COMMUNITY NEWS WOES!

The recent reorganization within the Westmorland Gazette, has led to a series hit and miss appearances of Burton. Holme and other Community News columns. The most recent and former editors: Vicky Goodall and Adrian Mullen. have been made redundant, along with the editor of the popular 'What's On' 'page, which has disappeared. We -Correspondents- were advised that, in future instead of dealing with one Editor, four trainee reporters would be in charge of Community News, all our submissions to be automatically collected under a new e.mail address plus, a change of deadline and presentation. However, this new system was not quite the smooth operation it seemed. Despite submissions e.mailed accordingly, teething troubles within the Newsroom exacerbated by staff shortages, proved to be problematic whilst a number Community News columns did not appear in print. At one stage I put an explanatory note on the notice board of the village shop whilst trying, to get these issues sorted out with the Newsroom which proved to be frustrating, lengthy with an increasing erosion of patience.

To be fair, clearly the remaining Gazette staff were under huge personal and professional pressures. After several weeks in limbo as it were. I managed to talk through a number of issues one to one, with an Associate Editor, by which time inevitably, rumours surfaced as to the future of the Kendal paper raising concerns our villages could lose their collective 'community voice'. I stated my case, received a sympathetic hearing, I 'm certain, I was not the only Correspondent who followed this route . However, things appear for now to have settled down ,although we were not advised in advance of the non-appearance of the entire Community News pages in the postChristmas edition. I have since then, checked-out the website of the National Union of Journalists where dismay was expressed regarding the recent staff-cutting exercise across the northern Newsquest titles. Finally dear readers, thank you for your patience, I hope this narrative has gone some way to explain my recent little local difficulties. Please be assured that, your Correspondent will remain vigilant and optimistic that, normal service will resume soon and stabilize

PC Observations...

of the Parish Council meeting by Kathryn Smi

More elections! The chairman announced that three elections, namely for the Parish Council, the District Council and for the Police and Crime Commissioner, would all be held on Thursday 7th May. The election for Parish Councillors will only take place if there are more than nine names submitted. At the meeting none of the current lot indicated whether they were intending to restand

We are represented at the District level by three Councillors and only one, Councillor Brian Cooper, comes up for reelection this year. Which leads on to the reports from the District Councillors. Councillor Harvey reported that he was aware that the Team Leader of SLDC Planning had written to the Council following its letter detailing the lack of compliance by the developer of Church Bank Gardens. Hopefully more of this sorry saga next month.

It was also reported that the SLDC Local Plan is being updated which includes Land Allocations. This provides the opportunity for the Parish Council to comment on both previous allocations and any future proposals. For the last two years Councillor Hopwood working with the Parochial Church Council has been trying to get Diocesan approval to mount a plaque in St James' Church bearing the names of those soldiers from WW1 whose names did not appear on the original Roll of Honour. At last permission has been granted and work can now go ahead. You do need to have 'staying power' as a Councillor! Parish Council then agreed the Budget for 2020/21 which will be presented to SLDC but until all the demands for funds from other agencies and the size of the grant from central Government are known your final council tax demand will not be known. Review of the Outstanding Actions presented no surprises. B4RN is going well, sign up for Morewood Drive has been good and the next phase now heads towards BoonTown The Conservation Project is also progressing with work recommencing in January. Improvements to Slape Lane progress not at all - there are no funds only mud. Another item before the Council for which you need 'staying power' The Council also briefly discussed possible parish involvement in the 75th Anniversary of VEday over the weekend 8th-12th May. This item will stay on the agenda in the hope that other parishioners may be moved to get involved.

Other items were: the Police Report which noted three incidents; an assault following a domestic incident, three burglaries on Burton Rd, Holme and a male exposing himself on Neddy Hill. Some pavement and kerbstone damage was noted as was the need for top dressing on Dalton Lane. Councillors also expressed some concern that Irving's wood lorries might be coming through the village with the County Council's approval. This would be investigated.

