

# NO PARISH COUNCIL REPORT THIS MONTH

# **FLOODING**

Review of the Flood Forum meeting of 23 October 2018

The meeting was chaired by Cumbria County Council flood resilience manager, Mr Doug Coyle and a presentation by Mr Colin Parks. Also in attendance was Ms Carol Last, Community Liaison officer and Ms Emma Shield.

The meeting was attended by some 30 members of the public representing the village of Burton and Dalton. Available was a copy of the updated report of the findings, which listed works carried out to date and what was still to be carried out. Also in the report are statistics and pictures of the flooded areas and rain fall on the dates of the floods. The report also lists who is responsible for each element of the works going forward. The report does not say exactly when or where works are to be carried out as it all comes down to funding.

Unfortunately, the funding applied for in July of this year has been turned down and another application can not be submitted until July of 2019. Funding was turned down as it is considered that Burton and area are not a high enough risk. Works carried out in Burton will only affect a few houses, so monies have been diverted to other areas that will protect a greater number of homes. When asked where does that leave Burton, we were told to turn to our own community and work together. When asked about funding for these works we were told, "there is no council funding for these works".

Various members of the audience asked about the bigger picture of what the future plans may hold. We were informed that "at this stage surveys are still being carried out, and until complete, no definitive plans could be made", however, ideas were offered by the audience. These have been noted down by the Council members and taken away.

The issue of gullies, culverts and drains generally still being blocked was raised and that joined-up thinking was required to ensure that the roads were swept, the gullies, culverts and drains cleared and at the same time the survey of these drains be carried out as all this work needs to be done under

the protection of traffic lights. This was taken on board as positive plan by the Council. It was promised that all this work would be carried out in two weeks time. Burton Flood Forum co coordinator, Chris Nolan, will be notified of the exact date so these works can be monitored.

In summary, the meeting was well attended and good points made by the audience and the points noted by the Council. We did not learn anything new however which was a little annoying. The Council were thanked by various members of the audience for their efforts so far. One or two points raised heated exchanges from the floor. These items have been noted by Chris Nolan who will take action to address.

# **UPDATE**

The 3 year Burton PSiCA Project has started preliminary work ahead of the January 2019 start date.

Just a reminder to everyone, the Parish Council is in partnership with SLDC and Historic England and the PSiCA project aims to provide improvements in the Conservation Area. This includes improvements in The Square, grant aiding the repair of a number of listed historic properties and the preparation Village of а Design Statement and a number of community workshops/talks.

The 3 main partners have formed a 'Key Stakeholders Group' together with the appointed architects and Cumbria County Council. The KSG will meet regularly and will keep the community updated and also feed back from the community into the KSG.

SLDC's Conservation Officer is sending letters out to some of the owners of listed or historic buildings in the Conservation Area to briefly explain the scheme, the significance of their building within the scheme and to ask permission for the appointed

architects/engineers to carry out surveys in order that costings for repair works can be undertaken and the level of support which can be offered for repair works to be determined.

At the same time, the architects, Crosby Granger, will be surveying the Public Realm area, i.e. The Square, and preparing a scheme and ideas for public consultation which is scheduled to take place either December or January. Cumbria County Council will be consultees to the scheme, and any flood relief or other works in the Highway will be taken into consideration during the planning stage.

Crosby Granger will also be starting work on a Village Design Statement (prepared as a Planning Guidance) to help influence the design and quality of future building in Burton-in-Kendal. There will be a workshop for this, probably in February 2019.

CAfS (Community Action for Sustainability) will be appointed to workshops deliver talks and on heritage/sustainability topics and deliver 5 or 6 workshops to the There will be a Design community. Workshop day delivered by the RIBA Places Matter and Crosby Granger Architects.

