Readers' LETTERS

Dear BN,

Why is Burton not worried about the biggest problem we have had for years and which is now very urgent.

In the last Burton News we were informed that the Pre-School was moving venues from the Hall to the School. I'm interested to know if anyone has thought about or prepared for where these parents are now going to park.

For obvious reasons, they can no longer park at the Memorial Hall. The Hall will require their spaces for the new Hall supporters. What plans have the School made for this enlargement? Have they even considered this.

I ask because I live across the road and parking has been a perennial problem for those of us living in the School's vicinity. The School did make a big improvement but some parents are no longer cooperating. My own anxiety was raised a few months ago where a pupil's father in impolite language, scorned the School's notice about parking by the gate, and blocking access. This attitude is not helpful to all



the ambulances, doctors, nurses, carers, friends etc, who now visit daily. They are concerned about the parking, and their need to have quick access.

Although I am obviously concerned about my own situation, I am also concerned about parking in the whole village. We have to look at how the situation has changed and by listing our problems and doing some thinking and be pro active. The School has coped by turning pupils play areas into car parks. How are they expecting Pre-School workers and children to cope? Are more play areas going to be used for parking? Is the School anticipating more development?

Very soon, a decision will be made about what will happen to the site of the Royal Hotel and the land surrounding it. This land is now being used by the nearby houses and others as a car park. Where are they going to go once new ownership has been accepted? Also there is soon to be an expansion of house building in the village. I assume these houses will be built with suitable parking. We should also be aware that now it's not just one car per family. We are now in a situation where one family can have many cars.

We have a growing village, which will increase our road use. Is this being considered in planning? Indeed is this

village concerned that we have a problem which is in need of thought and planning. We are all participants in this - who is going to take this issue seriously before crisis point?

As the mother of a young man with an acquired brain injury I feel I have to write to counter the negative (bordering on hostile) discussions by certain villagers in parish council meetings, the Westmorland Gazette and equally within your pages in relation to the new care home/planning applications.

I find it incredulous and shocking in 2017 to read in print terminology that belongs firmly in the 18th or 19th century and am surprised to discover how the issue is not the problem but rather the approach to the issue is. Am I the only one who finds it deeply offensive to read claims that "they" should be housed outside the village or on the outskirts rather like lepers in historic times? Frankly it leaves me shocked and horrified at the unwelcoming attitude of certain citizens in this village who rather than view the experience as something which has the potential to enrich their life and culture alongside open mind-sets thereby removing

antiquated stigmas relation in disabilities and differences would rather instead condemn and attack and show zero tolerance. Indeed I don't know about you but on that basis I find it amazing the NIMBY culture somehow view having their narrow and frequently perspective offensive aired application planning process is somehow beneficial to the integrity and moral compass of the community as whole!

Indeed it would be rather pleasant in this unpleasant world to encounter positive empathy and understanding of those differences and disabilities rather than resentment. Perhaps Mr Bingham would be better suited assessing the progress and "impact" of those stuck in historic pathways with negative views those with emotional on and psychological needs/mental health etc. on the actual individuals concerned and their families fighting to break down barriers, prejudice and indifference on a daily basis.

Despite the severity and complexity of his disability my son battles on to live as "normal" a life as possible which on my observations is quite humbling and puts fully into perspective any issues I have on a daily basis. Yes he may shout out loud occasionally but that is because his seizure activity is high and triggered nothing malicious merely

medical and unlike our Saturday night revellers he has no choice and no control. Guess that is enough to endure zero tolerance and condemn him to some remote area of the village! Strange world isn't it?

PC Observations...

Reporting from the Parish Council meeting

Councillors were rather thin on the ground at the 18 August meeting prompting Chairman Alan Wren to question the wisdom of meeting in mid-Summer. Business was rather thin too. The most interesting topics were:

- 1. The prospect of B4RN (Broadband for the Rural North) coming to Burton. B4RN is a professionally designed fibre optic broadband network, registered as a non-profit community benefit society, and run by a dedicated local team with the support of landowners volunteers. It offers 1,000Mbps FTTH broadband to every property in the coverage areas, costing households only £30 per month. Francis Mason-Hornby spoke in support of the idea and advised that, as part of housing development in Church Bank Gardens, the capability for B4RN to be available in Burton was available. Councillors agreed to invite a speaker from B4RN to address the Council in the near future.
- 2. Approval of a planning application to build a single-storey extension to the primary school for pre-school and afterschool education/activities. Although there has been an objection from a

neighbour on the grounds of even greater parking congestion around the school, councillors had no objections to the application. They did however call for the school to reconsider its opening hours to spread out the parking load at the start and end of the school day.