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NATURE NOTES by Bryan Yorke

Another fortnight or about the time you receive this magazine and we will be welcoming the return of Skylarks to Dalton Crags, with "Sky" singing away to his heart's content! I have seen Skylarks back as early as 1st of February and at times they have endured keen frost surroundings whilst at the same time delivering their most splendid ditty while climbing their imaginary ladder..... Other prebreeding signs can be lots of passing activity with Curlews, Lapwings and Oystercatchers and even the rooks are getting restless. It was as early as mid-January that I heard the Song Thrush merrily singing away to advertise his presence to others. That's really early!!

Wow! This year has been such a special time with the Chaffinch at Dalton Crags. Our area is becoming well known for its abundance of Chaffinch with high numbers passing through on migration and not only that, but we have the added bonus this year of many continental and regional birds stopping off to overwinter in the woodlands of the Crags.

This year in particular the number of Chaffinch over wintering in Dalton Crags has gone from 200 birds in a normal year to a colossal "over two thousand" birds. It really is an incredible sight to see the birds on their move and crossing over Plain Quarry in wave after wave after wave.

So what has made it so special this year compared to others? It's because this year has been a "mast year" which come around every 5-10 years. The Chaffinch overwintering now would probably have moved on to some other rich feeding grounds further south of us, but the beech mast

became irresistible and they just could not resist the temptations. Besides the Chaffinch, the Woodpigeons also are taking advantage of the extraordinary high yield with at times over 300 present in the Crags.

Although most of the birds gave away their identity whilst passing over by giving off their customary contact calls represented by a single repetitive chup call. That is all but for one bird which was clearly identified as a Brambling with its nasal eeerp call. But thinking about it for such a great amount of finches I am sure there must be far more Brambling amongst them which went unrecognized. Additionally it was pleasing to record a Siskin party of about 30 birds, several Greenfinch, Bullfinch and also Fieldfare and Redwing and lots of Blackbirds which were also enjoying the rich spoils of the local berry crops and have decided also to spend their winter in Dalton Crags.

The Snipe along with its cousin the smaller Jack Snipe and of course the Woodcock have again been recorded in excellent numbers throughout our area this year. Can't wait for that magical roding call of summer from our local breeding Woodcock "kwa,kwa,tisiwick", "kwa,kwa,tisiwick" The Pink Footed Geese are about with regular sightings over the past few days (20th January). They have been setting off from both Lincs and Norfolk and seen heading through Spurn before taking on a W or NW direction towards Cumbria.

The rare Great White Egret is still around in the fields on the left hand side which you see as you are leaving Burton in the Kendal direction. Most days he's around hunting frogs.

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HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE

HAPPY NEW YEAR 1920
JANUARY. The church choir heralded the New Year at Midnight by singing "
Christians Awake" in the Market Place.
There were 40 communicants at the New Year's Day Communion service.
Controversially, the Parochial Church Council decreed that PCC members should attend Communion at least three times a year. Butter prices rose to 2s 8d per pound, dearer in real terms than a 100 years later. A hurricane force wind blew slates off local roofs.

FEBRUARY. When Tom Crayston of Burton married Miss Shepherd of Holme he presented their bridesmaids with prayer books. The bride wore a blue crepe de chine gown. Warnings in reports that there might be a recurrence of the fatal 1918-19 flu epidemic included 'avoid excessive alcohol, cold and patients should occupy separate rooms and beds -where possible'.

MARCH Mrs Shorland-Ball, who was leaving the village, was presented with a beautifully embroidered bag by the Women's Conservatives and Unionists. The Burton branch had 68 'old members and 10 new'. A car belonging to Alfred Robinson, a Kendal timber merchant. which he had parked on Clawthorpe Lane was stolen while he was inspecting Mr Woof's woodland. Four young men 'travellers, subsequently arrested at Oxenholme, were charged with stealing the £275 vehicle'. When their pleas that they were 'only going on a joy ride and had no in intention of stealing' were dismissed they were remanded and subsequently sent to prison.

APRIL There was a full congregation at the main Easter Sunday service where the vicar the Rev Britten was assisted by the Rev Menneer (pronounced 'Manure' by his pupils) Head master of Heversham Grammar school who preached the sermon. After a child had been knocked down by a motor bike while crossing Main Street there were complaints that the local roads were rendered unsafe for pedestrians and horse drawn vehicles.