### A MEMORY – THE LAST OF THE LINE

## Sheila Lois Margaret Bainbridge 1922 - 2018

Preston North End had not had much success in 1922 until the afternoon of March 18th when striker Archie Rawlings scored a winner. Aunty Maggie was within earshot of the mighty cheer at the very moment my Sheila Lois Margaret Bainbridge was born. It was the beginning of a life full of interests along with a dogged determination to protect and perpetuate the long family history. Her life ended peacefully on the afternoon of Wednesday 26 September 2018 with her loyal and devoted Carers in attendance.

Sheila's father, Thomas Bainbridge was one of seven children whose father Thomas, farmed at Greenlands, Tewitfield. Her mother, Margaret was the only child of the second marriage of Robert Wilson. The Wilson family lived in Burton for over five centuries and owned quite a number of properties in the village. Thomas and Margaret were married in St James Church and started their married life in Rochdale. After eight years, they returned to Burton with Sheila and her younger brother Keith who lived at 'Hemplands' and died on 26 July, 2014. The family lived from here on with their Wilson grandparents at Hordley House; a property inherited by Margaret and finally by Sheila and so ends the Wilson dynasty.

The house and grounds date back to the 17<sup>th</sup> century. Alterations and additions were made in 1800. property and land was sold by John Porter of Goosenargh to Laurence Parkinson of Burton-in-Kendal for the sum of £172. Laurence Parkinson was described as a 'Writing Master of Accounts'. A title deed, dated February 1731 stated that the property and land was known by the name of Hordley on the west side of the King's Street. The sum of £172 was paid in lawful British money, signed and sealed in the reign of His Majesty King George II by John Porter and witnesses.

In 1800, the Coach House was built, Hordley House was altered and at the same time the walled garden was created. Much of the ground was taken over with a shrubbery, a tennis court and box hedges around the flower beds. Every tree had a story to tell. A Holm evergreen oak remains of which there are few remaining in the country. So many eyes have gazed through the gate of "The Enchanted Garden". Sheila spent many hours tending the garden. It is a place in which to enjoy peace and tranquillity and the sound of nature.

In the aftermath of the Jacobite march south, tales were told of Highland soldiers hiding in local houses and Bonnie Prince Charlie calling in on his way south through Burton.

Being last in the line, Sheila inherited the last few family properties in the village but it was the well-being of her tenants and their families which were more important to her than bricks and mortar.

From the outset, Sheila had a great love of learning. Her early years were filled with books; writing; collecting and observing the nature around her. Encouraged by her mother, she made good progress through the local school and Kendal Grammar School. Journalism was her chosen career which she pursued at a local level. Her contributions were published in The Westmorland Gazette. As a keen

stamp collector, her articles were also welcomed by Philatelic Journals.

Sheila had many friends, young and old. A love of the countryside and its wild indigenous animals, preservation and conservation were shared with the late Mr Francis Shrigley-Feigl of Cragg hall Wray. He constructed observation hides at Hale Moss where Aunty Maggie, Keith and Sheila spent many hours viewing alongside him.

There were regular visits from family friend Mr Alfred Wainwright. I expect they discussed walks but their common interest was also cats. Those feline friends lie today in their own sacred spot within "The Enchanted Garden". Nelson, an early arrival was one of a batch of kittens belonging to the mother of her dear friend Dorothy Woodhead.

Sheila was a loyal gem of a friend, a patient listener and an interesting raconteur. She was also a firm believer in "the hand of fate". Her conversation was never dull. It could be enlightening, historical or dramatic with a touch of the unexpected. Her friends meant so much to her and their birthdays were never forgotten. That was her life and she will be sorely missed.



day to day life of a Tudor from the food they ate, crime and punishment to The Plague. Many people have heard of the Black Death of 1348 and the Great Plague of 1665, both killing thousands of Londoners, but these famous outbreaks are only two of nearly 40 that London suffered between the 1300's and 1600's.

They created the Tudor Rose, reenacted the travels of Sir Francis Drake and also learnt a Tudor dance.

