We would like to thank all the people who have made this vision a reality, there are too many to name in an individual email but include the landowners who kindly gave permission for the connection to pass across their land; the people who invested to allow us to build the infrastructure; the people who gave up their time to dig the core route and local connections in; the people at B4RN who have supported & facilitated this community project; the people in the village who have championed our cause and gone door to door for expressions of interest; the B4RN champions from other villages in particular Silverdale who have given expert help, advice and time with us to keep our project on track.

Now that Phase One of our project is complete, we don't want to rest our spades and conduit, this is a real opportunity to deliver a world class internet service to our whole parish. We have a strategy on how we would like to achieve this and would like to share it with you at a community meeting on **Tuesday 19th November 7pm-9pm in the School**. We will also demonstrate the technology to you.

We have successfully attained a Gigabit Broadband Voucher Scheme (GBVS) package for our parish from the Department for Culture, Media & Sport (DCMS) and this will significantly reduce the cost of installation, allowing residents and businesses to receive vouchers on connection to the B4RN service.



PC Observations...

of the Parish Council meeting by Jon Mackness

Parish Council observations October 2019

The tension grew as Councillors discussed whether to agree to put £11000 to the PSiCA Burton conservation scheme to part-fund a shortfall of £18500 to fix the necessary drainage work which is needed in The Square to alleviate flooding. Technically, this is a County Council responsibility, but Cumbria is not budgeting to do the work until 2025 and flooding problems won't wait. On the one side there were the 'big picture' Councillors who recognised the urgency and the strong message that a 'self-help' offer wold give when future applications for funding were made. Moreover, the money was already pigeon-holed for infrastructure development and there have been no requests for alternative schemes for 2 years. On the other side were the less broadminded saying 'why should we give as much?' and 'they'll find the extra somehow even if we don't part fund'. In a small way, it was rather like a BREXIT deal negotiation who was going to give ground? It was 4 votes for and 4 against. Chairman Paul Rogers shifted uneasily in his seat. He had the casting vote. 'I don't like doing this', he said, 'but I have the casting vote and... (he paused) ... I am going to vote in favour'. A victory for the big-picture Councillors!

A second planning issue was the flagrant disregard of the developer of new housing in Church Bank Gardens of all the conditions agreed when planning agreement was granted by SLDC. All the Councillors agreed that the SLDC Planning Department was simply not doing its job. They are letting the developer 'get away with murder'. SLDC Councillor Brian Cooper who sits on the SLDC Planning Committee had no explanation. The conditions refer to the need for stone facing on the houses, refurbishment of the access road and footpaths amongst other requirements. £8000 CIL money was being withheld and the developer is not complying with any of these conditions. Councillors unanimously agreed to write to SLDC's CEO to protest 'in the strongest terms' about this non-compliance.

No objections were raised to the plans for 28 dwellings and associated infrastructure at the top of Boon Town.

Other matters discussed included:

1.Councillors welcomed the news that Roger Bingham's cancer treatment continues to go well. Roger in the meantime is his normal ebullient self and reported on Cumbria's plans to recruit 115 more police and to plant more trees to help combat climate change. If you know of anywhere where trees might be planted, contact Roger.

2.To help with parking during the forthcoming The Square conservation work, the School's Headmaster has offered overnight parking at the School

3.£158 was agreed for the purchase of wild daffodils for continued planting on A6070 southbound.

4.The connection of the School to the B4RN network was warmly welcomed

5.The saga to get diocese permission to erect a plaque in the Church to commemorate Burtonians whose names are missing remains mired in bureaucracy.

6.Slape Lane pruning remains in a bad state. Another bureaucratic mess apparently.

NATURE NOTES by Bryan Yorke

Where do I start! Because this month will be about birds, and nothing else other than more birds. Because that is what I am tied up with at this time of the year. I am out every day doing my vismig (visible migration) or perhaps I should explain. I am out counting the birds as they pass overhead on their migrations. I have been doing this since the first week in September and expect to continue until around bonfire night.

Probably the best place to start is today (20th October 2019) it's the day the Fieldfare's have started to cross over Burton on their way to the Lakes and then wherever their nomadic tendency takes them. I had no less than 2600 Fieldfare and 1376 Redwing this morning (0730hrs to 1230hrs) all following the line of the western flank of Hutton Roof and continuing northwest across Holme Park Fell to the tip of Farleton before veering off to a Western line as though perhaps making their way over to the Lythe Valley. It was noticeable more so with the Redwing that some of the parties just could not resist the temptation to cascade from the skies to call off in the area of Holme Stinted Pastures, to probably feast on the vast amounts of fat gorgeous berries which had shone up to them from the many hawthorn trees below. The berries this year are something really special. Also the Thrush numbers got even better the following day (21st October 2019 when I had 5443 Fieldfare and 1350 Redwing, I wonder just what the next few days might bring?

