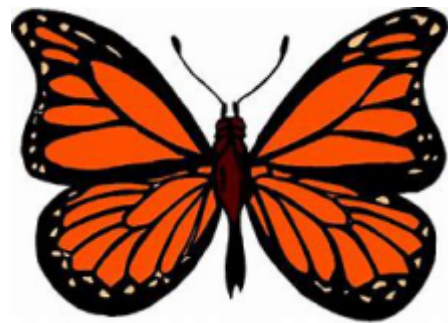

BURTON FLOOD ACTION GROUP UPDATE

Since our last update we have had one incident of surface water flooding in Burton. This was quickly jumped upon and reported to the correct people whom responded quickly and were able to resolve the issue. The gullies and associated drains were cleared out to the end of the pipe runs and the pit into which the water falls was pumped clear. As a result we have had no more incidents.

I may also confirm that we are still talking with our local MP Mr Tim Farron. Mr Farron has this week, 21st March, lobbied the parliament for more money to help us fight against local flooding and flood resilience actually mentioning Burton In Kendal and Holme as examples of where help is needed. Thank you Mr Farron.

Works are to start in August with the replacement of the drains and gullies in and around the square. This is going to lead to road closures whilst the works are ongoing. Finally a word of thanks to you. I have received several emails from you with thanks for the works carried out so far. Much appreciated, but I couldn't do this without your input, so please keep me informed of any issues as they arise and I will try to resolve.

PC Observations...

of the Parish Council meeting by Jon Mackness

The March 21st meeting was a two-parter starting with the Annual Parish Meeting followed by the normal monthly Parish Council. As the clock ticked off the final minutes towards 7pm, there was an air of expectation. Would any members of the public turn up? Kath Hayhurst and Peter Cummings did and the relieved Chairman - Paul Rogers - began his Annual Report.

The main message in the report was that housing developments in Burton are expected in 2019. They include 23 houses on the two fields at the top of Boon Town, completion of the Church Bank development and the Royal Hotel development. There is no further news at present about development of land to the west of Green Dragon farm. All these developments will affect traffic, parking, drainage and pedestrian access through the village and the Council are pressing developers to include safer pedestrian access to the school and Main Street amenities in their plans.

The Partnership Scheme in Conservation Area (PSiCA) is due to start after the Public Realm Improvement Plan (PRIP) improvements to The Square beginning after August are completed. This means that PSiCA will not realistically begin until 2020. Two PRIP village design workshops have attracted 25 residents to see the impressive planned improvements. The scheme is

backed by Historic England and is aimed at improving the appearance of the buildings and spaces in the centre of Burton.

Paul's report also included news about a rise in crime against property in the last 12 months. There is not exactly a crime wave but PC Martin Boak who attended the meeting asked for villagers to be even more vigilant at reporting suspicious cold calling, anti-social behaviour and protecting vans and outhouses containing tools. You can contact police by dialling 101 for non-urgent calls and 999 for emergencies. Martin's email is martin.boak@cumbria.police.uk. Martin also asked villagers to use the Cumbria Community Messaging Service at www.cumbriacommunitymessaging.co.uk to get access to crime information from Cumbria Police.

Paul welcomed the remedial work to improve the unsatisfactory condition of Burton's roads. New 'Road Narrows' and 'Unsuitable for HGVs' signs have been erected and a substantial initiative to avoid flooding in the centre of Burton will be carried out during the summer.

Paul also mentioned the commemoration of the centenary of The Armistice in 1918. A wonderful biographical exhibition was staged by the History Society with the support of the Church and the school. Finally, Paul thanked the hard-working parish and district councillors who faithfully carry out the tasks of representing and improving the village.

The normal Council meeting opened at 7.30pm. Kath Hayhurst in the Open Forum asked for Council support to replace the Perspex protected heritage map on the canal which is now weathered and faded. Kathryn Smith from the History Society had a 2006 minute of the History Society to show that the plaque's maintenance was a Parish Council responsibility. Councillors agreed to support the request and asked for 3 quotes to restore the plaque, pending approval at the next meeting.

Peter Cummings then requested permission to excavate a hole to the east of The Square to enable drinking water and waste water pipes to reach his property. This is Council owned land. Glyn Ormerod is also making a similar request. Frances Mason-Hornby pointed out that the Council and the developers need a proper legal and financial agreement – an Easement, registered at the Land Registry – to protect each other's interests.

