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Readers' LETTERS Farewell to an Old Burtonian

Alfred Cummings 13.4.1926 – 22.1.2019

Alfred lived the majority of his long life in Burton, growing up in the centre of the village, farming the Home Farm on the Dalton Hall Estate and finally retiring to Addlebank, a house built by his father on the east of the village. The village was very special to him and he was always proud to be an 'old Burtonian'.

Alfred was born on 13th April 1926 at No 1 The Square across the road from his parents` butcher's shop before moving into the The Square. He was the second child of Peter and Mary Cummings and brother to Jean and Peter. As a child he attended Burton Morewood School, With the onset of war Alfred left school to help his parents in the butcher's shop. He vividly remembered cycling around Burton, Holme, Arnside, Silverdale, Sandside and Yealand delivering meat on the old butcher's bicycle and bemoaned the fact there were no gears! At 16 he joined the local YFC and it was there he met Freda who was to become the love of his life.

It was during the war he forged his friendship with Otto Peyers, a German prisoner of war and a farmer's son from Stedum, near Hanover. This was an enduring friendship which transcended war and lasted their whole lives. Alfred and Freda were married in April 1949 in St James Church and took over the tenancy of Home Farm following on from her parents, William and Ruth Dobson. From these humble beginnings they built up a successful farming business.

Together, Alfred and Freda built up a herd of Pedigree Friesian cattle and forged lifelong friendships with dairy farmers of the 50s & 60s within the local area. In the late sixties the Pedigree milk herd was sold and Alfred built a Commercial beef herd which included lots of different European breeds. When they retired Alfred and Freda had a wonderful herd of cattle.

Family were all important to Alfred and Freda and they were thrilled to have three daughters; Margaret, Mary and Christine and delighted in their grandchildren and their growing number of great grandchildren.

Because Alfred lived all his life, until the last few months, in Burton, the village, the community and the church have been a pivotal part of everything he did. He was always very involved in village life, serving at Church as a sidesman and later church warden also as a governor at Burton Morewood School. Together with his family he played a part in the building of the Memorial Hall. Having spent 41 very happy years at Home Farm Alfred and Freda retired to Addlebank in 1990 and enjoyed 25 happy years there. Alfred and Freda were thrilled to celebrate their Diamond Wedding Anniversary and they were, in fact, married for over 66 years. Alfred valued his friendships within the local community, and enjoyed when he could attending the monthly lunch club.

For the last fifteen months of his life Alfred lived at Brant Howe Residential Home, Kirkby Lonsdale and he was truly grateful for the wonderful care and support he received. Alfred was kind, courteous and thoughtful; he always had a wonderful smile and twinkle in his eye. Throughout his life, he tried to help people in quiet and unassuming ways showing kindness, compassion and understanding. The words of William Wordsworth come to mind, "The best portion of a good man's life is his little, nameless, unremembered acts of kindness and of love." OUR FIRST RESPONDERS Peter Bowker

Our Village is very fortunate in having its own team of First Responders. This is a group of volunteers, trained in a range of life support and first aid skills, who are paged by the ambulance service when a 999 call is made locally. They then, whenever they can, drop what they are doing and attend the emergency to provide vital early care until the ambulance arrives.

This is great news for all of us, but it can unfortunately lead to the expectation that following any emergency call for an ambulance, a full set of Responders will automatically appear. However, this is not the case – for two reasons.

Firstly, each Responder is trained to deal with certain sorts of emergency and will only be called to appropriate incidents. This gets a bit complicated but, for example, all Responders would be paged for unconsciousness, chest pains or breathing difficulties, some would be paged for falls or serious injury, and none would be paged to a road traffic accident or if the patient was a young child.

Secondly, Responders are volunteers who have their own lives to lead and can only respond when they are reasonably able to do so. So not whilst they're at work, or in the fruit and veg aisle at Asda, or about to go to a dental appointment, or at 5.30 in the morning when they have to catch the early train to London.