MAY On 1st May a Railway worker's 'Labour Day Strike' in support of striking miners disrupted communications. There had already been 100 days of rain during the year which, at 23 inches, equalled records set in both 1872 and 1892. But it was fine for Burton Gala on Whit Monday when a fancy dress procession round the village was led by the Carnforth Brass band. Sports were held in Mr Dobson's Field followed by a dance in the National School. At the hiring fairs the six month pay rate for farm workers rose to an unprecedented £60 for best men and £20-30 for women.

JUNE Mr Dobson vacated Green Dragon Farm which was taken by Mr J Robinson of Crooklands. Mr Dobson sold eight acres of hay grass for an extraordinary high price of £44: 10s. In two train accidents three men were killed just down the main-line at Carnforth. It was decided to resume holding a children's summer picnic which had been not been held since 1914.

JULY two vehicles were written off following a car crash on the A6070 near Longlands. In a contested court case concerning a Burton cottage Mr G H Pennell was granted an 'ejection order'. Mr



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Walton, the evicted tenant, was ordered to repair 'defective sanitary arrangements' within ten days. 55 ex-Service men enjoyed a 'substantial supper at the Royal Hotel. Although there were seven fine days in the month 'the hay harvest was rotting. AUGUST Having trekked over on foot, Warton village Boy Scouts enjoyed (or endured) a week's camping on Clawthorpe Fell. Religious Education inspectors decided that Burton's day and Sunday school's had achieved 'excellent standards'. Long lines of holiday-making motorists splashed through the village on August bank holiday.

SEPTEMBER. While supporting increased highways expenditure Major Cropper argued that his opponents should realise that we are living in 1920 not 1820. There were demands that a speed limit of 10MPH should be made for Burton. Thomas Heywood described as 'assistant Post Master to his father' was charged with embezzling £4:16s: 1d from Post Office funds. Milnthorpe magistrates were told that he had suffered mental health problems and had been twice in a 'lunatic asylum'. His father had kept and clothed him but had not paid him a regular wage. He was fined £5 and the family gave up the Post Office.

OCTOBER Major Cropper chaired a South Westmorland Rural District Council enquiry about sanitation in Burton and Holme which eventually led to a sewerage plant being installed near Holme Mills. After Kendal Town Council permitted golf to be played on Sundays, Burton's footballers and tennis players argued that strict sabbatarian rules should be relaxed in the village. **NOVEMBER-The fifth November** activities were 'greater than for many years with a large bonfire in Mr Newsham's field and many displays of fireworks'. After two years of controversy, the war memorial cross was unveiled in the church yard. It commemorated the 15 Burton men who had died in the war: '11 had been killed in action, 2 died of wounds in France and two in hospital in England'.

DECEMBER. The Rural District Council's plans to build workers houses costing £60 were criticised as most working families would be unable to pay the rent of £30 per year. Snow fell on the tops' but, following a year of lousy weather, fresh strawberries were gathered at Christmas. Following the departure of Mrs Shorland -Ball there were fewer 'seasonal benefactions' than formerly.

Roger Reports...

From the County & District Councils

Firstly a Happy New Year to you and yours! Along with my good wishes I'll also pass on the County's chief executive's 'original' advice to "Keep well in Winter" by 'staying warm, looking out for each other and getting a flu jab'. Of more direct relevance for the Council, Cumbria highways always have 'sufficient' sand and grit for the winter. Even so I passed on grumbles that 'the County Highways department seemed to be slow in providing prompt treatment during the cold spell in December'. But, the usual 'lambing-time' blizzards are still to come.

