THE 'Community Help Scheme for Residents in Self -Isolation' organized by Burton Parish Council was fully operational within 48 hours of the first discussion. A swift and truly magnificent effort and outcome headed-up by Chairman Alan Wren and fellow Councillors whilst, Christine Davidson Parish clerk and her friend Lesley Bailey rapidly recruited many and willing volunteers, forty of whom are now registered having so far assisted over 60 households with meals. shopping, prescription collection or, just a phone call to the very isolated. Councillors ensured that, all residents were made aware of the scheme details, contact names, phone numbers ,e.mails. The monthly village newsletter Burton News, usually is paper- printed and distributed to every house by volunteers in all weathers. However, heeding government advice, it appeared on line with the usual copy on the village website, coordinated, arranged and type-set by editors supported by the hands-on ,experienced Editorial Committee. Aware that not every resident had Internet access, arrangements were made accordingly.

A very special mention to Gill and Akis from the village store and Post Office, along with their brilliant staff without question, the village life -line in no small measure. Every day, they help underpin both the Parish Scheme whilst looking after their vulnerable customers with extra deliveries, in good humour and unbelievable patience.No mean feat given, the stressful difficulties with supplies .Feedback from Christine, Lesley and Alan warmly commented on the width and breath of appreciation by and the overall generosity shown from, Burton-in Kendal.A good place to be.Thank you indeed everyone.

Green bin collections are re-starting in South Lakeland next week

South Lakeland District Council is introducing a **monthly collection** of green bin waste from the week **commencing Monday 4 May**.

The council is aiming for every home to get one green bin collection during May, while ensuring collection crews can continue to work safely and comply with social distancing guidelines. The council is keeping the situation under review and will look to resume a full fortnightly green waste collection as soon as it is safe and practical to do so.

Residents with green bins are asked to please follow these steps from Monday 4 May:

- Check your collection calendar and leave your green bin out on your next scheduled collection day. Crews will begin the round on the scheduled collection day.
- If your bin has not been emptied by the end of the scheduled collection day please take your bin back in and present it again on the next scheduled green bin collection day according to your calendar, when the crews will return to continue the rest of the round.


BLUE HAIR!

Burton singers donates more than two thousand pounds to charities

Burton Singers are donating £2200 to charities who need it during this difficult time. The village choir regularly donates money to charity after its twice annual concerts but this is the first time a donation on this scale has been made.

The money will be divided between four charities. Morecambe Foodbank will receive £1000. A further £1000 will be split between Lighthouse, (a community mental health hub, set up to cover for the loss of the South Lakeland branch of MIND) and Springfield (A domestic abuse support group based in Kendal.) The local charity Wise Up will receive £200.

Burton Singers VE Day concert has been cancelled due to the Covid 19 health crisis but its hoped restrictions will be lifted in time for the choir to rehearse for their annual Christmas celebration. Roger Reports...

From the County & District Councils [THIS ARTICLE WAS RECEIVED MID APRIL]

Because of the Corona Virus Crisis there is, strictly speaking, no Council News. To begin with the **District Council, Police and Crime** Commissioner elections have been postponed and there have been no Council Meetings since about 15th March. Also, most office staff have been diverted 'to 'home working'. This 'fact' was literally brought home to me when, during 'normal working hours, I heard a voice from amongst a group of cyclists pedalling down the lane yell out 'that's Councillor Bingham's house'. I responded, from behind a bush, 'working at home Lads?', which was greeted by guffaws from his mates.

On the other hand some staff are particularly hard pressed including our refuge collectors who are on half strength teams to avoid sharing vehicle cabs and to cover for selfisolating colleagues. While so many of us are on 'gardening leave' it is unfortunate that Green Bin collections have been suspended. Even so it seems to me more important that our domestic waste and recycling of papers etc are given priority.

The County's Children's Services department have complex concerns. With the schools closed, referrals of vulnerable children are down by 40% but, outbalancing this gap, calls concerning domestic violence have increased perhaps as a result of folk being together more often in cramped accommodation.

Relevant help lines are:-Domestic Abuse 0800 2000 247; Men's Advice Line 0808 801 0327; Victim Support-free of charge-0808 1689 111.

Meals available for 'free dinner children' and for families of "key workers' at certain schools have had a mixed take up and the alternative of a payment of £15 per week seems fraught with problems like the possibility of fraud and the availability of suitable meals. But a silver lining might be that a way of providing children's food in school holidays might emerge.

Although we like to think that South Lakeland has fewer social problems than other places, has recently been dispelled by recognition of countyline drug peddling. But a recent survey also shows that compared to 2018 All Crime in South Lakeland is up 10%, Violence with injury 31% and Burglary 40%. But Sexual Offences are down by 15% and Robbery like mugging-by 40%. As good news I have a councillor's £1000 grant to allocate to village causes so please let me have suggestions so that any improvements may be made for when better time return.



