PC Observations...

of the Parish Council meeting by Jon Mackness

Parish Council Observations: June 2019

Paul Rogers started the meeting with an appreciation of the life of Kath Unsworth, who died recently. Kath came to Burton in 1968 and served on the Parish Council for many years, including three stints as Chair. She also was a Governor of Burton's Educational Foundation and a strong supporter and caretaker of footpaths and bridleways around Burton. She worked at the school as Secretary and non-teaching assistant.

At the public forum, Philip Onions made a strong case for his planning application to put in a gate on safety grounds on the field west of Crag House on Dalton Lane. The PC was convinced and gave unanimous support. Roger Jones asked for grass to be cut at the 19 Trees' junction of Vicarage Lane and Dalton Lane also on safety grounds. The Lengthsman will be informed. Kath Hayhurst reported that the plaque by the canal is now installed. Kath also asked if a VOLUNTEER would start looking after the Station Lane garden. Minimal effort required to weed this attractive triangular garden.

Roger Bingham – District and County Councillor – reported on recent County Council activity which included concern about poor signage to prepare drivers for road closures, a scheme to install CCTV in villages to track 'County Lines' drug trafficking and petty crime and restoration work on canal tow paths and tree planting.

A lengthy debate ensued about whether to chip in some money to support a request for funds from the Memorial Hall Committee for a new village notice board. The eventual answer was NO on the grunds that the PC already had two notice

boards and the proposed location of the new board on the school grounds would not be ideal.

The updates on the B4RN superfast Broadband installation showed good progress with cable laying on the school field. VOLUNTEERS are still needed. Please contact Mike Iddon on 782950 or Martin Sansby on 781213. And INVESTORS who want a good return are also needed. B4RN is a great community scheme and the payoff in financial and amenity terms is enormous for Burtonians.

PSiCA is another community scheme with a big impact for Burton. It involves development of several areas of Burton starting with The Square. Two design workshops have already been run and a heritage makeover design was unveiled at the most recent on June 5th, alongside a Village Design Statement. Work is planned to start in early August. Traffic controls will be necessary with the possibility of road closure and/or single way control on the A6070 through the village. It's a 5-year project and other areas will be developed over this period.

Next meeting at 7.30pm on Thursday 18th July in the Memorial Hall.

Does your house have fast broadband speeds?

In recent years your property's connection to fast broadband can make significant difference to its value as seen by its increased importance in deciding what house to buy, and in what area.

Presently the government is committed to increasing broadband speeds, and localities such as Hest Bank are in line for fast fibre connection taking speeds well over 300Mbps with Virgin FTTP at £59 per month. Unfortunately, villages such as Burton are considered too expensive for national companies like BT and Virgin to install fibre to our homes. Another point worth considering: if

you are a Sky subscriber, is Sky's move to internet delivery through the new Sky Q. This will probably be the beginning of the end for satellite TV. Other problems could arise because of the new housing developments in Burton that will put even higher demands on the current internet speeds in our village. Consequently, this is where B4RN and local volunteers can help.

With B4RN broadband speed is no long an issue as speeds in excess of 950 Mbps are the norm and the bandwidth problem of multiple demanding users are vanquished. The other major bonus is the cost. At £30 per month, for a truly world-class broadband delivered to your home, at a price comparable to current BT charges and for a far superior service with the prospect of increasing your home's value. A remarkably good deal all round.

For Burton residents this offer of high-speed gigabit fibre from B4RN is seriously a No Brainer.

Currently B4RN along with many local volunteers are connecting full fibre gigabit broadband service to the village school. From there we intend to provide fibre links to connect to every property in Burton. All we need from residents is an expression of interest in this amazing new service by completing this online form at www.b4rn.org.uk/eoibk Extra help and support can be given by buying shares in B4RN at www.b4rn.org.uk/invest. B4RN shares currently attract a healthy 5% PA interest rate. This will help us connect all properties in a shorter time We also need more volunteers to help with

It does seem to have been a very unsettled month with lots of wet and windy weather and certainly not what you would expect to represent 'flaming June'. For the orchids sake after last year's heatwave disaster, this water must feel a relief or job well done!

But nature carries on and usually adapts, yet sadly I am getting several recent reports locally that Swallow numbers are down yet again, and in one instance they seem to have deserted their annual nest site completely. Although we are doing regular weekly checks on all the local Swift nest sites we are unable to say whether there is change or not! So far we have recorded a definite 18 nest sites already being used with a very strong possibility of a further 3 or 4 sites which we still need to confirm. Our regular annual tally over the past 7 years is between 20 and 25 nest sites in total, so we are certainly on target at the moment.... Just in case anyone wants to come along to our Swift watches we normally spend one hour on a Thursday or Friday evening, meeting at the Burton Memorial Hall at 2000hrs. I would have expected our adult Cuckoo's to have left us by now (normally mid-June) and probably well on their way back to Africa. Yet I am sure there will be several young Cuckoo's tucked away somewhere within Dalton Crags or on Hutton Roof who won't be departing until about mid-August. I believe the main host for the Cuckoo in these parts are either the Meadow Pipit and perhaps the Tree Pipit, but only the other week I was looking at some photos (not local) of were the host was a little "Jenny

m/

Wren".