Secondly may I thank everyone who sent me good wishes etc in my nearly three weeks in hospital in November and for shorter spells since. Every cloud has its silver lining! and considering we were inflicted with a winter election -my silver lining was missing the bulk of the General Election campaigns. Subsequent, impact on our local councils of the 12 December result remains debatable. Any effect on SLDC might be revealed at the next district election in May. On the County, changes are being contended as we still have a Labour / Liberal Democrat coalition controlled administration, although the Labour support has shrunk across the County and in our Westmorland part to 5%. The Lib Dems who obtained 18% of the County vote, nevertheless have 40% of places on the County's cabinet. Yet with 35 seats out of 81 the Conservatives are the largest party on the Council. Even so, in my view, the chance to change our administration will have to wait for the County Elections in May 2021. Meanwhile, the councils are setting the 2020-21 budget. On SLDC a

surplus of £88km is expected on last's year's budget. Following a government grant of £Im in October there should be less need for savings' than in recent years. The District's customer-connect staffing changes are expected to generate annual savings of £1.5m. In line with government guidelines SLDC's share of the Council Tax is likely to rise by 2.5% per property. I will give information about the County's budget next month.

On the January Council the biggest debate concerned a vote to increase member's allowances which eventually settled for 2%, broadly in line with inflation and a staff pay rise. Currently Cumbria County Councillors get the second lowest pay in the country receiving £8,573 compared, for instance, to Lancashire Councillor's allowance of £10,675. Cumbria councillors believe that they deserve more than councillors in compact areas, because of the time taken in travelling. A morning meeting in Carlisle if you live 60-70+ miles away can take all day. But, we all hate deciding our own allowances and would prefer 'allowance' decisions to be left to others. On general matters the District Council, is currently examining an extended bio-diversity strategy. Developers will be required to submit plans which takes into account bio-diversity objectives like conservation and pollution control. Following concerns about the council's vehicle safety a new 'lane-end' scheme aims to acquire smaller refuse collection vehicles 'to minimise

the risk from vehicle manoeuvres where access is restricted'. Also on SLDC the rejection of an application to register the Big Meadow at Staveley as a protected open space highlighted the possibility for parish councils to enquire how they might preserve valued landscape from development. Some Cumbrian Parishes have already succeeded in registering open spaces as village greens. Please, let me know if you have any ideas around Burton for land not designated for development which might be suitable for a public space. So far under the Development Framework, projected development at Green Dragon is starting and Church Bank is nearly complete. At Church Bank I am glad to report that the street signs have, at last, been clarified and renewed.

In the meantime I am trying to continue my regular village surveys. But, please continue to keep me informed. Good Luck-Roger.

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Vicar's Letter...

Living water

The sandcastles have been precisely placed with a flag carefully inserted in each, the city walls have been built up and the streets decorated with shells and seaweed. Now it's time for the moat to be filled with seawater – but now it's also that sad time when children discover that sand doesn't hold water and the moat will never be full.

Navvies knew that they often needed to line a newly-dug canal with clay if it were to hold water. Farmers knew that if there were no natural ponds on their land they could dig one as long as they could make it water-tight. But you wouldn't expect them to go to all that trouble if there was already a reliable bubbling stream within a stone's throw. Why put all that effort into building something that's unnecessary and inferior?

Jeremiah expresses the Lord's surprise and sadness at the wasted and foolish effort of Old Testament Israel in rejecting the God who was everything to them: "My people have committed two sins: They have forsaken me, the spring of living water, and have dug their own cisterns, broken cisterns that cannot hold water." (Jeremiah 2:13)

When your life feels like the dried and cracked bed of a pond that never holds any refreshing water it's long past time to ask yourself whether you have been ignoring a bubbling stream that flows nearby. Here is Jesus' answer to a woman that he met by a well and whose whole life seemed to be a series of painful relationships that had turned sour: "If you knew the gift of God and who it is that asks you for a drink, you would have asked him and he would have given you living water." (John 4:10)

Later this month we are teaming up with local churches and students and staff from Capernwray Hall to offer a week of events that may help you to discover, or rediscover, the life-giving water that Jesus Christ offers to all. I do hope that you will join us. Further details are at



B4RN HIGH-SPEED BROADBAND GIGABIT VOUCHER SCHEME

As you know our school now has a High-Speed Broadband connection (B4RN 4 Burton) thanks to the efforts of some dedicated village volunteers and, in particular, the efforts of Mike Iddon and Martin Sansby, who are working tirelessly to bring this service to Burton.