- 3. The PC looks after Plain Quarry, with the support of Forestry Commission maintenance resources. However the FC is no longer able to continue helping to maintain drains, benches, fences, Councillors steps and gates. Hopwood and David Haigh carried out a review of the maintenance work required. They will ask the PC to stump up £300 to take over the work. Using their own labour and 'donations' of materials from local business, they think this will be enough. community resource maintained community resources. Thanks to all.
- 4. Another Burton community project is the reprinting of Kath Hayhurst's publication of pamphlets about Jubilee Walks around Burton. Francis Mason-Hornby has offered to find the funds to do this. Many thanks to him.
- 5. Councillor reports (Alan Wren, Francis Mason-Hornby) included the nuisance of known offenders roaring round the village in their cars. Although the police have been informed, they take no action. Youths have also been

Village Store Renovation - 2nd phase is finally here!

Many of you have already seen the results of Stage 1 – our "posh" refurbished store room. In Stage 2 there will be a complete makeover of the shop from top to toe: new ceiling, lighting, shelving, floor etc... but why?

It seems like only yesterday that we arrived in Burton to start a new phase in our lives. As we look in the mirror and see the multiplying grey hairs (in HIS BEARD!) we realise that more than 10 years have passed. We have really enjoyed being in Burton, appreciating the warmth of the village community and we are determined to try our best to secure the future viability of Burton Village Store, but much has changed. We have a new pound coin, plastic banknotes and Wayne Rooney no longer plays for Man. U. But seriously...

The banking crisis, the rise of online activities (shopping, bill-payments and information access including daily news), a plethora of new legislations, have resulted in changes to traditional customer habits. The range of products offered by the Post Office (an important aspect of our business) also continues

to change. In this environment, like all businesses, we must re-evaluate our offerings and trading practices.

It has taken us a long time but, after many hours of talks with the Post Office, professionals, shop-fitters, suppliers, each other and much silent contemplation, finally we have decided on a vision for the future. This starts with a major refurbishment.

We will replace the existing PO fortress with a modern open plan version, located alongside a new extended retail counter. This will give us greater flexibility and allow the post office to be available for longer hours. The space freed up by the old PO fortress gives space to extend our range of fresh and products. We have frozen intended to improve the quality of the coffee to go, this will finally become a reality and the new environment, with more chilled space, will allow us to offer wider range of last-minute food solutions. We also plan to be open for longer hours so we are there when the late commuters return from work.

Fingers crossed, this will all happen during the last two weeks of October. Realistically, in order to complete the renovations the shop has to close.

We are grateful to the BMH Committee, and the regular users of the Club Room, who have kindly allowed us the

HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE

by Roger Bingham

THE LAST BURTON SHOW

sequel to August's Footnote on the First Show

On the 1 September 2000 The Westmorland Gazette the reported Show held the previous day on a weather-scourged hillside at Road, Carnforth: "A stunning display in slippery conditions from the Chariots of fire team was the centrepiece of the 135th annual Burton Milnthorpe and Carnforth Show. Ponies almost flew over jumps pulling carriages behind them, and then negotiated a bridge of smoke while Susie billowing specially trained stunt cow was a real crowd pleaser with her horse antics. The five year old Belted Galloway had been trained in the same way as a pony."

Not surprisingly, the Show President Mrs Margery Parsons who, with her late husband Bill (President in 1972), had farmed at Overthwaite, near Holme, commented, "In spite of many hardships in agricultural circles I found a wonderful show where the quality of the stock and great workmanship have come to the fore."

Traditional show animals were exhibited along side more exotic breeds like Llamas and Alpacas. John Garnett of Ackenthwaite Farm, was over the moon when his cow "Ulpha Astre Whinfell secured overall dairy champion at her first ever show. She calved about 10 months ago and she's still doing 34 litres a day." In the beef classes Ian and Angela Grisedale of Greenmount Farm, Milton, had a string of successes.

In sheep Glen Shapiro, of Silverdale, triumphed with a Blue Faced Leicester aged ram. Altogether the sheep classes attracted a rise in entries from 180 last year to 240. The introduction of sheep classes for Swaledales and Herdwicks helped to boost numbers and light horse and dog entries were also up.

Riders paraded round the arena despite the rain. Nathalie Lindsay of Bolton le Sands on Riccalton Velvet was the proud winner in the Pony Class "although", she explained to the Gazette, "it's the first time I have ridden her."

The craft marquee boasted everything from home-made produce to leather goods, miniature ornaments, walking sticks and com dollies.

Well it keeps coming around but oh too quickly for me!

When our Swifts disappear from our skies and the screaming stops so abruptly – no more entertainment from those special aerial acrobatics dashing up Main Street with only a foot or so from the tarmac road at times, or chasing one another in a noisy screeching regimental display like a team of "red or black arrows" with the ultimate precision. Well already I may be getting withdrawals and must now accept that their twelve week season is again over for another twelve months.

For the village Swift watchers it's been a funny sort of season, with very few birds seen during the normal daylight hours, and we think they have been getting the bulk of their insects from outside of the village. This year we expect that at least 22 nest sites have occupied within the village young birds producing at least 35 (estimated) which is more or less in line with most years.

