Children's Home in Burton

The imminent arrival of a Children's Home in Burton at The Cottage opposite the School caused a furore at recent Parish Council meetings. This was because residents neighbouring The Cottage were not consulted and felt that they had no say in whether or not this was a suitable development in the middle of the village.

The reason why this is the case is that a local authority – in this case the South Lakeland District Council – can allow a change of use without the need for planning permission. In other words, when an application for a 'Certificate of Lawful Proposed Use or Development' is used as in this case, the Council is not required to notify local residents.

Clearly a Children's Home is a change of use but according to SLDC, this does not constitute a material change of use 'in planning terms'. According to Building Regulations 2010, there is a material change of use when 'there is a change in the purposes for which ...the building is used'. Clearly a Children's Home is run for a different purpose than a normal household. The purpose is connected to financial gain for one thing.

So why are local councils like SLDC granting these applications without any regard to the impact on neighbours and without consultation? This is clearly a loophole which meets some political and financial agenda to which residents are excluded. Nor is there consistency across the country in the way in which

the loophole is exploited. A similar application by Witherslack to Daventry District Council was rejected whilst SLDC granted Witherslack's application in the face of strong local objection.

If you feel strongly that this is an abuse of the spirit of fairness and good neighbourly behaviour by SLDC and Witherslack, you might be interested to add your name to a petition to change the system. The petition calls for a tightening up of the wording about change of use applications like a Childreun's Home in a village. The petition can be found at https://petition.parliament.uk/petitions/1 82520.

Tim Farron has written to the Secretary of State about the loophuole. We wait and see if there is any action to tighten up the regulations.

Obituary

Esther Nodder 1933-2016

It was on an Easter weekend holiday at Capernwray Hall as a teenager that Mum, who had come to faith in Jesus as a child, accepted the challenge to give her life to serving a risen Saviour. Her dream was to do medical and mission work in South America, and so she started training for this, doing four years at Bolton Royal Infirmary, followed by a two year Bible diploma in Bristol.

But because of ill-health, she was told South America would have to wait. So she returned to her home town of Preston, started working as a midwife, and went back to her home church. One day the vicar asked her to help lead a youth group, and said jokingly, "Eh up, we've got good-looking lay reader called Jonathan. You'll be leading with 'im". She told the vicar straight out that "I'm not interested in any man, because in five years I'm off to South America". But the Lord had other plans!

When Jonathan proposed, she asked for a week to think about it. Poor guy - she was a pretty tough cookie! But in her Bible-reading that week the Lord gave her the verse in 2 Corinthians 6:1, "workers together with him", and that

became their motto and life, serving the Lord together for the next 37 years. For Mum that involved things like setting up and running Homemakers - a group to help young wives build their lives and homes on the Lord Jesus Christ. And being a homemaker herself — bringing up her three sons to know and love the Lord, as a vicar's wife having an open home, and praying for countless people whilst doing the ironing!

Dad's sudden death in 2000 at the age of just 62 was a massive blow to Mum, and one from which at one level she never really recovered. But in her loss she kept on serving the Lord. Over the next 16 years many people came to experience restoration and refreshment at her "Green Pastures" home, enjoying what someone called "her warm hospitality and loving spirit".

Many of them were Bible students from Capernwray Hall who came there for student family group, or to make chocolate chip cookies, and to thrashed at the card-game "Uno"! Reading letters and cards she'd kept from students all over the world, she clearly had a big impact on these young lives. In spite of prolonged ill-health, in addition she served the volunteering the bookshop in at Capernwray and at Radio Bible Class, knitting teddies for needy children overseas through Teddies for Tragedy,





sharing her faith with strangers on planes and trains, and trying to help others in their loss.

But Mum was not just a faithful servant – she was also a forgiven sinner, like every true Christian. She battled with the old sinful nature, as we all do. And that will have come out in all sorts of ways, in things she said and did. But she trusted in Christ, had a living faith that did bear much fruit, and is with the Lord now because of Christ.

We look back on the 83 years of Mum's life with thanks, and we look forward with hope. At the end of something she wrote about her experiences she said, "This is my story through an ordinary life, proving God's mercies are new every morning, and his faithfulness too". An ordinary life; a faithful God; a special person; a wonderful Mum – and we give thanks to God for her.

Reporting from the Parish Council meeting

A short parish council meeting, from which one or two issues did come up which the council would like to bring to your attention. No planning issues to discuss and a reminder to keep dogs on leads anywhere in the vicinity of livestock.

the Taking most frustrating and continuing problem first. Despite diligent patrolling and action by cllrs a few dog walkers are still not clearing up the mess after their dogs, mainly on Post Office Lane (and mainly by large The council takes this antidoas). social, and potentially health harming behaviour, very seriously and continue to address the problem including informing the Dog Warden. Repeated offences of allowing your dog to foul and not clearing up can result in a fine of up to £1,000.

Burton is in a Protected Area for Bird Flu and legal action can also be taken against owners of poultry who do not keep their birds inside or under netting.

