

Layered Apple Pies

Ingredients for Apple Filling:
400g-450g Apples
1 tbsp Butter
50g Sugar
1/2 tsp Lemon Juice
1/4 tsp Salt
1/4 tsp Cinnamon (or more if, like me, you prefer your filling to be very cinnamon-y!)
1 tbsp Cornflour

Ingredients for Dough A: 300g Flour 1 tbsp Sugar 1 tsp Salt 110ml Water

75ml Vegetable Oil

1-2 tbsp Water

Ingredients for Dough B: 130g Flour 80g Butter

Method for Filling:

- 1. Peel and roughly chop the apple into a saucepan.
- 2. Add butter; heat and stir until the butter is melted.
- 3. Add sugar, salt, cinnamon and lemon juice. Stir will.
- 4. Cover the pan and cook for one minute.
- 5. Stir, and leave to simmer.
- 6. Mix cornflour and water; pour into the apple, and cook and stir until thick.
- 7. Remove from heat, and chill.

Method for Dough A:

- 8. Mix the flour, sugar and salt.
- 9. Add the water and oil and mix to a dough.
- 10. Knead until dough forms a smooth ball.
- 11. Wrap in cling film and leave to rest for 30 minutes.

Method for Dough B:

- 12. Cut the butter into the flour.
- 13. Mix until a dough is formed.
- 14. Wrap in cling film and leave to rest.

Method to Make Pies:

- 15. Divide each dough into 10 pieces.
- 16. Wrap each piece of Dough B in a piece of Dough A.
- 17. Make each wrapped dough into an egg shaped 'ball'.
- 18. Roll out each ball lengthwise until very very thin and long.
- 19. From one end roll up like a swiss roll.
- 20. Repeat steps 18 and 19.
- 21. Cut each roll in 2.
- 22. With swiss roll effect up and down, flatten into thin rounds (they will give the appearance of catherine wheels).
- 23. Use your thumb to shape the rounds into shallow cones.
- 24. Fill each cone shape with apple; close the dough and crimp the edge. 25. Fry until golden brown. (In the Air Fryer we found 4-5 in the basket, sprayed with oil, took 10 minutes on each side).

They are best served warm, but still delicious cold. We have also decided to make mince pies using this recipe when the time comes!

Celebrate Snowsports Kendal Snowsports Club open/fun day on Sept 19th 2021. 9.30am-3pm

How are you going to enjoy your post-covid "freedom"? It may not feel like it right now, but the Summer Solstice has been and gone and the nights are drawing in: if that thought has you hanging up your outdoor clothes and running for a warm fire and a duvet, you possibly haven't experienced the joys of winter that can be had from sliding down a mountainside with a board or two planks under your boots. Yes, the antidote for sufferers of seasonal affective disorder or "SAD" is to take up skiing or boarding. Unfortunately, the British weather, particularly in recent years, is not reliable enough to put the real white stuff down when we need it, but there are dry ski slopes popping up all over, including one on our doorstep, on Castle Hill in Kendal. Any Burtonians whose children have gone through the Burton Morewood School will know that ski taster sessions have been offered (covid allowing) on this slope to years 4-6 as part of the PE curriculum – pretty unusual for a state school! Now we would like to invite Mum and Dad, Uncle Tom Cobley and all!

Kendal Snowsports is a volunteer run club, open to everyone, including those with disabilities, and offers open skiing and boarding or lessons from beginner to expert for all members at a very reasonable cost. Children's lessons are on Saturdays and Adults most evenings (see website for details) Open skiing sessions are on Thursday evenings 8-10pm and all day (10am to 4pm) on Sunday, taster sessions are available at these times so you can try out the facilities without the commitment of joining the club.

The slope is made of snowflex which is easier to slide on than the older alternatives and has less chance of causing injury (health and safety bit – snowsports can never be risk free). Although it is a small slope, it has 3 lifts and varied terrain, bumps, jumps and rollers, to make it interesting and help develop skills. As volunteers, the instructors are passionate advocates of the sport and very willing to give help in open sessions as well as lessons. All equipment is available for hire and is of good quality, regularly replaced and well maintained. It helps that all profits are ploughed back into improving the facilities!

Roger Reports...

From the County & District Councils

The good news is that Covid numbers have fallen from 700 cases in the County on Freedom Day, 19th July, to 206 cases per 100 thousand when there were 33 hospital cases a month later. 92% of Cumbrians over 18 have had both inoculations and 76% have had one jab. Even so there remains confusion about preventive measures with some shops still displaying notices requiring customers to wear masks and many people wearing them outside.

