

## **Our Local Butcher**

For some time now there have been complaints from a small number of residents in Cocking Yard about the At Burton News we butcher's shop. have been drawn into this because of a report we carried in the August issue (not seen by the Committee before publication), where we reported, quite faithfully, damaging comments about the shop by one or two councillors. The meeting was attended by a number of residents who also laid some complaints. What we reported was of course simply what was said at the meeting.

One complaint was that the shop has been turned into a 'wholesale supplier'. It is true that the shop does supply a small number of traders but does so only because the profit from that supports the shop which otherwise would have to close. John Unsworth, the Butcher, keeps this trade to the minimum needed maintain to his business. The business is owned by Nathan Brown.

The other complaint concerns noise and smells from the business. The Butcher ensures that the traders, who come early in the morning, transfer the meat rapidly to avoid any deterioration in their quality and with the minimum of

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noise. So far as smells are concerned, John Unsworth uses a pressure washer to clean the area outside the shop after every delivery.

Over a long period of time SLDC officers have made unannounced visits to the shop. This is standard practice. They have examined every aspect of the shop, including the small wholesale aspect. At no time have they found evidence to sustain any of the complaints and have told the Butcher that he does not need to make any changes in his practice.

We are very pleased to hear the assurances from John Unsworth about the proper conduct of the business and wish the Butcher's shop a long and successful stay in the village.

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## PC Observations...

of the Parish Council meeting by J.M.

Sarah Colyer was in the chair for September's meeting and she summarised the Police Report which included burglaries in Morewood Drive and Burton Park. This is unusual for Burton, so the message is to be vigilant and report any suspicious activity including cold calling using the 101 service.

In the Open Forum. Mike Iddon updated councillors on the latest news about the 1000-megabyte B4RN Rural Broadband that is on its way to Burton hopefully by Spring 2019. Currently the B4RN team is completing 'wayleave' permission to cross Burton from east to west on its way to Yealand. Mike reported that they are 95% there but still waiting for one or two households to grant permission. The route comes down through the school who will be able to dramatically improve its capacity for access to digital resources and save money on a BT phone line. This is also an exciting development for all Burton users as it will provide those connected with the world's fastest broadband service. It will also increase the value of housing stock in Burton as house prices are increasingly affected by broadband speeds.

Roger Bingham and Tom Harvey, two of Burton's district councillors were present. Roger said that council activity had been 'stone dead' in August, but he did report that a recent Quarry Liaison Meeting (parish councillor Jane Hopwood also attended) had been very Promises of money to help positive. with flood relief, drain maintenance and resurfacing the A6070 were made as the quarry is now predicted to continue operations to 2043. Jane Hopwood reported that complaints have been received about the impact of blasting on properties closest to the guarry. The blasts are well within legal limits and apparently no one is sure why the effects on 4 houses have been so severe.

Roger also reported that the SLDC was concerned about bridges at Hutton Roof and Crooklands and the effects of the recent bridge problems on the M6 which created jams on the motorway. Tom Harvey reported that hopefully the support SLDC for Burton's conservation area improvements would start to have effect as the partnership with Burton Parish Council and Heritage England gets going.

Amongst other issues discussed:

• Chris Nolan reported that the Burton Flood Defence Forum was underway. Anyone wanting sandbags should




# BURTON W.I.

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## 1914-18 - COMMEMORATION

In 2014 Holme & District Local History Society with the generous support of the Heritage Lottery Fund mounted an exhibition to commemorate the soldiers Burton-in-Kendal. of Holme and Beetham. The exhibition was held in both BMH and Holme Parish Hall in October/November 2014. Geoff Pegg, Kath Hayhurst and Dorothy Spencer did a great deal of research and produced three books documenting the soldiers of the three villages. Geoff also wrote and produced a great play: The Holme Front.

Now, 100 years after the end of the War, we wish to look at three aspects of the commemoration of the "War to end all wars" with reference to our local area.

#### 1. THE POPPY

An enduring view of the Great War is muddy, freezing, trench warfare: it is a true image but not always and not everywhere. Many soldiers on the Western Front have written of "...the crimson poppies...undaunted by the desolation, heedless of human fury and stupidity, Flanders poppies, basking in the sun" (Cecil Lewis). Some made the connection between the blood-red colour of the poppy and the blood spilled on the battlefields but to others the poppy became a symbol of regeneration and the renewal of nature. Poppies conveyed a dual aspect – a connection with beauty and youth but also, with their fast-fading flowers, a feeling of the brevity of life.

Ironically, before the War the fields of Flanders lacked the appropriate minerals for poppies to grow well but after the devastation brought about by the war they flourished.

