, at Christmas or at any other time.

Historical Footnote...

... by Roger Bingham

A VICIOUS WINTER - 70 YEARS AGO

winter of 1946-47 was long remembered as the most vicious ever. Officially, it was the coldest winter since Windermere had frozen over in the 1890s. Even so, lower temperatures were recorded locally in 1981, 2009 and 2011, while the 1963 freeze-up lasted longer than that of 1947. In 1946 Burton just missed out on a white Christmas as the first snow only flurried in on Boxing Day evening. But in the next week an onslaught of blizzards soon obliterated any notions of enjoying a winter wonderland. Earlier installed garden snowmen were engulfed waist deep and skating had to be abandoned on the canal because a foot of snow smothered the ice. Yet, up in Lakeland skaters were better organised and, in the absence of health and safety regulations, ad hoc ice hockey teams cleared their own rinks on the lakes.

Around Burton a lasting thaw did not set in until the end of March, while up on the fells thousands of lambs and sheep froze to death. Even so, in a brief break, the Farleton (mainly horse) ploughing contest, which was won by

Mr J Parsons of Brackenthwaite Farm, went ahead in February. Generally, however, society - like household plumbing - seized up. On several days only two or three buses got through the blizzards to Burton; Kirkby Lonsdale was cut off and a 'bus was lost at Sedbergh'. Nearer Burton, the main railway line was blocked for days on end.

Equally seriously, traffic ground to a halt after snow drifts blocked the A6 on Shap Fell, despite the enforced digging out efforts of German Prisoners of War from Bela River Camp at Whassett. As a result, lorries jettisoned by drivers unable to 'get over Shap' jammed all roads around Kendal as far as Crooklands and Milnthorpe.

Because of petrol rationing there were almost no private cars on the road. Consequently, disrupted public transport combined with fuel and materials shortages closed industry down. 69 men (sic) were out of work at Holme Mills, 1,000 K Shoe workers, who included many Burton folk, were Kendal and 50 extra laid off in unemployed people were registered in week at the area's Labour one Exchange at Milnthorpe. Most local schools were closed for three weeks, though the newly introduced 11+ 'Scholarship' examination continued.

Somehow 'a representative gathering of former pupils and residents' managed to attend the funeral in Morecambe of Mr W Smart a former Headmaster, from 1922-40, of Morewood School. His wife had predeceased him in 1937 and, tragically, his only son had been killed on active service in 1942.

On a lighter note Burton Drama Group staged, in the National School, three one act plays "Our Family", "Anteclockwise" and "Elizabeth Refuses." Possibly, less light-hearted was a talk given to Burton Women's Institute, by Mr Somervell of Haverbrack, entitled, "Some aspects of Recent Legislation." Over at Levens the first prize in a Wl Competition was a load of firewood.

Inevitably, the cold was the most acutely remembered aspect of the 'vicious winter.' Every household was dependant on strictly rationed coal, but with mines and transport snowed up fuel supplies broke down. Electricity was cut off between 9am and 11.30am and from 2pm to 4pm. Peat digging was resumed on the mosses with '1,000 blocks of peat being on sale for £8 cash.'

Typically, the WI offered a crumb of comfort by suggesting a winter warmer

Following on from last month I now have the outcome of the 2016 Autumn visible bird migration figures of birds recorded flying over Vicarage Lane from regular daily samples from October 1st to 31st and the numbers totalled as follows: 12,493 Fieldfare, 13,104 Redwing and 12,577 Chaffinches. 138 hours were put in to the counting which generally was

between first light and 2 to 4 hours after. In the majority of cases all birds were seen to head off in a south to south east direction as though heading to Capernwray Arkholme and onward. This being only a sample count, with many more birds actually going over during the full day, makes you wonder just how many would be involved!

It's been nice to record a couple of parties of Whooper Swans going over Burton whilst calling. I have got used to calling them "A Herd of Whiteness" which is I believe what you call a group of them. Also this Autumn we have been fortunate to record Pintail and Wigeon, along with lots of the more common Mallard.

It's that time of year again when, if we are lucky, we may see Thrushes congregating and feasting on the mass of berries which, this year, seem abundant, especially with the Rowans and Hawthorns.

If we are lucky we might just see Waxwings, which this year are already

Roger Reports...

from the District & County Councils

Firstly an apology to the residents of Church Stile who were confused by my November report that I had not had a response to requests for a speed limit sign near their houses. By this I meant the requests that I'd made on their behalf to the county Highways. The county and, also, some members of the parish council believed that there were already an above average number of speed reminders on that stretch of the A6070. These have been subsequently boosted by the speed warning smiley and gloomy sign along the road at Clawthorpe. Happily I have persuaded Highways to put a 'Slow' marking on the road near Church Stile which I will pay for out my member's allowance. The work will be done when the Priority Give Way white lines near The King's Arms and Boon Town are painted.

Other recent grants from my special fund have included £500 towards a library book trolley and £1,000 towards our lengthsman's wages. Also on roads I am happy to report that the weed infested gullies near the church have been cleared and I'm chasing up further work on drainage in Post Office Lane. Gulley cleansing has now been taken back 'in-house' by the county.

bins and have been told that the 24,000 tons of grit/salt ordered for this winter will be sufficient. We'll see! I was also assured that, having made 'reasonable provision', Cumbria can top-up supplies if necessary. On roads: I have had several complaints about darkness resulting from the installation of less-glaring LED street lights. I have asked for the cost of the new 19,500 lamps to set against the envisaged power saving of £175,000 pa.

The county has now received a final government flood damage payment of £500,000 which was for repairing footpaths. Altogether Cumbria allocated £120m out of central government's total of £180m spent nationally on the 2015 floods. An additional £3.5m was granted in 645 payments for post-flood business-rate rebates. As an aid to forecasting severe weather, Cumbria now has its own radar warning system based in Ireland,

which it is hoped will provide earlier warnings than we received last year. During the county's preliminary budget planning debate I queried whether the contingency funds will be sufficient to cope with cost levels - if we have repeats - of the 2005, 2009 and 2015 'once in thousand year' floods. Time will tell!

Inevitably - I'm afraid - further council savings will be required of £16m for 2017-18 compared with £45m in 2016-17, and projected cuts of £32m in 2019-20. There will also be a 1.99% increase in the county's share of the Council Tax plus a permitted possible extra 2% for increased adult services. Hopefully adult care will be enhanced by the recent appointment of 21 more social workers. They will receive graduate training in Barrow where, also, a new 'state of the art' care home has just been opened. Even so I am concerned about stories of older people requiring residential care being 'sent' to distant parts of Cumbria when nearer facilities for our area might be available just over the border in Lancashire.

There is also some better news on Children's Services as there has been an increase in nursery places for two year olds, while OFSTED has judged 80% of our secondary schools to be good or outstanding.

Another crumb of comfort is that I still have about £1,000 left out of my Councillor's grant allowance - so I'll be happy to receive applications for spending some more of YOUR money for our community.