NATURE NOTES by Bryan Yorke

A couple of days ago I had a Tern overhead whilst bird watching from over on Vicarage Lane. Please don't worry folks, It was a Comic Tern! So I guess it only fair that I should explain. I saw the Tern (slender gull type bird), but not able to fully establish which sort it was eq: it looked very much like a Common Tern, yet looked even more like an Arctic Tern. So when you get this sort of situation and you are not sure you call the bird a Comic Tern eg: You take the first three letters of the Common (COM) and the last two letters of the Arctic (IC) and there you have it COMIC TERN. During this last two days very large amounts of Arctic Terns have been crossing over the Country from West to East and large numbers are recorded annually from the Ribble Estuary and Heysham areas, but there's bound to be hundreds crossing over our little village of Burton, but they are usually so high and difficult to pick up. Although they will have crossed the seas at moderate height. they will on reaching land start gaining height even in such a short distance from our coast to where we are.... Three weeks ago during the hours of darkness an ocean going duck called the Common Scoter was passing overhead in their thousands again from the West and heading overland on their journey to the far Arctic, I wonder just how many passed us, there must have been large numbers. I have been stood most mornings recently up on Vicarage Lane trying to count the Mea dow Pipits and the tired arriving Swallows has they crossed over our

Swallows has they crossed over our village heading North to their upland breeding areas or in the case of the Swallows to their northern farmlands.

It's been great watching them! But at this time of year most of the birds coming through will be travelling during the night! The Warblers which include our Willow Warbler, Chiffchaff, Blackcap, Garden Warbler, Whitethroat's (both lesser or common), and not just the Warblers there will be our Wheatear, Whinchat etc etc

Obvious restrictions are in place but for my recent daily exercise I decided to survey both Lancelot and Burton Fell and I counted 44 singing Willow Warblers back on territory and one bird that was probably NOT! The reason I say that is that 43 of the birds were in full song with their lovely sweet diminishing call, whilst one was just doing its "contact call" of a low "hou-whit" call. I took this to be a bird which was just stopping over for food and rest before setting off during the night on its advancing journey. I was also able to record four Chiffchaff, four Blackcaps, two Garden Warblers, three Marsh Tits and two Tree Pipits, a nice variety.

As I write this (20th April 2020), I can report seeing plenty of butterflies during this warm spell of weather we are having, there have been Brimstone, lots and lots of Peacocks, Small Tortoiseshell, and in the last day or two I have seen Speckled Wood in the shady places and a firm favourite the Orange Tip.

Just at this time Ramsons are giving off that garlic aroma, Early Purple Orchids are gracing us in their beautiful deep magenta, and Bluebell woods are coming alive with carpets of blue, and some interspersed with little white dots which when you approach you soon realize they are Wood Anemone. It's all coming together now! But there is one flower out at the moment which needs to be mentioned in its own right and that is the Primrose. I have recently had the great pleasure to be able to revisit the Primrose field which lies over on East slopes of Hutton Roof Crags and the sight is just phenomenal, with thousands if not millions of the little yellow beauties, in fact there are that many it was like playing hopscotch to try and avoid treading on any. For as far as you could see it was Primrose, Primrose, Primrose covering an area of perhaps half a mile, and if you looked very close occasionally would pop up just odd Cowslips or the odd Early Purple Orchid or even a contrasting blue of the Dog Violet. Over-hall a must and a sight for sore eyes – thank you primula!

Our nature talks for April and May have been postponed until the 2020-2021 season, and our Annual General Meeting scheduled for early June may also have to be rescheduled for later in the year as, like many others, we have no idea how for how long the current lockdown and closure of public buildings will continue.

HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE

by Roger Bingham BURTON CELEBRATES VICTORY IN EUROPE.

"Westmorland Gay to celebrate End of European Fighting" ran the headline in the Westmorland Gazette for May 1945. Even so, there was the not the same excited outpouring of relief and joy which had greeted the end of the First War in 1918. Its ending with the Armistice, on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month, had come suddenly. This time it was different. To begin with the War Against Japan was still on which, it was thought, might continue for two more years. Also, coming to the end of this war' seemed endlessly drawn out. Way back in 1941 Burton folk had set up a War Memorial Hall Committee. Three years on, Germany's Third Reich had not crashed down immediately the allied D Day armies landed in France.

Yet, nine months later when peace eventually came, hopes of a brave new post war world were mingled with grumbles. Another Gazette caption groused 'Whitehall blamed for rates rises' and a councillor anticipated a 'loss of parental control' now that their children were being 'given (!) school dinners, milk and medical services'. In daily life peace did not bring instant prosperity. Announcements in Victory Week included 'housewives will have to have a seventh of their meat ration in corned beef'. Its price had also gone up from 1s 4d to 1s 8d in the pound, a fair chunk out of the allocation of four shillings of meat and offal per adult per week.

Meanwhile in Burton, Margery and May Atkinson from Crow Trees were congratulated respectively for obtaining certificates in Shorthand and Typing and for entry into a teacher's training college.

