

PC Observations...

Reporting from the Parish Council meeting

At the Annual Parish Council Meeting on 18 May, Alan Wren was re-elected as Chairman for one further year with Moira Rowley as Vice Chairman. Representatives were then appointed for various village organisation committees – Burton Recreational Trust Colver), Burton Education (Sarah Foundation (Sarah Colver), Local Area Partnership (Alan Quarrv Wren). Liaison Committee (Jane Hopwood), School Governors (George Isherwood) and the Fireworks Working Group (Alan Wren and Moira Rowley).

Roger Bingham thanked the electorate in Burton for a high (70%) turnout in the recent election. He won a 'landslide victory'. The county council still has no one party with an overall majority and continues as a coalition but the coalition can do very little until after the General Election on 8 June.

There were no planning applications to consider so Councillors rapidly moved on to administrative work, signing cheques and approving annual accounts and the annual governance statement.

Councillor reports were also thin on the ground. They included the on-going lamentation that 'dog poo' continues to foul the lanes, that the Speed Indication Device will shortly be moved to a new site to the south of the village, that Francis Mason Hornby has installed two electrical car charging points at his Dalton Lane Business Centre which are open to all to use, and that the Quarry Planning Application to extend the life of the quarry until 2025 (and later to 2045) will be presented on 25 May. The application subject is to several conditions wild including life preservation, vehicle access controls. contribution to road maintenance around the quarry and improving drainage at the guarry entrance.

Finally it was reported that the recent Green Dragon Housing Development Open Day had attracted upwards of 50 visitors who had raised issues about drainage, pedestrian access to the village centre, housing density, mix of business and residential properties, and the pressure on the school and other village amenities. Councillors resolved to write **SLDC** again to reinforcing Planning these considerations prior to the detailed plan being approved.

It was hot and hilly but we made it!

Jenny and I completed the 'Giro de Bali' from April 28 to May 1. It is a cycle tour around the island. We were raising money for a charity called REGAIN which supports people 'catastrophically injured' in sports accidents, in my case playing rugby.

Bali is a beautiful island but the traffic on the tour was horrendous. The cycling (in my case handcycling from a wheelchair) was the easy bit. Negotiating the route surrounded by hundreds of scooters, vans and cars gave the ride an unexpected extra challenge. And the heat! Averaging 35 degrees centigrade (95 F) it was a little OTT for the British group of 4 hand cyclists and 11 able-bodied cyclists. We were joined by several disabled Balinese men and women in handcycles supported by riders from the Balinese Sports Foundation. Everywhere we went onlookers cheered and made us very welcome.

The route was occasionally hilly but mostly 'undulating' and the road surface was good. We averaged 50 miles a day with frequent stops to drink water and cool down. At the end of the ride, we had a celebration dinner with all the British and Balinese riders. It was a



great feeling to finish and to share the achievement with the Balinese riders.

Many thanks to all the people who helped us with donations to raise money for REGAIN. It is the only UK charity specifically targeting spinally injured sports injuries. Diving, horseriding, motorbikes, and rugby are the main sports causing this kind of injury but there are others too. Thanks again.

Vícar's Letter...

Chicks under her wings

Walking through a field of sheep with our dog at this time of year sets off a racket of baa-ing. Very quickly lambs are re-called from their wandering to the safety of their mother's side. This desire to protect offspring is seen across the animal world and we feel it too.

When some terrible disaster strikes parents instinctively search for their children. Families nearby will draw together, parents with arms around their little ones. When children go missing, or when they begin to treat their parents as 'the enemy', the natural deeply-felt longing is to be able to hug them once again.

God thinks like that too. He speaks of 'finding' his child Israel in the desert: "He shielded him and cared for him; he guarded him as the apple of his eye, like an eagle that stirs up its nest and hovers over its young, that spreads its wings to catch them and carries them on its pinions."¹

And Jesus was just like that too. When he thought about how the people of Jerusalem had distanced themselves from his Father he wept for them.² "O Jerusalem, Jerusalem, you who kill the prophets and stone those sent to you, how often I have longed to gather your children together, as a hen gathers her chicks under her wings, but you were not willing!"³

When we start putting distance between ourselves and our Creator, then the most helpful thing we can do is to remember our heavenly Father's grief over his missing children and his

longing to gather us up into his arms again.

And if you've never felt that God was a Father to you then take a look at the astonishing Bible account of Ruth. She was from the people of Moab who were no friends of God's people. Tragically widowed as a young woman she decides to count the people of her Israelite mother-in-law as her own. Boaz, who eventually marries her, declares: "May you be richly rewarded by the Lord, the God of Israel, under whose wings you have come to take refuge." ⁴

It was a homecoming to a home and a Father that she never knew she had!

HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE

Burton's bleak spring and summer, a 100 years ago

1917 does not loom as large in the folk lore of the First World War compared to the ecstatic first year in 1914, the Dardanelles disaster in 1915, the Battle of the Somme in 1916 and the final, exhausted triumph of 1918. Even so, 1917 was a terrible year.