Writing after he had buried his friend, Canadian Lieutenant-Colonel John McRae of the Canadian Army Medical Corps wrote his famous poem *In Flanders Fields* beginning:

"In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row That mark our place...."

The poem was published by Punch in December 1915 and was an immediate sensation: in Britain the corn poppy of Flanders became the symbol of the war dead.

In 1921 Anna E. Guerin began making silk poppies in Paris and took samples to Colonel Heath, general secretary of the newly-founded British Legion, as a possible fund-raising emblem. Britain's first Poppy Day was held on 1 November 1921 (and raised £106,000





- the equivalent of £3.6 million today).

The local dimension

In 1978 there was a switch from silk to paper for the poppy. James Cropper of Burneside, Kendal, produced the red paper for the Royal British Legion – and still does – at cost. It is a lengthy operation for paper for 40 million or more poppies is required.

According to Cropper's the paper needs to be waterproof (no red dye must get on clothing!), and the colour must not fade. Later a green leaf was added.

The poppies themselves are assembled in Richmond, Surrey by disabled veterans and home workers. The poppies are shipped to approx. 88 different countries.

In 2014 the Acting Head of Remembrance at the Royal British Legion said: "The poppy is not a symbol of blood, politics or religion: it is a way of remembering but also hoping for a better future"

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## BURTON MOREWOOD SCHOOL

We have been so busy in school and it is only our third week back. In our topic work we have been learning about World War II and alongside this we have started to read *Goodnight Mr. Tom* by Michelle Magorian; a story about a boy evacuated to the countryside from London. We have been enjoying our IT work on our new computers and our maths focus has been place value.

Year 5's Science lessons have been looking at different types of materials. Their topic is Victorians and through their Art they have been learning about the Victorian artist William Morris. Maths lessons have been focused on rounding up and down and also on ordering. In English they have been looking at how to structure a story. They have enjoyed creating a maze using a program called 'Scratch' in ICT.

The Tudors are Year 4's topic - they have been learning about the War of the Roses, and what a busy man Henry VIII was. In English they have been looking at classic poetry, and in RE new beginnings. In Maths, like the Year 6, they have been focusing on place value. They have had fun in their Science lessons studying sound inside and outside the school and have made their own 'telephones' with cups and string.

Alongside Year 4, Year 3 are studying the Tudors. In Maths they have been improving their mental maths skills and also their times tables, and have been working hard on prefixes in English. They have been looking at what it means to have a balanced diet, and enjoying the fresh air with some tag rugby.

Year 2 have been looking at how to split their numbers into tens and units, and counting up and down in 2s. Thev about enioved reading have The Gingerbread Man, including acting out the story, sequencing the story and making gingerbread men, following step-by-step instructions. Topic time has been spent looking at the Great Fire of London and in D&T they have made 3D houses from a 2D net. Their self-portraits are now on display.

In English Year 1 have been creating stories about their teddies and in Maths they have been looking at numbers and the patterns they can create. In Science they enjoyed a nature walk observing man-made and natural materials.

Our new Reception children have been amazing getting used to a whole day at school. They have been working hard on their phonics and enjoying counting. They watched a movie about their exciting new outdoor play area which is currently being built, and were able to talk to the builders. They also had fun drawing what they would put in their own playgrounds.

# Roger Reports...

#### From the County & District Councils

Following the August inertia the councils' main meetings had hardly got going before the deadline for Burton News. Even so we had a busy county council on 5 September, which was brought forward on account of the scheduled clashing with the Westmorland County Show Day on the 13<sup>th</sup>. It took me about 20 years to persuade our Carlisle-centric officials to realise the importance for the whole county of 'our show' which is, probably, the biggest one day agricultural event in the country. Even then they got it wrong as 'they' had not realised the Show is held on the second Thursday of September so the council could have been held on Wednesday 12th. Even so, this trivial ignorance, reveals the difficulty of keeping local government local.

Keeping in touch will be exasperated if larger unitary authorities come in. These would involve - the dissolution of district councils, and their and county functions being combined. This has happened recently in Northampton and some 20 years ago in Durham. Blackburn and Blackpool. An impetus could be the decline in district functions. When nearly 40 years ago I

(the youngest!) became district councillor SLDC ran 6,000 council houses, leisure and tourism including Grange Baths, the Leisure Centre, numerous playgrounds everywhere and about 50 public toilets. Most of the toilets have gone or been taken over by parish and town councils and other duties have long since been contracted to companies like South Lakes Housing.

Virtually, the only major district services left are most of planning and waste collection. But these functions are mixed as the county is responsible for waste disposal tips - AKA Civic Amenity Sites while the county's Development Control and Regulation Committee deal, with planning for footpaths and quarries. Even so our recent Quarry Liaison Meeting was attended by both county and district officials. Perhaps a unitary authority would half the officer attendance.

