Re: Readers' Letters, Issue 279 April 2018

Whilst any letter headed "Well done Parish Council!" is welcomed I have been asked to point out that the first point made is factually inaccurate.

The Parish Council, in line with South Lakeland District Council, is unable to consider anonymous objections to, or support of, planning applications. All comments must include the planning reference number, your name and full postal address and the date.

If a resident of the Parish wishes to raise with the Parish Council a matter of planning enforcement, for example conditions of planning consent not being adhered to, or breaches of the planning rules the Parish Council may decide to investigate further and then raise the matter with South Lakeland District Council without the resident's name being forwarded.

All planning applications within the Parish are discussed at Parish Council Meetings and listed on the monthly agenda. Residents are welcome to attend meetings to voice any concerns, comments or objections for the Parish Council to consider.

J.M. Reporting from the Parish Council meeting

A member of the public commented in Open Forum that the B4RN the meeting on 18 April had been very impressive and several councillors who also attended agreed, emphasising that B4RN would not only bring ultra-fast and reliable Broadband but would also be a terrific community project. With Burtonians attending over 50 this meetina. of a fast the prospects implementation must be bright. Roger Bingham enthusiastically reported that Cumbria County Council now had a female Chair, a female CEO and a female Chief Financial Officer. Amongst topics covered at the AGM were dangerous potholes, the negative effects of M6 closures on local villages including Burton, the need for more plastic recycling, the satisfactory rating achieved from OFSTED for previously unsatisfactory Children's Services, how Cumbria compares to counties on various health issues (not very well), and drug problems across the county. Perhaps now we have some women in charge, services will improve!

Some form of commemoration is planned to celebrate the end of the First World War. A beacon poses various bureaucratic problems but Jane Hopwood is researching other ideas amongst local villages.

It makes you gasp with disbelief but the latest attempt by Cumbria Council to inspect a blocked culvert at the bottom of Boon Town Lane could not go ahead because it was blocked. What did they expect? Another culvert inspection was aborted because a previous inspection had jammed a camera in the culvert and left it there. As Paul Rogers observed, "we are all paying for this service." Over to the County Council to do better.

The response to Chris Nolan's Cumbria in Bloom initiative in Burton drew a limited response. He wants to get the School and other village groups involved. chrisnolan01@hotmail.com

Parish Clerk Christine Davidson reported that £5,000 had been received as a Community Infrastructure Levy from housing developers at Church Bank Gardens.



Spring is here and we're all very excited to see some sunshine and looking forward to spending our playtime on our school field.

At the end of March, our school came together and commemorated Easter in St James' church. This was followed by our two-week Easter holiday.

The Reception children are busy enjoying 'On Sudden Hill' a lovely book about how we learn to get along through play. They are enjoying their topic of Transport and are working hard on their Numeracy. Year 1 are enjoying learning about healthy food and then practicing their handwriting in their research. They are improving on their number bonds, phonic work, and made some fantastic Easter baskets.

Year 2 have been having fun with Claire Freedman's poetry 'Aliens Love Underpants'. They are improving on their 2s, 5s and 10 multiplications.

After our amazing visit to the quarry, Year 6 have been creating and editing leaflets to showcase how fantastic it is. Burton News Editors' Report for year ending 31 December 2017

Looking back over the last year...

There has been two changes on the Editorial Committee during 2017, as Charis Twist resigned as Treasurer to be replaced by Clive Horsford, and May Hesketh stood down as a committee member and was replaced by Christine We currently have eight Metcalfe. members as Mary Bullimore indicated her intention to stand down at this meeting, but as our Constitution allows for up to ten members you will note we are still two members short of our full complement, so if anyone feels the urge to join us, please do come forward.

We continue to be extremely satisfied with the excellent printing service from Baytype, which has resulted in a much better standard of reproduction overall, especially of the photographs. Any delays in an issue appearing were due to pressure of work on your Editors and not as a result of the printer!

Last year we retained the services of Nigel Taylor, to audit our accounts, and his guidance and support for the Treasurer and the Committee has been invaluable, and for this we thank him most heartily. Nigel stood down from this post in late 2017 and has been replaced by Dougie Bell, to whom we offer our grateful thanks.