Other matters discussed included:

- B4RN is still planned to start cabling in 'The Spring' but it is vital that villagers register their interest on the B4RN website. Please do this even if you are not going use the B4RN connection. You can do this at b4rn.org.uk/eoibk
- Boon Town playground improvements are completed
- Slape Lane is now virtually impassable – councillors will ask for urgent County Council action
- Dog poo and litter along village lanes is getting worse
- The Quarry needs to be reminded to wash their wagon wheels before they drive on the road.

FOR YOUR HOME MAINTENANCE



I very much like the sound of “Vernal Equinox” which this year fell on Wednesday 20th March and that’s the same day I need to send in my copy for the Burton News.

I got a pleasant surprise last week when I was over in Dalton Craggs searching down a dark 5ft deep gryke and guess what? I witnessed several new scollie (Harts Tongue Ferns) croziers coming through which would be unravelling themselves any day now, indicating the start to the 2019 fern season was well on its way. I was taken back at first because I have never seen them coming through so early, but down there it was probably warm and cosy but maybe a little damp, but something had triggered their early start.

Some people have been dashing over to Sedgewick to check out the large sloping banks that lead down to the River Kent, for in the bottom to see the beautiful displays of Yellow Star of Bethlehem and what a display they have put on again this year, the plant is so rare to find these days and I am told the ancient Beetham population has now sadly gone. Other plants out now or to be seen this month will include: Lords and Ladies, Wood Anemone, Dog Violets, Bluebells & Ramsons.

It’s that time of year when I am now on the lookout daily for my early warblers arriving, like the Chiffchaffs and the Blackcaps, and another week or two we should have the Willow Warblers. Also the Wheatear will be in by now and their rarer cousins the Northern

Greenland Wheatear will soon be seen resting up in Dalton Craggs whilst taking a breather and perhaps feeding up on small crane flies before their long onward journey to Greenland or Iceland or the Faroe Islands.

Towards the end of the month we can welcome back Garden Warblers and Redstarts to their respective breeding grounds in Dalton Craggs and other areas on the Dalton Hall Estate. Also worth a quick look up to the skies for “Herds of Whiteness” (Whooper Swans) leaving the UK and making their way back to Iceland to start their breeding season as well, usually they are seen in good numbers around the third week in March and so you may still get lingering birds in the first week of April. Starlings and Thrushes are also leaving us in large numbers.

By the end of April we should be hearing the Cuckoo or should I say Cuckoos on Dalton Craggs and Hutton Roof. It’s usually on or around the 1st of May, although last year it was a few days earlier in the last days of April. In recent years the first Cuckoo arrives and has had a “cough” or it sounds like it has. The first syllable he starts off OK with a proper good “Cuck” but this is continued with a sort of cough follow up! He usually loses his cough and regains the proper “Cuckoo” call after a couple of weeks or prior to him leaving us to return to Africa which is usually about the middle of June.

The main host of the Cuckoo is said to be the Meadow Pipit but locally I think it could well be the Tree Pipit. I do have photos of a Cuckoo being fostered by a tiny little Wren! The young Cuckoos make their own way back to Africa in early August and by all accounts find their way back on their own, sometimes returning to the

same areas as their parent birds.
Clever stuff and all put into an egg!!

The following sketch is what happened 6 years ago today (scribed on Vernal equinox Wed 20th March 2019 – sketch done on vernal equinox Wed 20th March 2013) and the weather was so bad on that very day the poor little Meadow Pipits were seen turning back over on Hutton Roof because of blocking snows they faced at Farleton and further North, and so they appeared to be heading back to the coast following their same tracks in a South West direction. This year is far different with even a raise in temperatures (with no snow in the outlook) and so I expect the birds to be able to proceed with their migration over Hutton Roof without problems.

HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE

1969 BURTON NEWS 50 YEARS

JANUARY Candle lit church services led by the Vicar, The Rev G Langham, had been much appreciated during the festive season. 'The Squire' Mr A.T. Mason — Hornby gave a talk on Mountain Rescue which was 'illustrated by slides and a tape-recorder'. Mr T S Dobson, 'a remaining link with Old Burton' died aged 74. He had run the local garage and was, also, a leading Free Mason. Plans were announced for a £60,000 Motor Way Service Station' near Burton on the north bound, west side, of the M6 which was currently being constructed. A south bound, east side, extension was 'envisaged for the future',

FEBRUARY South Westmorland Rural District Council was accused of being negligent in 'condemning' for demolition buildings around the former Globe Inn, in Main Street, A motorist, detected on Moss Lane with a car, which had not got a newly introduced MOT Certificate, was fined E2. A Mothers' Union tea-party, featured a slide show and 'tape recordings'.