Garden Warblers are having another excellent year with them being recorded in Dalton Crags, on The Common, Lancelot, Burton Fell and also to the top of Holme Stinted Pastures. I guess so far I will have recorded at least 15 singing birds. In comparison I have had relatively fewer Blackcap this year. I have noticed this before, that you hear lots of Blackcap at the start of the season, but as the Garden Warblers become more established, the Blackcap seem to go much quieter! Are our Yellowhammers clinging on! I really don't know what's happening, although I do seem to see fewer every year. I am still recording them either at the top of Holme Stinted Pastures or just as you go on to the Holme Park Fell and also recording them in Newbiggin Crags, it's worth spending time listening to their fabulous delivery of their well-known ditty "little bit of bread and no cheese".

Another bird I love to hear is our visiting Tree Pipits which to hear them and to watch them do their descending parachuting displays whilst accompanying themselves with the appropriate musical notes dropping down the scale from high to low in perfect pitch. Locally in Dalton Crags and Hutton Roof they seem to be doing OK and can be found at all the regular nesting places I am pleased to report.

Painted Lady butterflies are present in good numbers having so far seen them in Lancelot, Dalton Crags and on Holme Park Fell. Having seen so many I am wondering if it's been one of the Painted Lady years, although if it has been, well then I missed the main passing migration North which they seem to carry out every few years.

I have had the privilege to watch this migration with my late friend and it seemed to pass through at the area where the Beetham Caravan Park is situated and you may see them coming through all day at



regular intervals of only a minute or so between them. A spectacular sight. Because of the dampish wet weather our Small Pearl Bordered Fritillaries have suffered but are now making up for lost ground with a good emergence in the last few days (20th June).

HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE

by Roger Bingham Burton celebrates the Peace 100 Years Ago

The First World War ended, officially, with the signing of the Treaty of Versailles between Germany and the Allies on the 28th June 1919, seven months after the Armistice had stopped fighting on the Western Front on 11th November 1918. Subsequently a week of Peace Celebrations occurred between 12th July, when the were national Thnaksgiving services, and 19th when sports and carnivals we held throughout the land.

Even so, Burton's rejoicing's outdid most neighbouring communities both in number and variety. The Whitsuntide Bank Holiday enjoyed gorgeous weather when 'it was one of the busiest times witnessed for years past. The traffic was enormous, and motors and cycles passed through the village continuously'.

On Thanksgiving Sunday 'a good number of demobilised soldiers met a contingent from Holme at Burton Bridge and marched for a service at Holme Church. Here the Vicar expounded that 'personally he believed that God had been with our armies throughout' and 'unlike the Kaiser who always put God second, we should put Him first'. Back at Burton there were packed congregations when 'Praise to the holiest in the heights' 'O God our help in ages past' and an unusual hymn, ' ten thousand times ten thousand' were sung.

On the Wednesday the village was 'gay with bunting' as Home and Burton veterans, commanded by Sergeant W. Crayston marched to the Market Square, where the M.P. Colonel Weston presented a gold watch and chain (paid for by public subscription) to Quarter Master SergeantMatthew Crayston M.M. & bar, Burton's most highly decorated serviceman. The Vicar, Rev. R.W. Briton described how our brave Burton soldier won

the bar to his medal in March 1918 when, during the Germans 'Big Push,' he commanded 27 men in 'holding the line under great difficulties'. Colonel Weston also acknowledged that all Mrs. Crayston's five sons had served in the war.

A move was then made to the Sports Field for the 'Burton Gala'. The sports resumed three days later when 'in very fine weather', the Bamber Bridge Brass Band led the parade for the Victory Day Games.

At Sunset 'A fine display of Fireworks in Mr. Bibby's field up Boon Town, along with flares fired from Farleton Knott lit up the whole country around'

On the next Monday the celebrations concluded with a dinner at the King's Arms for demobilised men, and dance and 'confetti carnival' at the National School. But why Confetti? RB

Reception are still having fun learning about space. They have been studying how the International Space Station operates, from the many experiments that are carried out in zero gravity, including growing food. Reception have been growing their own food too – peas and potatoes. Their maths lesson have been all about repeating patterns and also weight. As this is their first year, they have been putting in some practice for sports day.

As part of their Science, Year 1 learnt about rain gauges and will make their own shortly. In English they have been planning how to make their own non-fiction books about sharks, tigers and polar bears. Halving, doubling and fraction work have been their recent maths challenges. In their topic work they are still studying transport and are very, very excited for their forthcoming trip to the Lakeland Transport Museum with a journey planned on the Haverthwaite steam train.

