#### HDLHS Trip to Naworth Castle and Lanercost

After the previous day being so wet it was with much trepidation that we set off from Burton (it was dry when we set off.) As the day progressed, despite my please for Divine intervention, it did rsin but sd much of the day was indoors it did not dampen our spirits. adjourned to a tearoom for refreshment before going onto Naworth Castle. Naworth has been the home to the Earls of Carlisle, the Howards and Dacres, for about 700 years. present resident is Philip Howard, a direct descendant of the Earls of Carlisle. Castle Howard in Yorkshire is perhaps the more well known branch of the Howard family but Naworth is the family seat.

Naworth Castle contains wonderful portraits and paintings, and the castle has been beautifully restored by Philip Howard. It has one of the most famous great halls in northern England. Philip Howard and his assistant gave us a very informative and entertaining tour which we all enjoyed immensely.

Travelling on a short distance, we arrived at Lanercost Priory where we had our lunch break, during which we had a talk on the history of the Priory

and the Howards' and the Dacres' connections, after which we had a tour of the church and Priory ruins.

Lanercost Priory was built in the 12<sup>th</sup>-13<sup>th</sup> century as an Augustinian house of prayer, mainly built with stones from the Roman Wall, as indeed were a lot of the properties in the area.

The Priory church is renowned for its stained glass, particularly by Burne-Jones and William Morris. Morris also designed the unique altar piece, the "Dossal" embroidered then hung in 1887. After restoration & conservation it was replaced in its present position in 2013. The church also has furnishings inspired by the Arts and Crafts Movement.

In 1306-07 Edward I stayed here, and there is a stained glass window to commemorate this event. Following the tour and the talk of the Priory church we proceded to the monastic ruins for a tour. The ruins also incorporate decorative commemorative tombs to past Earls of Carlisle. We also had the opportunity to ring the Priory bell!

Our day concluded, we journeyed our way back to Burton after a full and enjoyable day, despite the weather.

#### Wholesome Milk From Happy Cows!

We are Tom and Clare Noblet, we farm in partnership with Max and Jenny Burrow at Whin Yeats, Hutton Roof. Last year, with falling milk prices threatening the future sustainability of the farm, we put in a small dairy and started to make some of our cows milk into unpasteurised cheese. It's been a huge learning curve and we are continuing to refine our recipes all the time. We make two types - Whin Yeats Farmhouse, a smooth, creamy textured cheese, cloth bound and buttered, and matured for at least 12 weeks, and Fellstone - a Wensleydale-type with a drier texture and fresher taste, cloth bound, buttered and matured for 8 weeks.

We are also now able to sell our lovely, fresh, unpasteurised milk directly from the farm. Straight from the cows, cooled in the tank and then bottled, we believe this is milk at its best — fresh, un-

#### PC Observations...

Reporting from the Parish Council meeting

At the PC meeting in June 2015 the main item was the housing development at Church Bank Gardens. And it's still one of the two main items two years later. The other big item was the Quarry growth and its effect on houses in Clawthorpe.

The Church Bank Garden development received planning approval condition that the access road to the site was brought up to adoptable standard. The development is now well under way but the access road is far from up to standard and the District Council's 'Enforcement Officer' has taken no action to put pressure on Mr Sims, the developer, to do anything about it. Residents' complaints have been ignored and unanswered. Is this democracy in 2017 in action? The Parish Council wrings its hands in anguish and laments its lack of power and influence. Like so many other issues - the Children's Home, the blocked drains etc. – it appears that the PC can only write a letter and send it off into the ether in hope.

The blocked drains saga is another example of inertia. The drains are

meant to be cleaned out every 6 months by the county's Highways Department. Councillor Sarah Colyer went round the village in the pouring rain on June 10 to find that out of 36 gully drains around the village 20 were totally blocked and 16 were partially blocked. Clearly the Council has not been doing its gully maintenance job for years never mind every 6 months. Councillors decided to protest and write another letter. But what else can they do? It's a scandal.