To think these birds may well have travelled all the way from Russia or Poland and the Baltics or even Iceland (with regards to the Redwing), many of the thrushes will also have come from nearer destinations but still far away like Norway, Finland or even the Netherlands. Although in most years we do get plenty of Thrushes, but numbers depend on how the crossing is over the North Sea. We need good high pressure between the continent and the UK so the birds are not blocked by harsh weather and have a good crossing to the West to join us here in Burton.

It's also been really good this last couple of days for Whooper Swans making their way South East to the Lincolnshire plains or maybe a little further and down into Norfolk. If conditions are favourable "Herds of Whiteness" will travel at around 40 miles per hour, taking approx 3-5 hours. On Saturday last (19th) I had 16 birds crossing from somewhere over by the Lythe Valley direction and heading to the South East, they would have passed over Burton somewhere around the Dalton Hall. Again on Sunday last (20th) I had another skein of 12 birds making the same journey at the same height and speed and almost setting the clock to the same time has their predecessors the day before.

The Linnet population over Vicarage Lane has now built up to at least 200 birds and they are continually moving about from field to field enjoying the spoils. It looks like 'Fat Hen' maybe their main food source, well there is plenty of that about at the moment. It is surprising how the birds soon learn just where the best feeding is!

Another winter visitor I have been getting is the Brambling a lovely little bird and related to the Chaffinch, a bird more at home in Scandinavia than the UK, but they are so welcome here. I recognise them more by their call which includes a sort of squeal but straight away gives the answer to who it is flying overhead. A friend who also does vismig over in Bradford only a couple of days ago had a pair of Waxwings flying over to the West so maybe it won't be long before we start to see those colourful birds enjoying our berries. They are sometimes seen over on Arnside Knott and especially love anywhere that has the 'white Rowan berries' available.

Starlings are building now in large numbers and today (21st Oct) has also been the peak in numbers so far and I would expect the roost over in Silverdale will be growing considerably, the murmurations will have started and they will get bigger and better by the day and will provide so much enjoyment to lovers of birds who go to see them perform these fantastic natural works of art in the skies. HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE

by Roger Bingham

The First Anniversary of the Armistice 11th November 1919 was the first anniversary of the Armistice or the cease fire which ended the First World War. Yet Burton was dilatory in celebrating what was hailed as the end of the 'War to End All Wars'. In London and local big towns like Lancaster, Kendal and Windermere there were parades, wreath layings and special church services. Though way back in January, a Burton Commemoration Committee had been formed, its members were soon a loggerheads and two Chairmen, Mr T Atkinson and Mr J Taylor, resigned. Perhaps because of the discord there were no parades in Burton on the 11th of November and, as later Remembrance observances had not come in, there were neither red poppies nor a two minutes silence. Holme did rather better with a parade of 40 post-comrades gathering in the church, while down at Milnthorpe a gleaming Portland stone Cross, one of the first War Memorials in the land, had been unveiled on 11th September. Meanwhile in Burton a variety of memorial options were still being argued over. Suggestions included: a Churchyard Lych-gate with brass plaques 'and two electric lights', a cross in The Square and the conversion of the recently closed National School into a Memorial Hall, for which £100 had already been collected. Eventually, a Parish vote favoured a Churchyard Cross, costing £200 as against one in The Square estimated at £400. The village GP, Dr Cosgrave, took over as Chairman of the Memorial Committee with Mr Taylor, back again as Vice-Chairman, along with other village pundits like Mrs Shorland-Ball and Mr J Read.

The Parish Council pressed Westmorland County Council to spend some funds from an extra Government Highways grant of £50, 000 on local roads and ' not just in Kendal and the Lake District'. Getting around was particularly difficult. A third railway strike in 12 months caused a shortage of coal which reached an unprecedented price of 10 shillings a ton. Gruellingly, the fuel crisis coincided with the harshest late Autumn cold spell for 20 years. With 19 degrees of frost the canal froze from Burton up to Crooklands and after an eight hours blizzard, the snow was eight inches deep in the streets. Even so, the children were happy. Having missed out on parties in 1918 because of the influenza epidemic, three separate celebrations were held before the schools broke up for Christmas. Firstly, 'the children attending the Burton Schools gave a concert to an appreciative audience presided over by the vicar the Rev R. W. Briton.

The next day ' by the kindness of Major Hornby the children were entertained for tea at the school.' Though, the actual tea was provided by Mrs Bell while the prizes were distributed by Mrs Briton. As 'the children left the room they each received an orange and a mince pie'-perhaps from Major Hornby. On the following Sunday came the Sunday School treat. Finally, in the first week in December, it was announced that a supper and entertainment was being arranged for returned Territorial Army Soldiers-so the war had not been totally forgotten. RKB.