In Year 2's topic work they are looking at habitats and comparing arctic conditions, deserts oceans and rainforests. They have been comparing night and day temperatures, hours of sunlight and the types of animals that can survive in each set of conditions. In their science they have studied how plants work and have been labelling different sections of a plant. In their maths lessons they have been taking data from a tally chart and converting the information to a block chart. Their data came from their class friends – how many people had cats, dogs, hamsters etc, to tallying different types of transport that use the main road through Burton. They had a fantastic trip to the Manchester Airport Visitor's Centre. They visited a cockpit,

dressed up as a Captain and Cabin Crew, and stood under Concorde – they had a great day out, not to mention watching aircraft land and take off every few minutes! In their English lesson the following day, they planned their writing about the trip, and from their planning they will extend and deepen their writing about this great experience.



All of KS1 enjoyed a very pleasant, sunny afternoon on Dallam school grounds, orienteering, in search of vegetables as they have all been enjoying the story 'What I do with Vegetable Glue' by Susan Chandler and Elena Odriozola. A very funny book about a girl who falls apart because she doesn't eat any vegetables. Granny comes to the rescue though, as she's 104 years old because she always ate up all her vegetables!

Keeping with their Kenya theme, Year 3 have been learning about the different features of Kenya's landscape. Their art has also taken inspiration from Africa, drawing spectacular African animals and also drawing animals from cave paintings. In their English lessons they used these cave paintings to base their writing, to enable them to write incredible adventure stories. They have been tackling fractions and multiplication in maths, and labelling the different parts of plants in their science lessons.

In Year 4's maths lessons they have been practising their 12 times tables, and

converting time between analogue and digital. They have used an animated film as inspiration for a big writing adventure. As part of their Kenya topic, they have been looking at the Maasai tribe and learning about Fair Trade. They are now concluding their work on the human digestive system.

Year 5 are continuing their great work on their John Muir award. The stretch of land outside Year 2 has been cleared, new plants planted, and bark added to keep the moisture in and hopefully save on all that

weeding!!



When not busy gardening, Year 5 have enjoyed some tennis lessons on the MUGA with our Year 6 teacher. Their science lessons have been studying forces, pulleys and gears. They have been rehearsing with us for the forthcoming KS2 summer play.

For our topic work in Year 6, we have been studying mountains and volcanoes, and how they are formed. In our science lessons we have been working on Reebop Babies, which are imaginary creatures, created by ourselves, that help us explore genetic variation in a species. We have all enjoyed a week of Bikeability. Roger Reports...

From the County & District Councils

Despite national and international happenings, or non-happenings, our County & District Council's activities remain locally focussed.

Both authorities have joined a community safety partnership which identifies five local priority areas as:

- 1. Protecting Vulnerable People.
- 2. Substance and Drug Abuse.
- 3. Violent Crime.
- 4. Domestic Abuse.
- 5. Anti-Social Behaviour.

Although in all categories South Lakeland has fewer problems than the national average, we still have to remain vigilant.

As we have accepted that 'Climate Change is a threat to Cumbria, and in the long term to pubic health globally', both councils have pledged support for fuel saving and, specifically, to find suitable council owned sites for solar panels. Furthermore, as an environmental gesture, the South Area County Committee asked that the misspelt 'Climate Emegency'(sic) slogan daubed on a fly-over on Kendal's Bypass should be removed when the road is next closed for repairs!

On road closures, the closing of the A65 in May following a water main burst on Stanley Bridge, over the Lune at Kirkby Lonsdale gave me another opportunty to complain about the Highway's Departments failure to provide quickly, emergency 'Road Closed' & 'Diversion' signs. The same omissions happened when Crooklands canal bridge was closed for three weeks in February. In the A65 case there was only one sign at Junction36 (8 miles from the bridge) and none to the east, until a quarter of a mile of the closure.

Even so, I acknowledged that the repair team did a good job in enabling the road to reopen within 36 hours. I have also relayed mixed views about the restoration of the Canal towpath so that it can be used by cyclists, and passed on some worries i've received about 'bike congestion' on cyclist touring routes between Kendal and Lancaster.

Other recent highways concerns include lack of School Crossing Patrols as only 8 out of Cumbria's 58 Primary Schools still have Lollipop Ladies/Gents.

Finally, many people now share my anxiety about 'Ash dieback'. When, in May, I drove right across the 'Isthmus of England' (my own geographical term) between Lower Kentdale and Teesmouth, I didn't see ANY Ash trees in leaf, while four weeks later the foliage was very thin indeed. A Dutch Elm Tree disease type of disaster may be imminent which could be worse than 'if it's Oak before the Ash we're in for a splash'