MARCH Russells, the builders, advertised new bungalows for sale at £2,999. For inside: bed-room suites were available from £27 while a dining suite in teak with a 'coffin' sideboard cost 46 guineas. At the Mothering Sunday service bunches of snow drops were distributed to all the ladies. Later, Mrs Langham gave a talk about the World Wide Mother's union conference.

APRIL Sensationally, Fire Brigades from Milnthorpe and Carnforth raced to quell a fire at Dalton Hall which, as it could be seen for miles around, had been reported from a Police Patrol car. When they got there the blaze turned out to be from timber being burnt from the hall which was being

demolished. In the 'wedding of the year' Catherine Barber from West View, Burton married Patrick Berry, the son of a Carnforth doctor. The bride wore a full length gown of wild silk. The bridesmaids had tangerine satin dresses with 'kaftan sleeves lined with rose pink silk- The bride travelled in a green ensemble'.

MAY At the Burton Conservative Branch AGM Mr Pemberton was elected President, Mr Whitehouse Chairman, C. Walters, secretary with committee, members Mr Bateman, Mrs Taylor and Mrs E, Crayston. On Ascension Day Morewood school pupils attended an early morning service which was followed by Holy Communion for the adults.

JUNE An automatic STD telephone service reached Burton putting an end to 'trunk calls'. Sister Ellen Turner, the District Nurse for Holme and Burton, retired after 28 years service, Government plans to abolish Westmorland and Lancashire would put Burton into a new Morecambe Bay Authority Stretching from Barrow to Lancaster and round to Heysham. Morewood School pupils enjoyed a trip to Manchester Airport. They lunched in the airport 'canteen' and had tea at Belle Vue.

JULY A sudden heat wave made South Westmorland one of the hottest places in Britain. Beatle John Lennon and his wife Yoko Ono visited Lakeland but missed out on Burton. Claims that the surface of the newly laid M6 had dropped by up to 18 inches were denied by the contractors. In the summer sales women's coats were 'from 79/6; Corsets 59/; Men's sports jackets £9:10; suits £14. Mr Vic Gray, headmaster of Milnthorpe Modern School spoke to the WI on 'Your Child's Future Education',

AUGUST Burton Youth Club joined the Fulwood Barracks Youth Club on a camping expedition to Patterdale. Dalton House was raided by three burglars from Leeds who stole an antique gun and a Chinese Vase valued at £88, They were sent to prison for

two years. Soon afterwards the occupants put the house up for sale. 35 Youth Club members went on a trip to Blackpool.

SEPTEMBER A local teacher's conference and a group of parents of Primary school children voted in favour of Comprehensive education. Burton Hall in Tanpits Lane was advertised for sale which stated that 'the main part dating from the 17th century retained many appropriate period features including an old oak staircase with a carved newel post'. The house comprised five bedrooms, drawing and dining rooms, a harness room and 'a panty which would make a cloakroom and a housemaid's room'.

OCTOBER Two fatal car crashes occurred locally within five hours, On the A6 at Beetham a man was killed and three passengers were injured. On the A 6070, near Holme Park Quarry, 22 year old John Mundie from Kendal was killed and his two passenger injured. They had just been visiting sick relatives at Lancaster. No caterers had applied to run the new M6 Service station.

NOVEMBER A 'mini fair' with afternoon tea organised by the WI raised £15 for the Memorial Hall development fund. Fox hunting and outdoor sports were curtailed because of severe frost. On 'Black Tuesday' black-ice caused 'motorists to come to grief', There were many protests reported in the local press about Westmorland County Council's poor maintenance of the roads.

DECEMBER The Maude Commission abandoned the proposal to put Burton into a Morecambe Bay authority. The sports committee organised a Christmas party 'lasting for three hours' for 60 -70 children when the entertainment included games, dancing and a Punch and Judy Show. RKB

BURTON MOREWOOD SCHOOL

Reception have been learning all about dinosaurs!! They have read lots of non-fiction and fiction books about dinosaurs, they have been making their skeletons, saving dinosaurs frozen in ice eggs, and writing their own class dinosaur book. In their outdoor play area they have measured how tall a Brachiosaurus was – or might have been – and have been working hard on their counting and adding skills.