At last, something positive and good news. The council agreed to continue to subsidise the weekly Library Room by £100 and were pleased to help this group of residents.

Cllr Bingham is still chasing up clearance of the drains on Main St and replacement of the 30mph sign to the north of the village. He was also asked to arrange for signs at the appropriate places to stop HGV drivers attempting to go down Station Lane to the canal tunnel. Can I confidently report that these jobs will have been completed by the next meeting?

Other bits and pieces got mulled over, but nothing that was easy to resolve. One cllr wants to make sure that having had a feasibility study completed into the possibility of a footpath by the A6070 to Clawthorpe it didn't get binned in the 'too difficult' box. without significant funding and the permission of land owners this project is going nowhere at the moment - a bit like the flood water down the drains on Main St really. The other pedestrian access issue of a footpath to Church Bank Gardens is still on going, as is a replacement bench on the canal bank and repositioning of the Speed Indicator Device.

Well I was only going to make this report a short couple of paragraphs, and when I look at it nothing much is new.





Next month's meeting on Thursday 16 March is the Annual Parish Meeting meeting and starts at 7.00pm. So do come along and see if you can spot any changes in the chairman's report from the last annual parish council meeting, or even last year's meeting.



Vícar's Letter...

The wrong side of history

On 15 February the General Synod of the Church of England voted not to 'take note' of the Bishop's report on 'Marriage and Same-Sex Relationships'. Some opposed it because the report re-affirmed that marriage can only be between a man and a woman, others wanted it thrown out because it gave room for ministers to flout the church's teaching.

And some people, I am sure, on hearing the news, shook their heads and wondered why the church was even discussing this. In 2017, who still cares if a man wants to act like a woman or a woman like a man? Can't they be what they want to be? As David Cameron once said (on another issue) the church should "get with the programme".

Here are three reasons why Christians cannot fall into line with the direction our so-called liberal culture is travelling:

- 1. The commonly-accepted wisdom is that the Bible must be measured against today's standards. Christians cannot agree with this; the Bible had human authors but by God's design they wrote living words from God himself for all people in all ages. The Bible is not out of date; rather it is human ideas that come and go like driftwood while God's Word remains as unmoveable rock.
- 2. 'The programme' (as David Cameron put it) is by no means certain to continue. The political upsets in Britain and America in 2016, which may be repeated in other western countries,

remind us that what seems orthodoxy one day can be overturned the next. It is not 'the wrong side of history' to resist today's fleeting obsessions. Take the long view.

3. God speaks not to destroy our freedom but to keep us from miserable slavery to confusion. When we reject his words we suffer. Even worse, our children suffer. Jesus had stern words for those who cause 'little ones' to stumble. To take away from our children their certainty about being created by God as male or female is cruel mistreatment.

Jesus called a spade a spade, but those whose lives were in sexual turmoil sought him out for help and were warmly received. If that describes your life too, then I would be very willing to talk to you.

Roger Reports...

from the District & County Councils

February is the budget month. Unfortunately the district council's decisions about the Council Tax will be made after the Burton News deadline so I'll give you an update on SLDC's decisions next month and also the budget for the Police authority. As the Police spend more than does the district council any increase will not be negligible.

The county council set its budget on the 16 February which includes a general increase of Cumbria's share of the Council Tax of 1.99% with an additional precept for Adult Social Care of 2.00% for 2017-2018. It was also reported that the council, having already made savings of £198m since 2011, will now find further savings of nearly £52m for the period 2017 to 2020. Cumbria County Council's revenue budget for 2017/18 amounts to £374,422. The cost of education - formerly the largest item being financed differently is no longer in the budget.

For Burton Council Tax payers, most of whose homes are in the higher tax bands, the increase will be Band E (£88.001-£120,000) up from £1,505 in 2016/17 to £1,565 in 2017/18; Band F (£120,000-£160,0000) from £1,779 to

£1,850; Band G (£160,000 - £320,000) from £2,053 to £2,135; Band H (£320,000 and over) from £2,463 to £2,562.

On the Council Tax I received an enquiry asking if residents who live in lower rated properties could be prohibited from parking on side roads where the houses pay higher rates. The official view is 'with regard to parking, motorists who have vehicles which are taxed, insured and have a valid MOT (where applicable) can park on the public highway. They do not have to park outside their own property as long as vehicles are parked in a safe manner.'

The answer to a request for more yellow lines was 'there is no evidence' to support lines being put along the A6070 although the improved white lining for the entrance to Boon Town is being implemented.

In response to another enquiry I was told that the Cumbria County Council has no policy to change speed limits or implement 20mph's and - wait for it! - there are insufficient indications that the majority of drivers along Main Street exceed the 30mph limit - but as, I always say, it only needs one speed merchant to take a life!

Although I discovered that the site is just over the Cumbria border I understand that generally Lancashire Highways have a similar policy to Cumbria's which is to do nothing for the first months and then discreetly remove them. Thereafter, simple floral tributes will be allowed.

