PC Observations...

Reporting from the
Parish Council meeting

A casual vacancy? There was a surprise announcement from Chairman Alan Wren that Vice Chairman Moira Rowley had resigned. Moira has done a great job for many years and her enthusiasm and expertise will be greatly missed. The Parish Council is displaying a notice informing the residents of the parish of the vacancy. The notice will run for 14 days from the date it is displayed. Assuming an election is not called, the Parish Clerk Christine Davidson will review applications and a new councillor will be co-opted or, if there is more than one applicant, there may be vote.

At the Open Forum, Lynne Nolan reported that the County Council had at last lurched into action as it realised it was in breach of its legal responsibility to take action when more than 5 houses were flooded as happened more than a year ago when Storm Desmond struck. They are now promising to clear culverts in and around the main problem area in the central area of Burton. Parish Councillors are helping by pointing out where the main risk areas are.

After many years, there is action to convert the Royal Hotel into 6 houses, a pub and a beer garden. Graham Wilson was present and reported that the initial development plan for 16 houses had evolved into the new application. Although, Councillors were concerned about parking, there was almost unanimous support for the new plan, which promises to be a boost to village amenities and conservation status.

Burton's conservation status is at risk as reported in last month's Burton News. Councillors supported SLDC's intentions to gain funding to improve Burton's status but held back from committing its own funds to the initiative. Instead, they agreed to monitor developments and review the situation early in 2018.

Councillor Jane Hopwood reported a 'more aggressive' attitude by local quarry management following approval of their expansion plans. Jane was particularly interested in what was happening to a levy the quarry pays to improve infrastructure in Burton and Holme. She reported that the money might be being spent but questioned the targeting of the funds. A stretch of the A6070 had been wrongly resurfaced for example. Jane also reported that local school visits to the quarry had reduced in number, possibly due to

scarcity of teacher availability to accompany pupils.

With some doubt, we added small bunches of grapes to the goody bowl. They were all chosen!

I suspect Dave and I get as much fun and delight in seeing such lovely bright faces, innocently defying the forces of darkness as they all do.

Our Holly Tree

Many years ago, when our two sons were small, we spent the October half-term holiday in the Cotswolds. It was a lovely week with wonderful autumnal colours and lots of walks through woods. On one of our walks I tripped over a small seedling holly that someone had carelessly pulled up and left on the path. Never lacking a damp tissue and plastic bag, I rescued it, put it in my suitcase and brought it back to Cumbria.

I planted it out in our garden and the following year, though only about a foot high, it produced some berries. It has now moved to its third garden and, as I write looking out at the frosty countryside, it is sitting outside the window glowing in the winter sun against the blue sky, with berries on every branch and twig. The birds love it and, as their feeding station is nearby, they often hide in its prickly shelter. I can see a blue tit with a sunflower seed and a coal tit who always rushes in, grabs a seed then retreats into the holly

to consume its breakfast at leisure. There is a blackbird eating the berries as this is our first really cold snap. Now there are three goldfinches warily reconnoitering as the sparrow hawk is a frequent visitor. We have seen it dive ingloriously and unsuccessfully into the prickles on several occasions when trying to seize small birds.

On one wonderful Boxing Day morning we opened the curtains to see a flock of redwings busily stripping the berries: it took them three days and then they disappeared as silently as they had arrived. In very cold spells we have a pair of tiny goldcrests visiting, picking over every twig, searching for small tasty morsels.

Weeding beneath the holly can be bad news for bare knees but the fallen leaves scattered over the border leave a clear signal to unwanted feline visitors.

We know that this will be the holly's final garden. If we were to move it is far too big to take with us, but it disperses numerous scions across the garden and we would hope to take its children or grandchildren with us when we move on.

Our beloved holly tree continues to repay us annually for an impulsive gesture 30 years ago.

Roger Reports...

From the County & District Councils

I seem to have received more e-mails than ever before on matters ranging from cold callers, disturbances by youths, traffic congestion caused after the M6 was closed three times in five days, speeding, building control problems on Church Bank and floods. Some progress is being made on highways. But I'm not sure if a government scheme to shorten coned off distances and to increase speeds in reduced motorway lanes from 50 mph to 60 will help us in Burton. Even so the 'No HGV' signs for Ewan Mill Lane and Station Road (ordered in March) have been installed - though I've had complaints that the positioning of the sign at Neddy Hill might obscure vision.

Pavements for both sides of Mowbray Drive are in the current works schedule and quite a number of pot holes have been filled in and gullies cleaned out.

Encouraging developments have been made on the flooding problems. At a special meeting on 26 October about problems around The Square, county council Flood Officers explained that they had investigated sources of flood water, much of which issues from around the tennis court and the fields to the east of Main Street. Drainage had

also been impeded by a blocked culvert under the road, a large drain tarmacked over in the Royal car park, while a culvert had been cut through by electricity cables under the west side of The Square. I am pleased that the utilities company is paying for this work. The west side of The Square has never been adopted by the county council and, despite historical enquiries by me and others, no one could discover the whereabouts of the descendants of the Atkinson family (last heard of in New Zealand!) who were the historical Lords of the Manor who owned The Square and, so, might have been responsible for its maintenance.

Despite further enquiries the county council has no plans for the creating a pathway from Church Bank to Clawthorpe. Allegedly, as a major 'capital project' this might cost £100,000.

Regarding pestering by fish sellers and 'reformed' offenders, I am supporting plans for No Cold Calling Zones.