We think the bulk of the Burton birds

left us in three separate departures with a lot of birds on the morning of the 6 secondary August, then bulk а departure of at least a further 20 plus on the morning of Friday 11 August, and then a final small party of eight or so on Sunday 13 August. But that is not the full story! Because has I write this column (18 August 2017) I did see a straggler Swift still hawking the skies last night just behind the King's Arms, we suspect that the bird is part of a pair which has nested on the front of the Royal Cottage building, and so it will be very interesting to see just how late this birds goes! So it's eyes to the sky for a few more days yet! On behalf of Burton folk thank you Swifts for yet another great year and have a safe journey back to the African Congo, I suspect most of you are well on the way.

Oh it's been a good year for our Orchids (a real cracker!) with record numbers of Dark Red Helleborines and also Broad Leaved Helleborines, just on Burton Fell I reckon I counted over 650 Dark Reds and 138 Broad Leaved, but I guess on the whole of Hutton Roof there could be in excess of 2,000 Dark Reds and maybe some 400 Broad Leaves. The season produced some stunning looking plants and, like most years, some of them were extra special with several varieties, and not only that we also have the rarer suspected hybrids amongst them. Like most years





have taken lots and lots of photographs of our orchids and you may wish to check them out on my orchid devoted website (see link below). There is so much interesting stuff going on up on the Fell but, again as I write, the Orchid season comes to an abrupt end, so I must now try and catch up on my records and writings over the coming months. I guess we still have one flower which should be at its best right about now and that's the "Fellwort" or "Autumn Gentian" (Gentianella campestris). have recorded this just leaving the Trig heading East, or leaving Uberash Breast heading down the footpath towards the parking areas - almost following a horizontal line of Burton Fell boundary wall. It's also seen on the footpath heading from Clawthorpe Lane park up area heading towards the Farleton side yet keeping tight to the boundary wall on the west side.

Most of the summer butterflies have now dropped off, although we are still getting lovely Peacocks, Brimstones and Commas, but as I write I am seeing very worn Meadow Browns and good numbers still of the White butterflies. Also lots of dragonflies this week in particular, they are so flitty as they fly over the bracken of the Burton Fell areas.

Thankfully we still have lots of

Swallows and House Martins in the village and over the coming weeks I will prepare myself for starting off with the "Visible Bird Migration Counts" which I tend to do annually usually from good watch point areas highly elevated on Vicarage Lane, although sometimes (depending on the species, weather and winds) I do also sometimes observe from up near Whin Yeats, e.g. Whin Yeats is best for moving Meadow Pipits N to S direction, and Vicarage Lane is best for moving Chaffinch NW to SE directions. I guess we are so lucky to have all this happening on our own doorstep! It really is so satisfying to be able to see such spectacles, the only drawback might be that I need to set my alarm clock much earlier, because it is the "early bird" hours that are the best.



Roger Reports...

From the County & District Councils

July brought a disappointment at the county's Development Control Regulations & Committee. After one of the longest debates I can recall Kentdale concerning Lower the DC & R decided to give full approval to the application to extend the workings of Home Park Quarry, both in years and in the depth and extent of the excavations.

Along with four members of the public (representing Clawthorpe residents) we asked for reduced blasting levels as the some detonations impact of reportedly damaged properties especially to double glazing. It was contended that the problem might be mitigated by reducing the operation area in the part closest to the houses on Pipers Lane. I believe that many members non-politically of the might motivated committee accepted this modification as it would only have had a miniscule affect on production. But following advice from a up by senior officer backed council's lawyer we were told that no modification could be made to the application - so the amendment to restrict the area was lost. Although I, along with most local people, support the Quarry's regional and national contribution to the economy I am considering seeking other opinions about the validity of this legal ruling. If you have any other issues regarding the Quarry please let me or the Parish Council know and then we can inform the Quarry Liaison Committee.

Unfortunately because of a timing clash with DC & R I had to miss the Police and Crime Commission meeting. But, in

the meantime, I am seeking views on a proposed amalgamation of the 'Blue Light' Police, Ambulance and Fire and Rescue Services.

I have also reported fresh complaints about delayed responses to the 101 police Help Line and have heard further grumbles about mistakes made by SLDC's Refuse Collection Service which has 'missed' some bins and boxes. If you have any refuse problems please, initially, ring SLDC at 01539 7333333.

On 4 August I made a detailed tour with the Chief Highways Engineer of our area's problems, like the entrance to Church Bank Gardens, white line improvements and flooding issues on the A6070 and, the complex drainage on Tan Pits Lane.





1806 18 April. Ric. Bush, parish of Burton in Kendal, labourer, for stealing 1 lb. of cow's hair, value 10d.. belonging to Edm. Harrison, sentenced to imprisonment with hard labour in the Ho. of Correction at Kendal, for 2 years; Whitsun Saturday and on between 11 and 12 a.m., to be stripped naked from his hips upwards and publicly whipped with a Cat with Nine tails, from the Town Hall (Market Place) to the top of New Street and back again. Kendal Order and Indictment Book, 1798-1811.

I can't help but wonder what he would have needed the cow's hair for though, can anyone tell me?