So it is a disappointment when Responders are criticised, as they have been recently, for not turning up as expected. Because when they can turn up, they will – and will provide vital early care, often for a considerable period of time, and will support and reassure, and occasionally save a life.

PC Observations...

of the Parish Council meeting by Kathryn Smith

Yet again there was no police report presented to the parish council meeting. This lack of communication and liaison between the police and the parish in recent months, despite there being quite a number of burglaries and other incidents, is a matter of some concern to the council. Ideally the council would like the relevant police person to be more familiar with the village and for information about local crimes to be made available in a timely manner. The chairman would write to the relevant police authority about this.

The meeting heard an update on the progress of B4RN for the village, which is progressing but still needs funding and more village participation. In order to encourage residents to become involved the team would be active in the village and digging of trenches would commence in the near future. It is important to note that Morewood school will only receive its free connection if the required percentage of residents and businesses are signed up.

Also at the Open Forum a resident sought detail about the installation of gravel catchment areas in the east side of The Square. The parish council not being the lead authority for this project could not give a full answer but were aware of the issues raised such as the need to coordinate all the ground works in The Square.

It was agreed that this would be an agenda item for the March council meeting.

The planning application for a two storey extension at 4 Vicarage Close attracted no comment. After some discussion the planning application by Clawthorpe Hall Business Centre to build a new hall for meetings and worship by a community of Plymouth Brethren was not objected to.

The council agreed the Calendar of Meetings for 2019/20 noting that the April council meeting would be on Wednesday 17th April 2019.

Highways England has proposed improving the M6 Burton Woodland Habitat, The council noted that this area was in need of attention and any restoration might hopefully also provide some noise abatement, especially for the residents of Clawthorpe.

Finally the chairman gave notice of the meeting to be held in the Memorial Hall on the evening of 14th March at which matters apertaining to the Village Design Statement, proposals for The Square and assosiated matters would be addressed by the contractor for the Conservation Scheme.



Burton Flood Action Group Update

As you will recall Cumbria Flood resilience team, lead by Mr Doug Coyle and the Cumbria highways team, lead by Mr Peter Hoskins, promised at the last meeting, 23rd October 2018, to have ALL the gullies cleared and jetted "within two weeks"

We all knew this would not happen, but, as a result of constant nagging, ALL the gullies both North and South bound have today been cleared as of 06/02/2019. Seventy two gullies were jetted in total, including the culvert under the West Square, fifty three were reported by the jetting team as being blocked solid. These were mostly at the North end of the village, past the Memorial Hall, on the North bound carriage way.

B4RN Hyperfast Broadband for Burton

Within the next month there will be some digging commencing in the fields adjoining Vicarage Lane and Morewood Drive. This is to bring the fibre optic broadband cable from Dalton towards the heart of Burton. Real progress.

All wayleaves have been signed allowing the fibre optic cable to then be routed through into the playing field of Burton Morewood School where the village cabinet will be housed. This will then give us the unique opportunity to start connecting properties to this world class broadband along the first route into the village.

We need at least 50% of the village to express an interest in taking the B4RN service, and to identify Small and Medium-sized Enterprise (SME) businesses based within the village.

This can be done here (it is nonbinding): b4rn.org.uk/eoibk

SME businesses include:

- Sole traders, directors of companies with registered addresses in the parish,



- People who let out property (anywhere) who are residents in the parish,

- People with an HMRC Unique Tax Reference (UTR) who live in the parish and pay tax on an additional income.

Look out for more information in the form of a leaflet from the Parish B4RN team in the near future.

-Investment in the project is also required. There is currently a 5% return on investments paid from day one, much better than banks or building societies are offering.

-Invest £1500 and receive a free connection (usually £150)

-Being connected to B4RN allows you to stop paying line rental to BT

-Your current landline telephone number can be retained to use with VoIP internet calls

-The school will get a free connection and service allowing the pupils to benefit from a world class internet service.