Out of the blue I was consulted by SLDC's Conservation Officer about registering 'Buildings at Risk' in Burton. I declined to see him until after the Parish Council had been informed, as I recalled uproar elsewhere after 'officials' without prior consultation arrived to tell residents that 'their place

was in a mess and needed doing up.' Also in a broadcast, I stressed, that Burton residents generally cherish their historic heritage and that the village looks better than in my younger days when, as 1950s postcards show, there were telegraph poles everywhere, hardly any buildings were white-washed, and new properties were being built with un-rendered brick walls. Moreover, with the impending development of the Royal Hotel and the possible restoration of a derelict cottage (currently up for sale) some obvious blemishes should soon be rectified. But I will use my local and historical experience to obtain grants to enhance Burton as the most historically enticing entrance of Cumbria.

On SLDC, controversy over the council's closure of Kendal's New Road car-park continues. Following a lengthy debate the council's scheme was adopted to close the car park so that the road-side area (now to be called a 'common') may be transformed for 'peaceful recreation.' No-one as yet knows where the twice yearly fair will be situated. Several member of the majority party either voted with the opposition against the plan or abstained and many others were not present for the vote. Cheaper parking in other car-parks has been introduced, but I still think a new car park should have been created before the 100 year

old, free New Road car park was closed.

A white Christmas has been forecast but I'm told we have enough road grit. We'll see! But Seasons Greetings all the same,

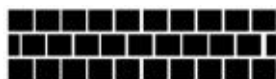

Well I feel like crying! Yes we never really got our Fieldfare this year, most of them must have travelled straight down Europe without crossing over to the UK. It's a real shame for the birders because this species is probably one of the most "waited in anticipation for" out of all the Winter migrants! We did get a sampling of 2,681 birds on the 30 October and also a further 925 birds over Burton on 1 November, but that's been it! We would in most years get at least 7-10 thousand of the "chackers" coming through this area, and what about back in 2009 when I had over 20,000 mixed thrushes in a single morning coming over Whin Yeats, and I think this included 10,000 or more Fieldfares. No one knows for sure why we have not had them this year, but most seem to think that the weather conditions were never right for a good east to west move this year and for most of the period we held blocking winds (westerlies) right at the crucial time of their anticipated crossing of the North Sea. After saying that, we are noticing some nice nomadic parties feeding up in the areas of both Dalton Crags and Hutton Roof. Lots of berries

around this year so the ones that have come through have plenty to go at.

Maybe few thrushes, however this year has been something really special for the numerous Hawfinch that have entered the country from the east side. It's quite obvious they must have been struggling getting food and have decided to make the long journey west to join us. There have been well over 1,000 additional records throughout the country of Hawfinches during the past couple of months. One bird which bore a ring was actually found dead close to one of the bird observatories in the south of England and they checked the bird, which was very emaciated and well below its necessary weight to survive, and it was confirmed to have been previously ringed in the Netherlands. We have had three Hawfinch recorded from Hutton Roof this year, whether these are continentals or some of our local stock birds we will never know! Odd records of Waxwings are just starting to come through from east Lancashire so I wonder if they will arrive up here in due course. Also a Hoopoe was seen around the middle of November in the Lancaster district. But I guess the jewel in the crown has to be a late Swallow seen on November 17 at Leighton Moss.

HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE

1917 - A POOR CHRISTMAS AND A COURT CASE

1917 was, perhaps, the most miserable year of the First World War. Casualties were less than in the previous year 'on the Somme' but in 1917, Burton 'lost' Bill Crayston, Albert Baldwin, Thomas Hutchinson and RH Braithwaite on the Western Front; other Burton Lads were wounded during the Passchendaele offensive and just, before Christmas, news arrived that Corporal Harry Eccles, serving in East Africa, had, 'received a German bullet through his left arm.'

At home, throughout the year the weather was bad especially for farmers. Late frosts hit lambing time, rain deluged the hay crop and the harvest was ruined by thunderstorms which also killed a horse at Cote Green. But, in December, the village was enlivened by the biggest Burton story of the year when a renowned farmer Mr W Woof, of Clawthorpe Hall, was charged at Milnthorpe magistrate's court with 'obstructing a servant of the London and North Western Railway with the execution of his duty at Burton and Holme Station.' Apparently Mr Woof was 'in a bad humour' on going to

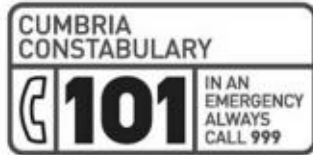
the station to collect 68 sheep at 7 pm when it was already dark. He paid the £1 fare but delayed signing the receipt until he had counted the sheep. When the ticket collector refused to release the sheep Mr Woof grappled with him, allegedly causing bruising. During the altercation Mr Woof's son let several sheep out of the pen. With the help of a borrowed lantern they were soon rounded up but Mr Woof did not sign the receipt, and ordered his employees to drive the flock through the lanes to Clawthorpe. Next day, when visited by a detective, having checked the sheep, he signed the receipt. Nevertheless, he was charged with assault where he claimed that the railway company had 'acted out of spite' because he owed them other money. But, after a 'lengthy consultation' the case was dismissed.'

Mr Woof might now have been in a better humour but Burton had a less than Merry Christmas. Typhoid broke out locally and many Burton children went down with whooping cough. Even so, Sunday School prizes were distributed by Miss Burtholme dressed as Father Christmas.

During the bitter cold 'Major Hornby gave out a generous supply of coal to widows resident in the parish' and the Church Christmas Day collection of £2:4s went to 'the sick and needy.'