Happily, relations between Holme Park Quarry and the community are generally positive. Even so several





properties have been disturbed bv blasts and one has had repeated vibration damage to double glazing. But, the number of neighbourhood complaints reduced. Recent has planning permission to continue quarrying until 2043 will soon be implemented. The quarry is to contribute £5,000 (index linked) to maintain the A6070. Requests have been made for improved Go Slow HGV signs near the quarry entrance and £100,000 flood relief plans are being considered. The quarry will continue to control the lorry restrictions on using the A6070 through Main Street. At the first error the driver will be banned for seven days and could incur permanent bans for extra errors.

the transportation On Highways working group has approved highways resurfacing etc for Drovers Way and when the flood abatement discussions -(which are going well) - are completed there will be further drainage work in the problem areas around the village. Beyond our borders the A65 is to be resurfaced - so expect hold-ups. I'm still pressing the county Highways Department to repair Crooklands Bridge and send the bill to the canal authority, which owns the bridge, but which invariably delays action until it is about to collapse.

Meanwhile we have received good news that Cumbria primary schools' performance which was 4% behind the average for England in now almost up to National Standard. In South Lakeland most primary and secondary schools are already average, good or outstanding.





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# VICAR'S LETTER...

#### Dogger

Have you read *Dogger* by Shirley Hughes? I asked just that in a school assembly this week and I was surprised that so many of the children had read the book - *Dogger* was published in 1977 while I was still at school!

The book always brings a lump to my throat because of the extraordinary kindness of Bella as she resolves the problem that has engulfed her little brother. Dave has lost Dogger, his dearly loved soft-toy dog and no-one can find Dogger anywhere. Dave is still very sad on the day of the school summer fair when, suddenly, on the toy stall, he spots his beloved Dogger with a price tag on him: 5p. Dave only has can't make anvone 3p and he understand that Dogger is really his and shouldn't be for sale. Eventually he finds big sister Bella. She has been having a great day and has even won first prize in the raffle, a huge yellow teddy bear with a beautiful blue silk bow. Bella and Dave rush to the toy stall but they are too late; Dogger has just been bought by a little girl who now refuses to sell him again despite Bella's

pleading. Dave cries. The little girl cries and then she catches sight of Bella's big yellow teddy and puts out her hand to stroke his beautiful blue silk bow. *"Then Bella did something very kind ..."* 

I can't say more in case you haven't read the story.

I don't know what Shirley Hughes intended when she wrote the book but if anyone wanted to picture Jesus Christ's extraordinary kindness towards us then it would be hard to better this. Bella found a way to rescue Dogger for Dave but it cost her dearly. Jesus Christ found a way to be able to rescue you and me from our self-destructive rebellion against our Creator but he paid a heavy price; the cost was his life.

As 11 November approaches remember Jesus' words, "Greater love has no-one than this, that he lay down his life for his friends." If you remember who Jesus is and the agonising depths of his suffering on the cross, then this really means "No-one has ever loved you as Jesus did."

# HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE

#### by Roger Bingham

#### SALE AT THE VICARAGE 1915

Into the twentieth century Church of England Vicars were regarded as belonging to the gentry. Burton's Vicarage, built - at a cost of £900 - in 1844, by the Rev Morewood was, after Burton House, the second largest residence in the parish. Fortunately he enjoyed a private income to subsidise his stipend of £200 pa.

An indication of its lavish accommodation was provided by I.K. Kilshaw's advertisement of 'the highly important Auction Sale' ordered, in 1915, by Mrs Monks, the late Vicar's widow, 'of the entire costly and well chosen Furnishings' of the Vicarage. In room order, they included:-

Bedrooms: Painted Bedroom Suite. Brass Mounted Bedstead with Box Mattress, Wool mattress. Spring Bedside Cupboard, Iron Bedstead with straw Mattresses, Bamboo Table. Folding Bed Chair, White Enamelled Corner Cupboard, Painted Dressing Table, toilet Mirrors, Chamber-ware, Carpets, Fenders, Gas Fire, Pictures, Texts etc. 12 yards of Stairs Carpet, Brass Stairs Rods, Curtains etc.

Drawing Room: Walnut Suite upholstered in tapestry. Walnut Occasional Table, Walnut Cabinet, Coal Hearthrug, vases. Carpet. Brass Mounted curb and Brass Fire International Library of Implements, famous literature in Bookcase complete; pictures including several Stippled engravings printed in colour by Bartolozzi, etc Ornaments, Vases etc; Casement Curtains and Brass Rods, Upright Pianoforte, by Chappell & Co.