Regarding the state of the roads, several residents have supported me in making enquiries from York Council about the effectiveness of attaching camera to refuse lorries to check on pot holes. As I am still receiving complaints about refuse not being collected at the published times I wonder if we could somehow fit devices to other council vehicles to check whether our bins are being emptied on time!

Following the announcement that the Police Service 101 non-emergency number is now being answered within three minutes - no one has so far come forward with any experiences to the contrary. But as always please let me know.

Historical Footnote...

... by Roger Bingham

SHEEP

Sheep play a small but significant part in historical references to agriculture in Burton. Even so the village was made famous and prosperous in the 18th century as a market for grain, as is indicated by the Georgian architecture in and around the Square and in the barns behind the streets. large Regarding stock. cattle were preferred beasts, and there are many records in medieval times to cattle enclosures and also to cattle rustling.

beef was Accordingly, always the favourite meat - selling in c.1700 at seven pence a pound (7d) or more compared to mutton which could be half that price. Pork was even cheaper. At Burton's 'back-end' fairs pigs were often as much to the fore as cattle. But, in 1750 there was such a glut of swine that 80 pigs were sold in one day at Burton at the give away price of a farthing a pound. Sheep do, however, appear prominently in a list, drawn up in 1732, of tithes due to the Vicar of Burton: - 'Every person within the parish that shears ten fleeces shall first choose two fleeces and then the vicar takes one. If he shears but five sheep

he shall pay but half a fleece and for all under five 1d. Also due to the Vicar for ten lambs dropt in one year 10d, for six lambs 8d, for four lambs 2d, for one lamb a halfpenny and double for the two first years after the Vicar's induction'. Cattle rates included 'for every cow which have a calf in the year 2d. For every cow not having a calf in a year but still giving milk the milk tithe to be paid by the person in whose hands the calf is dropt'. Little is known about the appearance of the sheep.

'Survey Westmorland In his of Agriculture' in 1794 Andrew Pringle, a ministry official. did mention not Lakeland's famous Herdwick sheep whose head, taken from Westmorland's old coat of arms, is Cumbria's heraldic crest. Those he observed had a poor appearance being 'horned, dark or grey-faced, thick pelleted, with course, strong hairy wool'. The best local breed was the Silverdale, which were white faced with close wool. In Burton and Holme they could yield 'a stone of wool at 8d a pound'. Later, in 1876, Mr J Cock of Coat Green, Dalton, bred prized long-woolled Leicester Sheep. In 1900 Mr J Dobson of Burton had got 'the palm' at Kendal Show with 'the best long woolled sheep'. It was reported that he had won first prize in the 'aged ram' class.

BURTON COMMUNITY FIRST RESPONDERS

The Burton Community First Responders are volunteers who live in the village and who provide Emergency Life Support on behalf of the North West Ambulance Service between a 999 call being made and the arrival of the Paramedics. There are currently six of us in the Burton team and, working with a team based in Holme, we provide cover across the two villages and the surrounding area 24 hours a day, 365 days of the year. We all carry resuscitation kit including a defibrillator and oxygen therapy equipment. In the last 12 months, Burton Responders were called out by the Ambulance Service on 186 occasions to a wide range of incidents requiring emergency medical care, a number of which were immediately life-threatening.

To continue to operate we need to secure a certain amount of funding to cover pager rentals and equipment replacement. A huge thank you is therefore due to all of you who have supported the team over the years and enabled us to continue to respond to 999 calls. Our AGM, to which you would be welcome, is to be held at 7.30pm on Thursday 30 March in The Kings Arms.

In addition to the defibrillators carried by team members, Burton Responders also have a publicly accessible defibrillator which is in the green box on the wall of the Memorial Hall. This is a potentially life-saving piece of kit if someone suffers a cardiac arrest. It is designed for use by untrained members of the public and is exactly the same as those you see at railway stations and in supermarkets.

If you find yourself needing to help somebody who has collapsed and needs urgent help, phone for an ambulance on 999; the operator will mobilise the Ambulance and the First Responders and will guide you on what to do - including giving you the code to open the green box.

Later in the year, local Responders will be running some "Heartstart" sessions which will enable folk to find out more about the defibrillator and to learn some simple skills which can save lives by helping you to know what to do until the First Responders or the Ambulance arrive. Family Connection found in the National Archives

I'm an amateur genealogist and I have found part of my family lived in Burton in the C18 & C19. I notice that you have both a police and a historical section in your magazine wondered if you would be interested in using a snippet that I found in the National Archives. The constable in question was my ancestor (who also appears in the trade directory that is on the village website). You will see that punishments were a bit harsher then than now!

'Presentment, James Simpson late of Burton in Kendal tinker on 17 February [1800] caused a breach of the peace in the house of William Bailiff of Burton in Kendal victualler, William Bailiff sent for James Chambers of Burton in Kendal husbandman, constable of township who was then assaulted by James Simpson. A true bill. Pleaded guilty, sentenced to be imprisoned in the House of Correction till the 12th day of May next, to be taken down to Milnthorpe and there publicly whipped through the market between the hours of 11 and 12 o'clock till his body is bloody and then discharged. 17 February [1800]'