In literacy Year 4 have been writing mystery stories for a competition. In maths they have been measuring angles and lines. They are still studying sound in science — looking at how sound travels and the importance of ear defenders! They are still enjoying their tag rugby in their PE lessons.

Year 3 have been looking at vertical partitioning in their maths and have been learning two new terms: augend and addend. When adding two numbers together, the first number is known as the augend and the number added to it is known as the addend. In science they have been looking at the digestive system from start to finish!

Year 2 have been counting up and down in 2s, 5s and 10s and continuing their work on place value. They are

working hard on their cursive handwriting and also learning about nouns and adjectives for their Big Write on their favourite places to visit. In literacy Year 1 have been enjoying reading 'Not a Stick' and in maths they have been looking at number bonds. In art they have been studying supermachines and have had great fun painting them.

### From the County & District Councils

We have not had a county or a district full council since last I reported. But Cumbria's South Area Committee has been particularly busy with highways. Apart from the Drovers Way resurfacing I have no more important Burton schemes to mention, as the 2019-20 list has not been compiled. growing out of gullies (drains) on Church Bank/Main Street is temporary traffic lights have to be used because of the central white lines. I have asked that lights should be allocated on one duay to several neighbouring sites where they are required so that - as each job and moving time takes about an hour. several awkward gullies could cleansed in one day. Also, in a recent survey they have found out that the number of registered gullies in the county have increased from 1001 to 1430. I and other members supported a move for the county to enforce owners of land (mainly domestic gardens) to cut their hedges back and also clear any verge drainage runways. According to my historical records this has been the local occupier's responsibility since at least at 1691. On another tack it was noted that the Great North Cycle Run had boosted visitor numbers, but that prolonged closure of the Windermere Ferry and problems on the Lakes Line have harmed the tourist-related economy. #### 2. POETRY AND REMEMBRANCE

There are hundreds of poems written about the First World War by combatants and non-combatants alike.

The attitudes and views expressed vary considerably from the optimistic, sentimental or patriotic -

"And they are fortunate, who fight" (Siegfried Sassoon);

to the realistic depiction of fighting and the horrors of warfare; and bitter satire: "Happy are men who yet before they are killed Can let their veins run cold..." (Wilfred Owen: 'Insensibility') and "The air is loud with death,

The dark air spurts with fire..." (Isaac Rosenberg: 'Dead Man's Dump')

Although the War is remote in time now, there is a considerable interest in the poetry, particularly of poets such as Sassoon. Rosenberg and though others such as Rupert Brooke, Rudyard Kipling, Charles Sorlev. Blunden, Edmund Robert Graves. Edward Thomas, etc. etc have their devotees.

Is it possible to establish the "best" poet or the "best" poem of the War? Of course not, for opinions will be so divergent; however...

#### The local dimension

In November 1990 Gil and I went to a talk in the Chapel of the King's Own Royal Regiment, the Priory Church, Lancaster. The talk was given by Dr Jean Moorcroft Wilson who had written a biography: 'Isaac Rosenberg – The Making of a Great War Poet'. In her talk she said that Rosenberg had some connection with Lancaster, though not directly, as he had never visited the city

but at some time had been in the bantam battalion (for men under 5' 3"), the 11th bt The King's Own Royal Lancaster Regiment. (He was killed on the Somme on 1 April 1918). Further, she said that there should be a statue to Rosenberg in Lancaster as, she said, there is no other poet of note from the city. Gil and I looked at each other with some disbelief, for, not more than a few hundred yards from the Priory Church is the birthplace of the writer of probably the most famous verse about the First World War in the English-speaking world.