-£30 per month "all you can use" service for residential properties.

-Future proof your property's internet connection whilst making your home more attractive to prospective buyers.

We can't start the active phase of connecting properties until the required funding has been met and at least 50% of properties have expressed an interest.

Extract from a letter from Burton Morewood School about B4RN:

The school has agreed to host the cabinet for the village and will receive a free connection and service of the B4RN hyper-fast broadband service. There would be a two-fold benefit for the school; firstly, a financial one but more importantly, a 1Gb hyper-fast connection would be a significant improvement for our children and staff working in school.

What we need is for as many **Burton-in-Kendal** residents of & Clawthorpe to register an interest to demonstrate to B4RN the final viability of the project (this is nonbinding). We stress that there is no obligation to take the service, it just triggers the initial installation of the main distribution cabinet, which the school has offered to host. The expression of interest form can be found at **b4rn.org.uk/eoibk**

Furthermore, and very importantly, due to recent changes, the B4RN team are identifying businesses who will be eligible for a government initiative called the Gigabit Broadband Voucher Scheme. If you live in the parish of Burton in Kendal and pay tax on a business or rental property, please register an interest as this could significantly help in releasing extra government funding.

This is both a wonderful opportunity for the school as well as for the village as a whole. There is nothing on the market coming close to this service at this cost. We thank you for your support in this and please share our request with any other friends and relatives living within our local area.

I guess most of last month (February) for me as been about checking out Ferns. Some of them from last year have held out really well and still can give good photos even now as we are approaching Spring! I guess before we know where we are, we will start seeing new croziers unravelling to mark the start of yet another fabulous fern year.

Birds – I noticed Lapwings heading out East over Holme Park Fell on Feb 2nd presumably heading back to their upland breeding grounds. At about the same time it was reported to me that our regular Lapwings had arrived back on territory in the fields at the side of Vicarage Lane.

Normally I expect to see and hear our (Sky) the lark singing long before now (17th Feb 2019), but I must be missing him so far, after several walks up past Dalton Crags and each time drawing a blank, but I would bet that after writing this, he is probably up there singing his little heart out. In fact I have just read an email from someone reporting the Skylarks were back on territory on Valentine's Day (Feb 14th) Our local Barn Owls have been seen again in and around Burton. Close to where I live the local Tawny Owl from the old vicarage has been calling away with its "witty witty woo" which is always a pleasure to hear no matter what time of night (or day) he might be calling. I wonder if we are at the courting time of year, this species can be down on eggs from as early as the middle of March. Besides hearing his "witty witty woo", I often hear him giving off his other well known "Keewick" call.

Odd Meadow Pipits have been seen on Hutton Roof which is obviously an indicator to the start of their returning to their upland breeding grounds. Lots pass over Hutton Roof from a SW to NE direction. I have always thought the best place to watch them has been the Trig Point or even lower down in Dalton Crags. I don't expect there to be much activity with the Mipits until at least mid to late March.

Our wintering Woodcock, Snipe and Jack Snipe are occasionally flushed from up on Hutton Roof. Also good to hear that Dr. Sharp who carries out the Woodcock study (Lancaster University) is still getting good numbers whilst recording them on the Dalton Hall Estate.

This month can be good for getting early Chiffchaffs our first returning Warblers, I usually record my first of the year around the 25th at Thornleigh followed by other early birds in Dalton. Also I have had Swallows passing through the Trig Point areas as early as the 24th. You could also get early Blackcap. Also remember March can be good for seeing returning birds with most of the winter Starlings dispersing back to their homelands, and watch out for "Herds of Whiteness" (Whooper Swans) crossing our skies from the third week in March and they head North to their Icelandic breeding grounds, also the final parties of



Fieldfare and Redwing heading East before they hit their North Sea crossing.