Nevertheless public meetings are resuming. Because members still have to be socially distanced larger halls are being used. This meant that the County's Development Control and Regulations and the Police and Crime committees have been held in Carlisle. For SLD's C Local Committee, with no other room apparently available, we had to meet at Castle Green Hotel . Similarly SLDC's main council with a reduced attendance met in the Town Hall's Assembly Room which is a larger than the Council Chamber. Meanwhile, much of SLDC's HQ at South Lakeland House is being cleared out to make way for offices to be let privately. This is at a time when because of 'working from home' partially continuing Kendal seems to be awash with empty office space.

Even so the main council debates are bound up with the virtually simultaneous announcements of the review of parliamentary constituencies and of Local Government reform. So far the biggest objections have concerned the reduction of Cumbria's MPs from six to five by in effect

abolishing our own Westmorland and Lonsdale Constituency. Locally most folk seen to be indifferent to our own area being put in with Morecambe and part of South Lakeland. As far as I can see the boundaries of our current County Division of Lower Kentdale will stay the same. Some Ulverston councillors have grumbled about being put into Barrow but the biggest objections have centred on the apparent failure of the boundary commission to take account of 'significant geographical features'. Hence Alston high up in the Pennines being in Eden will be united with South Lakeland and Barrow and be even further from the unitary authority's HQ than it was from Cumbria's HQ at Carlisle.

But the biggest anomaly apparently resulted by allocating Ambleside, Bowness and Windermere into Copeland which will be separated from the likely HQ at Whitehaven by England's largest Lake and highest mountain. So far I've only joined in the debate over the name of the southern Unitary Authority which I want to be called Westmorland and Furness. But Penrith (formerly in Cumberland) wants Eden to be added to the name, even though much of Eden like Kirkby Stephen, Shap and the old County Town of Appleby were in Westmorland. The northern Unitary is likely to be called Cumberland. But whether the two unitaries authorities will be called Counties or Districts has yet to be agreed. Please let me know your views. All the best-Roger

PC Observations...

AUGUST 2021 MEETING

Although a police report had been sent to the parish council meeting, annoyance was expressed that it was not helpful in that it was not specific to Burton and Holme.

Two parishioners made contributions to the Open Forum; almost a record attendance. The first detailed that his property had been designated as an Amenity Site in the last SLDC Local Plan and as this was clearly a mapping error he hoped that it could be rectified. Cllr Rogers and the parish clerk agree to investigate. The B4RN update was somewhat a depressing tale. The government is to curtail the voucher scheme for B4RN from 24th September. Although many properties have been connected in the southeast sector of the village and work is continuing on the southwest side of Main St, to ensure a 'dig' further north on the west side more sign ups, at least 50%, are needed by 10th September. A 'good deal' is available for those houses already tied in to a contract with another provider and B4RN provides subsidised access to broadband.

County Cllr Bingham reported on the fall in Covid cases in Cumbria and that 92% of over 18's have now had two injections. He also noted the proposals to change the Parliamentary constituency boundaries, which would put our area in with Morecambe and Lancaster and the Local Government proposals for Unitary Authorities. This latter would see a basically north/south split of Cumbria with some strange geographical anomalies. There

was some confusion as to whether the planning application for Hemplands had already been seen by the council in this form but just to be sure the council decided to make the same reply as last time of no comment.

The next item at first glance appeared to be a good time to nod off for a bit, but turned out to be of some importance to the village. SLDC are reviewing the Local Plan and are about to start the consultation stage. Areas and issues to be covered will include: tackling climate change, enabling active, safe and healthy lives, sustainable economies, transport and travel, enhancing the natural and built environment and development strategy including meeting housing needs. After the last review some residents were taken by surprise and concerned by the allocation of certain areas for housing development, so please note 7 areas in the village are already annotated as possible development sites. The council is keen for parishioners to be fully aware of this review and to take part in any consultation. For further details visit the virtual consultation room at https://lucmaps.co.uk/South Lakeland Local Plan Consultation/.

The next item was a report from the Parking Working Group. Cllr Wren reported that it might be possible to find more parking spaced on Main St and the group had also done some work on looking at a more ambitious scheme to provide dedicated privare parking. A couple of areas had been identified where numerous spaces could be made but this would rely on the owners of the land agreeing to sell or rent to the parish council. The next step would be to see how many car users would be willing to pay for this facility, probably by a annual fee

before proceeding further with the technicalities of making it work. small item, but worth mentioning, a credit note of £213.01 had been received from SLDC against the fairly outrageous payment for maintenance of street lighting. Then on to the depressing (but not for all items) review of Outstanding Actions. PSiCA: in a word (or two) No Action. The snagging list is still outstanding, but at least the council is still withholding the final payment of £5000. Church Bank Gardens: it says on the agenda that District Cllr Tom Harvey is dealing - but not with any noticeable achievement. County Cllr Bingham reported that the site is still in the hands of the Administrators but that surprisingly three houses are now up for sale by auction. There appears to be no resolution to the problems most of which stem from a blatant disregard of planning conditions.