The Western Front casualties at Passchendaele were as numerous and the drenched fighting conditions in fathomless mud, reportedly, were even worse. Two Burton men 'paid the supreme sacrifice' in this offensive.

After Lance Corporal Crayston was killed his memorial service featured Tennyson's "Crossing the Bar".

For Trooper R H Braithwaite's commemoration in June many former members of the choir got leave from munitions work 'to take their pre-war places in the choir' where they sang "Now the labourer's task is o'er".

Later on, the death in action was reported of Private George Bell who had been the ticket clerk at Burton and Holme Station. Better news was conveyed in a Red Cross telegram informing his parents in Burton that Lance Corporal W Robinson was recovering from wounds as a 'Prisoner of War at Hamburg, Germany'.

Locally, the climate added to war weariness. Spring was issued in with a snow fall, nine inches deep, followed by 17 degrees of frost which killed the flowers so that 'very little could be done in the way of decoration' for the Easter church services. Inevitably, the damson blossom was blighted but where the fruit set damsons were sold in the autumn for £14 a ton.

Because of the cold weather hay-time did not start until the end of July. Somehow, despite the 'clarty' ground, ploughing went ahead but no Burton farmer copied the example of Mr Garnett of Ackenthwaite and used a motor driven plough.

August brought a plague of caterpillars and, just as the harvest began, a four hour thunder storm flattened the corn and flooded the streets, while a mare and foal were killed by lightning at Court Green.

With many men in the forces and girls in industry, agricultural wages rose to

Finally, as autumn arrived, Burton was aroused, on the 1 October, by loud cacophonies on a bright star lit night. It was neither thunder, nor an invasion, but a gigantic and fatal explosion at the Royal Ordnance factory at White Lund, Lancaster. Yet, they too were echoes of the seemingly unending war.

Right on cue! with some of our Swifts arriving back with us on 5 May with increases in numbers over the following days. We have already started our village Swift watches which are usually held on Thursday evening's meeting at the Memorial Hall at 7pm and everyone would be very welcome to attend. So far we have had two meets and we already think that we could have counted over twenty Swifts in the skies over Burton, and already the birds are showing much interest in their regular nesting sites at the Royal and the Manor, and both Cocking Yard and Clawthorpe Hall. They are fascinating to watch as they scream whilst chasing one another low over the village and other times you may struggle to see them because they have climbed to such a great altitudes.

This last month (May) has seen arrivals by all the regular summer visitors which have travelled great distances (thousands of miles) to be with us at this time of year for the purpose of their breeding and have included Chiffchaffs, Willow Warblers, Garden Warblers, Blackcaps. Redstarts and Spotted

Flycatchers. Additionally I have also had two separate sightings along the canal of the beautiful little Sedge Warblers which have been a pleasure to watch and to listen to.

The Cuckoo came back early this year and was present from the 24 April in Dalton Crags (upper) and we have also had two more Cuckoos recorded as well, one of these must have been one of the females which showed some brown around the neckline. I wonder who the host victims will be this year – more than likely a choice between the Meadow Pipit and the Tree Pipit. It's not unknown for the Cuckoo to choose host as small as a Wren!

lťs resident great to see our Stonechats still with are us and breeding in Dalton Crags, just at the time of writing (21 May) the male bird is stunning with such a colourful plumage emitting its "alarm and at times chakking call".

Well it looks great at the moment with most of the birds safely back, and all the regular sites plus some new ones as well seem to be taken up. I have, to press, checked 75% of the sites so far and all looks good for another year.

about the Swallows Not too sure because their numbers have been dwindling for some time now (not just a



local trend but more of a national trend) with numbers down at most of our local farms but no factual evidence to back this up.

These sunny days have produced some nice butterflies over the past month with record numbers of the lovely yellow Brimstones being seen in hamlet, Plain Quarry Dalton and several places on Hutton Roof. We have also seen good numbers of Peacocks, Small Tortoiseshells. Orange Tips and more recently Speckled Woods and this week we have had our first sightings of Dinghy Skippers on Hutton Roof. I don't think it will be long now before we are starting see our Small Pearl Bordered to Fritillaries flitting about.

It's just the right time now to go out and look at the splendid Lily Of The Valley flowers which we are so fortunate to have within our nearby limestone pavements and, for me, the best population has to be hidden away in Dalton Crags. Also there are fabulous populations of the lovely "Bugle", and "Yellow Pimpernel" is reasonably Our ferns are also looking common. good especially the rare (but local for us) Rigid Buckler Fern is looking really well and can be seen well in both Dalton and other parts of Hutton Roof. Also well worth watching out for Angular Solomon's Seal which makes



its appearance this month and can be seen tucked safely away in the shallow limestone grikes. The Early Purple Orchids are now almost over for another year and yet another rare orchid – the Fly Orchid is just starting to show. 