One thing that I am not keen on at this time of year is seeing the squashed mature frogs and sometimes toads (depending on where you are) as they try and make their way to their respective breeding ponds. I had my first frog to succumb on Glebe Close on 13th February and this can carry on for another two or three weeks before it settles down.

Wow! That last nature talk at the Memorial Hall on Badgers with Ian McMurdo was amazing and gave us such rare insight to this secretive mammal. Looking forward to the next nature talk which is on March 28th at the Memorial Hall and is called "Wild Morecambe Bay" by David Poole.

As I bring my copy to a close, I am about to head off up into Holme Stinted Pastures to check on the Daphne Mezereone which should by now heading towards full bloom. 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HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE

THE SQUARE

As has been shown by general interest in the recent schemes to preserve and enhance key heritage features, the architectural heart of Burton is The Square. Seventy years ago in his book 'Cumberland and Westmorland' Norman Nicholson mused that Burton 'does not seem to have grown, but to have been planned by an artist so you are scarcely aware of its smallness.

Even the square with a market-cross is intimate and formal, a half-sized set which might have been easily transported whole to a London stage for an opera. The eyebrows of history hang over the village like the upper rooms of the old houses held up by pillars on the pavement, and there is a slight taint of quaintness in backyards and cobble side streets.'

Although, technically it is the 'Market' Square, Burton like Beetham and Flookburgh has lost its market; though markets at Kendal, Milnthorpe and Kirkby Lonsdale, all of which stem from the Middle Ages, have survived. Burton Market was a comparative newcomer.

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In c. 1690 Thomas Machell recorded 'Burton was made a market town by a charter from King Charles II in 1661. The Market was kept every Tuesday and two fairs every year, on St George's Day-23rd April, and St Bartholomew's Day -24th August.

It was procured by Sir George Middleton, Lord of the Manor of Leighton Hall, with a toll of 1d a beast, and a Quart a load for wheat, peas, beans and barley and nothing more how(ever) much the vender brings on that day. And for oats —three handfuls and stallage a halfpenny, if all their goods exposed to sale be worth 13/6d.'

Machell's reference to corn and, (in another paragraph) to large wheat fields situated between Burton and Kirkby Lonsdale is an early mention of Burton's importance as being Westmorland's main corn market. Sadly for Burton the opening of the Lancaster to Kendal Canal in 1819 quickly put paid to this prosperity.

Only ten years later, in 1829, Parsons and White's directory reported that Kendal held 'the rank' as the main corn venue, 'though there is a small wharf at Burton'. Yet, the Directory continued, Burton's 'being on the main turnpikes leading from Kendal to Lancaster, there are several good inns and many respectable families have chosen it as a cheap and pleasant place of residence'.

Fortunately, many of the Georgian 'residences' have survived-as have some of the grain barns `up the (formerly) cobble side streets '. RKB.

BURTON MOREWOOD SCHOOL



Reception are still have great fun constructing boats, houses, rockets and lots of other exciting objects, using all of our saved resources – cardboard boxes, tubes, plastic tubs, etc. Their imagination can go where it wants! They have also been making their own clocks and learning about time – tricky business for a 4 or 5 year old. They have enjoyed learning about the rainforests around the world, and their learning journey has been shared with their family members at their recent show assembly.

Year 1's maths has included number bonds to 10 and 20 and studying 3D shapes. They have been very busy in their PE lessons, covering dance moves and gymnastics. Their geography has focused on the United Kingdom. In their art lessons they have enjoyed looking at the artist Piet Mondrian, who was a Dutch abstract artist. They learnt how he changed from painting landscape pictures to geometric abstract works of art.

Florence Nightingale is one of the nurses being studied by Year 2, during their topic work on Nurturing Nurses. They have learnt how she cared for the wounded, making changes in hygiene and also chose to care for the soldiers through the night, carrying her lamp as she went. There has been lots of counting with coins, learning about our coin denominations, with lots of challenges on how they can use different coins to pay for their favourite items. In Year 2's story writing they have been using story mountains to help them plan a beginning, a middle and an end. In D&T, materials were their focus - from glass to wood, from fabric to plastic - studying their properties.