In Year 6 we have been challenging ourselves on our times-tables Olympics, answering 20-100 questions in 2 1/2minutes. Long-multiplication and 2D shapes have kept us busy too. In our computing lessons we have been studying spreadsheets and formulas. and for our French lessons we have been improving our counting skills. For our art we have been learning about Henry Moore and have had fun drawing sketches of each other and making clay moulds. In our guided reading session we have been reading 'Goodnight Mr. Tom', linking to our continued research on WW2. We have enjoyed studying and writing newspaper articles for our English lessons. Moving on from light in science, we have been studying the eye, and light entering the eye. We continue to focus on our schools' Christian values and looking especially at respect, how we can respect our earth and reduce the effects of climate change. We are enjoying a selection of different sports such as orienteering, netball and football.

In their English, Year 5 have been writing a diary based on the book 'Street Child'. This book is based in Victorian times, showing how harsh life could be for a Victorian child. Their topic work continues with the Victorian theme, writing a newspaper article on the death of Queen Victoria. They are continuing with their intricate wallpaper designs based on the artist William Morris. An election took place in class to choose their representative for Forest Schools. Forest schools is all about outdoor education where we visit natural spaces to learn personal, social and technical skills. Their maths focus has been subtraction and addition. They have been enjoying netball and some year 5s were involved in a netball competition at Dallam school. In science year 5 have been studying the planets, and using fruits to represents the different sizes and distance between planets.

In their maths, Year 4 have been challenged with tenths, hundredths, decimals and fractions. They have all entered a story competition organised by Moto in the Community, entitled Bee Adventure. They have been given a choice of three introductions to their story and they can go wherever their imagination takes them. There are lots of prizes on offer, from playground equipment to vouchers.

Their science work on sound continues with home-made pan pipes with straws – quite a challenge to get a sound! The Mayan Gods have been researched in



topic along with map work in geography. They have been enjoying tag rugby in PE. During their RE lessons, Years 4 and 5 have written a small piece about themselves, and their lives here in the UK (Year 4 also drew self-portraits). Our Year 4 teacher will be visiting Uganda, and these profiles will be shared with the Ugandan children, she will also be taking some KS1 books from our library. This is all about supporting schools as part of the Brickworks Charity, helping South Sudanese refugees, in a camp in Mayo. The school's name is the Macedonia School. There she will support the teacher and also teach small writing workshops and hopes to return with letters from the Sudanese children. We had a fundraiser for this trip in the summer and raised £300.00. We wish her well and look forward to reading the letters from the Sudanese children.

Year 3 are writing their own stories about how they think we would all cope and react if aliens landed on our planet! Their maths has focussed on place value and word problems, using two-step operations to solve them. They have really enjoyed studying the Stone Age and what they think might have been found on a Stone Age menu. Light and dark has been their focus in science and, like Year 3 they have been honing their tag rugby skills.

Year 2 have been extending their research on Nurturing Nurses, looking at the interesting and varied lives of Florence Nightingale, Mary Seacole and Edith Cavell, why they were famous, and how they differed from each other. They have made Red Cross Medals and lanterns. In maths they have been taking 2-digit numbers and learning how to partition them, in more than one way, into tens and units. In their English they learnt how to set out a formal letter, and for their French they have enjoyed learning some new French words. They have continued their Lowry research and have added people and buildings to the landscapes they painted a few weeks ago.

Year 1 have been adding up numbers to ten, working on their number bonds, and also subtracting. The Big Bad Wolf is their focus in English, looking at the sequence of events, and using their adjective knowledge to describe the story. Reception are getting to grips with using and counting money, and sorting numbers. They have enjoyed party planning; thinking about hats, banners, invitation cards and party food. Handa's surprise has been their focus in English. Handa decides to take seven pieces of delicious fruit to her friend, Akeyo, who lives in the neighbouring African village, but a series of sneaky animals steal something from Handa's basket, which she's carrying on her head. When Handa reaches Akeyo, will she have anything left to offer her friend? In PE Reception have enjoyed their Gymnastic time with Miss Penny from Dallam School.

A very big thank you to everyone who supported our school at our latest bingo night. £490.00 was raised and this will go towards improvements and repairs to our playground equipment. A Halloween Disco for Burton Playgroup is planned for Friday 25th October, from 6:00pm – 8:30pm at our school, so come along and have some spooky fun. Our first Aldi sticker poster has been completed and will be sent off for our chance to win £20,000 for our school funds. We have made a great start on a second poster too. Thank you to everyone who has collected them from their shopping trips.

Roger Reports...