During 2017, four issues contained 28 pages, and seven contained 32 pages. No issue was smaller than 28 pages in 2017 which, for the fourth year running, is heartening!

We are fortunate to have retained our regular columns by Roger Bingham (Roger Reports, and Historical

Footnote), the monthly Letter from the Vicar from Graham Burrows, the Parish Council report from John Mackness, and Bryan Yorke's delightful drawings and reports from the Swift Study Group. Occasional articles have also come from a number of other contributors including Alison Murphy, Anne Craig, Marion Plowright, John Mackness and Gil Caley.

Throughout the year BN has offered support and coverage of a wide range of fund-raising activities for various groups and societies within the village or undertaken by villagers for other causes. We have carried regular news & events listings from the Memorial Pre-School, Youth Club, Historical Society, the Photographic Society, the First Responders, Outdoor Bowls, Holme Cricket Club, The Rec Trust, the Children's Sports Committee, and The Burton Singers. Helena Nixon has sent in a report from the W.I. each month, and we have had info from Morewood School, Cumbria Police, the NSPCC, Carnforth Rotary, Rosemere Cancer Foundation, SLDC and Age UK.

We have covered the regular big village events such as the Daffodil and Onion Shows, and the annual Art and Craft Exhibition. We have also included information regarding the contentious development at The Cottage, and regular updates about the revamp of the Village Store. Various included local business news, and in included our December we usual roundup of Christmas events and activities plus opening times for the Village Store.

Unusually, in 2017 we covered two elections: that for the county council in May and the snap General Election in June; in the round-up for the latter we

succeeded in doing something the editor of the Westmorland Gazette claimed he couldn't do, by making contact with and obtaining a brief candidate statement from Mr Fish Finger himself!

In the October issue we included a 4page pull out survey in collaboration with Burton Memorial Hall. The level of surveys for both returns was feedback disappointing, but the received about useful us was nevertheless.

The Diary and Events listing are still receiving notices for inclusion well in advance of events, which we are sure is helpful for forward planning by many villagers. We continue to include events from some local societies who meet outside of Burton but who have village members, and we have also continued to include some events at nearby venues such as the Heron Theatre at Beetham and the miniature railway at Cinderbarrow. Several societies and groups have made a donation to BN as a thank you for including their regular events in the listings, and those donations have been much appreciated.

At the year end we had 37 advertisers, and still had an advertising waiting list of businesses from outside of the village. Adverts remain a standard 1/8 page with one remaining 1/4 page and one 1/6 of a page.

Finally, we would like to thank all our columnists and contributors, our auditor, all the members of the Committee who give help and advice to us as Editors, and for all the work they do in writing articles, keeping minutes, managing the advertisers and the money, and in getting the magazine distributed.

A big thank you to our team of distributors who turn out come rain or shine to deliver the News. To our advertisers and subscribers, and those support our annual envelope appeal for donations, we owe a huge thank you and to all the individuals, groups, events, and local businesses who financially support the ongoing provision of Burton News. And lastly but not least, to Gill and Akis in the newsagents who have carried on with being our collection point for copy for each issue. They also pass on copies to more remote villagers for us, offer copies of BN in the shop, and hold the all-important donation box for our annual appeal.

DALTONWOODLAND BURIAL GROUND

Raising awareness of environmentally friendly burials

A Cumbrian estate owner is aiming to educate people about the environmental impact of cremations and why natural burials are a more sustainable option.

Francis Mason-Hornby, owner of the Dalton Hall Estate, introduced the woodland burial ground seven years ago in a bid to offer a greener alternative to cremations. The 30 acre site is based in woodland at the foot of Dalton Crags, Burton-in-Kendal.

Francis said: "Over the years, we've found that people often aren't aware of the environmental impact of cremations. Personally, I found out about natural burial as a sustainable option through article an newspaper, it came as a surprise because I hadn't heard of it before. After reading the piece, the idea stayed with me for a while. I did some research through the Natural Death Centre and looked at introducing it to the estate.