In Year 1 maths, the children have started to look at fractions. In English they focussed on writing their own story with the title 'Don't let the Pigeon' They could add anything they wished to the title such as 'go to sea', 'join the circus', or 'fly a plane' – anything they wanted. They then worked on three persuasive sentences about why Pigeon thinks he/she should eat all the cake. They have also had fun researching Superheroes.

In their PE lessons they enjoyed putting together their dance routine for the school dance competition, which was judged by Mr. 'Len' Thexton, Miss 'Shirley' Colyer and Mrs 'Darcy' Barker. Each Year had their own routine and style of dance to perform. Year 1 have also planted some seeds in their science lesson and are keeping diaries to see how they grow. During their Creative Day they had fun talking about space and walked through a 'time machine'. In their Geography lessons they studied landmarks around the UK and compared London with Brasilia.

Year 2 have also been working on fractions – showing different ways of representing the same fraction. In their story writing, they took 'Jack and the Beanstalk' and wrote their own versions – with any plots and twists and turns they chose. They are making sure that they don't forget those all-important capital letters, finger spaces, correct punctuation, followed of course, by a full stop. In D&T the hot topic of recycling was discussed. They didn't realise that recycling around the country is so different, and that not everyone recycles the same as Burton.

Years 3 and 4 are still enjoying their Ancient Egyptian topic. Year 3 have created Egyptian images in a silhouette form, and continue to learn amazing facts about pyramids.

Their English lessons have focussed on letters of explanation and they too have been working on fractions in their maths. In PE they have been honing their hockey skills. For their music lesson they enjoyed listening to African drumming and using African drums.

Year 4 children have extended their Egyptian topic, and in their English lessons they have been writing letters about a cursed canopic jar, linking it to their class novel 'Secrets of a Sun King'. In maths they have been identifying, measuring and drawing quadrilaterals. Some of Year 4 enjoyed a hockey competition – known as Quick Sticks – at Dallam School. The rain stayed away!! As part of their RE they are looking forward to visiting St. James' Church, to find out more about the special areas of the building. They made their own bread buns in D&T.

Lots of us throughout the school are still enjoying running club on Thursday lunchtimes, and there are regular 10k – 40k certificates handed out at the end of our collective worship. Year 5 and 6 are

continuing to enjoy their swimming lessons and also their ski-ing.



Continuing their study on the plight of the Orangutans, Year 5 completed their radio scripts and were filmed presenting them to their class. They were the winners in our school dance competition and took their dance about the plight of the Orangutans to the Brewery Arts, Kendal. It was a very moving and thought provoking performance.

In their Art lesson, they have enjoyed studying all things Japanese.

Three times in the school year, two Year 5 and two Year 6 children attend the South Lakes Pupil Parliament, at the Netherwood Hotel in Grange-over Sands. They meet with 12-13 other primary schools and discuss topical issues from the UK and around the world, through group work, research and debates. The focus for this school year is Food Poverty.

Burton Morewood presented their Bill - The Farmers and Producers Bill. It proposed that farmers and producers get paid a much fairer rate than they are now, as it was felt that the large supermarkets are too powerful and are taking advantage.



As part of our Science work on electricity, Year 6 visited to Heysham Power Station. It has an amazing interactive exhibition which helped us understand how nuclear power generation works – it was great to have a guide who could answer all our questions. The Visitor Centre is open to everyone, not just schools. We really recommend a visit.

In D&T we have been challenged to design packaging to keep foods either hot or cold and testing different materials to see which would insulate best. In Computing we enjoyed learning how to use Google Streets and how to develop and use formulas for keeping track of things like pocket money or spelling test scores. In PE we have started to learn the tricky sport of golf.

We have a School Council that get together after their lunch, every Monday. Recently they have been discussing school dinners and what they may or may not wish to change on our school menus, and also how to help each other, particularly the younger ones, in the dinner hall. The Council also suggest the various theme days that take place in our school. Their latest suggestion was our Emergency Services day which was a great success and £300.00 was raised for St. John's hospice. Well done everyone!