The new equipment has been installed in the Boon Town playground but the site is considered unsuitable for a Skate Park. However, it was thought that there might be a possibility of this amenity at the Recreation ground. Finally, the council turned down a request for a waste bin at the entrance of Slape Lane. The next meeting will be on Thursday 16th September at 7.30pm.

NATURE NOTES by Bryan Yorke

Orchids - It's been yet another fabulous orchid season up on Burton Fell with some beautiful specimens both with the Dark Red Helleborines and the Broad Leaved Helleborines. I'll bet I counted almost 600 of the former and a couple of hundred of the latter on Burton Fell. Even had a few of the rare hybrids making their presence. To think if you wanted to see this rare orchid hybrid the only place to be within the UK is right here on our doorstep, that to me makes it so special. Every year we have some of Britain's leading botanical academics scrambling on to our fell to check those special plants and they never go away disappointed, they always get the friendly "Burton" welcome.

Other flora – It's that time again, for me to check out the Gentians. I have found the very best place to be is Holme Stinted Pastures with a follow on to Holme Park Fell then across and back on to Newbigging. I think last year I had over 3000 Autumn Gentians along these tracks, but I will not be counting them again in a hurry, that does give me some approximate idea of how many we have. Last year was a good year, and looking so far I don't think we will get anywhere near that number this year, but that's just how it goes some years are up on others. I do think though it may be a special year for the much rarer Field Gentian. I have so far found only two places where I know they reside which are both on Holme Stinted Pastures. Some are quite close to their relation the Autumn Gentian. Searching out and recording "Gentians" will be most of my work over the coming month prior to the start of:

My annual vismig counts (visible bird migration) - counting from the top of Vicarage Lane from about the 10th of the month until mid November when it will be "eyes to the skies" to check all those little fellas and lasses winging their way South to their wintering quarters, but not forgetting September is also a good month for watching Pink Footed Geese arriving in huge numbers and some crossing over Burton and if your lucky you may hear their distant garbling calls which make you look up and sometimes you can see their long "v" formations as they head South East or South. Also watch out for the "Herds of Whiteness" (Whooper Swans) which usually fly lower and in a straight line. I usually see them coming in from the NW and heading to the SE presuming they are on their way to Lincolnshire or Norfolk. Occasionally I see a skein heading South/South West and I presume they may be heading towards Martin Mere on the South of the Ribble.

Our village Birds – Our village Swifts have done OK this year although numbers are down on previous years by some three to four nest sites. This year we have managed to confirm 20 nest sites being used which is the lowest number in the last 5 years. Our two pairs on Riggs House were missing along with the nesting birds which were on the Coaching House. Everywhere else seemed to be doing OK and it's quite possible we are missing others which just never got recorded. It was pleasing news to learn that a single Swift was seen canvassing our new purpose built nest sites on the new development behind the old Royal Hotel, this may be an indication that birds will take on the nest sites next year. The Swifts throughout the Country are struggling with lots and lots of birds which seem

to have gone missing. Although most of our Swifts left us by the end of July and into early August, we still had up to four hawking our skies as late as 15th August.

Even our Swallows and House Martins have not been up to par! With lots of birds which seem to have departed much earlier than they would normally and things have looked rather barren across the village in recent days. Obviously they seem to have settled for a single brood in most cases, so wonder whether this has something to do with shortage of insects or the changing weather patterns who knows. But one thing I do know that it is NOT normal.

If you have never been you don't know what you are missing this village tradition is a sight to behold if your new to the village come along and see what it's all about, you won't be disappointed.



B4RN VOUCHER APPLICATION DEADLINE 10 SEPTEMBER!

The DCMS is curtailing vouchers that pay for the B4RN infrastructure from 24 September. Anyone wishing for a B4RN connection, who has not already applied for a voucher, should do so before 10 September. B4RN are also offering what they call Connect+ whereby for you can have a B4RN connection for £5 /month whilst still in contract with your existing provider.

B4RN have proposed a 'hard-dig' option for St James's Drive, Hollowrayne, Tanpits Lane, Hutton Close, Vicarage Close and the west side of Morewood Drive

So far residents in the Burton Parish have been granted 175 vouchers of which we have managed to connect 70, mainly in the SE corner of the village.

On the west side of the village we have dug in ducting to Barton Close, Barton Row, Chester Terrace, Croft House and the west side of the Square and Croftlands on Neddy Hill. We await a contractor from B4RN to dig in the core ducting.