Another significant village news item was a report that Burton Players, a newly formed club, made a successful debut in the Old School when they presented, under the capable managership (sic) of Mr T.J. Dobson, three one act plays 'O.H.M.S., 'The Wash Tub' and 'Heaven on Earth'. During the intervals Mrs Ellis gave several pianoforte performances.

Then, on V.E. Day, 'the village was bedecked from end to end, and presented a gay spectacle. There was a crowded dance provided by the Parish Council and an excellent buffet'. On the Sunday following 'despite the inclemency of the weather, a fine show was made by the Procession from the Market Square led by members of the local services. The (church) services were splendidly attended. During the festivities the historic market Square with its quaint old cross was floodlit, showing up the bright display of bunting and flags'. So, like the rest of the County Burton, went 'gay'. RKB.

TALES OF THE M6 - by Kath Hayhurst

Burton Memories, after our walk to the seat by the Motorway bridge on Station Lane, on Easter Sunday, we were reminiscing that the M6 was as quiet as it was when it was built. John and I, with our sons Colin and Jeffrey came to live in Burton on Friday 13th September 1968. The house was newly built, we had checked the plot beforehand and heard that a motorway was going to be built nearby. We decided to do some research, and went to the contractor's offices at Shaw End near Grayrigg. The engineers showed us the plans and told us where it would go through the parish. He said the house would be 250 yards from the centre of the roadway. He also pointed out that it would be in a deep cutting so the sound of the vehicles would go up and over the homes nearby. French's the building contractors had their site on the field opposite Burton Thistle football pitch, it was full of huts and cabins. Some of the workers lived in a caravan site in the next field going north. Unfortunately I have not got a photograph of either, in the Burton archives.

After we moved into 2 Station Lane I took photos of the motorway's progress from Hanging Hill, they show the area as fields, then dug out, and later concrete columns for the new bridge.John brought many loads of crushed stones from Holme Park quarry, and later Asphalt from Leapers Wood quarry near Carnforth, then French's made all the ready mix concrete at Holme Park for the bridges. Our sons and their friends used to roller skate on the new road surface after the work men had gone home.

Peter Cummings retired butcher Burton Square, who built Addle Bank told us the workmen found a well nearby when the road was altered, he said they measured the depth of the water and it was 30 ft deep.

Our daughter Joanne was born in 1970,the District Nurse who lived near the school said she was very busy checking all the new babies. There was 5 boys and 1 girl in April,and 30 babies that year. She had a saying: 'New house new baby', as Vicarage Close, Burton Park, St. James's Drive, Morewood and Mowbray Drive were all being built then. We have really enjoyed living in Burton and we have had the same neighbours at No 1 for 52 years, so we have seen our children grow up and grandchildren come and go. This month we celebrate our Diamond Wedding, but it looks as though it will be a very low key event due to the Coronavirus, however we can still reminisce!

It certainly hasn't been the continuation of the B4RN installation we had hoped for at the start of 2020 with the coronavirus outbreak. B4RN are keyworkers so have been busy maintaining our existing network and, where safe, expanding it. This means that Route 4 (Boon Town, Mowbray + Thornleigh Drives, Dalton Lane & Heronsyke) now have core fibre blown to live chambers. Martin Sansby has done an excellent job connecting people on Route 4 whilst observing government social distancing guidelines. Many residents have themselves dug the orange duct from their boundary to their property during lockdown and are now live with the B4RN 1000 MB/s hyperfast broadband service. If you are concerned about people needing to enter your property during this crisis B4RN blows fibre and fuses on the outside. However you'll need to drill a hole through your house wall for the duct to get in through, but even this can be done from the outside for you if you aren't able to do it.

Please see the map of Route 4, any properties which are on this route (within the red lines) have the potential to go live with the B4RN service relatively quickly. If you are on this route and would like more information about how to do this please email b4rn4burton@gmail.com

In other news Mike Iddon was interviewed by a reporter from The Sunday Times about being connected to B4RN just before the lockdown came into force. In the article it explains how Mike's wife Maddy is classified as a vulnerable person as she suffers from medical conditions caused by chemotherapy treatment she received when she was younger and is currently being shielded. The installation of B4RN has meant they can both work from home, teach an online curriculum to their children, video conference with friends and colleagues and watch UHD simultaneously if required and with no slow down. Previously it was a struggle to do just one of these things. We are keen to keep our promise and install this voluntary community led service to all properties who request it. We will endeavour to keep you updated through Burton News of our progress. It was two years ago that we held our initial village meeting to discuss the idea of bringing B4RN from Dalton Hall to Burton. Since then we have attained significant numbers of wayleaves to allow the optical fibre to enter the village across people's land, installed the cabinet, dug the core route in and sent Burton Morewood School live with a free lifetime internet connection. We've also hosted a B4RN meeting at the school to show residents the service in action and talk to them about what the next steps are. Furthermore many residents are now connected on routes 1,4 & 6. This has all been possible because of the community spirit of this village with its many volunteers and I'm sure this will continue into the future.

We hope that you and your families stay safe in these challenging times.