I refer, of course, to Laurence Binyon. At No. 1 High Street, Lancaster is this stone memorial:

LAURENCE BINYON
POET AND SCHOLAR
1869 - 1943
WAS BORN AT NO. 1 HIGH STREET
ON 10TH AUGUST 1869

He studied at Oxford and after graduating took up a post at The British Museum, while continuing his interest in poetry. He married in 1904 and had three children. On the outbreak of the war he was 44 years old (too old to enlist) and, being moved by the numbers of casualties, wrote 'For The Fallen' (1914), the fourth stanza of which is most famous. In 1915/6 he went to France as a hospital orderly. After the war ended he returned to The British Museum and later (1933/4) was Professor Poetry at Harvard of University.

So – what is the poem? I expect you have all guessed by now. The first line is often misquoted (most recently in the title of Peter Jackson's recent film which re-masters First World War moving film) but is often recited at Remembrance Services in the UK.

Canada, Australia and New Zealand. Here is what he wrote in the fourth stanza:

"They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old:

Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn.

At the going down of the sun and in the morning

We will remember them."

In 1985 he was among 16 poets of the Great War to be commemorated in Poets' Corner in Westminster Abbey.

# VICAR'S LETTER...

## Finger-Lickin' Good News

A white moustache and goatee, thickframed glasses and a string tie, he is now world-famous for his restaurants. But not everything went well for the young Harland Sanders. When he was only 5, his father died. Later he argued with his step-father and left home. He worked on a farm, then briefly joined the army. He was fired from several jobs for fighting and was well known for his constant swearing. By the age of 40 he had a petrol station and was trying to provide for his family through the Great Depression. Setting up the old family dining table and chairs in a corner of the petrol station he started selling food. One of his best meals was fried chicken and Harland developed a novel pressurefryer and his still-secret blend of 11 herbs and spices. Eventually 'Colonel' Sanders began to sell franchises - the first 'Kentucky Fried Chicken' opened in Utah in 1952. There are now 22,000 worldwide.

Even after he sold the business Sanders continued to be the instantly-recognisable face in the KFC advertisements, but as he grew older he knew something was wrong. He later wrote, "If God created the world –

and I know He done that – and I am part of His creation, then I should have a close relationship with Him. I didn't and it bothered me ... all the success I'd had with my franchising business ... still left me with a hollow feelin' ... I was a good citizen and all that. But all this while I knew I wasn't right with God."

He was persuaded to go a church meeting where it dawned on him that this was exactly the mission of Jesus – to take on himself the weight of our guilt and so to put us right with the God who made us. Sanders began to put his trust in Jesus rather than in his own effort to be good enough.

It "just seemed like a great burden was lifted off my shoulders. I'd never felt anything like that before, and here I was seventy-nine years old."

Colonel Sanders continued, "I pray to God Almighty my story will encourage you also to commit your life to Jesus. If you will, no matter what hard times you may go through – if you keep turning to Him, acknowledging Him, and honouring Him in all you do – He'll help you through."



# THE ARMISTICE -**Burton Celebrates and Mourns 100 YEARS AGO**

Throughout the district and (as the Westmorland Gazette put it), Empire", the Armistice - which, on Monday 11 November at 11 am, ended, in effect, the fighting in the First World War, was celebrated enthusiastically in Burton. As it was still some years before domestic 'wireless' came in and there very few telephones in the village the glad tidings arrived, at about 11.30am, via a telegram to the Post "Armistice stating. signed: hostilities ceased : Secretary to the GPO, London". Then, as word sped round, flags and bunting were soon displayed on almost every house including, it was noted, on the homes of the 'fallen'.

At the National and Morewood Schools loud and hearty cheers were given for the King, army and navy, followed by the National Anthem; after which the pupils had the afternoon off. But, "at Burton the rejoicings were postponed until Tuesday evening when fireworks of all descriptions were let off in all directions. Lieut. F. Bainbridge supplied music on the gramophone for dancing

in the open air. To finish the evening an impromptu band paraded the streets singing songs of the allies."