Vicar's Letter...

The other side of the wall

Dear Friends

Where is God when skies are darkening, relationships are not working, family members are not thriving, businesses are failing, illness is not retreating and help is not arriving?

Is he far away? No. "He is not far from each one of us. `For in him we live and move and have our being." (Acts 17:27-28)

Is he uninterested in us? Nope. "The Lord is good to all; he has compassion on all he has made." (Psalm 145:9)

Is he powerless to help us? Na. "I am the Lord, the God of all mankind. Is anything too hard for me?" (Jeremiah 32:27)

Is he unkind or cruel? No way. "I am the Lord, who exercises kindness, justice and righteousness on earth" (Jeremiah 9:24)

So where is he then?

Some people were recently reminded that people they have never met live within a few feet of them. They were near enough to someone the other side of the wall, in the next-door flat, with Coronavirus, for the NHS app to 'ping' them. It is possible to live close to someone but not to know them at all because you are separated from them by a wall.

God is also the other side of a wall. He is not unable or unwilling to rescue us but our rebellious disobedience towards him is a wall that makes him seem like a distant stranger: "Surely the arm of the LORD is not too short to save, nor his ear too dull to hear. But your iniquities have separated you from your God" (Isaiah 59:1-2) That's it. God is not far away, but there is a wall of our own making.

This barrier was represented in the Jerusalem temple by a huge curtain (reckoned to be 60 feet high and 4 inches thick!) that kept people out of God's presence. As Jesus died on the cross, carrying the sin of the world, "the curtain of the temple was torn in two from top to bottom. The earth shook and the rocks split." (Matthew 27:51) The invitation was clear: put all your trust in Jesus Christ and the wall comes down, there is a way back to the one who made you. Sincerely

HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE

by Roger Bingham

GRAVE HISTORY

Inscriptions on gravestones are accessible sources of social history. Apart from relationships, useful to family historians, they contain information about male occupations. Thus in Burton's grave yard William Airey d, 1780 was a carrier. His wife Jane, who died at 98, after 57 years as a widow in 1837, had the oldest age recorded on a 19th century Burton gravestone. Langdale Atkinson, son of the Lord of the Manor, was a sailor who as a Lieutenant on HMS 'Rattlesnake', was drowned aged 22 'while crossing Lagos Bar on the West coast of Africa' in 1863. Shop keepers and craftsperson included John Barker d. 1731, a mercer-(cloth merchant). Unusually for an inland village James Ireland d. 1830 was a Sail Maker. Pursuing a rural role was a Clawthorpe yeoman John Lucas d. 1794 who left '£40 for an annual afternoon sermon and £12 for bread for Poor Housekeepers of Holme who come to church on Sundays'. Going out of Burton Parish, he bequeathed £5 to the poor of Hale and Whasset. John Kelly d. 1840 was, a 'cordwainer' which meant that he made shoes from new leather as distinct from a cobbler who 'cobbled up' worn footwear

Professional occupations include a vicar, Rev Robert Morewood d.1866, and a doctor James Parkinson d. 1797 who 'by his great professional Skill and Success –and his practical Attention and Care were rewarded with due reputation and the final Acquirement of an ample fortune'. He

left £800 as a fund to increase the Salary of the Grammar School of Burton and to assist 20 poor boys and 14 girls in obtaining a Christian, orderly and useful education'. A shorter tribute was provided for his brother Lawrence who died aged 85 in 1796 'after 60 years assiduous attention to the Profession of writing and accounts'. Another medical doctor was Thomas Harrison who died in 1803. An appreciative tribute was 'erected by the Friends and pupils of Mr Michael Noble Pearson , Master of the Grammar School of this Town, who died the 26th May 1838 aged 54, in token of esteem for his Talent, unwearied attention as a teacher; and for his moral and exemplary conduct as a Christian'. Miles Wilson of Clawthorpe, who 'fell asleep' in 1869 aged 67 had been 'for many years clerk at this church'. A similar memorial was provided by the Hornby Family of Dalton Hall to James Richardson d. 1858, who 'had laboured 44 years in the service of Edmund Hornby of Esq.,' and who, for 'many years assisted in the choir of this church'. Similarly, Edmund Walker had, been employed for upwards of 40 years at Dalton Hall. This stone was erected E.G. Hornby Esq'.

Amongst many longer mainly religious tributes is the commendation to a local polymath after whom Cockin Yard is named: 'Near this stone lies the body of William Cockin who died aged 65 in 1801, a Man of Strong powers of mind and of singularly Modest and general benevolence of heart, a self taught Philosopher and a Christian from conviction who derived his faith from the Holy Scriptures..' RKB.