Dining Room: Oak Table. Oak Occasional Table, Over-mantle. Harmonium, set of Four Print Engravings 'Elmer Keene' and other Pictures, Brass Mounted Curb and Fire Irons, Coal Vase etc.

Library: Two sets of Bookshelves, Two Wicker Arm Chairs, Mahogany Kneehole desk, Arm Chair, Bamboo Table, Fender and Fire Implements. Coal Vases. Gas Bracket and fittings. Pictured, Ash Pan, Linoleum etc..

Hall: Small Side Table, Hall Stand, Fumed Oak Umbrella Stand. 3 Bentwood Chairs, Pictures, 15 yards of Cocoanut Matting.

Kitchen: Kitchen Table, 4 Windsor Chairs, Pot Rail, Coal Box, Steel top Fender, Clothes Maid, 4 Metal Dish Covers, Blue and White Dinner Service



complete and Pots, Pans, Brushes etc, Wringing Machine, Washing Tubs, Dolly Legs etc Lawn Mower, Garden Tool etc.

Most of the furniture was new when the late Rev Gilbert Monks came to Burton a short time ago.

After this we have the older ones disco (yr3 vr6) this is one where the children can be signed in and dropped off and they enjoy a couple of hours with their friends. This is a great event for the children and we look forward to seeing lots of them there.



British Summer Time Ends Put your clocks back on Sunday 28 October







There has been a lot going on during September with the very ambitious Farleton and Hutton Roof Festival which had lots of great activities on our own doorstep. Also for me September has been the start to the visible bird migration and I have been out and "up with the birds" on most days, identifying and counting birds has they fly the skies above Vicarage Lane.

Swallows migrating this year have been so interesting and never before have I seen and counted so many heading over our village. Although this sounds great (and it is great), but this is not to say they have been more successful with their breeding, in fact if anything the early authoritive reports are already stating that the Swallow numbers could be well down on previous years. I had 1,008 Swallows over a three and a half hour period, which makes you wonder just how many actually did go through on the full day! I also went up again to the watch point at the top of Vicarage Lane later in the afternoon and they were still going through, it must have been a full day passage which is rarely seen because, as a rule the birds would be passing but high into the

clouds, and because of that you would normally miss them. So why were the birds so low down and easily counted. Well looking at the weather on the day you would have thought they might have given the day a miss but NO. It was on Tuesday 18 September they had made up their minds to go, although the weather was atrocious with southerly winds of up to 30 to 40 miles per hour and raining throughout. But for some unknown reason they must have felt the need to go! And because of the conditions it brought the birds down to a low visible level with some just brushing past you and you felt their down draught against your face as they went past.

The earliest Autumn migration birds to enter our country are the Pink Footed Geese which come all the way from Iceland. This year I had my first 35 over the village on 12 September, but it was the 16 September that proved to be the best counts when I had 637 in at least 10 skeins. I counted them from the top of Vicarage Lane, although their passage seem miles away and from somewhere come near to Killington (behind the Farleton) where they were seen heading west to somewhere around Barrow (I guess) where they then headed directly South and over Morecambe Bay. The same birds were picked up again by others at the Heysham Bird Observatory.



Whilst doing a led walk last Saturday (15 September), we had just entered Dalton Crags from the Plain Quarry car park and found this beautiful array of puffball fungi. It was the arrangement that took everyone by surprise, somebody in the party remarked just how it looked so much like a lawyer's wig.



Plenty of Red Admiral **Butterflies** around on the sunny days and now starting to make their way south. It's been good seeing the Small Tortoishell butterflies recovering well and this year has probably been their best for some twenty years. The wasp seem to be plentiful and seen on the many ivy plants along with hover flies, it will be interesting to watch them when the colder weather comes through to see if they will again migrate east/south east following the hedgerow on Vicarage Lane, there can be hundreds of them seen following this route in a continual

migration of sorts. It will be watched with interest.

So what can we expect in October: well I am sure there will be thousands of thrushes which will mainly be Redwing and Fieldfare but to a lesser degree we get lots of Continental will also Blackbirds. Song Thrushes (| am alreadv recording these since 13 September) and Mistle Thrushes. Also there will be lots and lots of continental finches which, if we are lucky, will include some Brambling and besides these we may even get rarities like Snow Bunting and Lapland Bunting passing through. Will this be another year when we get high numbers of Waxwing? Well this all depends on just what the weather is like in Scandinavia from where they come. One thing for sure we will get plenty of starlings (up to 100K) making their way to Leighton Moss throughout October, normally peaking around the 25<sup>th</sup>, the birds will have come from the Baltic together with birds from the Netherlands and other eastern destinations.