At a Victory Service, the Vicar, The Rev. H.V. Urquart chose the hymns, "All People that on Earth do Dwell," "Thy Way not Ours O Lord" and "Art Thou Weary", which no doubt echoed the mixed feelings of the time. Indeed, the Armistice did not bring an end to the **Amongst** mourning. the announced in the Gazette in the next two weeks were the Victoria Cross winner, the Rev Theodore Hardy, Vicar of Hutton Roof, and Captain Willink from Burneside who was also the sonin-law of Westmorland's M.P. Colonel Weston.

Burton's recent war dead included Driver Michael McGrath. "He was with Mrs Bindloss at Hilderstone Farm for two and a half years before enlisting. Death was due to pneumonia. He was 23." Days later a "Burton Air Ace" also died. He was Cadet Leonard H. Nutter from Thorny Croft, Burton. An Old Boy of Heversham Grammar School he had been one of the best football and cricket players in the district. Before the war he was for two years a Bank Clerk at Liverpool. Though he was an airman like Driver McGrath. died pneumonia brought on by influenza, a contagion which eventually killed more people than who had died in the War.

I guess all I can write about this month is on the subject of Birds and more particular visible bird migration taking place over our village. It's that time of year for me when all spare time is devoted to visible bird migration counts which I am usually taking stock from Mike Taylor's fields off Vicarage Lane, from first light (at the moment about 07.30hrs) for up to four hours each morning from the middle of September until around the middle of November, and unless there are any emergency family issues that's where I will be.

strange It's been sort of year especially with the passage Chaffinch, with numbers exceedingly low in comparison to past years, so what could this possibly mean? Well I really don't know, maybe they are using a different routing this year (doubt it!), maybe it's to do with the temperatures we have been getting for the time of year (yes go along with that) but the shortfall could be down to a host of different reasons. So most days I have been getting just over 100 birds whereby normally by now I should be getting around the 400 mark! But after saying all that today (21 October) all seems to have changed and I managed to get a count of 507 Chaffinch and most of them passed over during light rain. There you are, it would have been so easy for me to pack up and go home, but I hung in there and was rewarded with fabulous large migration parties with some parties of 50 birds, 30 birds etc etc.

Besides Chaffinch I am getting good numbers of Linnet, Goldfinch, but so far little in the way of continental wintering thrushes, e.g. Fieldfare and Redwing, although monitoring stations throughout the country have been getting them in their thousands. It's all down to the wind directions on the day of their passage and so far this year we have been getting mainly southerly/south west winds which takes the birds far away from Burton in their routing, but if they come through when north winds are blowing there is every chance you will get them coming over our village. They can be meandering in the flight lines which will follow the line of Hutton Roof, or another one will be where they come from somewhere appear around Truckhaven area and then follow the sides of the A6070 past Longlands and at somewhere around Deerslet will cross over towards Cinderbarrow, and then across to Arnside and Sandside, and then cross over the estuary and head up the Lythe Valley. Other times they may use the

I have had some great counts this year of Pink Footed Goose with lots of skeins going overhead and also lots more that can be seen through the binoculars passing Arnside Knott and Levens in the far distance. Also had a couple of records of Whooper Swans passing overhead. Unusually it was noted that some of the Pink Footed Goose were heading north which is so unusual at this time of year, I did seek advice on this strange situation and it was suggested that they had probably overshot their original destination Solway and it was thought they were making their way back (adjustment). Not sure about that advice but it will have to do for now!

It's been great watching the Starlings arrive from all parts of Northern Europe including the Baltics, they come in on a direct west flight and usually they have come down low by the time they hit our local airspace. They are arriving daily and usually peak around the 25 October. It really is well worth a visit to Leighton Moss for around 5pm in readiness to watch the Starlings come into roost after a day's foraging, and if you are lucky you may even get to see their fabulous murmurations.

Harlequin ladybirds - and swarms of

ladybirds in general, have you been getting them? It's about one week ago and there were lots of reports throughout the north of local infestations, and we in Burton also had reports of large quantities of ladybirds of which included large numbers of the more recent Harlequins.