The intention is now to roll this out to the rest of village, starting with Route 4, which will connect householders on the south-east side of the village, from the school down to HeronSyke. Digging to lay the conduit has already begun. We now have a substantial number of interested householders, but we are not sure whether everyone in the village is aware that if you wish to be connected you must apply, as soon as possible, to the Department for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS) for a Gigabit Voucher. The Government will then allocate grant funding towards the deployment of B4RN service in Burton, which will significantly reduce the cost of installation. What do you get with your Gigabit Voucher?

The voucher you receive depends on whether or not you have invested in B4RN (see https://b4rn.org.uk/community/investors/ for details), and whether you apply for a resident or business voucher.

For Residents

If you wish to be connected but have not invested in B4RN, your voucher is worth £150. This covers the cost of connection. Any additional costs incurred, such as contracting a digger or hiring tools, must be personally covered. B4RN recommends that these costs can be avoided or minimised if villagers and neighbours work together to ensure connection for their street/area.

If you wish to be connected and have invested at least £1500 in B4RN, then your voucher is worth £150 plus a free connection. In other words, the £150 can go towards any costs incurred in receiving B4RN's high-speed broadband connection.

For each £1500 or more invested, a householder receives one free connection. Free connections can be donated to neighbours, family or friends living in the village.

For Registered Businesses

Businesses receive a £300 voucher plus a free connection.

How to apply for a Gigabit Voucher

You can find the Gigabit Voucher Request form, and further information, on the B4RN website at https://b4rn.org.uk/postcode-checker/.

- On the Get B4RN page enter your postcode in the space provided and click on 'Check'.
- This will take you to a page where, if you scroll down, you will find the Gigabit Voucher Request Form.
- Be sure to complete the entire form including first your contact details and then, below the images, your requested service details.
- Finally, do the speed test, enter your speed and click on 'Submit Voucher Request'.

Validating your Gigabit Voucher

Submission of your voucher request will trigger a response from the Department for Digital, Culture, Media and Support (DCMS), who will, within a few days, send you an email asking you to validate your request. It is important that you look out for this email and check your spam folder if it doesn't arrive in your inbox. Your voucher must be validated within 28 days or you will lose it.

Business applicants will also usually be asked for additional proof. You should contact Amy Lis in the B4RN office to ask what proof/ID is needed for your particular type of business. (a.lis@b4rn.org.uk: 01524 555 887).

Your Parish Precept Explained

As council tax bills for 2020/21 will be delivered in the next couple of months, this seems a good time to explain about the Parish Precept.

The precept is the council tax that the billing authority, South Lakeland District Council, collects on behalf of the Parish Council. The precept is calculated as part of the parish council's budget; it fills the gap between the parish council's planned expenditure and it estimated income. Parish Council's do not receive direct funding from central government and so the precept is a hugely important part of a Parish Council's income.

At the recent Parish Council Meeting it was agreed to request a precept of £22,326 for 2020/21. This precept represents an increase of £5,000 on the PC request for 2019/20. The reasons for this increase are outlined in the minutes of the December Parish Council Meeting and below.

The Band D charge is calculated as the precept divided by the tax base (the number of Band D equivalent dwellings in the parish)

Therefore for a band D property, the Parish Council precept increase paid by the council tax payer for 2020/21 will equate to approximately £7/year.

The increase for the coming financial year is partly due to incomplete payment of the CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy). This has led to a shortfall in estimated income. The Parish Council has also had unforeseen expenditure due to extra drainage works that were required to alleviate the flood risk to The Square and surrounding areas.

This Precept income allows Burton-in-Kendal parish council to provide local residents with numerous services throughout the village including: grass cutting, street lighting, street furniture, litter and landscape maintenance as well as maintaining the Boon Town Playground and more recently the Partnership Scheme in Conservation Area (PSiCA) project.

Your Parish Council also acts as a community liaison with other local service providers (such as South Lakeland District Council, Cumbria County Council and Cumbria Constabulary) and is always on hand to assist with the queries and concerns raised by local residents. We hope you will agree that Burton-in-Kendal Parish Council provides local residents with good value for money.