Years 3 and 4 are still enjoying learning about the Ancient Egyptians, working out how the explorers found the tombs and how they managed with no machinery, to make the amazing pyramids. Year 3's maths moved onto place value for 4 digit numbers.

Year 4 children compared their lives to that of an Egyptian – great if you were part of the Egyptian dynasty, not so great if you weren't. However, no-one went hungry as the fertile land along the River Nile served the people well. Their English lessons kept with the Egyptian theme, looking at spooky Egyptians and shape poetry. 2D shapes and coordinates kept Year 4 challenged. In RE they have enjoyed looking at the special books we have in our lives – what they mean to us, how we look after them, where we store them.

Lots of us throughout the school are still enjoying running club on Thursday lunchtimes. At the end of February our school were invited to take part in a cross country challenge on the Dallam grounds. Lots of schools competed and Dallam School looked after us well, with a well-earned snack at the end of our run and the weather was kind to us too.





We were also invited to take part in a gymnastics competition, again at Dallam. Everyone who took part received a certificate and a medal for their placement. We really do enjoy these challenges and making new friends with other primary schools





Year 5's SEAL lessons (Social and Emotional Aspects of Learning) covered British values – and what it means to us to be British. 3D shapes have been their maths focus and in science they have been exploring day and night. During their topic time they have been researching the greenhouse effect on our world, and combined this research in their English lessons, writing a radio report asking for people to support the plight of the orangutans, who are in danger of becoming extinct due to the destruction of the rainforests. They have also been learning how to knit.

Year 5 and 6 swimming lessons are ongoing and so too are their visits to Kendal Ski slope – honing their skills of balance and speed.



For a number of weeks we have been getting familiar with a music set for our involvement in Young Voices. Young Voices is one of the largest choirs in the world and each year 5,000-8,000 children come together in large arenas to perform their newly learnt songs. We learn the songs every week via Lyric videos, and Spotify links.

We travelled down to Manchester Arena in the last week of term, and we performed with some of the best professional musicians in the world, along with a world-famous conductor and musical director. We learnt our dance moves via the video link from a creative director. The world's best lighting and sound technicians support the venue and made it an amazing, unforgettable experience.



It was a full day and at the end we were all tired but very happy with being able to perform in such an uplifting atmosphere.

During our morning maths sessions we have been working out the volume of cuboids. Our topic is hot and cold, comparing the most extreme of these two environments, around the world, and in our science lessons we have been studying electrical circuits.

We are looking forward to World Book Day on the 7th March, where we will be sharing our favourite bedtime stories, wearing our PJs. We are also looking forward to our next mufti day at the end of February, when we will be coming to school dressed as a member of one of the emergency services.

Roger Reports...

From the County & District Councils

February was, as always, the busy budget month for the County, District and Police authorities on which I serve. Even so, much of my time was taken up by the local problem of Crooklands Bridge. Although in the middle of the Lower Kentdale Division it impinges on further away places like Burton when it is closed following damage. It is not a county bridge but belongs to the Canal and Waterways authority which is responsible for repairs and for making claims from vehicle insurance.

In January the canal officials closed Crooklands Bridge ten days after it had been damaged without informing local users or councillors. Other problems arose when diversion signs provided by the Canal Trust were inadequate. I, myself, informed Dallam and Kirkby Schools whose pupils' buses use the bridge. Then for a fortnight roads and lanes all around were congested, leading to some damaged verges and hedges. At the full County Council I urged that an enquiry should be set up to see if the county could speed up repairs in future by doing the work and putting out the diversion signs and then sending the bill to the Canal authority.