The continuing growth of the quarry is Councillors are not another threat. opposed to the growth plans but are concerned about the possibility that blasting from 6.30am to 6pm weekdays (8am to 12 noon Saturdays) will become the norm. A local resident backed the Council's protest and it was agreed to that the PC should respond to a Quarry Time Extension Report to make it a condition of acceptance of the report that blasting should not start before 7.30am and never exceed a property damaging level of severity at any time. Apparently the resident's double glazing has had to be replaced many times as a result of blasting. The resident also made an impassioned plea for the extension not to encroach on the land that is now a nature reserve between the residences Quarry and





Clawthorpe. We can only hope that the present (and future) management team at the Quarry will abide by this very reasonable request. Holme Parish Council (Holme is just as affected as Burton) have made no comment.

Other items discussed included:

- 1. There was no police report this month.
- 2. Alan Wren reported that swing problems on the playground had been fixed and that SID's (speed indication device) new position on the south entry to Burton was working but needed final adjustment.
- 3. George Isherwood will put another coat of wood preserver onto the bus shelter to the north of the village.
- 4. Moira Rowley asked for maximum publicity for Burton Recreation Trust's Annual Team Challenge (a music, bar and fun-filled extravaganza) on July 15 following last year's successful event. Money raised will go towards resurfacing the play area.
- 5. Roger Bingham thanked Burton residents for their extremely high turnout for the June 8 election. The outcome of the election though has done no favours for County Council business which is effectively paralysed until the hung parliament gets itself sorted out. Roger lamented the recent flash flood in Burton more evidence,

if any was required, that gully cleaning in Burton should be top priority. I'm afraid to say though that it will be no surprise if this message falls on deaf ears.

- 6. Finally some good news on July 20 at 7pm in the Memorial Hall, Bryan Yorke will give a short talk and then answer questions about 'Swifts in Burton'. It's the right time of year so don't miss it!
- 7. And no dog poo stories this month! Amazing.

#### Vícar's Letter...

#### **Question Time**

Imagine being a politician and trying to hold in your head all the figures and arguments so that you are ready to answer any question that might be thrown at you. Not many of us could do that well.

But there is one question that Christians are told they must always be ready to answer. Peter tells us to get ready for this one: "Why do you have hope?" (1 Pet 3:15-16)

In English 'hope' often means a vague longing that things will work out OK in the end. But Peter's word 'hope' in the original Greek is more focused. It means something that is absolutely certain but just hasn't happened yet, like the 'sure and certain hope' that is spoken about in a Christian funeral service.

Peter knew that when life in the 1st Century hit hard, people would be puzzled to see that the Christians still had hope. Struck down by serious illness, crushed by the cruelty of someone they trusted, hounded out of the synagogues by Jewish leaders or hounded to death by Roman rulers, Peter wanted them to be ready to explain why they still had a sure and certain hope.

And Christians ought to expect that people will ask the same question today. The more we are struck down by serious illness, crushed by the cruelty of someone we had trusted, grieved by violence and suffering in every corner of our world, saddened by chaotic politics, or hounded to abandon our Christian beliefs, the more we

should expect people to wonder why we still have hope and to ask us why.

Peter tells us his answer: In this world we can never put the people and things that we love beyond the reach of death or decay but God has trounced death in Jesus who now holds all the levers of power in earth and heaven. Nothing can stop Jesus bringing in a new order where his triumph is shared with all those whose only hope is in him. We have "an inheritance that can never perish, spoil or fade". (1 Peter 1:3-4)

Perhaps you've been puzzled by an apparently indestructible hope in someone you know – go ahead and ask them, "Why?" See if they're ready with their answer!

#### HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE

#### **BURTON'S ARMS**

Heraldry attracts less attention by historians than it did in former times. Back in 1888 Edward Bellasis' "Church Notes" on Burton Church described coats of arms on the monuments to the gentry, which nowadays could only be understood by specialists. Thus he records the arms on William Atkinson's plague of 1825 as 'pale az. & qu. double-headed displayed or, on chief engrailed of 3rd, rose of 2nd between 2 martlets of 1st (Atkinson) impaling sa, per chevron az & sa., chevron ermine between 3 etoiles ar, Langdale. Crest of rising ppr. Wings Atkinson eagle displayed (ermonois) right claw on bezant'.

Equally fulsomely he described the arms on the 1835 monuments to Thomas Cotton of Curwen Woods on which are '3 cotton hanks'. Other more prominent arms are displayed around the village. On at the A6070 southern entrance to the county and Burton are Cumbria's coat of arms, granted in 1974, which pinpoints features of parts forming the new county including the 'parnassus' flowers for Cumberland, red for the Furness District of Lancashire. white roses for the Sedbergh, formerly in Yorkshire, and the ram's head from

Westmorland's crest. The supporters the Red Dragon referring are Cumbria's Ancient Briton origin and the Dacre Bull of Cumberland. They stand on a base representing Hadrian's Wall with crossed two red bars Westmorland which derive from the Barons of Lancaster, once Lords of Kentdale.

Further up the road, red bars also Westmorland's appear on (granted in 1926). These are also displayed in the The Memorial Hall\*. They include the apple tree for the old county town of Appleby and crowned by a Herdwick ram's head impaled with a shearman's hook. Modern times are represented by the Lion and Unicorn Arms of Queen Elizabeth II on, ironically, The King's Arms. But Burton's biggest and more unusual arms are those of the Duke of Edinburgh (granted in 1947) on the Royal Hotel. His arms exemplify Prince Philip's royal pedigree as they show three lions for Greece and Denmark (he was born a prince of both countries), two 'pallets' for Battenberg, a castle on a mount for Mountbatten, with caps on turrets for Edinburgh. supporters represent Hercules and a Lion Rampant which wears a 'naval representing the service in the British Royal Navy.

We are well on with the bird breeding season and most of the little beauties have gone quiet now with just the occasional flurry of song from the many Warblers we have in and around the Warblers village. The who travelled all the way up from Africa and the Continent to be with us seem to be in good numbers this year especially our Willow Warblers and Chiffchaffs with more territories than ever being recorded. We have also done well this vear with the Garden Warblers. Redstarts and the Whitethroats.

It was over a week ago since our Cuckoo was last seen (14 June) and he or she will be well on their way back to Africa by the time you read this. As a rule our local Cuckoo departs somewhere around the middle of June and her offspring will be raised by the unsuspecting foster parents before they themselves leave during early August. It beats me how they know how to get back to Africa on their own steam without being shown by a parent bird. It's obviously all built into that egg! (see illustration)


Some of the rarer butterflies are now on the wing and I have been seeing regular numbers of Small Pearl Bordered Fritillaries, Dinghy Skippers and lots of Small Heaths whilst up on Hutton Roof. By the time this article

goes to print I would also expect to start seeing Ringlets, and the larger fritillaries like the Dark Green Fritillary and if we are really lucky maybe the rarer High Brown Fritillary and another special we have here the Northern Brown Argus.

This is one of the best times of the year for me, because it is the start of our rare orchid season when we have all those specials like the Dark Red Helleborines and the Broad Leaved Helleborines in flower on Hutton Roof. I love looking for them and taking photographs of them. I have over the years done surveys and counted no less than 2,000 of the Dark Reds and some 500 of the Broad Leaved. Hutton Roof is the second most important area in the whole of the United Kingdom for the Dark Red Helleborines. And it gets better! The two mentioned orchids do

get together and hybridize and produce a beautiful strong plant which goes by the name of Epipactis Schmalhausenii (as yet no common name). Hutton Roof is the only place in the whole of the UK where these rare hybrids can be found and as a rule I usually have somewhere around the mid-teens to check each year. We also have many rare variations of Orchids which I guess make it a attraction to the many orchid lovers.