"The main reason why people might not be aware of natural burial as an option is probably because talking about death and letting your loved ones know your own funeral wishes is typically a taboo subject. If you go back 150 years, death was a constant companion. When a loved one died, the coffin would be there in the front room for three or four days. Death was simply accepted as a natural part of life and all the funeral arrangements would have been organised within family and you would have been buried locally."

Statistics reveal that nowadays at least 70% of the UK population opt for cremation. However, it has been estimated that a typical cremation releases about 320kg of carbon dioxide equivalent into the atmosphere.

Francis is keen to spread awareness of natural burials as a greener, more environmentally friendly option.

He said: "Attitudes are changing and the word is spreading. It's the combination of people taking green issues much more seriously, coupled with the fact that more and more people are beginning to talk about death generally, such as on the radio, on TV and the recent rise of the Death Café movement. The common misconception of a natural burial is that it's a much more 'hippy' alternative than it actually is."



HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE

by Roger Bingham

A Poet's View of Burton

Burton figures quite prominently in the 'Cumberland and Westmorland' volume in the 1949 County Book series. Its author Norman Nicholson, 30 years after his death, is still often regarded as Lakeland's greatest 20th century poet. But his prose can also have a lyrical air occasionally punctured by northern bluntness.


Entering Westmorland by the train from Carnforth he observed, "a different feel of the land." Around Burton, "you are aware that the landscape is clean and washed after the grimness of central Lancashire. But soon you realise that its positive cleanness shines out of the limestone rock. The little chips that break through the soil are as white as daisies."

As Warton Cragg and Farleton Knott came into view, he observed, from the train window, "you see low hills with shelves of whiter rock arranged one above the other like rows of ivory backed books standing on green baize. Even the roads have the same clean look about them and the shining tarmac

with wide green verges and limestone walls fits happily into the landscape. When you get closer to the ploughed fields you find the surface is covered with crusts and cobbles of rock, rough like slag. The beck bottoms are choked with accidental gargoyles of limestone. The villagers of lower Kentdale collect the stones to make borders to garden paths, or even porches to front doors. I have seen monoliths and hog backs of limestone, six feet high and more propped against the walls in Burton and Holme. Many tons also have been sent Blackpool and elsewhere rockeries."

As for Burton itself, Norman observed, "small though it is, it is nevertheless a highly organised village. It does not seem to just have grown but to have been planned by an artist. Even the Square with a limestone market cross is intimate and formal. There is a box of a cobbler's shop at the corner (of Neddy Hill) so small that it would all go downstairs, upstairs, back and front into a fair sized room. The eye brows of history hang over the village like the upper rooms of the old house held up by pillars on the pavement and there is a slight quaintness in backyards and cobble side-streets."

Yet, he mused, "try to diddle any Burton

It was great yesterday (19th April) to that sunshine and feel what difference it made to the birds especially the migrants. I checked out Holme Stinted Pastures, Holme Park Fell, Farleton, Hutton Roof common, Burton Fell and Lancelot and counted no less than 38 Willow Warblers in song and that was only on my path, there could well have been over one hundred on the Hutton Roof complex as a whole, but despairingly only about 4 Chiffchaffs which at this stage appear to be well down. I would normally have counted maybe 8 by now covering the same territory! Not only was I treated to these fabulous little Warblers, but also had my first of the year Northern Greenland Wheatear which were obviously feeding would up and by probably disperse nightfall proceed on their fantastic journey towards Greenland or Iceland or even the Faroe Islands, also had my first Tree Pipit which gave me the added spectacle of a fine display by leaving the high tree and climbing in a vertical line to a high point where it then parachuted down on bowed wings whilst at the same time delivering the most beautiful of calls before it again alighted on a much lower tree. I also had my first of the year Blackcaps in Lancelot. What a day it was and not the Stonechat and foraettina the Yellowhammer.

The following couple of days also brought more migrants over the Hutton Roof complex with a further 40 Willow Warblers (bringing my total to 78), 2 Chiffchaffs and 1 Common Whitethroat

in Lancelot, another Blackcap and a Garden Warbler now in at Plain Quarry. The breeding pair of Stonechat were seen again yesterday (21st April) in Dalton Crags deforested.