On other highways issues, flooding remains the main problem. I have asked that the gullies all along Main Street be checked and cleared especially those near The Creamery, on Church Bank and Neddy Hill. According to policy they all should be 'serviced' annually, but some gullies are more equal than others as they need more regular attention. To ensure a quick response it may help that whenever we see a blocked drain we inform the council network and /or the highways hotline 0300 303 2992. Also, please continue to keep me informed.

On the budgets the police rate is going up by 10%, half of which will cover inflation, rises in fuel costs and a bigger than anticipated pay increase. The rest will go towards paying for police surgeon cover which is no longer provided locally. Most of the rest will fund 20 more full time officers. Together, with last year's 25 new recruits Cumbria's force is now approaching full strength. Increased pressures include online bullying, domestic violence and cross county line drug dealing. As most of the County's illegal drugs come up the M6 from the south, Burton is on the front-line of the problem. I have reported my personal concern that night-time 'boy-racers' using our lanes near the Cumbria/Lancashire border might be





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'suppliers' who have come off the motorway to avoid cameras on the Station Road M6 bridge. As with gullies perhaps we all need to be vigilantes!

The County Council Budget decisions produced the anticipated result. Altogether the Council made savings of £22m, making the sum total of over £200m since the economy/austerity regime set in six years ago of over £200. To achieve the Council Tax requirement of £378,755m the basic 'core spending' Council Tax rate will increase by 1.99%, plus an additional Social Care Precept of 2%. The Schools Budget will be £251m which is paid centrally. For a Band D property the new rate will be £1,385pa. At the time of the BN deadline the District Council rate had not yet been set-so more next month. In the meantime enjoy the springtime when it emerges. Best wishes -ROGER

A few days before writing this letter I fell off my garage roof. I was going to put back a slipped tile but I badly misjudged things and came down to earth rather painfully. I now have several broken ribs and some uncomfortable weeks ahead. As you can imagine I've thought a lot about all that happened. Here's just a few of my thoughts:

I am foolish and make wrong choices. And if that's true for my plan to fix the tile it is true in a hundred other ways in my life. Not all of my mistakes have such sudden painful consequences but the results may be deeper.

My foolishness hurts others. It brings tears to my eyes now to remember how I lay on the stretcher listening to the paramedic leave a message on my wife's voicemail, knowing how awful it would be for her to get that message.

How amazing our First Responders are. I was on my own when I fell and could only make it as far as the phone. It was such a relief when help arrived and if David was annoyed at me for having interrupted his decorating he certainly didn't show it.

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VILLAGE DESIGN STATEMENT

As part of the Burton Conservation in Partnership Project (PSiCA), parishioners were shown the concept for a Village Design Statement on Saturday 19th January in BMH. The Architects, Crosby Granger, have been commissioned to produce this document from information and ideas from parishioners. Those attending were shown a photographic and graphic layout showing how the village developed and its 'character areas' onto which they were able to mark their thoughts and ideas: what was good, what was important to them, where things could be improved and any other comments they wished to make about Burton and its surroundings.

A Village Design Statement is an important document. It contains guidance and information about how future building can be sensitively incorporated into our environment. When adopted by the District Council, it will become a 'Supplementary Planning Document' and future development, of all kind, must take it into consideration and the Planning Authority refer to it in their deliberations. It will put the village in a much stronger position when new developments are proposed.

The presentation was followed by a walk along Main Street, where we were able to see the different styles and groupings of buildings, different materials used over the years and what type of details and materials make our village, what fitted in and what did not. Questionnaires were given out so that the Architects could glean feedback from local knowledge and which parts of the village parishioners thought were important to them and what aspirations and ideas we have. Further questionnaires are available from The Post Office, please ask for one, all comments and ideas are welcome.

A further workshop on this subject will be held in the Memorial Hall on Thursday, 14th March at 6.30pm. At this meeting, there will also be updates on the evolving enhancement designs for The Square, where again, all comments will be welcome. Please look out for posters around the village and information in BN about this and other, further workshops and meetings in the PSiCA Project



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