At first I wasn't sure what they were because they looked very much like little snakes, but I soon realized that they were a group (not sure of pluralities!) of Slow Worms huddled up together and right on the summit of Hutton Roof. I was difficult to try and count them but we do estimate there were four in number. What surprised me most was the place I found them, because the area would have very little in the way of water.



### Roger Reports...

From the County & District Councils

#### **June Report**

Firstly may I say THANK YOU for returning me as your County Councillor for Lower Kentdale. Thanks also for a friendly reception, for coffee breaks and for use of 'comfort stations'. In all my walking round, mainly in glorious weather, I never heard a cross word from anybody - so thanks again.

As in previous elections our turnout was the highest in the area at 52.4% joint equal with our neighbouring County Division of Kent Estuary. Our statistics were Roger Bingham Conservative 1715, Simon Blunden -Green 97, Paul Casson - Labour 139, Gordon Higton - Liberal Democrat 510; Majority 1205. The votes cast in Lower Kentdale were 2463 compared to Kent Estuary's 2686. Overall the the Conservatives were most successful party increasing their seats from 25 to 37, while the Labour Party after losing 11 seats, obtained 26 seats. The LibDems remained about the same 16 seats although in Lakeland they lost seats in Furness and Windermere but gained Appleby in the District. Independents Eden also gained 5 seats, one in Workington

previously a solid Labour seat. Another surprise was that a Conservative won the traditionally Labour seat at Cleator Moor.

The slackening of Labour representation the west on coast means that the parties are geographically more balanced across the county. With no single party having an overall majority it seems that a coalition county administration will be formed. This is the normal pattern for Cumbria as, since its inception in 1984, only twice has a single party had total control - once Labour in 1997 and once Conservative in 2009. This time an exceptional situation has arisen with announcement of General the а Election on 8 June as no County Group wanted to go into coalition with another party as this might harm their vote nationally. The obvious solution might have been to postpone forming a new county administration until after the General Election. But this would be illegal as a new administration has to take office within 25 days of the local election. Thus, it has been agreed that temporarily, the current Labour LibDem coalition will carry on until after 8 June. Whether we will know the composition of the new Cumbria administration before the next Burton News awaits to be seen. Even so by then we might all be sick and tired of politics!

#### **July Report**

As my June Council News was 'deferred on account of the General Election' this month's contribution will be brief. In any case I have little to report as because of the election there have been no meetings. But, as often before, Burton's electorate provided a splendid turn-out. At 9pm on Election Day our Polling Clerk at the Memorial Hall said that 800 voters had come through the doors and there were also 250 or so postal votes. Out of an electorate of 1124 this seems too good to be true so I'll try and check the figures and report back asp - providing I'm not deferred again for yet another election!

At election time I had two major issues - flooding and planning. 'Flash' the 29 May deluge certainly was. Having escaped, in the nick of time, from Hutton Roof Fell Run I was greeted at home by the sight of my gravel path being washed away and by the first of the 'what do we pay our rates for?' emails and phone calls. Yet, half an hour later when I reached Burton the waters had mainly sped away, though the dampness hadn't. Nevertheless, I have onto the council improvements to drain sizes along Main Street and virtually everywhere else, for and other improvements

extended kerbs on Tan Pits Lane. Yet again I have pressed for the clearing out of the existing drains. A few days after the flood I saw our lengthsman and a parish councillor digging out two 'gullies' by the primary school which had been totally blocked by tree roots. No wonder we ask, 'Why do we pay our rates?'

Planning problems over the Church Gardens site continue. Throughout the election period forwarded to the councils various complaints including allegations failure to reply to correspondence. On the Monday following the election I reported my concerns to SLDC's Chief Executive. I currently understand that County Highways have received an undertaking from the contractors that the Church Bank road will be brought up to adoptable standards. I am also pressing for a confirmation that remaking the road will not be postponed for an indefinite time until the last dwelling is occupied. I hope to be able report enforceable agreements in due course.