The lovely weather has brought out the butterflies with several Peacocks recorded and nice to have a very early male Orange Tip, my first Comma in Lancelot and a Brimstone in Plain Quarry Car Park.

I am told from a good source (the Warden) that Whitbarrow (Hervey Reserve) had their first Cuckoo arrival yesterday (19th April) which is quite early, we normally get ours up on Dalton Crags around the last few days of April or a regular date is the 1st May. More great news I learnt was that the first of our local Redstarts arrived back just off Dalton Lane on the 18th, thanks to Alec for letting me know. Robert from Kendal sent me his report for the 19th when he had 2 Blackcaps singing away at Plain Quarry and also a further 3 Tree Pipits in Dalton Crags.

Earlier notes: looking back over the month the first Wheatear (Eurasian) was reported over at Farleton on 25th March (thanks to Steve M), I had a "Herd of Whiteness" with 16 Whooper Swans heading NW over Farleton on 29th March, my first Chiffchaff calling in Holme Stinted Pastures on 29th March. Had my first two Swallows on the lines at Cowan Bridge on 9th April and also my first Willow Warbler on Holme Stints on the same day. Also an extremely early record of the first House Martin returned to Dalton Hall on that same day. I had 2 Brambling in Lower Dalton Crags and also another Chiffchaff from population was Plain Quarry recorded. Also on the 13th Victor (Chiffchaff) back from just arrived behind Vicarage Lane (thanks Mary).

Also another Chiffchaff on the canal was heard on 18th (thanks Sandra).

I have found some more of the rare Daphne Mezereone up on Holme Stinted Pastures, just starting to go over, but still managed a lovely photo or two and will obviously keep my eye on this for next year.

Some of our beautiful local woods are beginning to get carpeted with lovely Wood Anemone and Bluebells and populations of Herb Paris are starting to show. The Early Purple Orchids are about three week away yet but building good rosettes. Can you believe far South of England and the plants are already out at their best!

"So where are the Swallows today, yesterday and everyday,

FRED WHITTON CHALLENGE 2018

I will be taking part in the Saddleback Fred Whitton Challenge on 13 May 2018. The Fred Whitton Challenge is one of the most popular cycling sportives in the UK and is also famed as being particularly difficult. Riders rank it alongside European events such as the Marmotte in terms of difficulty. The Fred Whitton Challenge consists of a 112 mile sportive around the Lake District, starting at Grasmere and taking climbs of Kirkstone, Honister, Newlands. Whinlatter, Hardknott Wrynose passes. As the name suggests, it is run in honour of Fred Whitton. Fred, who died aged just 50 in 1998. was an extremely popular member of the Lakes Road Club.

The very top riders complete the route in just under six hours but eleven hours and over are not uncommon for the average Sportive rider.

Training for 'the Fred.' Like a marathon, 'the Fred' requires a commitment to train and to get some miles in before taking on the challenge and finishing it. At the start of the year I subconsciously set myself a target of riding a minimum of 100 miles per week with 19 weeks to the event.

The training plan didn't start well with no miles ridden in the first week of January and a further 268 miles achieved by the end of January. I completed 300 miles in the wintry conditions during February. Training resulted in a mixture of the Wattbike in the gym at work and a few miles on the open road. The 65 mile Coal Road Challenge Reliability Ride organised by Lune RCC on 25 February was an early season test in the freezing conditions and snow covered Coal Road on the Garsdale Head side.

The wintry conditions continued into March and once again I had a week where I completed no miles. Despite this setback I did manage to complete 376 training miles during March. On 15 April I took part in the Forest of Bowland 'Epic' Sportive starting and finishing at the J36 Rural Auction Centre. The 100 mile 'Epic' route has an elevation gain of over 8,000 feet taking in the climbs of Jubilee Tower, Waddington Fell and Cross of Greet from Slaidburn. A great test, for the big one next month which I completed in a little over 8 hours official time.

With four weeks to go to 'the Fred' I have now completed 1,453 miles since the start of the year, just 47 miles under my target of 100 miles per week after 15 weeks.