From the County & District Councils

It never rains but it pours and so this year's September equinox was particularly sodden and received nine emails of complaints about the weather on the 27h September. Other Councillors also bore the brunt of 'if you can't do much about it ring the council'. Not all problems need be directed to 'the council'. Blocked drains on pavements are the responsibility of the District and in some cases, like squares and greens, to Parish Councils. If watercourses like a beck, ditch or dyke are involved the Environment Agency should be informed. Foul water including floating toilet paper has to be dealt with by the United Utilities. (Incidentally I've just heard of plans for new legislation regarding septic tanks which may require their owners to install special pumps). Locally, we also have the complication of the Canal and Waterways Authority which deals with leakages and water erosion including, I believe, under the canal bridges and aqueducts.

Flooding from private land is particularly complex especially if many gardens and other land like fields are in multiple ownership. It took me many years, because of the legalities, before I induced the council to install a big pipe across Station Lane to reduce flooding on Tanpits Lane. This September nearby Neddy Hill was badly eroded only three years since we had major drainage and resurfacing work completed. District- wide the County's main Highways problem remains the saga of Victoria Bridge on Sandes Avenue in Kendal where constant flood surges have impeded repairs started after Storm Desmond. Elsewhere the long term drainage work on A6 south of Kendal at Prizet seems to have worked. I think I'll direct their flood engineers to our historic problems at Clawthorpe. Also on

Highways I have requested that part of my Members Highways Allowance should be used to resurface the appalling pavement from Tanpits Lane to the church. Unfortunately, my direct funds will not pay for my currently 'worst road' from Clawthorpe to Hutton Rood. But patching will be done on the road from Holme Mills to Drovers Way, whose back road has recently been made good.

I only hope there will be enough County funds as despite substantial increases in Central Government grants our South Area County Highways have overspent by £85, 816. On the other hand the revenue from On-Street Parking has increased from £1,033,115 in 2017-18 to £1,389, 682 in 2018-19. New parking regulations are coming in following major restriction in tourist hot spots like Cartmel. A safety code for school runs and parking is also being drawn up which I hope will not have to be regulated just by the school staff. I understand that it is only in London that it's illegal to park on pavements and that Cumbria police accept that some pavement parking is essential for traffic use on narrow roads, providing yellow lines etc are observed. On public transport our A ticket bus scheme for students is continuing; the starting fee will go up from £7 to £10 but the fares will remain the same. I am also pleased that the 'Dreamscheme' for young people's mental health will include our rural area where, for instance self -harm especially by giris has become an issue though it's below national standards. Good News is that Burton has the highest grade 10 rate for Health. Burton's Life expectancy is 83.8 for men and 86.3 for women. -RB.

BURTON FELLWALKERS SCOTTISH HOLIDAY

In September, thirteen members stayed at the Hydro Hotel in Pitlochry. Day one saw seven of the party ascending Ben Vrackie. After crossing the moorland above Pitlochry, Loch a' Choire was reached and the remaining steeply stepped climb to the top loomed ahead. Views from the summit were very good when the light cloud moved off and the party enjoyed their lunch before returning to the loch. A traverse path over the shoulder of Meall na h-Aodainn Moire, leading to the bealach on the Killiecrankie path, was followed to rejoin the main path leading to the car park. Others caught the bus to Killiecrankie and walked back along the riverside path to Pitlochry. The Visitor Centre at the hydro-electric dam provided good views and some welcome refreshments. Evening entertainment based on kilt construction was provided by a member of staff at the hotel.

Day two outings included Rannoch Moor Station where good food was enjoyed at the local establishment. The Hermitage near Dunkeld and followed the Inver Walk which passed Ossian's Hall and cave. The Torrywald Victorian viewing point (from which views were now obscured by trees), came next as the route continued through forest to join the riverside path where Neil Gow's Oak and wavy seat were seen. The final section passed through Inver Village itself. After refreshments at The Beatrice Potter cafe, the ancient Birnam Oak in Birnam Woods was visited.

The last full day provided an opportunity for some to explore the stretch of the Rob Roy Way from Strathtay to Pitlochry. The bus, with dubious prop shaft and differential noises, took the group to Grandtully for the start of the walk. Crossing the bridge to Strathtay, the path to Pitlochry was located and the ascent to the Fonab forest begun. Underfoot conditions varied considerably as the group made their way alongside the Tullypowrie Burn and then across the moor to the edge of the Forest. A search for the stone circle shown on the map proved unsuccessful but a short way into the forest, a new highway was crossed. This was apparently a road leading to a Bauxite mine away to the west of our route. On reaching the Fisherman's cafe alongside the Tummel, the group had a drink and continued to the dam and visitor centre before returning to the hotel. -CH

Listen! Can you hear this?