We all enjoyed World Book Day on the 7th March, and coming into school in our PJs was a real treat. We spent our morning in mixed year groups – older years with younger – and shared our favourite bedtime stories. With one week to go, we are all looking forward to our Easter break.

Roger Reports...

From the County & District Councils

Most of my news will concern the District Council as for last month's BN there had not been an SLDC meeting. More recently, on the 26 February, the District fixed its share of the Council Tax. South Lakeland's Net Revenue Budget for 2019-20 was adopted as £14,005,200 and the SLDC's share of the Council Tax will increase by 2.6% equivalent to £193.63 or £5 per annum on a Band D property. There will be some increases in fees but car-parking rates will remain unchanged as they have done for the last five years. Savings targets rising to £1,550m have been made partly rising from the Customer Connect Programme. £740km has also been saved by staffing restructuring. Over-all Parish Council precepts have increased by £83,000. I haven't yet obtained Burton's precept charge.

Reductions in SLDC's staff over the last seven years has left a whole office floor of our offices being vacated which will be refurbished and then rented out. Whether the expected income will justify by the initial £2m+ projected cost of the conversion is yet to be debated fully. Currently our premises in South

Lakeland House, situated behind Kendal Town Hall, are approached down Angel Yard off Stricklandgate. But the address is officially 'Lowther Street' although no convenient access is possible from that narrow and polluted highway. In future a public way will be through the main entrance of the Town Hall where the front area will provide meeting rooms, I have suggested that the former Town Treasurer's office once occupied by A.W, Wainwright, the Lake District Guides writer, should be called 'Mr Wainwright's Room' although the current proposal is to call it the Romney room after the artist who died in Kendal.

Rather like in December when the council debated how to end World Poverty, the February meeting, after receiving a deputation, considered 'the climate emergency,' We were informed that 'an intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change's 1.5C special report provides sobering clarity of the impact of climate change', As my two—pennyworth I summarised historically recorded climatic changes hereabouts. Even so, I wondered whether these lofty issues weren't diverting out attention from the local matters for which we'd been elected to consider, Nevertheless, I warmly supported another motion condemning

anti —Semitism. On local matters the persistent delays and traffic disruption caused by periodic damage to Crooklands Canal Bridge was my most pressing issue —although it is a rather marginal problem for Burton. To the point I chaired a business like meeting of the canal and highways authorities aimed at coordinating action —so that, for instance, accurate and speedy diversion can be put in place and local interest groups like school, businesses and parish clerks be speedily informed of any closures, Following the wet weekend around the 10 March I again complained to the flood warning officers that their information focused on Kendal and central Lakes and not on our area which was largely ignored. In 2017 when 20 homes were flooded in Burton and Holme, Kendal which had received 'amber' warnings remained high and dry.

Vicar's Letter...

The Cruellest Crown

Capernwray Hall lies a few miles to the south of us. For most of the year, it is home to up to 180 young adults who come from many different countries of the world to study the Bible in order to better know the God who is their Creator and who, in Christ, gave his life for them. At other times the Hall is a centre for Christian holidays. Derek Burnside, Principal of the Bible School, has kindly allowed what follows to be taken from a recent letter of his:

In a sick, twisted way, it was a stroke of genius. Bored troops, away from home, have the chance to have a little 'fun' before the prisoner in their charge is sent to his death. And one of them has the great idea of crafting a crown of thorns, the ideal combination of pain and mockery to torture the one accused of claiming to be a king. Some soldier's God-given creativity is twisted and abused to wound the creator himself.

It was the perfect symbol for that moment, one that that went far beyond those soldiers' casual cruelty. The righteous Son of God has thorns crushed onto his brow, thorns that exist only because of human rebellion (Genesis 3:18). He wears our sin, carries our curse. But those very thorns are twisted into a crown,

in anticipation of the King of kings' coming victory over sin and death. The problem and the solution to human sin are woven into one vicious, glorious piece of headwear just as sin shows its starkest self.

Victorious athletes and festival celebrants would have worn headgear of similar style, adding further layers to this divine imagery. The King of grace willingly submits to his own creatures' brutality, and then rises to reign victorious over sin and death, carrying us in his wake, rejoicing.

*Behold the man upon a cross, my sin upon His shoulders;
Ashamed, I hear my mocking voice call out among the scoffers.
It was my sin that held Him there until it was accomplished;
His dying breath has brought me life – I know that it is finished.*
